A talk on FRAUD

given by David McLaren, retired Deputy Chief Constable from the Surrey Police Economic Crime Team

Please read this, and last month's report from Twyver WI on the same subject. Think about how it applies to you!

David's talk to the Upton WI was both illuminating and disturbing. It is estimated that over £1.17 <u>billion</u> was lost to fraud in the UK in 2023. The internet is, of course, widely used and has revolutionised society in so many good ways, but it also has a dark side. You will meet attempted fraud there, and on the phone and on the doorstep. "Take 5" is a nationwide effort to protect against fraud. The core is that you <u>Stop and think for 5 minutes</u> (hence "Take 5".)

- STOP: Take a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information. This could keep you safe.
- CHALLENGE: Could it be fake? It's OK to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.
- PROTECT: Contact your bank immediately by phoning 159 if you think you've fallen for a scam, and report it to Action Fraud.

People can be fooled by on-line dating and fake photographs. Of course it's money the criminals are after. There's an old saying: "If it's too good to be true..."

David suggested for personal protection that we have a spy hole in the door and a chain to stop it opening more than an inch or two. Burglar alarms, security lights outside, front and back, thorny hedges, a dog - these are known to be good deterrents.

There is no meeting in August, so we meet again on Monday 2 September, at 2pm in the Pavilion, and the talk will be on Wildlife in the Garden. All are welcome.

The other was a black comedy "Counter Secrets", which had a taste of Sweeney Todd about it. The action taking place in a butcher's shop where the owners were killing customers for their meat. Again the play had a good turn around twist at the end.

The UpStagers are 20 years old!

About 25 years ago the stage in the Village Hall was not really used at all, and the management committee at the time were considering removing it and enlarging the main hall. There was a "Save our Stage (SOS)" campaign, and the management relented. It had been said "now it is saved you will have to use it". And so the UpStagers group was founded. Forty or so productions on, they are now celebrating their twentieth year. Their first performance, 20 years ago, was of two one act plays, so it was fitting that the production this year had the same format.


The UpStagers will gladly welcome anyone who wants to join, as an actor, or backstage. They meet every Wednesday at 7.30pm in the Village Hall – just go along if you are interested.

"Shakespeare Rocks" at the School

Many villagers received through their letterboxes an invitation, from Year 6 at the school, to attend one of the performances. I was delighted to be there!

The production was an amusing look at William Shakespeare's life and the times that he lived in, interpreted in a modern way. The musical was written in a style to engage children in learning about Shakespeare and his world.

The show begins with Aubrey, the 'Rough Shakespeare Company' director and his assistant Al claiming that they have found William Shakespeare's secret diary. Aubrey narrates from the diary as we go through the Scenes. There were seven very well written and extremely well sung songs. The song 'Will's Wonderful Words' was performed by Minstrels in sunglasses whilst Will was





chased by a legion of fans. The song 'No Girls Allowed' was performed with great gusto by Year 6. This song highlights how absurd the rules were at the time, e.g. no women were allowed to perform on stage,

so all female parts were played by men and boys. There were shrieks of laughter from the children when they saw the boys they knew from Year 6 dressed as women.

Scene 4 begins in the newly constructed Globe Theatre. The builders, all in Hi-vis jackets, are applying the finishing touches to the Globe in preparation for the performance of King Henry V. 'Show In The Globe' is sung and Queen Elizabeth 1 makes a grand entrance. Scene 5 is set in a rehearsal room and the cast of Macbeth are rehearsing. The cast are very superstitious and will not mention Macbeth by name in case it brings bad luck. 'Don't Mention Mac' is sung just prior to one of the cast saying the dreaded word. The Witches conclude that the only solution is to spin around three times and say a naughty word. Unfortunately, it was too late as the Globe Theatre had just burnt down! Bernie Bottom, the cannon operator, was the bearer of this bad news. appearance was met with great laughter from the audience, especially the children, as he turned around to

reveal what part of his clothing had been burnt off!

The next scene takes place in the burnt out Globe Theatre. Romeo and Juliet are there and they are discovered by Minstrels trying to find their instruments. The Minstrels are shocked to discover that Juliet is a woman and not a man dressed as a woman. A duet was sung by Romeo and Juliet. This song entitled 'Romeos and Juliets' was a very thought provoking love song about understanding, empathy and unity. The children playing Romeo and Juliet sang this song brilliantly

Scene 7 takes place in William's bedroom. He is now older and not feeling well. Anne, his wife, tells him to rest and as he lies down he comes across a new-fangled pencil which inspires the song '2B or Not 2B'. This song is performed by all of the cast, again with all the energy of youth.

