Leylandii Trees between Woodland Green and the Motorway

From Bernard and Julia King:

Firstly, a big Thank You to all who signed the petition in support of getting Highways England and Skanska to reduce the height of the trees that are parallel to the M5 Motorway and Woodland Green. Over 200 people signed the petiton and again, our sincere thanks.

To update everyone: Stroud MP Neil Carmichael visited our property in Woodland Green on the 6th July and was able to see the problem for himself. He agreed the trees were much too high and needed reducing to an acceptable height. He said he would write to the Chief Executive of Highways England.

Since then there have been several communications by e-mail which have resulted in a response from a Director of Highways England responsible for this area. He outlined a plan to address the offending trees with a wider intent to not only attend to the trees, but to facilitate better growth characteristics of the trees which should deal with the undergrowth issue as well. This is not the ideal result!! We wanted the trees culled / lopped <u>now</u> or during winter. This is not going to happen. More likely to be in the 2016 / 2017 programme. So what next???

Since the petition there has been little enquiry from residents regarding progress. The only other avenue to pursue is to create a protest stance, say on the Motorway Bridge, with the media involved to publicise the issue. That would make the need for a significant number of local people standing in protest with placards of some description or another. We rather feel the support for this action is unlikely to receive the numbers of persons with the necessary dedication that would be required.

Meanwhile, we are chasing ITV West to support the issue, but as yet we have not received a formal agreement to this. We will continue to push for it.

So our thanks to everyone again!! We will wait to see if Highways England honour their commitment in due course.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING: SOLAR PANEL "FARM" AT ROOKSMOOR

The November Parish Council meeting was attended by rather more than the usual number of villagers, of course because the Council was to discuss the planning application for solar panels in fields between Rooksmoor and Valley Lane. There were about 50 present. This being a Parish Council business meeting meant that it couldn't be a full consultation and debate involving non-Council members. Nevertheless, the Chairman allowed non-Council attendees to make brief statements, and he even took an informal vote among those present.

It is fair to say that most or all present wished to object to the plans. Objections were based principally around the opinion

that this was an inappropriate development in a designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. It also would have a very considerable impact on the houses nearby. There was also concern that there had been very little public consultation time allowed in the planning process. Most heard for the first time about the application only days before the deadline for submitting objections.

The Parish Council agreed unanimously to object to the plans. Their objection is now lodged with the District Development Control Committee.

drawn before the meeting was closed. Our next meeting will be held on Monday, December 14th when the speaker will talk about the Christmas Mummers Play in Gloucestershire.


Happily our membership continues to grow; currently we have 46 members. We look forward to 2016 and our exciting new programme.

COLD

Research highlights that there is a general lack of awareness of the effects that cold weather can have on an older person's health.

Cold weather causes a massive increase in associated health problems: heart attacks, strokes, pneumonia, depression, worsening arthritis and increased accidents at home (associated with loss of strength and dexterity in the hands).

- 70°F (21°C) is the ideal temperature for your living room
- 64°F (18°C) is the ideal temperature for your bedroom
- Keep your bedroom window shut at night

If you have an older friend or relative close to you, some of the advice given here may help them prepare for the winter season

• Call in or visit more often, if the cold weather stops your friend or family member from getting out and about. Calling in on someone can help keep their spirits up and make them feel less isolated.

 Make sure they have basic food items in the cupboard or freezer in case it's too cold to go shopping.

• Pick up prescriptions if it's too cold for them to go out, or find out if their local pharmacy offers a prescription pick-up and delivery service.

• Make sure they don't have a fall. Take round a mixture of salt and sand for putting on steps or paths in icy weather.

• Encourage them to keep warm. Check with the recommended temperatures given above. Low temperatures increase the risk of flu and other respiratory problems and can raise blood pressure.

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· Help them get a benefits check to make sure they're claiming everything they're eligible for. I can arrange a benefits check, or you can use some of the online benefits calculators available through Age UK, gov.uk, Citizens Advice, Turn to Us and other information websites.

If you are over 50 and would like any advice or support, please call me to arrange a home visit to discuss how I can help.

The light in the darkness

In recent weeks I have been struck by how many events there are in local towns and

villages involving the switching on of lights. And this month there will be numerous carol services at which will be read these words about Jesus Christ: "In him was life and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." (John 1,4-5)

In the physical darkness of December we are perhaps more aware of the deeper darkness in our world. It is not only about conflict and suffering in places far away, it is also about the communities in which we live and the lives of those we know, often in places of pain or struggle.

It is also about those dark places deep within each of us where destructive thoughts and emotions lurk, such as fear, pride and shame.

In all of this we can easily be fooled into believing that the darkness is stronger than the light. Too often we fail to grasp the truth that the hope and light of Jesus Christ transforms the darkness. In this month of Christmas lights and candles, may we each have the courage to expose the dark places within us to the light and love of Christ. And as we open ourselves to transformation may we grow to be more confident bearers of Christ's light and hope in who we are, and what we say and do among the people and places of our daily lives.



Local Businesses ...

This month it is the turn of the Village Store and Post Office ... run by Shreyas and Krupa Patel.

