The Church Building - Crisis

David Knight, Vice-Chairman of the Parish Church's Council writes: The future sustainability of St Leonards Church building is in crisis.

This beautiful historic building where thousands of people have worshipped over the centuries needs to be restored and renovated to make it fit for purpose.

The results of our recent Quinquennial Inspection have been published by the architect. The cost of repairs amounts to almost £300,000 just to keep it watertight and free from damp.



Twyver Women's Institute

The WI is celebrating its centenary and we heard that the WI Centenary Baton, which has been travelling round the country, was to be in our area on March 17th. Margaret, our President, and members from each of the other WIs in the area will travel by horse and cart to the St Barnabas Church Hall to meet Mayor Debbie Llewellyn for the occasion.

At the March meeting our speaker was John Crowther from the Hedgehog Hospital, where sick and injured hogs are brought for treatment. He was inspired to get involved by Annie Parfitt who organised the British Hedgehog Preservation Society. He and many other

volunteers keep the hospital going. They treated and looked after 120 hedgehogs last year. The decline in the numbers of hedgehogs is becoming very serious due to loss of habitat, changes in weather patterns and the large numbers of badgers around these days. The hospital relies on donations to help buy medicines and food and a comfortable bed. In closing his talk he implored us to look out for these little mammals; any offers to help would be gratefully received.

Our next meeting will be on April 13th in the USL Village Hall at 7.30pm and all will be made very welcome. We will be introduced to Karen Van Hoff who will tell us all about The Knitted Necklace, a Hat and a Tiara.

Continuing our series of articles on local businesses, this month we feature Bourne Baking

Esther Bourne is the Owner and Director of Bourne Baking Ltd. She says: "My family and I moved into USL over 5 years ago and we love living in the village.

I set up my bakery business as a Limited Company in November 2013 and run it from my home. But how did I get to that point? After 28 years in Medical Sales, I was made redundant, but along the way I had also spent a few years running cafés for Sainsburys and Morrisons, which gave me experience of the catering industry. My enthusiasm for baking probably came from members of my family over several generations, my late mother, both grandmothers, and aunts who were all excellent bakers.



Over the last 3-4 years I have been busy developing recipes, testing and perfecting them, learning techniques to decorate and flavour different cakes so that I can offer unique designs.

My main focus has been cupcakes and if you look at my website (see link below) you will see that I bake other items too including small Wedding Cakes. I have also recently branched out into providing buffets for groups from 2 to 50 people (cold food only). This includes Breakfast Buffets and Afternoon Teas. Menus for what we offer will be appearing shortly on my website.

I hold a Level 2 Food Hygiene and Safety Certificate and following an inspection last year by Stroud District Council, I was awarded a Level 5 Food Hygiene rating (the highest score available). I also have advanced training in Food Allergens and am able to bake and cater for allergy sufferers, Vegan and Vegetarian diets.

I will be having a stand at our Village Fete on 20 June so please come along, say hello and see what I love to do !!

I hope I can be of service to some of you in the future."



PUTTING FOOD ON THE TABLE!

Today in and around Gloucester some parents are struggling to put food on the table. One in five people live below the 'poverty line' in the UK and this can mean that parents go without to feed their children. Redundancy, low incomes, benefit delays, ill health, unexpected bills or a sudden crisis can mean that the cupboards are bare. For some the choice can be eating or heating. This is a challenge which can be faced on a daily basis. Not eating regular healthy meals can have a detrimental effect on short and long term health.

In Gloucester our local Foodbank provides emergency food to local people in crisis, and has been providing this support for ten years! Food is donated through the generosity of the local population, and then volunteers sort and pack it into emergency food boxes. Over 120 agencies including Age UK, Children's Centres, Schools and Citizens Advice Bureau based in Gloucester City provide vouchers to families and individuals who are in difficult circumstances, which can be exchanged for three days worth of food. A voucher system is used to ensure that clients are genuine and that the underlying problems are being addressed. Clients can have a maximum of 3 vouchers in a 6 month period, and the Foodbank enquires if a subsequent voucher is presented. This is to ensure that both the agency and client are working to resolve the underlying problem, in order that the client can become financially independent.

