#### **UPTON ST LEONARDS WI**



President Lynne welcomed all ladies including one visitor. flowers to grow. Trees and shrubs are coppiced using The formal business was brief: Angela's strawberry tea raised £158 for WI funds. Two workshops have been arranged, card making on Thursday 10th October and a Christmas decoration on Thursday 14th November. A reminder of the USL Show on Saturday 7th September, our entry being 6 items for a pet, the items to be donated to Teckels animal sanctuary.

Speaking on behalf of the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust, volunteer Rose Lennard stated that the Trust manages 60 reserves across the county, 2500 acres of land managed and financed by patrons, legacies, grants, trusts and corporates. The Trust has 28,500 members, 500 of which are regularly active. Founded in 1961 by a group of volunteers led by Sir Peter Scott, the HQ of the Trust is Robinswood Hill Country Park, opened in 1992 by Sir David Attenborough. This site is very popular with local families to enjoy walks on the hillside with panoramic views over Gloucester, picnics, BBQs and a new cafe due to be opened shortly. Gloucester is blessed with ancient woods, rich meadow pastures and wetlands where iridescent dragonflies delight to dance in the warm sunshine. Old mills and quarries are favourites of bats and reptiles, most places having a home for our wildlife. Old breed cattle on the hills, alongside sheep, encourage smaller species of

natural tools. A recent success story was the appeal to secure Daneway Banks near Sapperton, a nature reserve ideally suited to the large blue butterfly, bringing it back from extinction. As our speaker pointed out, the length of grass has to be right, also soil microbes, insects such as ants all play a vital role in the life cycle of this species of the large blue butterfly. In our gardens we can all help our wildlife by planting insect friendly plants such as lavender, scabious and buddleia, open single flowers ideal for attracting bees, the list is endless. Nature can inspire and teach us as communities and young children, looking to a healthier more natural future where people and wildlife can thrive together.

There will be no meeting in August so our next meeting is on Monday 2nd September where our speaker is Merleen Watson and her talk is entitled "Deaf not Daft".

All ladies very welcome.



I must go down to the seas again, to the vagrant gypsy life, To the gull's way and the whale's way where the wind's like a whetted knife;

And all I ask is a merry yarn from a laughing fellow-rover, And quiet sleep and a sweet dream when the long trick's over.

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

# Treasure Island by Robert Louis Stevenson (1850-1894) published 1882.

Young Jim Hawkins is at once terrified and captivated by the rum-soaked sea-dog who takes up lodgings at his father's inn, the Admiral Benbow. But after discovering a treasure map in the sailor's trunk, Jim embarks on a perilous journey of treachery, heroism and piracy aboard the ship Hispaniola. We recommend this as an adventure story which is enjoyed by both children and adults. Stevenson also wrote Kidnapped, The Strange Case of Doctor Jekyll and Mr Hyde and A Child's Garden of Verses.

Rev James Turk Writes

One of my favourite films is Shadowlands, starring Anthony Hopkins and Deborah Winger. The film is an autobiographical account of C.S Lewis, the author of the "Chronicles of Narnia" books. Known as

Jack, he teaches at Oxford during the 1950s. An American fan, Joy Gresham (Debra Winger), arrives to meet him for tea in Oxford. It is the beginning of a love affair. Tragically, Joy becomes terminally ill and their lives become complicated. There was one scene in the film that moved me greatly, during a time when Joy was in hospital, Lewis is in the college running late for an important dinner. His colleagues ask how Joy is and he replies that she is improving. One colleague, Harry who is a clergyman, states that this improvement has come about because of Lewis' prayers, and God is answering those prayers. This scene in the film touched me deeply because in his reply Lewis articulates that desire we have as Christians to pray.

"That's not why I pray Harry, I pray because I can't help myself, I pray because I am helpless, I pray because the need flows out of me all the time, waking and sleeping. It doesn't change God ... it changes me." \*

The most basic definition of prayer is "talking to God." Prayer is not meditation or passive reflection; it is a direct address to God. It is the communication of the human soul with the Creator. Prayer is the primary way for Christians to communicate their emotions and desires to God. And though not done exclusively in church, I am sure you will not be surprised to know that we pray in church often.

