### Focus on Local Business

This month we take a look at ...

#### **CEDAR MOTOR HOUSE LTD**

Those who have been in the Village for some years will remember the "Bikes & Pieces" cycle repair shop, run from his dad's garage in Bowden Cottage by Tim James when he was still a young lad. This was an early start as a mechanic, following in his father's

footsteps. His father is of course Barry James, who set up Cedar Motor House in Cheltenham in 1968. Tim got his formal training as a vehicle mechanic with the Army, and in 1994 he left the Army to join his dad's company. The business moved to its current

location at Grove Court on Upton Hill in 1998, with Barry in charge, Tim as assistant, mother Meg doing the admin work; very much a family business. When Tim married Val, she also joined the business, and since Barry and Meg retired, Tim and Val have been the directors.

A first impression, when one walks in to the workshops, is how clean it all is. There is still the smell of oil and cars, but gone are the days of greasy grit on the floors, filthy overalls and grimy hands. Tim says: "to stay in business, garages have to move fast to keep up, and nowadays we are heavily computerised, as, of course, the cars are." Part of keeping up and growing was a large investment in equipment and training to be able to do MOT testing. Cedar Motor House now has 5 car lifts, spread over 4 workshops at Grove Court, and employs 4 other mechanics. Vehicle servicing, diagnostics, clutch and tyre fitting are areas that they specialise in.

They are members of the Good Garage Scheme and have been ranked among the top 5 garages for excellent customer service and feedback in the country several times. The personal touch and village connections remain very important to Tim and his business. He collects and returns cars he is asked to service or repair from the owners' homes, and Cedar Motor House has customers in the village who have been with them ever since the business was first set up.

The good news was that there had been no Anti Social Behaviour incidents during the period.


However there has been 1 burglary, 1 theft from a shed / barn and a further 4 thefts, 3 of which were from insecure cars with items of value on display such as SatNavs, Briefcases, designer sunglasses, work bags and keys.

In addition to the above, another Burglary has recently taken place through forced entry resulting in the homeowner's car being stolen.

#### The key messages from our PCSO Khim Mortimer are:

- Fit an alarm system to your home and turn it on when you go to bed and when you leave the house
- Join your local Neighbourhood Watch Scheme if not already in it
- Do not leave valuables in sight in your cars and make sure cars are locked when you leave them

#### Cathedral City, City Cathedral

Dean Stephen reflects briefly on the role of the cathedral in the city of Gloucester.

A cathedral is firstly the place where the seat of the bishop rests, the cathedra, and so a cathedral is naturally the

mother church of the diocese. But any cathedral is also in a unique relationship with the city that is often only called a city because of having such a major church at its heart. This is true in Gloucester where the cathedral still dominates the landscape and still has a unique role in the life of the whole city. Civic and secular events take place here and people come and go on a daily basis, rather than just for an occasional diocesan service.

The Heart of Gloucester is the name for the first phase of Project Pilgrim, the project to improve and restore parts of the cathedral, and it is what we seek to be. Amongst all our development plans and events, what holds us together is the offering of public worship 365 days a year. In this way, we seek to be a place of prayer and a place for all. We pray daily in turn for each parish, school, fresh expression, chaplaincy in the diocese. But we also pray daily for the city and the diocese in which we are set. You are welcome to join us any day, we are always here. That is our job as your cathedral.

#### Project Pilgrim -- what you thought

Thank you to everyone who gave their responses to the initial design proposals for Project Pilgrim, the project to improve and restore parts of the cathedral. Almost 400 people answered a questionnaire and others joined with focus groups and attended presentations.

- 87% of you said they were supportive of the project
- 84% believed that the transformation of the car park into a public space would provide a better setting for the Cathedral
- 87% were supportive of putting solar panels on the Nave roof
- 93% were supportive of our plans to restore the Lady Chapel
- 95% were supportive of using the Tribune Gallery as a place to tell the stories of our building and history.

44% also wanted reassurance about parking solutions. Rest assured, we are fully aware of how important this issue is and will make sure we find viable and sustainable alternative parking for key stakeholders before any building work begins at the end of 2016. To find out more visit

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#### **Update on The Church Restoration Programme**


Since David Knight's article in the April USL Life we have been working on plans for the restoration work required to the Church and Churchyard, as recommended by the Quinquennial (QUI) review which is conducted every 5 years. As David mentioned there is considerable work to be done – and it will be both extensive and expensive!

The Church architect has been very helpful, visiting recently to explain in detail his QUI report to Rev Christine and the Parochial Church Council, and to recommend how best to take the necessary work forward - which will cost in the region of £300,000 - of which repairs to the church roof in various places will be the most expensive and time consuming. Various grants will be applied for and inevitably that is a long process but for part of that, we need to demonstrate that funds have been raised locally – so we need to raise at least £25,000 as soon as possible.

We will be highlighting plans for this in next month's USL Life – and any ideas and offers of support will be very welcome - but in the meantime a big THANK YOU to the support from the Village Day and recent Gnome Hunt, which have helped to give a great start to the repair fund kitty. Inevitably it is expensive to run the church building - and that is a daily challenge - but these running costs and the income needed will be kept separate from funds received for the restoration work.

