

Editorial



I believe that the National WI motto "Inspiring Women" is deliberately ambiguous. It means both that the WI hopes to inspire women through its activities, and also that many WI members in the past and present are, of themselves, inspiring

women. We should all try in our own ways to be an inspiration to others, and be ready to learn from inspirational people we meet.

The WI was founded in Canada in 1897, based on a British model of women's guilds. The first WI meeting in Britain was held in 1915, led by a Canadian WI member, and the National organisation was set up in Britain in 1917. This was wartime, of course, and the first aims of the organisation were both to revitalise rural communities depleted by the war effort, and to encourage women to become more involved in producing food, given the labour shortage.

This issue of Upton St Leonards Life celebrates the foundation of the Upton St Leonards branch of the WI one hundred years ago, in 1923. I hope you enjoy the stories and pictures of our first 100 years.

Our Main Feature – the Upton St Leonards WI Centenary

Congratulations, 100 years old!

Here, first, is how it all started in 1923.

There was a general get-together of women interested in forming a WI in the Village. More than 80 arrived to hear from the Gloucester Federation of WIs what would be expected.

At the call for nominations to form a committee, 27 names were put forward (this alone may cause a smile among today's members)! This was whittled down to 12 by ballot. Most appropriately for the times, Mrs Adela Birchall from Bowden Hall, the wife of the village "squire", John Dearman Birchall (Junior), was elected as President, and over 50 ladies remained to hear from the Gloucester Federation Chair Person.

At the first recorded meeting of 1923 The President was ill, so could not attend. The secretary resigned, being unable to come to future meetings - so the treasurer became Secretary and a new committee member took over as Treasurer. A resolution was carried that any member being more than 5 minutes late for the meeting would be fined 2d (pennies) — maybe today £2 equivalent.

A programme was sorted for the year. A choir was formed. There was a knitting competition: all were given a ball of the same wool. The winner was the one who knitted the longest piece of a sock at a fixed width and tension, in 10 minutes. The prize was — another ball of wool to make another pair of socks! But all the 10 minute "socks" were then completed at home ready for collection at the next meeting.

Vegetable competitions were entered at shows in the county - certificates were also gained in singing, knitting

and cake making.

The rest of this piece features pictures and items from the early years, and celebrations at 40th, 50th, 60th, 75th and 100th anniversary events, plus a few other photographs of interest.

I hope memories will come back to be enjoyed, and some will be well remembered, so we are able to look forward to the years ahead... Congratulations and best wishes for the years to come.

The last few years have been very difficult for Upton St Leonards WI, as with clubs of all kinds. Keeping going, that long Covid break in 2020, when not even committees could meet. Technology helped, but the face to face meetings were out - Zoom, telephone and computer took over. So it was a great relief when meetings restarted in August 2020.

Free weekly news recording for visually impaired people

for the visually impaired. What a wonderful idea and very welcome in the area they serve. We heard how the volunteers give their time to recording items of interest from local newspapers and snippets of world newsworthy interest, along with information on the entertainment industry and magazines. recorded on memory sticks and sent via the post to people requesting their services free of charge and they are given a small device on which to play them at no cost to themselves. They record plays, poetry and monologues by local actors and directors approximately 80 – 100 minutes are recorded each week. There are about 60 volunteers in total who give up their time for this amazing cause. Approximately 20 to 25 articles are selected each week from the previous 7 days and the recipients are so grateful for this link into their communities. Three of their members are over 100 and most are in the 70 plus group so it keeps them in touch. For special occasions such as Christmas, recordings are done well in advance as these can cover 5 hours, enough for listeners to enjoy over a longer period.

Margaret gave us a reading as she would have recorded it for listeners, it was like listening to Angela Rippon - so clear and calming you can understand why this is of great benefit to the community. If any of you know of someone who would benefit from this service don't hesitate to contact them:


Events at the BMI

The 66 Bus

This is a really good news item! The Village now has an hourly bus to Cheltenham, Painswick and Stroud.

