
Just 40 days before the 2023 show begins and still plenty of time for you to decide on your exhibits!

TEMPORARY CLOSURE OF VARIOUS ROADS

Gloucestershire County Council, as traffic authority, intends to make an order under the relevant provisions of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (as amended) to temporarily close and restrict part of the roads as detailed in the Schedule below.

- Bondend Road to Nuthill (74 metres)
- Bondend Road No. 90 (22 metres)
- Bondend Lane to Bondend Road Jemima Cottage (15 metres)
- Nuthill, The Coppice to Hilvertsheem (15 metres)

The reason for the closure is for new electricity supply work.

The Roads are expected to be closed between 1st August 2023 and 25th August 2023, where the presence of approved signage will indicate whether the closures are in force. Further advance warnings of dates/times will be displayed on site prior to the closures and restrictions taking effect. The order can permit the closure and restriction of the Roads in any order, or simultaneously as required. Alternative Route – As signed on site. Emergency and Pedestrian access to adjoining properties will be maintained.

VILLAGE HALL AGM

On the 9th May the Upton Village Hall Trustees held their Annual General Meeting. The Chairman Keith Pearson was re-elected for a further year, but indicated that this would be a final year for him, so plans would need to be made to find a new Chairman. Mrs Jackie Lord who has been a Trustee for many years and Chair of the Social Committee also for a very long time, has stepped down due to other commitments, but offered to help on an ad hoc basis when free. The Trustees thanked her very much for all her sterling work.

All other Trustees agreed to continue and were accepted unanimously. A few members of the Community Groups who use the hall were also in attendance. 2022/23 showed a small excess of revenue over income, but the hall finances remain strong, with an amount now set aside as a reserve for a possible need for the roof replacement when needed. Bookings at the hall remain solid. The Trust now has two vacancies for Trustees to bring it up to full operating level, so if you are interested in helping or know someone who might please contact the Chair. The members agreed that £250 (50%) of the income from the Spring Show would be donated to the Church Roof Fund. The representatives of the Playgroup expressed their gratitude for all the help received from the Trustees. The main Hall floor was refurbished during the last year, but would require much more in depth attention within the next couple of years. The highlight of the year was the Jubilee Picnic enjoyed by a large number of folk on what was a reasonable day of weather, although given the summer we had, it could have been a little kinder. As a new user of a 21st century smartphone, it brought dread, as I'm still mourning the end of life of my old tiny Nokia and, from the sounds emanating from others in the room, many were also reticent. However, we needn't have worried as he warned us from the beginning that he has attempted to instruct his parents and would tread carefully!

So starting off 'low', he began by saying he used an iPhone and assumed we all did – a resounding 'No' went through the room – but David wasn't deterred and carried on astounding us with QR codes and the magic thereof, and how movies are now shot on iPhones, as video cameras have now become practically obsolete and regrettably SLR cameras are following close behind.

This technology is now introduced to kids at GCSE level and they know more than David and are teaching him

from YouTube! He decided after 22 years in the classroom he needed to do something different, so he retrained in Art Psychotherapy, obtaining an MA and began his new career at Cinderford School, where Photography was used as a way for the children to express their feelings. Art Psychotherapy services do amazing work in Adult Mental Health services too. David recommended Photoshop to us and one important tip he gave us is: Never use Flash. We then learned basic rules of 1/3rds and grids on photos. David suggested we take a mindful photo and think about the image you want to portray.

And what's coming up?

The Village Show

On Saturday 9th September it will be The Village Show.

There has been some sort of village event in Upton going back hundreds of years. In the distant past there was The Cherry Fair which was held on the first three Sundays after July 5th, old Midsummer Day. Stalls with cherries, ginger bread and other goods were placed near the Kings Head and previously near the church. The Cherry Fair probably originated in pagan times as it is associated with Midsummer's Day. However, the name 'Cherry Fair' is probably later in origin, as cherries were introduced from Asia with the arrival of the Romans.