In the meantime, thanks to summer weather and the tireless work of USCAN and other volunteers (a well deserved special

mention to Matthew G, Mike B, Sheila T and others of course), we have been able to make significant improvements to the state of the churchyard. More needs to be done in tidying up the trees and we have received a professional report which will enable us to get permission from the Diocese to carry out the more substantial work. At ground level (literally) much of the clearing of ivy and grass has made visible parts of the churchyard hidden for many years. Just close to the South Aisle wall (the side of the church nearest to the Rec) Sheila removed a large patch of grass only to discover a "hidden" gravestone. It is for Thomas Marston "who departed this life October the 26<sup>th</sup> 1799 aged 77 years" (see picture) – are any readers related or know of the family? We would be interested to hear!



And Finally – please keep visiting the Church and the ever-improving churchyard this summer, and if you can start putting some pennies and pounds away, we will be advertising our fund-raising plans very soon. Thank You!!

## Starting "Big" School

Is starting school still daunting for some children? Or are most little ones practised at being away from mum or dad for periods of time? How times have changed! In the past many children stayed at home with mum until they started school, and this could mean that everything was very strange for them to begin with, being in one room most of the day, not having mum around to ask for help, being with lots of other children – some of whom would be strangers!

Now, many children attend play group or nursery before going to school and learn to take the rough and tumble of play early on. Some spend time away from home with grandparents or other relatives. Compared with years ago, these days many mums work and small children have to be cared for by others. Rather than stories, painting and trips to the shops or the park with mum, many children will be doing these things with other carers. So a positive outcome of this is that these children will be more used to managing many things away from mum – getting dressed and undressed, going to the toilet, cutting up their own food, putting on their socks and shoes and asking for help when it is needed. Surprisingly, though, a 2013 report by the Centre for Social Justice revealed that some children fall behind at school because they start Reception unable to respond to their own name!

Children can feel very shy and a little anxious about 'big school' and parents may see a reaction to this – a few tears or tantrums, not settling at bedtime or back to 'thumb-sucking' and baby talk. Quite natural you would say in the circumstances, and with reassurance and time these traits will surely reduce. Sometimes discreetly letting the teacher know that the child is anxious about one thing or another is wise and will alert the staff to being supportive and reassuring.

Further practice with your child at skills required to manage the day can help. Before school begins, chatting about what happens in the school day provides a story, and words to describe a new experience about to happen. There are numerous books with stories about starting and being at school and reading a story together with your child can provide mutual comfort about the near future!

Your local book shop can recommend or, alternatively, you will find recommendations on the internet. For the parents or carers, there are survival guides and books explaining what learning is like in schools today. Only recently a new version of the national curriculum came into effect! Each child is different and some children settle into 'big' school easily, whilst others will need that extra reassurance that parents and carers are able to give.

### Village Information

#### Parish Council Meeting - Monday 6 July

A Police Report was given - see page 5.

A Boundary Review has recently concluded that the number of councillors representing the Stroud District in the County Council will be unchanged.

The building works at the new Community Centre next to Coopers Edge School have been completed. The Coopers Edge Trust will be signing a 5 year management lease and it is anticipated the centre will be open for business before summer ends. Facilities include a sports hall with two badminton courts.

A Community Orchard is being set up on the Stanley allotments site. Mike Richardson is now setting up a management committee for it.

A review of all land owned by the Parish Council is now taking place to ensure everything is registered with the Land Registry.

Councillor Morris shared the positive results of a recent Allotment inspection and that judging for the "Best Kept"

allotment had been concluded. The Council thanked Mike Stratford for his work as the Judge.

The Clerk reported that the Canopy over the Pavilion door would be installed shortly together with repairs to the door surrounds.

Councillor Wilson thanked the Clerk for achieving the resurfacing of the path next to the Village Green in time for the Village Day. The repair work on the path near Rooksmoor will be completed by end of the summer. The Parish Council will be meeting a representative of the Highways Agency to try and resolve some other issues in the village.

The Village Day was discussed and everyone agreed that it had gone well considering the weather conditions. The efforts of all involved had raised over £2k which would support the Village Hall and Church repairs.

It was agreed that there would be no increase in fees for sports clubs using the Recreation Ground facilities.

#### M5 Motorway Noise - latest position

Keith Pearson, our local District Councillor, has been continuing his pressure on our behalf regarding action to reduce the noise levels from the M5 traffic.

A recent response has been received by Neil Carmichael's office confirming that he is working together with other local MPs to achieve a positive outcome for all residents affected by the current noise levels (e.g. including other parts of Gloucester located near the motorway).

The Highways Agency has been asked to carry out a survey on the noise levels affecting local residents and to produce a report by the end of this summer. The report will include detailed works required and a timetable for completion.

Any updates will be shared via USL Life as they are received.

#### **Pets' Corner**

As the summer months draw on and autumn beckons, here are my thoughts for you all, in no particular order.

