On behalf of The Upstagers I would like to thank everyone who supported our latest panto, Snow White, and also for all the kind comments we received afterwards. It turned out to be very successful in the end and we had three out of four sell out performances.

It was my first time writing a full length pantomime and I was very nervous as to how it would be received but I was thrilled by the result. We did face quite a bit of adversity throughout and at times

wondered why we do it but that's drama for you.

Not long after starting rehearsals, the people who were going to help me with singing and choreography had to drop out due to very valid personal reasons. This meant that I had to take on the job of musical director as well as acting director. As I was also doing the part of the wicked queen this meant lots of jumping on and off the stage at times but I was ably assisted by Pam Tickner and Debbie Bartlett. My daughter Maddie Lewis who was playing the part of Snow White and who lives in Bristol was catching a train straight after work in order to make rehearsals and then back home again afterwards and I thank my husband

for ferrying her back and forth to the station in time to catch her train. We initially struggled to find a prince but then found young Kieran who did a fine job and turned out to know his princess from years ago which was lovely for them both.

Just as I thought my troubles were over one of the cast dropped out which caused another headache. We were lucky enough to find a new member from Upton Hill who took over the part of Flash and did a fantastic job, also doubling up as Buttons – and he could sing!

Bits got rewritten and added as we went along and I became inspired by my actors, but due to work commitments and other things we looked as if we would never be able to get a full cast rehearsal until the final dress rehearsals. Then another member of the cast realised he would be away and wouldn't make either of the dress rehearsals! This was a blow but we managed to fit another dress rehearsal in a week earlier so things were really starting to come together.

I should have known better! The week before we were due to perform it I had a phone call from one of our leading actors to say that he was unable to do the panto. My stomach hit the floor and I really didn't know what to do for a couple of minutes, then I rang Keith Pearson ("The Mirror") and told him the news. We both made a few frantic phone calls and managed to get Lisa Holman

All Change at our Village Post Office!

Hello everyone, my name is Seeta and my husband (Rahul Odedra) and I have just taken over the running of Upton St Leonards village Post Office.

We are very pleased to have moved to such a lovely environment having come from the large city of Birmingham!!

You will see that we have a daughter who is called Shanaya and she is 15 months old.

By the time you read this the Post Office refurbishment necessitating a temporary closure will have taken place (14 - 24 March) although we did manage to keep the shop open during that time.

The new look has involved taking down the screen so the post office and retail counters merge.

We have been working in the new look post office since 1300 on 24 March.

Along with the physical changes are some revised opening times which have been designed to provide more flexibility for customers.

We hope that the improved access to the Post Office and Shop will help those of you who may be out for a large part of the day and need to shop late afternoon / early evening. Also, if you find you run out of something you need for dinner we are on the doorstep to try and help!!

We will be looking to improve on the previous product range, particularly for those items that are purchased on a regular basis and this will include beers and wine.

Twyver WI - March meeting

In a change to the published programme the speaker was Addie Stevenson, Chief Executive of Emmaus. Her talk was entitled 'Emmaus in Gloucestershire – more than just a charity shop'. She explained that Emmaus does not just sell furniture etc. but also provides a home and meaningful work for people who have experienced homelessness, providing them with the support and stability they need to move on with their lives. She was accompanied by two of the "companions" (the name Emmaus uses for those it is helping). who described to us the life events which had caused them to become homeless and subsequently be part of the Emmaus community. Their stories were very emotional and a great eye-opener as to how homelessness can happen to anyone in any walk of life, often through no fault of their own. Members were greatly impressed by the courage of the speakers and the good work done by Emmaus.

March Parish Council Meeting

The Parish Clerk confirmed that training for the Speedwatch project would take place shortly.

The Police had recently held a constructive meeting with Upton School regarding inappropriate parking.

The Green Waste Collection Service had received a good uptake and the Bulky item collection service is working well with no increase in fly tipping.

The District Council intends raising Council Tax by 1.99%.

The A417 Missing Link road has been given the green light at government level.

A meeting of senior political leaders is due to be held shortly on M5 Noise Reduction Measures although the Parish Council is still to see the Highways Agency Report on this issue.

Two quotes for work were agreed at the meeting, the first for drainage improvement at the Recreation Ground and the second to erect protection posts and signage on Twyver Bank.


The erosion of the verges on Nut Hill has become dangerous in places and is being reported to Amey Highways.