Gloucester

Foodbanks provide more than just food! They are a point of contact for people who otherwise may well be isolated and feeling desperate or unwell. Foodbanks can help to ease or prevent family breakdown, housing loss, crime and mental health deterioration - by listening and by signposting people to further support if appropriate.

Anneliese Sterry, Gloucester Foodbank Manager, is working at the 'coal face' on a daily basis and witnesses the problematic situations that befall people, and the value of the work that the local Foodbank is doing. She says of Gloucester, 'During 2014 we supported 5,186 people including 1,727 children under 16 living in and around Gloucester city. In 2014 we gave clients 37.5 tonnes of food and toiletries. At present, we are giving an average of 3.5 tonnes of food and toiletries each month.'

For local donations of foodstuffs, the collection point in Upton St Leonards is at the Church each Friday between 6pm and 6.30pm and also at Church services. Diana Way, the coordinator at our Church then ferries the goods to the Gloucester Foodbank centre. For some this may not be convenient and there is also a collection point at Christchurch Abbeymead and at Tesco in Brockworth. So what kind of foods are most in demand? Long life goods, dried goods, and tinned foods. Some people do not have the means to warm or cook food. This can be due to energy costs, so 'cold food packages' can also be provided in these instances. The list of items in an emergency food parcel was drawn up by a nutritionist to ensure that each client receives a nutritionally balanced diet. Below is an up-to-date list of particular items required at present.

Funds are also welcomed to cover running costs. The Foodbank is situated in Great Western Road, Gloucester.

World War 1 Centenary Commemorations - April 1915

We Will Remember Them

Continuing our series of articles remembering the men of Upton in the month of the centenary of their death, we remember ARTHUR PERCIVAL DEARMAN BIRCHALL.



Arthur as a young boy

Arthur Birchall was the eldest son of the prominent Birchall family who lived at Bowden Hall. He was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Royal Fusiliers attached to the 4th Battalion Canadian Infantry and died on 24 April 1915. He has no known grave and is named on the Royal Fusiliers Panels 6 and 8 at the Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres.

He was in Canada as an instructor at the start of the war. He was made a temporary Lt Col in 4th Bn Canadian Infantry (1st

Ontario Regt) and arrived in France with his Battalion and moved into Belgium to Ypres. On 22 April the Germans started the 2nd Battle of Ypres and opened the valves of 4000 canisters of chlorine gas which drifted over the Allied lines. This was the first time that poison gas had been used. Manning the front line were French Colonial troops who died in their hundreds whilst others fled to the rear. This left a gap of 4 miles in the front line and the Canadians were ordered to plug this gap. The Canadians, using make-shift gas masks, held the German advance and it was during this battle near St Julian that Arthur was killed. He was mentioned in Dispatches for his bravery. His body was never found.

A search of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) web site reveals that he is actually named twice on

the Menin Gate Memorial, the second entry is as a Canadian casualty - Lt Col AP Birchall of 4th Bn Canadian Infantry (1st Ontario Regt) who died on 23 April 1915, recorded on Panels 18-24-26 and 30.

The Birchall family's influence in the Village remains visible today through the Birchall Memorial Institute' which was erected in 1898 by the Birchalls as a working men's club, in memory of Arthur's father John Dearman Birchall.

Tragically, the Birchalls were to lose yet another son: Edward, a Captain in the Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry was killed on 10 August 1916 and is buried in Calais. In 1918, their cousin John died following an appendix operation whilst at Eton school; he is buried in Upton.




Arthur in 1895 with the USL Cricket Team (this picture still hangs in the BMI)

There is a wooden plaque in the Village Hall erected on the opening of the hall by the Birchall family in memory of Arthur, Edward and young John. There is also a bronze plaque in the Church to the memory of Arthur from his surviving comrades of the Ontario Regiment.

We hope you can take the time to look at the plaques and also John's grave to read more about them. The CWGC website is very informative too.

Please let us know what more you may find out about the 37 men listed on our War Memorial; we aim to publish details in a small booklet and on the Parish website in due course.