Rabbit owners must keep vigilant for fly strike (when bluebottles lay eggs on mucky bottoms) as this is a devastating condition. We often see poorly rabbits which appear well in the morning but are sick by the evening, crawling in flesh-eating maggots. There are various preventatives available. Myxomatosis is more likely in the summer months so vaccination is recommended, especially for rabbits with outdoor runs.

Cats will often drink from ponds and dishes filled with rain water. In my opinion they prefer it. During periods of drought (like we had in June and some of July) these water sources dry up as pond levels drop. Urinary problems are then more likely as cats drink very little at the best of times.

Fleas and ticks will remain a problem, fleas especially as the summer progresses. It's an old adage, but prevention really is better than cure. Whilst shop bought products are effective to an extent, they miss parts of the lifecycle so here is another cliché: you get what you pay for.

Noise phobias particularly affect dogs and various medications and strategies can alleviate a lot of the suffering. Thunderstorms are more likely at this time and preparations for the autumn firework season should be considered.

Leptospirosis, known as Weil's disease in people, is a nasty disease, sometimes fatal. A new strain of this has been found in Somerset and South Wales (possibly elsewhere too) so ask your vet about it, particularly if your dog spends a lot of time in water. I currently think the extra risk is low but my Practice has now upgraded the vaccine to include the new strain.

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## Upton St Leonards People

#### This month we are featuring Joan Ashton

'Auntie Joan' has been an influential figure in the lives of many of our young citizens for many years now, having started out at our local playgroup as a volunteer in September 1980. Her ability to 'tickle the ivories' for sing-a-long sessions made her an invaluable member of the team, along with her gregarious personality and love and empathy for young children. Even now, some 35 years later, she still pops into the playgroup at least once a week.

But, there is more to Joan Ashton than meets the eye. Joan has dedicated a lifetime of service to the British Red Cross and talking to her and listening to her recount her memories was awe-inspiring.

Joan originally hails from Middlesex and at the age of 16 decided on a career in engineering draughtsmanship though her heart was really in nursing. It was a difficult choice between financial stability and philanthropy and did not sit easily in the mind of young Joan. Having come from a nursing background (her aunts were nursing sisters) and also engineering, to follow in her father's footsteps, this was always going to be a hard decision to make. However her father was killed in a tragic industrial accident the year before the war and as nursing was pretty poorly paid, in order to contribute to the family, engineering won the day.

However, it's thanks to the matron at the Enfield Teaching Hospital, who, on hearing of Joan's dilemma from her aunts, suggested that she could train with the Red Cross as a volunteer which also offered a wider range of courses in the profession and Joan's love of the Red Cross and volunteering was born. Working during the day and volunteering at night, nursing in the hospital, Joan realised her dream and achieved the best of both worlds. It wasn't long before her skills were called upon when war broke out as all available medical personnel were in the front line of duty.

Near the Enfield hospital there was a camp, Cuffley, where prisoners-of-war were held, mostly air force personnel. Their wounds were treated by the Red Cross nurses, alongside British men and women from the air force and army services, who were brought in with horrific injuries, including major traumas from broken glass.

The hospital where Joan was based was 5 miles from her home and required her to take 2 buses to get there. After a long day in draughtsmanship she made her way for the night duty, then at the end of her shift she was straight back to work the next day! She managed to get some sleep every other night as long

as the need arose. She still remembers the red glow in the night sky over London as the bombing went on.

In the following years Joan's life was pretty much set on the path of her volunteering, this being the main focus along with her day job and being a housewife.



She came to Upton in 1979 with her husband and became an Instructor/Leader of the Red Cross in Painswick, teaching nursing and first aid.

The British Red Cross is an invaluable organisation and is called upon in outbreaks and emergencies; they fill in gaps in our healthcare, for example in a flu epidemic. From the original 12 members who started the Painswick branch, there are 2 left, Joan being one of them. She still renews her certificate to practice every 3 years and intends to do so as long as possible. What is more, she is still called upon for duty in her uniform.

You may not be aware but the Red Cross is not just for war zones but can offer help through referrals to the public at large; e.g. loans of wheelchairs, various medical equipment, assistance with nursing patients returning home from hospital, etc. The current Gloucestershire HQ is at the Waterwells Business Park.

Joan went to the International HQ in Geneva in the 1990's and whilst there, she also visited the World Health Organisation (WHO) next door and was enthused by her visit.

She has been awarded many medals for her services, including long service, 60 and 65 years medals, the Badge of Honour for service and was President of the Gloucestershire branch for a year.

Joan has had a full life but still manages time for a few hobbies and remembers fondly playing tennis and badminton when she was younger.

I asked her did she have any advice for us young'uns? She thought for a moment and then said "caring and always thinking of others, and above all, keep learning".

Joan is sure that maintaining a youthful attitude has prolonged her life. The playgroup children have been a big part of her life and they have loved her; many still come and say hello years after their pre-school days are over.

What an amazing lady! Joan you are an inspiration to us all; we salute you!!