- A house has been reviewed and made safe, with the help of the local police, giving a lady with impaired mobility the confidence to remain in her own home.
- Grab rails and bathroom equipment have been installed to assist an ex-military gentleman return and continue to be independent in addition to linking him with exservice organisations and leading to the renewing of old acquaintances.
- I have been able to link farming charities with a farmer, to recruit staff and find volunteers to permit the ongoing running of a family farm. And much, much more.....

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CHURCHWARDEN KEITH ROBBINS writes: Dear friends

"Will ye no' come back again?"

When I first arrived in this beautiful Village - I know I have only just arrived (in 1997) compared with some of you - I attended the evening service regularly at church, and there were maybe 30 in the congregation, with easily double that at the 10 o'clock service and maybe 20 at the early communion every Sunday. Now there are just 6 services a month, and I have seen as few as a dozen at the main 10 o'clock service.

Of course many older members have passed away, and others have left the Village, but I say to those who have moved in and to those who don't now attend regularly, "Will ye no' come back again?". Jesus told a parable of the big feast, in which the host sent out many invitations, as all was ready, but one by one those invited started to make excuses.

We have just celebrated the greatest feast of all at Easter, and every Sunday echoes that pinnacle of our faith: "Dying and living, he declared your love, gave us grace, and opened the gate of glory." That, surely, transcends all the excuses!

As has been said so often, the church is the people of God, not the building. But a set of individuals can't really be a "people" without actually congregating from time to time, so please come back to your church. And of course the building we have happens to be a beautiful place to meet!

EASTER and the RESURRECTION - a personal view by David Knight

I hope everyone had an enjoyable and peaceful Easter.

When we travel across the country and further afield we cannot fail to see a church building. When we search the horizon we see steeples and towers. Every town and village has one or more places of worship.

Christianity has indeed spread from the days of the early Church more than 2000 years ago and is still spreading. China is currently seeing a huge growth in the Gospel message.

The Bible teaches us that when the whole world has been given the opportunity to accept the risen Christ the end will come of the present system of things. God will take over and heaven and earth will be joined.

When we look at our magnificent church building at Upton St Leonards, or when we return home and travel down the hill from Painswick or return on the motorway and see that splendid tower, especially when it is illuminated, what does it mean to us?

It is not just a building to admire when we go by, it is a place to be used to worship and learn the gospel, to escape from the stresses and strains of this life for an hour and just think and take stock, if it makes Jesus enter our thoughts for a minute or two all well and good.

The Church building means one thing to me and that is a reminder of the risen Christ and that is the central message of Christianity. When we think about the risen Christ do we think about the Easter festival? There is no indication of the observance of the Easter festival in the New Testament, or in the writings of the apostolic Fathers. The sanctity of special times was an idea absent from the minds of the first Christians. We don't need special times of the year to celebrate Christian festivals. The risen Christ is not something to remember once a year but to live with every day of our lives if we are true believers. When we remember the risen Christ and follow his example we our trying to perfect our lives and reject evil. As a Church community we should be growing in faith together led by the Gospel message first and foremost. We can only spread this message if we look outwards into the community and do good works and make disciples of people. This is what will make our Church at Upton grow and the building flourish.

ANNUAL CHURCH MEETINGS

The pair of Annual Church meetings (our AGM in other words) take place on Sunday 17th April.

11:30 a.m. At the first, very brief, meeting, the Churchwardens are elected. At the moment we only have one - there should be two to share the load. Surprisingly, these are elected by the whole community, not just church members. So anyone who is a resident of the Village, and anyone on the Church Electoral Roll, may attend and vote for the candidates.

11:35 a.m. The second meeting is the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, or APCM, for short. This is the meeting with reports on the past year, pastoral, administrative, finance and all church activities. There are elections to the Parochial Church Council. Though only church members, i.e. those on the Church Electoral Roll, are entitled to attend and vote, the Church invites anyone interested to attend (we are allowed to do that and we are not trying to hide anything!)

QUINQUENNIAL UPDATE

There is progress to report. The leaking vestry roof will be replaced soon. A roofer has been selected to carry out temporary repairs elsewhere pending future reroofing. We are making some progress with an application for a Lottery Grant for the main roof work. Unwanted trees in the churchyard are being removed.

A flood in the basement has put the main oil-fired heater out of action. It is probable that we will have to replace the system altogether.

Mike Blanch, who is coordinating this activity, writes: "I visited Holy Trinity Church in Minchinhampton to listen to a presentation on how they are planning a refit of their church to meet today's needs.

They have a small planning group, which is looking at ideas from parishioners, such as replacing pews with individual seats which can be moved around to suit the occasion, utilising other spaces in the church, such as the sanctuary area. At Minchinhampton they are also discussing under floor heating, and I obtained some useful information.