St Leonard's Church has a long history of being a house of prayer. For centuries people have gathered there week after

prayer. For centuries people have gathered there week after week to worship and to pray, to bring the people and situations on their hearts, before God in prayer. This is at the heart of what we do as Christians, and St Leonard's is still a place where people gather to worship and pray. And that gathering to pray does not only happen on a Sunday morning.

In the Anglican tradition Evening Prayer is a service that takes place sometime after midday, generally in the late afternoon or early evening. If you look at the times of weekly services held at St Leonard's, printed in this magazine, you will see that we hold Evening Prayer, on Monday and Wednesday afternoons at 4pm. The service has a set pattern and we follow the liturgy as printed in the Common Worship Daily Prayer book. It is time for us to pause during the busyness of the day, to step into the cool of the church and bring to God the situations and people on our hearts.

Everyone is welcome to join us at these services, and please be assured today that whatever you are facing in your life now, or anytime in the future, God is always waiting to listen.

#### Coopers Edge School





#### A life less throwaway

by Tara Button



With the amount of coverage in the media, and discussion with folk I meet, on topics such as fast fashion, goods immediately available (to own or return), household items to 'dump' if no longer liked, the title of this book grabbed my attention. Reading reviews I decided it was a sensible buy with my Christmas money! The 237 pages (plus the 4 Appendices, Endnotes, Further reading!) started thus:

#### Introduction

or

#### Why I want my grandmother's tights

"My grandmother's tights used to last forever. They were so strong, people could tow cars with them, and they did. Granny had two pairs - one to wash and one to wear. But then the manufacturers decided to change the way their stockings were made, and not for the better." And ...." Our whole houses, our whole lives, have become stuffed full of things that let us down"

The Author, Tara Button, is the Founder and CEO OF BUYmeONCE - this giving a good indication what her passions are. Even the subheading underlines this:

#### "The Lost Art of Buying for Life".

The book is in two parts; "Broken Behaviour" and "Living a Life Less Throwaway".

For my part (category:75+)I know that my "things" are suitable for my life now. I think realistically I won't be buying many large items (life expectancy and all that!)). But to reflect on how life has changed, accumulating (too many?) things, makes this an interesting read for my generation. For younger folk there is much in the book that they could identify with. Tara Button was a baby in 1983 - you work it out. For a start Tara worked in the advertising world writing adverts for some of the world's biggest brands. So, if you like, she was on the other side of the counter enticing customers to buy goods. Experienced on both sides. Her phrases such as "Quality Stripping" - "Planned Obsolescence" - "Celebrity Power" - "Social Manipulation" - will resonate with the reader who is beginning to look at shopping habits anew.

This book is more than just a noting of how the world of buying works nowadays - it gives the readers an opportunity to self-reflect/assess their behaviours. I found the chapter that includes "Letting go of the clutter and the superfluous" useful.

#### **Hadwen Patient Participation Group**

Hadwen reported a decrease in the "Did Not Attend" figures. Jan - March 2019 showed a decrease of 33 missed appointments when compared to the same period last year. Systems were introduced to reduce this further by staff ringing the patient concerned to discuss the seriousness of their actions. This is time consuming for staff and we would rather they were not required to use their time this way. An appointment can be cancelled online from wherever you are no matter how late, that appointment can then be offered on the day to an urgent case. Please be mindful about keeping or cancelling booked appointments and ensuring you are signed up for text messages to get a timely reminder of your appointment. Some of these are for young people such as children and are termed as "Was not brought" as children need support to attend.

Phone consultations take 5 mins which is 50% less than a face to face consultation. If an examination is required then a face to face appointment is necessary.

The practice is looking for volunteers to help with a community garden project to create a pleasing space next

to the new building. If you can spare some time and skill in this area please either drop in and give them your details or email hadwenmedical.practice@nhs.net

It could involve growing vegetables or flowers in raised beds to enhance the area, for patients to enjoy and socialise.

New signage in each of the waiting areas is now in place and the notice board gives useful information for patients. The TV screens in the waiting areas are informative on health and wellbeing subjects. The staff will look at softening the waiting areas to make them welcoming and patient friendly.

We looked at barriers to Ladies attending for a smear test. Invitations are sent to all Ladies between 25-49 yrs every 3 years and the 50-64 age group are invited every 5 years. Do support your family and friends to take up this offer, it really does save lives. Plans are afoot to carry out research into the views of those who use the practice.