The 66 from Cheltenham to Stroud used to go along the A46 past Prinknash. The route has been changed so that at the Brockworth Fruit Farm roundabout it diverts along the A417 and then comes through the Gloucester Business Park, Lobleys Drive and Abbeymead Avenue, down the Wheatway and onto Painswick Road past the Kings Head and up Upton Hill to Painswick. New bus stops have been put in place, and some of the stops are shown on the map here.

This is an hourly bus Monday to Saturday. It is 25 minutes to Stroud and 31 minutes to Cheltenham, according to the timetable. No 66 bus on Sundays (Note, however, that the 166 takes the former route past Prinknash on Sundays only.)

Please check details and times. The nearest stops for those in the centre of the Village are at the Kings Head. Or you can walk along the Ash Path and catch the bus near Christchurch Abbeydale.

Villagers in the Prinknash and Pincott area, of course, lose their bus service as a consequence, so it's not good for all.

Older Village residents will remember that there was a service many years ago from Gloucester to Painswick that stopped at the Kings Head. It was apparently well used at one time, but then we all acquired our own cars and the route was axed like so many rural routes.

Could you give a Ukrainian family a safe home?

This article comes from Stroud Ukrainian Refugee Community Support (SURCS)

Despite the war in Ukraine lasting over a year, many families are still in desperate need of a place of safety. Could you offer a room, or better still an annexe or holiday home?

There are several organisations set up to help host families, including SURCS, a local network of volunteers helping Ukrainian guests and their hosts, so you won't feel alone!

Refugee guests are able to live and work in the UK for up to three years. Six to twelve months is the initial expected stay. Host families receive

help towards costs.

Many Stroud district families have already opened their doors and have found the hosting experience an overwhelmingly positive one. They have enjoyed making new friends, having more people around the house and sharing each others food and cultures.

Sadly, SURCS has a long list of people needing either follow-on housing or still trying to get out of Ukraine. They say: "We are trying our best to forge connections where we can. As a volunteer group we are not professionals so cannot do official matching and checks and all that, but

we can point people in the right direction and help HFU* get people placed."

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

Dear friends in Upton St Leonard's,

Welcome to my last letter to you for the USL magazine! I have so much enjoyed writing monthly thoughts about life and our journey of faith together with you during my time here, and sharing them with you, and I hope you have enjoyed reading them. I first acquired a love of letter-writing whilst at boarding school as a teenager. I wrote to all sorts of friends (as well as the compulsory letter home that had to be written after breakfast and before church every week on a Sunday morning) and it was a great way to stay in touch and share thoughts and views.

Outside my study window this morning, the girls from Denmark Road School are all queuing up excitedly to get on coaches to go off on trips, so there's quite a lot of noise! I love living opposite the school: I can hear the girls out at break, and lunch, and they play sports on the pitches next to our home. They sit on our wall outside the house as they wait to go home each day and I have an arrangement with the lady who owns a local ice-cream van -at the end of their school day the girls queue up to buy ice-creams – in all weathers – and we've agreed that the van can park across our drive unless I want to go out! All very satisfactory and friendly.

There are one or two challenges with the school, of course. Their burglar alarm goes off in the middle of the night at times, and sometimes the girls return from a trip in the early hours, chattering excitedly about all they have seen and done, and wake us up! Sometimes when there is a school event the street is packed with cars and we can't get ours out (mind you that happens when there's a rugby match as well) And during the summer term I collect tennis balls, which coming sailing across the fence from their courts into our garden!

But on the whole it works well, each of us respecting the other and allowing for our differences. Surely this is a model for us here in our parish and community, each of respecting the other and allowing for our differences. Here is what the Bible says about this:

Since God chose you to be the holy people he loves, you must clothe yourselves with tenderhearted mercy, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. Make allowance for each other's faults and forgive anyone who offends you. Remember, the Lord forgave you, so you must forgive others. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds us all together in perfect harmony. And let the peace that comes from Christ rule in your hearts. For as members of one body, you are called to live in peace. And always be thankful. Let the message about Christ, in all its richness, fill your lives. Teach and counsel each other with all the wisdom he gives. Sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs to God with thankful hearts. And whatever you do or say, do it as a representative of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks through him to God the Father.