Dear Friends,

Easter is a wonderful time to reflect on the principles of our faith. As we approach Easter, we may consider the notion of fresh starts in the form of new life and new birth.

We are inundated with images of eggs and chicks as we give and receive Easter eggs and possibly colourful cards illustrated with springtime.

The impact of what happened that first Easter is still relevant today.


When Jesus died and rose, he did it for us. He offers us new life, eternal life, with him; life that starts now, but continues beyond this life. Now that is worth celebrating!





THE ANNUAL CHURCH MEETINGS

It really goes without saying that these meetings are more important than ever this year. Church members should do their utmost to attend.

The most urgent need for repair is the north side of the roof, where the tiles need to be replaced.

Historically Upton St Leonards was blessed with a large and generous congregation and the church thrived; in 2015 we are in a completely different place.

The parish consists of about 3000 people and with the demands of everyday life and associated interests, people's needs for spiritual sustainability seem to be waning.

I personally think that in today's world our need for peace, love and unity is stronger than ever.

Over the last decade or two the Christian community has not helped itself or the community. It has closed in on itself and become insular and has not recognised the spiritual requirement of society.

A good example of this is our local church. The congregation is getting older, our regular generous members have moved away or passed on and new blood is not filling our pews.

It is also interesting to note that a large part of the current congregation who attend and work for our church live outside the parish.

We are however very fortunate in that our new part-time vicar is outward-looking and recognises the problems.

The Upton St Leonards Christian community is not about the church building but about the people, it's about mission and getting out into the community and spreading the good news of Jesus.

There will need to be a strong and determined team to organise fund raising and apply for grants. Even if you are not a church member you can be a participant in this effort. We've done it before (remember USLOT) and we can do it again. The church was passed on to us in decent working order. What are we going to pass on to Village residents to come?

Offer your services to Rev Christine.

Things are already starting to happen in that respect.

If we want the church building to continue as a place where our families and friends can be married, baptised, buried or just to turn up to sing carols at Christmas, then we need to support this building financially as well as spiritually.

The current congregation is now aware that the future of the building is in doubt; the church is extremely cold and damp as we are unable to keep the heating on for long periods to warm the space.

The congregation will not though disappear. The founders of the early Christian church met in people's houses; this could be our future.

'The Dinosaur's Diary'



Your Parish Council

At the Council's March meeting, the Clerk was asked to do what he could to hasten repairs to the potholes at the bottom of Nut Hill Road.

The Council will be writing to a few village residents about hedges and bushes that are growing over pavements and thereby significantly reducing the usable width. If your bush / hedge / tree restricts the pavement, please cut it back!

The Council is worried about the lack of progress on reducing motorway noise with re-surfacing. The Council agreed to write to the Highways Agency Chief Executive expressing its concerns. Councillor Hunt has been filmed for a Channel 5 documentary on motorway noise.

In the February edition of USL Life there was an article about a Gloucestershire Rural Community Council (GRCC) scheme "Friends For You", a volunteer befriending service in support of older, isolated and housebound people in the community. Councillor Wilson and others are looking at implementing this in the Village. There is an article about this on page 16.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is on Tuesday 7th April (not the usual Monday) at 7.30 in the Pavilion. As usual, Villagers are welcome to attend.

Waste Collection & Recycling

Parish Council Chairman Keith Pearson writes:

Over the last few years there has been a drive to encourage recycling to a much greater degree. Overall, residents in Upton do a good job and recycle all they can - so a big thank you to all those who do. Do note that there is no need to put the bin out every fortnight if it is nearly empty. Some do not create a very large amount of recyclable waste; I probably put the recycling bin out once every six weeks for our household.

For nearly 15 years the waste collections for Stroud District have been handled by contractors Veolia, who currently collect black sacks every week and recycling every fortnight.

From next year a company called UBICO will be running the waste collection services. This company will be partly owned by Stroud District Council. With this set-up the Council has negotiated a new contract and system for an enhanced service at a reasonable increase in cost.

The column on the right shows the changes you can expect when the new service starts. These changes we believe will help divert even more waste from landfill, which will be of benefit to the environment.