I'd like to set up a similar small team here, to review what we actually need, with the object of involving others, increase attendance and participation at services, and use the space for more social events."

Joining in as we journey on beyond 2016: Rt Revd Rachel Treweek, Bishop of Gloucester



From the Diocese of Gloucester

Since 2012, churches within the Diocese of Gloucester have been working towards a shared vision - Journeying Together. Our four key commitments are to worship together; to share our Christian

faith and values; to provide a visible presence in every community and parish; and to serve the wider world. I am now inviting you to be part of the process of discerning how we move forward on our journey over the next five years, building on all that has been achieved.

Rooted in Prayer (5 to 15 May)

I am inviting everyone to come to a Day of Prayer in the Cathedral on Ascension Day, Thursday 5 May, any time between 11am to 8.30pm. There will be an opportunity to pray in different ways as we come together before God to listen to what the Holy Spirit is saying to us. It is then hoped that in your local context you will initiate ways to bring people together to pray during the ten days to Pentecost.

Conversation around 3 core questions (15 May to 20 July)

- What is the Holy Spirit saying to us in this Diocese?
- What is your dream or vision for the Church in our Diocese in five years' time?
- What could we do to realise this vision?

The aspiration is that even now you will begin to plan times and places to hold conversations with others, not only within worshipping congregations and church-led projects, but also with people of all ages and backgrounds in the wider community, many of whom may not identify themselves as Christians. We need to be listening carefully to what God might be saying to us through those we encounter in the places where we live, work, study and socialise. We also need to think about those who are often missing from our encounters. Other people may hold

different perspectives from our own and we need to listen in an undefended way. Please do share the various ways in which you plan to hold conversations.

There will be clear instructions about how to feed back what you have heard and there will then be a process of distillation before launching some key priorities together in Advent. If you are reading this and you live or work within the Diocese then you are part of this process of prayer and conversation to discern what the Spirit of God might be saying to us. Taena Pottery

When I asked Sean and Vici Casserley from Taena Pottery if they would consider being featured in USL Life magazine they invited me for supper to talk it over. The Pottery and Studio, and the Casserleys' home, are in the grounds of Whitley Court Farm on Nut Hill Road. Outside the pottery, spring flowers have already appeared and rescued chickens are clucking in their pens. Looking towards the hills I can see High Brotheridge and lower down, to the south, Prinknash Abbey. There is a faint smell of milk as this is dairy farmland, and although it's only a little over 4 miles from the centre of Gloucester, it feels miles away.

Sean and Vici met in the early seventies on a three-year studio pottery course at Camborne and Redruth College in Cornwall. Their tutors included Janet and Bernard Leach from St Ives Pottery and Michael Cardew from the Wenford Bridge Pottery, all leading lights in the heyday of the Studio Pottery Movement. The course was designed to equip students with all the skills necessary to set up and run their own business, with a can-do, practical, make-do-and-mend ethos. Vici recalls how poor the students were in those days, and remembers living for a week on a packet of Complan and broccoli stolen from local fields. When I asked Sean how he remembered college he was keen to mention the first time he saw Vici, "I walked into the college studio and saw a very pretty girl, beautiful even, with long dark hair, throwing a pot at the wheel. She was wearing loons (widebottomed trousers), desert boots and a fisherman's jumper." Vici remembers Sean as "noisy, big-bearded and wearing ragged jeans. He may have had a lot to say, but he was always interesting!" During supper which included vegetables from their very large fruit and vegetable garden and home bottled fruit and drinks, they talked happily of their young dreams of making a life together, inspired by the classic film "Isaac Button, Country Potter".*

When the college course finished they returned to Whitley Court, Sean's birthplace, and were invited to take over Taena

Pottery by Loo Graves, who had started it with Margaret Leach after the Second World War. In the early days the workshop had been part of a broadbased pacifist community and that feeling, of a more humane approach to living and working, still persists.

"Low tech and high skill" is how Sean describes their wares. These techniques have been handed down from generation to generation and the Casserleys' authentic slipware relies on careful selection of clays for trailing and feathering, and a light touch of the hand. The tools for decorations are improvised from whatever is to hand, from washing-up liquid bottles with hand-cut nozzles made from crow or pigeon quills to an old car aerial with a fishing line. The overall effect is of pots which recall the qualities of traditional work while remaining timeless; pots which are quiet and do their job well.

