Letter to the Editor - Fancy A Festive Walk?

The Cotswolds are abundant with wonderful locations, perfect for a ramble. Gather loved ones, wrap up warm and enjoy the benefits of a winter walk.

Thank you to Tom, who recently took part in the Stroud Valleys Walk in aid of the Meningitis Trust and wrote to us about his experience:



This long established 21 mile walk around the Stroud valleys always takes place on the last Sunday in September. The Meningitis Trust ensure that walkers can do as little or as much as they choose and the route is very family and dog friendly. A shuttle bus service means that at any check point, transport is available to take participants back to their starting point. The check points are also where a wide range of snacks from fruit to more substantial victuals are often on offer to boost energy!

Amongst the 19,000 taking part in this year's walk was an 83 year Upton resident who has done the circuit in all but 2 years since 1992, when the walk covered 23 miles from and to Painswick! In more recent years the circuit takes in the old railway line from Stroud cricket club to Nailsworth before a steep climb to Minchinhampton and over the common before plunging down to Brimscombe. From Brimscombe it is uphill followed by a delightful wooded way and lakeside walk through Toadsmore Valley to Bismore before climbing to Lyppiat and Round Elm.

The trail now leads towards Slad passing along what must be the most unexpected but memorable vista from Swifts

Hill. After a descent to a lake it is uphill again to Slad's war memorial and beyond by mainly bridleway and field, looping gradually to Pitchcombe.



Pitchcombe to the Standish Woods is a long and steady climb in one of the largest fields in the area that is sure to test stamina! The reward is the knowledge that up hills are now conquered! You are now following the Cotswold Way and as you emerge from the wood at Randwick, widespread views across the Severn Vale are to be seen. Gradually the Cotswold Way descends over fields, through a vineyard to the railway footbridge at Stonehouse before reaching the much improved Stroudwater Canal from where it is a short distance to base and relaxation to recover, swap tales of the day and count the blisters!!

HEALTHY LIVING FORUM

This group is about self-education and gives us pointers where to find the information we need to educate ourselves, so we can then make informed decisions with our health care professionals about how we manage our health. We outline the small changes to our lifestyles, which can improve our health.

The group met in October at the Pavilion. We shared our experiences on where we were BETTER on our healthy living journey. We looked at various books bv doctors written scientists who have researched



this subject. Being diagnosed with Type 2 Diabetes is a big wake-up call and it's good not to wait until you stumble across this diagnosis by accident, as one member did recently.

The advantages of not having to deal with hunger when reducing your weight is key to success and this was fully explained during our discussions. We looked at how meal plans such as 'HelloFresh' can provide portion controlled meals, which are fun to cook and involve real fresh food, which is healthy and nutritious. Our local Morrisons provide a similar service called 'Eat Fresh', a complete meal in a box, containing fresh ingredients. Portion control is a big step in maintaining our health and these food boxes gives us just that.

In November we met on Wednesday 14th from 7pm -8.30pm in the Pavilion. We shared the latest science regarding the use of Statins - one of the most widely prescribed medications.

In December our meeting is on Wednesday, 12th, in the Pavilion at 7pm. Those attending are asked to watch the film "Widow Maker". This is available at http://www.thefatemperor.com/blog/

This film is quite shocking but well worth watching. We will also share tips for surviving Christmas and other festive occasions without gaining weight and interrupting your healthy eating plan. Do come along and join in the fun.

#StolenMemories

Your home contains all of your special memories. If your home is ever burgled those memories could be stolen. This year, in the run up to Christmas, when the days are getting shorter, take steps to protect your home and keep your memories safe.

Use this checklist to survey your home and implement changes.