Shreyas told us: "We were both born in India and came to the UK in 2002, initially living in London. When we were looking for a business to run we wanted to move to a nice environment with a good quality of life and for these reasons chose Upton St Leonards. We have been running the village Post Office for approximately four and a half years. A number of my family members run post offices in different locations in the UK so there is a long association with the company Post Office Ltd."

A lot of changes have been made since our arrival, both to the Post Office and what we are able to offer in the shop.

A recent development is that I now provide a part time mobile Post Office service to Painswick on two days a week, following the closure of their Post Office.

Below are some of the services we provide.

Personal Banking - withdrawal up to £300 per day plus deposits into any bank account (with some variations re paying in slips or use of Debit Cards etc.)

Other examples are National Lottery, Foreign Currency, Phone Cards, Gift Cards, Charity Christmas Cards, toys, off licence, newspapers (incl delivery), magazines, photocopying, pet food, bread, milk, cigarettes & tobacco and frozen foods.

I am in discussion with the Post Office to see if I can provide Passport and Car Tax and if successful will let everyone know through our Newsletter.

Of course we also have the shop with many products on offer. We understand we cannot compete with the range of goods in local Supermarkets but particularly for those who



don't drive or who may have mobility issues, we offer convenience locally.

You would expect me to say that I would like as many people in the village to use our goods and services as much as possible and hope this article reminds everyone what we do offer.

We are also interested to know if you need anything specific such as a particular brand of food eg bread etc or a weekly / monthly magazine which we would then endeavour to supply.

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Æthelflæd, Lady of the Mercians

This month I take a brief step away from historical buildings to write about one of England's greatest women, Aethelflaed, "Lady of the Mercians" who rebuilt Gloucester from its former Roman ruins.

Aethelflaed was born in 869 at the height of the Viking invasions of England. Sources tell us that she was born in Staffordshire. She was the eldest daughter of Alfred the Great, King of Wessex, and his wife, Queen Ealhswith. She was sister to Edward the Elder.

In 874 most of Mercia (see map) had been invaded by the Danes and Danelaw extended from London northwards. The



only survivor of the old Kingdoms was Wessex.

In 876 Alfred and his army had been defeated by the Danish leader Guthrum, and had been forced to retreat to the Somerset marshes.

By 878 Alfred had rebuilt his army and defeated the Danish at the battle of Thundon. The Danes were pushed back to their stronghold at Chippenham where they were starved into submission.

886 sees Alfred take London and he returns it to the Mercians.

Aethelflaed is now 15 years of age. She is offered in marriage to Aethelred, Lord of the Mercians, to cement an alliance between Wessex and Mercia.

In 890 Alfred creates the Saxon chronicles.

892. Another Viking army arrives, but this time finds a kingdom defended by a series of fortified defences known as Burhs and a mobile field army. Alfred had constructed a series of 30 Burhs, designed to ring Mercia with military defences and fortified towns, each was detailed in a document known as the Burghal Hidage. After a four year struggle the Vikings are forced to withdraw and in 896 Alfred is declared King by the Anglo Saxons.

899 Alfred dies and his son Edward succeeds him.

902 Aethelred is forced to withdraw from public life through illness and Aethelflaed becomes the ruler of Mercia.

905 Aethelflaed together with her husband, health restored, prevent the Norse settlers from taking the port city of Colchester. They continue Alfred's programme of fortifications, starting in Chester.

> In 907 Aethelflaed and Edward raid Danish East Anglia. They bring the captured body of St Oswald to Gloucester. Aethelflaed begins to rebuild Gloucester from its former Roman ruins. She lays out a core street plan which still survives to this day.

> 910. Together the forces of Wessex and Mercia defeat the Danish at the battle of Tettenhall in Lincolnshire.

911 Aethelred is killed in battle and Aethelflaed becomes the sole ruler of Mercia. She is given the title Myrcna Hlaefdige, "The Lady of the Mercians", (some sources say Queen)

She now embarks on a vast programme of fortifications, adding a further 10 Burhs to her Father's original 30. The most important of these were Tamworth in 912, Stafford in 913, Warwick in 914 and Runcorn in 915.

916 She invades Wales taking Brecknock.

917 She leads her armies against the invaders and captures the Viking stronghold of Derby. Her Brother Edward takes Colchester. Aethelflaed then forms an alliance with Scottish kings Constantine II of Alba and Constantine Mac Aed of Strathclyde against Norse York.

918 So formidable had she become that she peacefully takes the Borough of Leicester.

Unfortunately Aethelflaed dies in Tamworth before knowing that the Vikings have accepted her as overlord at York.

Aethelflaed is buried beside her husband in St Peters church (now St Oswald's priory) in Gloucester alongside the bones of St Oswald a former Christian King of England. Though there is little left of St Oswald's priory, Aethelflaed's tombstone is displayed in Gloucester City Museum. A statue of her with her nephew Athelstan



stands in the grounds of Tamworth Castle and there are 3 depictions of her in stained glass, at Worcester and Chester cathedrals and in St Andrews Church in Churchdown. Her living legacy lies in her determination to defeat the invaders and unite England, this came to fruition in 954 when her nephew Athelstan became King of a united England.

She is a Gloucester heroine who has been overlooked by historians for centuries. She spent her lifetime developing and improving the lives of the people and was determined to drive out the invaders and unify the people of England.

She deserves our thanks and recognition.