The Casserleys also produce a full range of plain and functional wheel thrown pots for the table, mainly in their signature blue as well as traditional yellow. These are sometimes embellished by Vici with sgraffito lettering using a dry metal nib. House names, commemorative plates, wall sconces, incense burners, children's named mugs, plates and







piggy banks can all be made to order. Last year they were commissioned to make replicas of 15th century large decorative wall sconces for Sir Thomas Moore's house in Cheyne Walk, for the Queen's visit. I asked them what they were most proud of in their work. Sean was quick to reply, "Well, I think the kids turned out really well".

Vici and Shaun have run weekend workshops on Cotswold kiln building and Cotswold slipware, and for the Arts Council's "Festival of Potters". Apart from their studio at Taena, their pots are sold in *Potters*, a co-operative in Bristol, *Brewery Arts Cirencester*, the new Gloucester motorway services, *Made in Stroud*, *Arcade Artisans* at the Brewery, Cheltenham, and Vici has a stall at Stroud Farmers' Market. The pots have been shown in a variety of magazines including *The World of Interiors* and *Ceramic Review*.

Sean says he does all the donkey work as well as throwing the pots and mixing all the glazes and Vici does the decorating, lettering and selling. They say they make nice pots for nice people and after a working lifetime of making pottery their buyers continue to come back for more. This is a 40 year old double act, and as I leave after supper, with a box of their eggs, I feel their life isn't just a story about making pottery, there's another story here, about two lives well lived.

Arthur James Mourbey

Arthur James Mourbey was born on 11th December 1896 at Bowden Hall Cottage. He was employed after leaving school at the Co-op in Gloucester. He joined the 1st Royal Gloucestershire Hussars, initially serving in Egypt. The Regiment was sent to Gallipoli before being evacuated back to Egypt. He was wounded in an attack by Turkish forces and was taken prisoner. He died on 23rd April 1916 - Easter Sunday - aged only 19. He is buried in Kantara War Cemetery in Egypt.

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The Birchall Memorial Institute (BMI)

For many the BMI is the heart of the village and its 800+ members know everything there is to know about the place, but to others, perhaps those who have moved into the village in the last 10 years, the BMI remains a bit of a mystery. I moved into Upton St Leonards in September 2006 but it was not until the Summer of 2009 that I plucked up the courage to enter the BMI, and I have been a member ever since.

In November 2015, I was asked to join the BMI Committee and have been given the responsibility to represent the younger generation within the community. In my opinion the BMI is an excellent facility that is right on my doorstep, but I suspect that there are many who live in the village who do not know what the BMI is, so I am going to try and dispel some of the myths, by answering a few simple questions.

What is the BMI?

BMI stands for the Birchall Memorial Institute and has nothing to do with the Body Mass Index (which was my first assumption!) Put simply the BMI is a social club which was formed in 1898 for the people of Upton St Leonards. The BMI has a Lounge bar and a Sports bar, which shows a wide range of live sports, a Skittles Alley which doubles as a function room at the weekends, and a Pool and Snooker room. It also has a patio area which is lovely in the summer.

Where is the BMI?

The BMI is located on Bondend Rd, next to the Village Hall.

Who can be a member of the BMI?

Anybody over 18 years old can become a member of the BMI, all you need to do is fill in a membership form which is available at the bar, get it signed by a current member and pay your subscription. Once the form is approved by the committee you will be issued with a Membership card.

How much does Membership Cost?

Membership is £15 per annum for new members and £10 per annum after that. There is a concessionary rate (50% off) for anyone in receipt of a State pension and there is an option to purchase a discounted 4 year membership.

Are women welcome at the BMI?

Yes, Women are allowed in all areas of the BMI. Part of the club's history is that it used to be men only but this is very much in the past.

Are children allowed in the BMI?

Yes, Children are allowed in the Lounge before 9pm as long as they are accompanied by an adult.

When is the BMI open?

The times for each bar varies slightly but at least one of the bars is open at these times.

Monday – Thursday 12.00 – 14.30 and 19.00 – 23.00

Friday, Saturday 12.00 – 23.30 Sunday 12.00 – 22.30

Can I book the BMI for Private Functions?

Yes, as mentioned before, the Skittles Alley doubles up as a function room and can be booked for Birthdays, Anniversaries, Christenings and Wakes. Room Hire is £50 for non-members, and £25 for members. Several different catering options are available.

Is there entertainment at the BMI?

Yes, there is a wide range of entertainment that is organised throughout the year including Quizzes, Live Music and a Summer Pig Roast. Details of coming events can be seen in this newsletter and at the BMI website www.bmiclub.co.uk

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
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
