Hearing Dogs provide visibility to an invisible disability, transforming lives. Every hearing dog is specially matched to a deaf person so that the dog's skills and personality perfectly complement the lifestyle and needs of their new owner.

We meet again on Easter Monday 2 April in USL Village Hall to hear a presentation from Chris O'Grady on "A Walk to Rome". All ladies are very welcome.

## Twyver WI ASTORS Members listened to a very interesting

talk given by Mike Tookey on "The Gloucester Street Pastors", who are part of a national and international interdenominational church response to urban situations. They have been serving Gloucester city's nightlife over the past six years and work alongside the local Police force and various community and church groups. Ten years ago there were just 280 pastors in Britain but now 10,000 have been trained. Pastors go out in groups of four and are easily identifiable by their uniform. They have an Administration officer who arranges their 4 week rotas when they go out on the streets. They each carry a rucksack which contains flip flops, a dustpan and brush, bandages, bottles of water and chocolate biscuits and evidence



#### Battle of Upton St Leonards - By Teresa Clarke

The message on the phone said, "Could we meet to talk about the Battle of Upton?"

I was intrigued. Men with crossbows; Lords astride horses with flaring nostrils; pennants blowing in the wind and weeping Maidens.

Standing at the top of Portway I tried to visualise the two opposing armies in the fields below.

Arriving at the appointed time and entering the lounge of an old stone farmhouse, my host handed me a faded Northgate single pocket file, across the front of which was written "Upton Protests".

For many, like myself, Upton's Day of Action, 21 April 1988, may have little significance. But for the residents of Upton at the time, it heralded a great triumph.

Their campaigning, with the assistance of local politicians, radio celebrities, and the fierce determination of the community themselves, ensured that the village remained outside the Gloucester City Boundary. Reading through the documents, the correspondence from the Local Government Boundary Commission, letters of support from Councillors, local newspaper coverage etc, I realise that living in this beautiful rural community is the result of the efforts of the residents in 1988.

I thought it best to reflect memories of the time with words from some of those involved and I start with a letter from John Watts:

Upton's Day of Action 21 April 1988.

Who Remembers?

Towing a J.C.B. Digger back over Upton Lane motorway bridge using the Tug Of War rope?

The huge bonfire built on Prinknash Knoll, materials supplied by David Cridland?

The march by villagers up Portway to throw the Boundary Commision's proposals on the bonfire?

The old and young transported up the hill on David Cridland's tractor trailer that nearly tipped over at the gate.

The 8 oz mortar firework, courtesy of Tim Court from Cross House, which set the sheep running and the peacocks screaming.

The soup kitchen manned by neighbours from Cranham. Martin Whitaker serving tomatoes.


The work of the very professional Action Committee. Two to mention, Edward Nurse and Monica Sims.

The letters of support from neighbouring parishes and District Councillors including Nora Regan.

And then the great celebration Barbeque/Barn dance at Portway Farm when the result of Upton's actions had been declared. The prime organiser was Richard McLean.



In following editions I will endeavour to present a sequence of reminiscences from villagers who took on the might of Government in the defence of Upton St Leonards' identity.



Speaker: June Dolphin - 'To Zambia with Love'

#### Tower Floodlighting



#### Rev Clodagh Ingram writes

#### No Hoax Easter

There will be much comment on the fact that Easter Day falls on April 1st year. Easter Sunday usually falls early to mid-April and occasionally at the end of March but for the first time in 73 years Easter Sunday shares the same date as April Fool's Day. Easter Sunday's date changes every year and has done since 325AD when the Church Council decided that Easter Sunday would always fall on the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the equinox. This followed on from

the fact that the Jewish Passover is celebrated on the first full moon of the equinox and Christians believe that the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ took place at the time of the Jewish Passover.

No doubt there will be claims that Jesus rising from the dead is a hoax and Christians are foolish for believing that Jesus is the son of God who came to save the world.

I have to admit that there have been some great hoaxes played and by some very well respected people. In 1976 the British astronomer Patrick Moore made an announcement on BBC Radio 2. He said this: "At 9:47 a.m. today there will be a 'once-in-a-lifetime' astronomical event occurring." He said that listeners could experience it in their very own homes. The planet Pluto would pass behind Jupiter, temporarily causing a gravitational alignment that would counteract and lessen the Earth's own gravity.

Patrick Moore told his listeners that if they jumped in the air at the exact moment that this planetary alignment occurred, they would experience a strange floating sensation. When 9:47 AM arrived, Radio 2 began to receive hundreds of phone calls from listeners claiming to have felt the sensation. One woman even reported that she and her eleven friends had risen from their chairs and floated around the room. The date was 1st April 1976.

But I think my favourite hoax is the one Burger King played in America in 1998 when they published a full page advertisement in an American newspaper announcing the introduction of a new item to their menu: a "Left-Handed Whopper" especially designed for the 32 million left-handed Americans. According to the advertisement, the new whopper included the same ingredients as the original Whopper (lettuce, tomato, hamburger, etc.), but all the items were rotated 180 degrees for the benefit of their left-handed customers. Perhaps it's because I'm a left-hander that that particular hoax appealed to my sense of humour, but whatever clever hoaxes are uncovered by midday on the 1<sup>st</sup> April 2018, Jesus' resurrection from the dead will not be one of them. There is strong historical evidence regarding the death and resurrection of Jesus, along with the testimony of eye witness accounts and the lived experience of millions of Christians for over 2000 years.