This musical was a joy to watch. There were in excess of 60 children performing and they were all amazing. Not only was the performance exceedingly good but so was the scenery. The teacher informed us that this was all done by Year 6. It was evident that a lot of time and effort had been put into this production and it paid off. Well done teachers and WELL DONE YEAR 6.

We all hear about Samaritans Purse and Operation Christmas Child at Christmas time, when we are asked to donate or fill a shoe box for children in need across the globe. But what most people don't realise is that the organisation doesn't just spring into action in October / November, and hope that there will be enough gifts to go around. Volunteers are working tirelessly the whole year round. Sewing, knitting, crocheting along with other handicrafts talented contributors give. Not

only that, the empty shoe boxes roll in through every season and are diligently Christmas gift wrapped throughout the year to be ready and waiting for the packing days.

Jenny was recently, one of five volunteers in the UK to have her 'shoebox' story told in the OCC Special Report publication and here it is below



If you visit Jenny's home in Gloucester, you'll be in no doubt about her love for all things Operation Christmas Child! Boxes of school supplies, toys, personal care items and accessories line the walls, along with the beautifully wrapped shoe boxes ready to fill

Jenny runs a local Facebook page and encourages her community to drop off boxes, quality crafts and other shoe box items all year round. She then works with three local churches to pack these gifts together at packing parties. Last year they packed around 400 shoe box gifts at the parties and 1284 shoe boxes overall.



Jenny said "Every shoe box represents a child feeling loved and an opportunity for them to hear about Jesus, and that spurs me on to pack even more gifts."

Jenny is also Collections Coordinator for Gloucestershire and organises picking up all the shoe



boxes from drop-off locations in the area. She arranges for them to be taken to the National Ministry Centre in Coventry or the pop-up processing centre in Cardiff, where she also volunteers. Last year Gloucestershire collected a fantastic 3,525 shoe box gifts!

"I am part of a brilliant team of volunteers locally, and it is a privilege and joy to be a small part of such an amazing ministry," said Jenny.

Mother's Union

In June members visited St Paul's Church, Shurdington where the Church Warden, Clare Stewart explained the history of the Grade II listed building.

The church's claim to fame is that it is taller than it is long with a very elegant spire.

Recycling was noticeable including the second-hand box pew and the very low Norman door had been moved several times along the north wall.

Behind the altar there was an intricately carved stone reredos and to the right two beautiful Thomas Denny windows given in memory of local parishioners, Betty Jones and David Davis, an undertaker and farmer.

Both windows display the interests and loves of them both. Betty's showing young girls in blue representing



her lifelong connection with the Girl Guiding movement and her love for exploring the local countryside with the "Devil's Chimney" on the side of Leckhampton Hill depicted. At the bottom of the window her love of nature is captured featuring poppies, thorn bushes, small birds, butterflies and even a hedgehog.

The other window captures the view of a stony path leading over a stile into a field scattered with cattle and pear trees and stretching away to the Malvern horizon pierced in the middle by a slender spire. A small Cotswold farm is visible, such as that of the Davis family, and a donkey looking over the hedge by the stile welcomes those who pass into the sloping field.

Afterwards everyone enjoyed tea and cakes in the Church Hall.

Parish Council Report

It has been a busy period for the Parish Council, with plenty of business to be sorted before the holidays. Please note that there is no Council meeting in August, so the next meeting is on Monday September 2, at 7.30pm in the Pavilion.

Meeting with Gloucestershire Highways

The Council held a meeting with Yakub Mulla, from Gloucestershire Highways, to go through many village issues to do with clearing road drains, uneven pavements, potholes, broken man-hole cover surrounds, etc.

Yakub confirmed that street drains are cleared twice per year, and special call-outs are sometimes made when issues such as a blockage are reported. There have been some pothole repairs done. But what of many issues,

such as breaking up pavements in Six Acres, cars cutting the corner at the turn into Bondend Road by the church, getting a speed camera, the crossing of Churchfield Road just below the shops, crumbling surface of Ash Grove, more potholes all over the village and more? Some of these issues are under investigation, some remedial action is planned, and some can't be done because the Highways budget won't stretch.

Report from Paradise by Zbigniew Herbert translated by C. Milosz & P. Dale Scott



*pneuma means spirit or soul




BOOK REVIEW