Colossians 3 v 12 - 17

This was one of the readings we had at our wedding, but it's just as appropriate for people in a church family as it is for a couple getting married. It's about clothing ourselves with all those good things that come from the Holy Spirit living in us and helping us to be more like Jesus. It's about allowing for differences and faults and forgiving each other. It's about LOVE being the basis of how we live. It's about letting peace be the ruling factor in our relationships. It's about the word of God filling our lives and influencing all we do. It's about helping each other to grow in faith and about singing praise to God! It's about being thankful to God and about everything we do and say being for God.

So after a brilliant eighteen months with you all, I pray that in the continuing months of the vacancy you will take these verses into your hearts and let them influence your life together. God has a plan for you all, and as you wait for that to become clear, may these words inspire and guide you.

I pray God's blessing on you all, and all good wishes for a Happy Easter!

Village Recollections

I recently had the pleasure of meeting and talking with Ivor (Vincent) Middlecote who was born in Winnycroft Cottages in the late 1920s. Not long after his birth his family moved to Bondend Road, as Winnycroft was his grandparents' home. Back then Bondend Road was more of a lane than a road and consisted of a few cottages close to the route onto Nuthill.

At six months old Ivor needed an appendectomy which meant getting to Over Hospital on Vineyard Hill. Thankfully, people in Upton St. Leonards have always helped each other and Mr Gosling, a nearby farmer, hooked up his horse and cart to drive the eight miles. Ivor was incredibly lucky as The Vineyard had one of the few surgeons skilled and brave enough to perform the operation that saved his life.

Ivor had four older siblings: a sister, Doris, and three brothers James (Jim), Leslie (Les), and Ronald (Ron). The brothers were all conscripted into the armed forces with Les managing to sign up at sixteen! After serving for twenty two years Ivor planned to move back to the village with his family but sadly housing was too expensive. However strong links kept, and keep, him visiting almost weekly, even finding time to enjoy the occasional coffee at the BMI.

Attending school, in the building which is now Chipmunks Nursery, was not Ivor's favourite way to spend his time; he would rather have been outside than sat at a desk. The favourite parts of his school life were sport, gardening, and woodwork. The school garden was across the road, where the boys grew vegetables in the middle section and the girls grew flowers in the more visible

outer sections. The skills Ivor gained in the school garden as well as in the woodwork shed, housed in the recently refurbished school room, have proved very valuable throughout his life. When Ivor was the youngest pupil at school and his Aunt Daisy, the oldest, they each planted a tree at the recreation ground though Ivor can't remember what occasion was being celebrated*; in the photograph Ivor is the one highlighted. Ivor remembers attending school with Joyce Moore, Aves Jeffcutt, the Freckletons, Curly Barnard, Derek Avery as well as his best friend Digger Read who lived 'next door' though the cottages were actually back to back. I wonder whether any of their families have stayed local?

Upton was a lot smaller then but still boasted football and cricket teams and at the start/end of the respective seasons they encroached on each other's pitches on the recreation ground causing a little friction. The Middlecotes were very much a football family with Ivor's Dad marking the pitch out every Saturday morning and at one time four members of the team were Middlecotes.

skills Ivor gained in Plus Ivor's parents ran a weekly

Plus Ivor's parents ran a weekly sweepstake on the rugby scores to help subsidise the football team. Not only did the residents of Upton play football and cricket they also played tennis on a court behind the Village Hall and badminton in the Hall.

It surprised to me to hear that Upton had five pubs, though before Ivor's time. According to his Grandma, his Grandad got fined one shilling for being drunk in charge of a horse. Apparently he couldn't pass a pub without stopping for a pint. More modestly, Ivor remembers collecting his Dad's two pints of beer for the weekend from the side door of the BMI.

I was fascinated to learn that Upton had both a village policeman and a village nurse, and that the shop, Norris's, was on the corner of Churchfield Road and The Ash Path. Luckily Ivor and his brothers could run faster than the policeman so they only got caught scrumping once; they were caught in an orchard at Rooksmoor when they were told "don't knock 'em all off, if you want to eat one, take one".