Quick actions:

- Timer switch connected to a light for the front of your home
- Stop 'checking in' to locations online when you're not home.
- Avoid posting about expensive items you own online.
- Put any tools or equipment left around in your garden securely away.
- Put up a 'beware of the dog' sign.
- Move your house and car keys so they are not visible.
- Put up a window sticker advertising your alarm / cctv / neighbourhood watch scheme.
- Make your property look lived-in and loved from the outside.
- Add wire mesh to your shed's window and/or an alarm if possible.
- Turn on "Find my Device" and Activation Lock on your smartphone and tablet.
- Replace door locks if required.
- Remove unknown and past people from your online social networks.



Planned Actions:

- Put up motion-activated security lighting at the back of your home.
- Lay down some gravel.
- Put high value items in a safe or in a third-party safety deposit box.
- Trim your hedges, greenery and bushes to give natural surveillance.

Temporary Closure of Hempsted Household Recycling Centre

The Hempsted HRC will close from Monday 3 to Friday 21 December inclusive to install new equipment and improve the site. It will re-open on Saturday 22 December.

During the closure, the current machines will be upgraded. In order to prevent last minute closures and wasted journeys, and to make the sites more flexible to operate into the future, Gloucestershire County Council is bringing in a new mobile compactor. New open top skips will be provided. New and improved signs will be installed so visitors know which materials go where.



Rev Clodagh Ingram writes

Jesus told extraordinary stories like the one about the Prodigal Son (to be found in chapter 15 of Luke's Gospel) which simply tells us that it does not matter what we have done – God is waiting

for us to come home.

Christmas is a time for homecoming for many people. For others their former home or family or country is gone or home has never been the safe place it ought to have been. Yet we all long to come home.

The story of Christmas is the beginning of God's homecoming to live among the people he created. The story of Christmas is the beginning of the possibility of our own homecoming. One of the names given to the baby Jesus is 'Emmanuel' which means 'God with Us'. The Jewish people had waited hundreds of years for their saviour, they were expecting a warrior king to arise and restore them to their own land. But instead God sent his son, as a helpless babe into the heart of a family; into the heart of a community; into the heart of an occupied nation; into the heart of the people he loved to rescue them and restore them into loving relationship. The people he had been calling home: home from estrangement, home from exile, home from isolation, home from self-sufficiency, home from loneliness, anxiety, hatred and fear finally had the means to find their way back through Jesus.

No matter what has been happening in life God is calling each one of us home this Christmas. God is calling each one of us into relationship because he created us, he loves us and he wants us to know him better. He wants us back home among the family.

God calls us home through Jesus his Son who was born as a helpless baby and died as a man on a cross to open the way for us all to come home into the fullness of loving relationship and life offered by our creator God, the maker of heaven and earth and all that is in it.


"God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him." (1 John 4:9)


together in the first instance and then attached them to

You may have heard the bells of the Parish Church of St Leonard's ringing out on the evening of 11.11.18.

For those who came to the Church 7.00 pm - it was a real pleasure to see you, It gave the opportunity to see

and hear the bells in action and for the ringers to provide a further insight into ringing techniques.

Twelve members of the Gloucester Branch of Church Bell Ringers, some of whom had only started ringing a few months ago, were able to ensure that the 8 bells were rung at the Church for this very important 100th anniversary in the World's history. The timing of the ringing at Upton coincided with the Worldwide events to

commemorate the armistice and the cessation of hostilities at the end of the first world war. and a 'Ring for Peace' in that it serves to remind us all to consider how we lead our everyday lives; to promote and encourage a lasting peace between all members of our species and to putting an end to the suffering and futility of war.

WW1 Plagues Dedication

Amidst a busy afternoon of visitors to Mike Stratford's fascinating weekend exhibition of items relating to World War One, the church went quiet as a congregation of some 75 local and not so local residents gathered to witness the dedication of the two World War One memorial plaques installed just days before.