The Village Show as we know it was originally called a Flower Show and included Upton, Cranham and Painswick. The show in this form started in the late 18th century. The earliest detailed record I have is for the show in 1891, Cranham was included in 1892. The show was held at Bowden Hall with many other activities, not only exhibits of flowers and vegetables. The judges for that show commented that what was shown was of high quality, but the exhibits were limited in quantity.

Expenses for the show in 1891 were £27 18s 2d with tent hire being £3.00.

A special competition was held for entries from houses where there was no under gardener. How many houses in Upton now have a under gardener?

There were also athletics and a cricket match was played between Upton and Cranham. Upton won by 11 runs, the scores being Upton 36, Cranham 25. Hardly a high scoring match.

When Bowden Hall was sold in 1925 Painswick went their own way. Then various other venues around Upton were used. The show was held at Valley Lane, Commelines Mill Farm and a field on the Stanley. Things did not always go to plan: on the Stanley the Marquee blew down the night before the show. Also shows in the past have been cancelled due to rain and of course two World Wars. In recent years The Show has moved to the Village Hall grounds.

May this year's show go without a hitch and we hope for good crowds and fine weather.

HOME START STROUD AND GLOUCESTER

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

We have a request from Harriet Walker of Home Start Stroud and Gloucester, the local charity which works with young families supporting them through a difficult time in their lives. The charity runs various groups including post-and ante-natal as well as toddlers and a group for fathers and their children. A volunteer works in the family's home for 2-3 hours per week in order to give children the best possible start in life. Why I volunteer for Home Start Stroud and Gloucester

Moving to the Stroud district 26 years ago with a young family made me acutely aware of how difficult things can be to cope with in a new place. My husband was working away a lot and I knew nobody. Luckily, I was fortunate in making friends at my children's new school, but it was hard moving into a new area having left a very supportive group of friends who I had met when I had my first baby in Bristol.

When I saw an article in the local newsletter a few years later in 2001 about volunteers for something called Home Start, a family support charity, I was intrigued. I found it needed experience with children, which I had, and also volunteers needed to be prepared to work with families going through a difficult time. Apart from that I didn't need any other qualifications.

My youngest was just about to start school, so I enquired about the role and began my training. Almost 23 years later I am still volunteering and have also become a trustee for Home Start Stroud and Gloucester.

I cycled to Paris from home in 2016 to raise much needed funds for the charity and I also coordinated making art packs in 2020 during covid to help families who were struggling at home.

Volunteering with families in their homes is a real privilege. I have helped many families over the years around the Stroud district many of whom I keep in touch with.

The role of a volunteer is very varied. I have taken families to toddler and baby groups, outings, doctor and hospital appointments. I have helped with shopping, mental health and confidence issues. I have read and played with children, comforted babies and parents and been there for parents who don't always have a supportive network nearby. I visit the family once a week for 2-3 hours and have gained so much personally by seeing families thrive and gain in confidence. I see how valuable it is for children to have regular supportive visits that make a real difference to parents who are finding things tough, as every parent does at some point.

Home Start run regular training courses where volunteers are guided to learn about their role when working within a family. Volunteers need to be good listeners, empathetic, non-judgemental, and willing and able to visit a family on a regular basis. FILMS ON THE THEME OF RAIL TRAVEL

BOOK REVIEW

Strangers on a Train by Patricia Highsmith (1950). All At Sea

Back in December 2018, two people, strangers, one from the North and one from the West Country, decided to take the trip of a lifetime on a land tour of India and the Golden Triangle. The friendship from this encounter endured and became one of a love story and on the 2nd June this year, the same two people, Peter Wilson and Jo Woods, exchanged vows at sea on the Sky Princess and were married by the ship's Captain!