So if you are not part of the recycling club yet, please start now!

HOW THE SERVICE WILL CHANGE

The existing recycling service will remain as it is, and the Council hopes to add plastic film recycling in the near future

There will be a new food waste weekly collection service, using a small caddy bin supplied by the council - you will be able to line the caddy bins with plastic carrier bags.

Garden waste will be collected fortnightly for recycling, using wheelie bins. There will be a charge for this optional additional service. The green bag system will go out of use.

With an extensive range of recycling materials being collected fortnightly, food waste collected weekly and a separate garden waste service, nonrecyclable waste will be collected fortnightly.

Black bags will be discontinued and a small size wheelie bin will be used.

Collection of bulky items will become chargeable as this free service can no longer be sustained, but costs will be reasonable, probably around £15 for three items at a time, but we will encourage people to use furniture recycling organisations where they can.

Friends for You

Gloucestershire Rural Community Council has recently launched a project called Friends For You, which is

a volunteer based befriending scheme. You may have seen the article about it in last month's USL Life.

USL Life editors Andrea Dawson, Peter Wilson and Andy Russell, together with Millie Barnes, want to promote and support this initiative, using USL Life to highlight what the scheme is and to encourage Villagers to take part. The scheme, in essence, is trying to raise awareness, encourage volunteers, and match up volunteers with people who are on their own, not engaged with



things going on in the Village, maybe housebound, and therefore not seeing or talking to others very often.

It's a sad fact that with an increasing ageing population, families scattered or

no family at all, a lot of older people do not receive regular social contact. A reliable, local volunteer visitor calling regularly each week for an hour or two offering friendship and a listening ear has a positive impact on a person's state of mind and sense of wellbeing. Their visits provide an opportunity for a chat, a chance to enjoy a cup of tea together or maybe go for a walk. Some contact may also be achieved through phone calls but the thrust of the scheme is to enable face to face contact where possible. The friendships that develop enrich the lives of both people.

The overall aim is to reduce loneliness and isolation, which is the scourge of our modern society. Loneliness is a bigger problem than simply an emotional experience and can shorten someone's life expectancy. If you feel that you could spare a couple of hours per week to support someone in need, please drop in to the Pavilion some time between 2 and 4.30 pm on Tuesday 12 May. Millie, Andrea, Peter and Andy will be there, supported by Sue Black

who is the "Friends for You" coordinator for Gloucestershire. Please come along and have a chat to understand how the scheme will work and what support is being



provided to volunteers in the scheme. Tea and coffee will be available during the afternoon.

There is some paperwork and a security check to complete before the arrangements are put in place. Full training and support for volunteers will be provided by the team running Friends for You.

If you are reading this and feel you would benefit from a friendly face visiting you on a weekly basis for a cuppa and chat, please pop in and say hello. We will then do our best to match you up with a willing volunteer.

If for any reason this particular afternoon arrangement isn't convenient for you, but you feel this service might be of interest to you or a family member or friend, please do get in touch and we will visit you in the comfort and privacy of your own home to explain more about how it works.

The photo was taken as part of an appeal to grant-giving organisations, such as the Gloucestershire Playing Fields Association, and the Biffa Awards scheme (using money from Landfill Tax). The club has started a project to raise the £42,000 it will need to replace the fixed practice nets at the Recreation Ground. The ones there now were DIY built at very low cost by club members, and though they have served the club well for a number of years, they have become unusable. The England and Wales Cricket Board advice is to build to a much higher specification, mostly using specialist contractors, for

nets that will last much longer and can be used even when the surrounding ground is too soft - through the winter as well. The Parish Council has been very keen to support this project, and has already offered a grant towards the cost.

The club is most grateful to the Lady Downe Trust, which has made a grant covering 50% of the training fees for 4 new coaches.

The club is also most grateful to Cedar Motors of Upton Hill, who sent a mechanic, free of charge, to fix our roller when it broke down recently.

Practice will start outdoors in April, and the first scheduled game is on Sunday 19th, when the club takes on neighbours Coopers Edge (who share use of the ground) in a pre-season warm-up. League games for adults and juniors start in May.