A short service was led by Bishop Michael Hooper, grandson of Renford Charles Hooper who died in 1921 and whose name featured on the second plaque. Bishop Michael and his brother Alan were brought up in the village, living in Bondend Cottages and Michael sang in the church choir. He remembered fondly his time in the choir and was pleased to see so many friends in the congregation. He remarked that his grandfather, who led a humble life in the local fields as a cowman, although with aspirations to be a silversmith, could not have foreseen the changes in society that WW1 engendered, with improvements in women's right to work, and with education expanding such that Michael could aspire and succeed to such a high role in the Church.

During the service, the 40 names of those recorded were read by Revd James Turk and by Alan Hooper and Bishop Michael's son Wrenford James Hooper. Making the third generation of Hoopers involved, Renford's great, great grandsons William Wrenford and Sebastian were present, with William reading the Kohima Epitaph. It was pleasing to see relatives of others named on the plaques and our photo shows the Hooper family, Iona Birchall (relative of Percy and Vivian Birchall) and Wendy Howe and her mother who had travelled especially from Leicestershire – niece and great niece of Edwin James Mills. Many others present knew the families of those who lost loved ones.

The plaques were crafted by local expert Paul Malvern and the equally talented signwriter Rob West who attended the dedication, along with many of those who had made donations towards the project. A book will be completed in the weeks to come, using material from Mike Stratford's collection and USL Life readers are encouraged to let him or me have any material relating to those named, which can be copied for the book, so we can record as much information as possible for the legacy of those who died for our freedom. Bishop Michael closed his talk with a prayer "For Peace and Justice throughout the World"; a fitting epitaph for the memory of 40 men who left their homes over 100 years ago and did not return.

Having qualified at Redland College Bristol (now UWE) in Constructional Design and completed his formal

training as a Teacher in Design and Technology, he spent 30 years at Beaufort School, passing on his expertise and his enthusiasm for creativity to students.

He's now retired from formal teaching, and as he recalls, he's unlikely to forget the day, as it was the day of the Great Flood!

His love of chair-making led him to tutor both at the Gloucester Arts & Crafts Group Summer School in Newent and St Peters and once a year he teaches in Chichester at West Dean College.

His choice of wood is Elm and Ash, now quite hard to source. He used to be able to obtain it from Westonbirt, as they used to hold wood sales but this is no longer an option. Whitney on Wye near Hereford has now become his go-to

supply. The particular elm used has to be air dried and pliable as kiln dried wood is too brittle.

Phil has designed his take on the Welsh stick chair and has named it Chair Mark II. One of his chairs has been fashioned in Burr Elm and is incredibly beautiful which you can judge for yourself in the photo both here and online. He also renovates old chairs and replaces the rush seating, and welcomes enquiries through his website **philshipleychairs.co.uk**

OBITUARIES

COLIN FRESHNEY - 1936 - 2018



Colin was born in Dunston, a small village in Lincolnshire. Educated at Lincoln City School he then studied Sociology and Psychology at Nottingham University. During his early career in teaching, he met Maureen and they were married in 1960. Two children followed, Mark in 1961 and Alison in 1963. In 1970 the family moved to Upton St Leonards where they have lived ever since.

Colin was very active both in the village and in the county. He became a Parish Councillor and Chair of Upton Parish Council and was a district Councillor for Stroud and Chairman of the Brockworth School PTA. In 1981 he was appointed Vice Principal of the National Star Centre, where he remained until his retirement in 1994.

Shortly after he joined U3A as a committee member and subsequently became Chair and Vice Chair. He joined the Magistracy, and became Chairman of the Bench for Gloucestershire. Colin was instrumental in gaining one of the first Lottery Grants that helped to rebuild the Pavilion in Upton. He became President of the Village Show and was an active member of the Garden Club, reflecting his passion for gardening. He was also Chairman of the Lady Downe Charity, which bestows grants to deserving youngsters in the village. Colin was an exceptional leader, motivator, organiser and contributor, valued by all and missed by so many.



BOOK REVIEW:

It is one of her later novels and is a clear critique of the Edwardian aristocratic society as well as a reflection of her own childhood experiences.