If any of you are contemplating taking vows in the near future, perhaps this is one to consider? The ship, the Sky Princess, is registered in Bermuda as are many of the cruise ships traversing the seas and the reason for this is as follows:

In January 2002 a white paper was published by the Government regarding the modernisation of marriages. It was reported on Lloyd's List that the Maritime & Coastguard Agency hoped the reform of the marriage laws would enable weddings to occur on board British ships. Weddings are a real money spinner as part of the cruise ship industry and this has resulted in companies being reluctant to register their cruise ships on the British register. Therefore ceremonies cannot be conducted on British vessels – although weddings can take place on ships registered under foreign flags. Thus, contrary to popular belief, valid marriages cannot be conducted by the ship's captain on a British vessel – so if you see a movie or read a novel with the romantic vision of tying the knot officiated by a captain on a British ship, think of it as poetic licence.

However, as happens in most weddings at sometime during the planning, things can go awry – even at sea. Due to weather conditions the ship was unable to dock on the planned day and as the ceremony has to be conducted at sea, flurries of changes of itinerary, hair appointments, bringing the date forward by one day, were then changed again at the last minute which, as any bride and groom know, is extremely stressful. However, calm descended and all was well.

Peter and Jo decided that because of their love of travel, getting hitched on board would be a fitting tribute to their destinies. They had written their own vows to each other, and after their commitment, in accordance with the legal requirement of Bermudan law, the Captain began:

"According to the Maritime Marriage Act 1999, Peter and Joanna, you have given yourselves to each other by solemn vows, with the joining of hands and exchanging of rings, as Master of the Sky Princess and the legal power vested in me by the Laws of Bermuda, I now pronounce you Husband and Wife." The Captain was Italian so the words spoken had a very strong accent which also added to the flavour of this international event. Peter and Jo wore sumptuous Indian wedding outfits in a nod to their meeting and in gratitude of a fortunate holiday booking.

Peter is a member of our Parish Council and also an editor on this magazine. We wish him and Jo a long and happy life together.

AWARD WINNING CLUB

The BMI has recently received a coveted award from CAMRA, the Campaign for Real Ale.

(There were a couple of lines about it in last month's magazine, but the news arrived too late in the printing cycle to make more of it then. Here's the fuller story.)

Every year for the past five or more years, the BMI has achieved the standard required for a Cask Marque plaque. Independent assessors look at the quality of all the beers served, checking the storage, cooling, the dispensing etc. The plaque is proudly displayed outside by the entrance (and is pictured here).

But quite a few pubs and clubs have that.

So this year the BMI was nominated to CAMRA for a shot at one of its awards. This organisation, dedicated to the tradition of, and campaigning for, real ale in Britain, sets really high standards. They send official


visitors, and also undeclared spies. CAMRA checks the quality of the beer, of course, but they also look at ambience, cleanliness, availability among other things. There are separate awards for Pubs and Clubs, and for each area. So the BMI initially won the CAMRA award for Best Club in Gloucester. That then meant it was eligible for, and won, the award for Best Club in Gloucestershire. This is a terrific achievement. County winners go forward to the National competition, so it might get yet another accolade!

This is a personal triumph for Brian and Lorraine Dodd and their staff. It is Brian who orders the beer and looks after its storage and dispensing, and the pair of them and other staff who look after the so many aspects that make the BMI a great place to be.

FLOODING PREVENTION WORKS - UPDATE

Hard to believe it's a year (18 July 2022) since the public briefing given to residents by Joe Baker and his Flood Risk Management Team (FRMT) from Gloucester County Council. Joe briefed Parish Councillors recently - last month on 13 July. Since last year, a considerable amount of work has been undertaken by Joe and the FRMT with specialist consultants, modelling the very complicated flow of the River Twyver and the Sud Brook and the associated myriad of streams - the map looks like blue spaghetti! Most of the work is upstream of the main village, so unseen, but creation of Natural Flood Management measures such as "leaky dams" have already had a positive impact. The FRMT are making good progress on more significant works for our benefit and Joe will be providing a fuller update for USL Life shortly, with another public briefing in the autumn. Joe and team are working very hard on our behalf and Councillors were impressed and reassured by his dedication and enthusiasm - there are many positives already and in the pipeline.