#### Parish Council Update (Village Improvements)

#### **Speeding Issues**

In an earlier update it was explained that the Council were exploring the idea of a 20mph Zone in the village.

IT'S GOOD NEWS!! We have recently been informed the surveys carried out late 2017 have supported this approach. This won't be a quick fix as it requires us to following a formal process with legal implications and cost. Next steps are to meet with the Highways Team, hopefully in April (their new financial year) to progress the detail and work up the necessary plans. You will be updated as progress is made but I am sure you will welcome this approach.

As a result of this success, there will be an impact on the Vehicle Activation Signs and possible Pedestrian Crossing in Churchfield Road. Once the 20mph Zone is implemented, new surveys will need to be completed to see whether the average speed of vehicles warrants Highways investment.

#### **Road Repairs**

The recent improvement to Bondend Road was very welcome. The next planned work is to improve the road surface in 6 Acres. We are also bidding for funds to improve the surface of Dirty Lane.

#### **Outdoor Gym (on the Recreation Ground)**

Following the public consultation in 2017 where the idea was supported and equipment choices were identified, we are looking at how to fund this and are hopeful we can progress implementation before the summer.

#### Children's Play Equipment

We received useful input from the public consultation exercise. Shortly we will be looking at some good ideas already implemented other council areas. Again we are looking at possible grants to help part fund this and will provide an update once the necessary work is completed.

#### **Benches**

At the last Council meeting it was decided to site two benches on the new patio next to the Pavilion building so people watching sporting activities on the Rec have somewhere to sit. #### **Home Security**

Many of you will be aware that there were several break-ins in Upton recently and this has caused some concern particularly with elderly residents who live on their own. If someone is determined to get into your home they will do so (e.g. by smashing windows) but there are a number of things you can do to make it more difficult for burglars. Some examples are shown below:



- Timer switches linked to lights / radio
- Having an alarm system and using it when you go out / go away
- Having fencing / hedges around your back gardens (low walls / fences make it easy to access and leave properties)
- Closing curtains when it gets dark
- Not advertising going away on social media such as Facebook
- Locking all doors and windows when you go out

#### **Alfred James Davis**

Alfred was the son of Edwin and Rosa Davis of Rees Farm, Watery Lane. He was born in 1897 and went to the Village School. He enlisted, at the outbreak of the war, in Gloucester, in September 1914, though he was aged only 17. He served in the 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup>/5<sup>th</sup> Regiments of the Gloucestershire Regiment. While serving in the 7<sup>th</sup> Battalion he was sent to Gallipoli in 1915 and when they were evacuated to Egypt he was sent to France.

He was killed, aged 21, near Bethune in northern France on 18 April 1918 during the battle of Loos. He has no known grave and his name is recorded on the Loos Memorial to the missing. He was a Private with regimental number 18998.

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## Birds in Upton

Spring is in the air as I write this and by the time you read it, will actually be here. After the chilly Winter months leading up to Christmas, with only even colder weather to look forward to, as a birdwatcher, once Christmas is over I start to look forward to the



Summer migrants arriving which will herald the start of better, and warmer, weather.

In Upton, generally the first to arrive is the Chiffchaff, a small yellowy/beige bird, which

can be heard making its distinctive 'chiffchaff, chiffchaff' call as early as March. The mean date for its arrival in Watery Lane is the 15th and this conjures up one of my earliest memories of my time in Upton. On that date in 1989, I spent the day with a friend, sorting pieces of Cotswold stone from the pile of rubble that was left of the old cottage we bought, so that it could be incorporated into the new garden. It was my first Chiffchaff of the year but by the end of the day I have to confess I had had enough of the constant 'chiffchaff' call going on within a few feet above my head!

Once the Chiffchaff is identified, some passing through and some staying to breed, other migrants quickly follow. Everyone's favourite 'to spot the first' is the Swallow, sadly



declining in numbers, but which can still be seen regularly in The Stanley and The Portway where they nest around the farm.



Unfortunately, although the House Martin can still be seen in Upton, its numbers have greatly reduced over the last few years. Around the same time, the Willow Warbler, very similar in plumage to the Chiffchaff but with a completely different call, also arrives and can be heard in

the country lanes around the village. Even

experienced birdwatchers struggle to tell these birds apart unless they are actually singing.

Spring is also the time when our resident birds start to form pairs, build nests and breed and it is fascinating to be able to watch the progress



and the hard work put in by the parents to feed and fledge broods of Blue Tits and Great Tits in garden nestboxes.



By April many of our birds will already be nesting. Blackbirds and other members of the Thrush family can start as early as February/March in a mild Winter. We are fortunate in Upton to have such beautiful countryside and many different habitats to

wander through and just look, and listen, for the birds. Cud Hill is particularly good for warblers such as Blackcaps and Common Whitethroats and farmland birds such as Skylarks and Yellowhammers.

After decades of being advised that we should not feed the birds during the Summer months, on the basis that birds try and feed the nestlings whole peanuts and choke them, the scientific opinion changed a few years ago and we are now advised

that offering bird seed and nuts to our birds throughout the year is a good thing. Scientists have realised that birds are not stupid and that in times when natural food (insects, fruit or seeds) are in short supply, the parents will eat the bird table food which enables



them to save the natural food for their chicks.

So, if you do feed the birds in Winter, please don't stop now, they will be grateful for your offerings.

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
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
