Edwin Witchell first showed a collection to the Stroud public in 1894 and at a similar time Art classes began. In 1927, Sir Henry Mears and Charles Irving, gardener and geologist, wrote reports on museums and the latter became Stroud's first curator in 1929. Stroud Museum was officially opened in 1930.

Thanks expressed to Val and Penny for their invaluable support.	Other people who contributed to the museum were Stuart Douglas Scott who introduced decorative fine arts, and Lionel Walrond who was curator for 37 years. 


During the opening service Maureen Freshney was admitted by the Branch Leader having joined before the lockdowns.



#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Close to Where the Heart Gives Out : A Year in the Life of an Orkney Doctor Written by Malcolm Alexander and published in 2019, this book is an unflinchingly honest tale of rural life.

It is set in the wild and remote landscape of Eday, part of the Orkney archipelago, and written by the only doctor on the island. The stories range from humorous to deeply moving.



Doctor Alexander describes adjusting to life without modern conveniences, to the extreme weather and how to provide the best medical care to the population with limited resources.

The book leaves this reader with the strong desire to visit Orkney and admiration for those whose lives match the rhythms of the landscape.

# From a Watchnight Service on Christmas Eve (an extract from the book above)

The doctor is to take the service; drinks and mince pies are to follow in a building with only gas lighting and no running water.

Kettles are placed on the paraffin heaters and the mince pies are kept warm wrapped in foil.

The service is a joy to take, although it's just as well I chose not to go into the pulpit tonight; baby Megan is refusing to do anything but cry unless I hold her in my arms. Slowly the weight of my arm increases as she drifts off to sleep.

I suppose its alright to have a sleeping baby at the centre of a Christmas Eve service.

#### Tree Planting at The Glebe Field

The Parish Council were very grateful to The Woodland Trust and their Sponsors for supplying tree saplings and plastic protectors. Unfortunately the protectors haven't been robust enough to survive in a dog walking field!!

On that basis, the Parish Council decided to purchase something more able to last the course and these have now been fitted to protect the saplings.

## Feature Article - Samaritans

## SAMARITANS



You may have see seen on TV, heard on the radio or read in newspapers that HRH Charles, Prince of Wales and Felicity Harding, Chad Varah's daughter were in town celebrating with Gloucester and District Samaritans 50 years of listening in Gloucester.

"There are in this world, in every country, people who seem to be 'ordinary', but turn out to be extraordinary. They give their total attention, they listen without judging or interrupting. They do not preach; they have nothing to sell. We call them Samaritans." Chad Varah.

Many of us know that Samaritans was set up in London by Chad Varah in 1953; our Gloucester Samaritan branch was set up in 1969 and was sponsored by the local Council of Churches. On 24th August 1971, Eartha Kitt, the singer, officially opened the Gloucester Helpline and took some of our first calls. By the end of 1971 the Stroud Befriending Group joined the Gloucester Samaritans, and the Gloucester and District Samaritans was created and included all the Stroud and Forest of Dean District communities.

The current Gloucester Branch in Parkend Rd, opened in 1991 and was the result of generous local financial support and lot of very hard work by extraordinary people.

As well as the purpose built Operations Room for telephone answering and email correspondence, we have a visitors room, training and meeting rooms, and two bedrooms for volunteers wishing to rest before or after their shifts. To the rear there is a good sized safe car park.

Gloucester & District branch of Volunteers is drawn from around our catchment area including Upton St Leonards, the Stroud Valleys, Wotton-under-Edge, Cam and Dursley and the Forest of Dean.

Samaritans in Gloucester have a proud tradition of having a strong presence in our communities and have embraced many local events, carnivals and festivals, Pride Day, craft fairs, and College Fresher Fairs; setting up stalls with information leaflets about our work and responding to opportunities to talk with people. In a normal year we have had a Samaritan presence at Railway Stations to support staff and rail users and in the past have had carol singing on the platforms at Christmas. More recently, our volunteers have linked with 'Gloucester Feed the Hungry,' supporting the homeless and rough sleeper community. During the lockdowns we have worked with the NHS and other emergency services to ensure that front line workers felt supported with our contact details included in food boxes delivered by local food banks.

We look forward to being able to re-establish all our Outreach work once pandemic restrictions are fully lifted.

Samaritans vision is that fewer people die by suicide and one way of working towards our vision is to share our knowledge and our research and experience with people in our communities so that others become part of the informal 'caring team'.

Gloucester Samaritans work closely with Gloucester City Council, British Rail and CRUSE Bereavement Care; we visit HMP Long Lartin to support the trained Prison Listening Volunteers and are currently working with Waterwells Police Custody Suite to offer emotional support to detainees.

\* Our Gloucester & District Branch has 165 volunteers, drawn from our catchment area.

\* We do regular shifts, taking telephone calls or answering emails from people who are feeling in distress and who need to talk in confidence and safety to someone who has been trained to listen well.

\* We create a safe space for callers to express their feelings of distress, explore their options for coping and finding their own best way forward.

\* Callers won't get advice from Samaritans; they won't be judged or made to feel uncomfortable whatever their circumstances. We listen to the trials of our fellow humans and believe in the power of listening with kindness and consideration and the necessity of confidentiality.

\* We are here day and night, 365 days a year offering emotional support for whatever callers are going through and for anyone who is struggling to cope.

\* There's no typical person who contacts us and no typical problem that people talk to us about. Sometimes callers need to talk about past experiences or disturbing thoughts or feelings and prefer to talk confidentially to an unknown person. Sometimes people get to a point where they don't want to tell family or friends about their innermost feelings and prefer to talk to a trained listener: some may feel they just can't cope any longer and life is too much to handle alone and they need to talk their life experience before they make decisions about the future.

In September 2021 Gloucester Samaritans took 1857 calls and responded to 100 emails. We were open 581 hours. Nationally Samaritans answer a call every 6 seconds. 21,200 volunteers answer more than 5 million calls for help every year. More than 6,500 lives are lost to suicide in the UK every year.

We live in a lovely village and one of the things that makes a real difference to enjoying our homes is having good neighbours.

Many good deeds are done every day in Upton for people who may have reached more senior years, have lost their life partner or just need a hand when they don't feel well. For all those people who make a difference a big thank you from all those who have had and continue to receive support.

There are the occasional problems with such things as bonfires, DIY at odd hours, setting off fireworks late at night and parties with loud music but I am pleased to say the knowledge of good deeds done in Upton far outweighs the odd complaint received about things that can annoy people living close to each other.

If you think you may sometimes fall into the "problem" area please consider your impact on those around you. Thanks.
