# What's Been Happening in Upton?

## Quercus (hewn from oak wood)

The old oak tree (on the village green) as we knew it, is no more and in its place we have a wonderful creation by artist Daniel Cordell. Daniel lives in Devon and takes his art all over the world.

I was lucky to be passing as the artist got to work. First the top part of the tree was removed by heavy lifting equipment to be used later as the iconic bench, then the artist got to work with his tools. Watching the 'creature' emerge from out of its chrysalis, hewn by this craftsman by hand and blade was mesmerising. The skill of the artist and his knowledge of his ancient craft were sheer joy to watch. I asked him how long he had been doing this. He went to university to study art and when he left, realised that this was what he wanted to do, so through trial and error and no formal training he embarked upon his craft. He told me he'd had many failures and left a trail of attempts behind him but learned through his mistakes and, watching him at work was pretty spectacular. The face seems animated, the feathers almost appear to ruffle in the breeze and the claws clinging to the perch make it come alive.





The Tawny Owl (Strix aluco) also called the brown owl, is known throughout folklore and legend symbolizing transformation and change and a guide through hard times. It is also regarded as a symbol of wisdom and knowledge. It is common to woodland areas across Europe as far as Siberia and makes it's nest in a tree cavity where it feels safe and concealed to breed. It does not migrate and fiercely guards its territory, so much so that young birds leaving the parent nest will often starve if they cannot find a vacant territory of their own. This is why it is so important to preserve our trees and woodlands.

They are nocturnal and fly and glide silently through the night, dropping out of the air to seize their unsuspecting prey. This owl has been known to catch smaller owls but it in turn can fall prey to eagle owls and hawks. Its call has been associated with bad omens and even death, and the double hoot call and well known 'Twit Twoo' that captivates us is actually the male and female responding to each other.

I caught up with Daniel a couple of days later as he was putting the finishing touches to the bench, smoothing it with a sander and feeling with his hand to ensure there were no splinters. A very apt and fitting memorial to our wonderful late Queen.

Take a look at Daniel's website <u>www.dancordell.co.uk</u> to see his other amazing creations and there are lots of sites with information on owls and what they have meant to various religions and beliefs over the centuries.

On behalf of village residents, a big thank you to the Parish Council for making such spectacular use of a tree stump which would have probably been cut down eventually and the Village Hall Committee for their financial contribution. Also thanks to Nigel Murrell who has offered to treat the wood so it is protected from weathering.

Oaks are the stuff of legend and our tawny owl will stand for many years to come Linda Munnoch





Dear friends in Upton St Leonard's,

One of my favourite comedians on the TV is Michael McIntyre – have you ever seen him? Of course, everyone's sense of humour is different, but he makes me laugh a lot! One of the reasons I like his comedy is because it's all based on his observations from life – highlighting some of the crazy things we sometimes say and do – and he gently pokes fun at those – and himself, of course. Recently he was talking about how at this time of year we say 'Surely it can't be December already?' to which his answer is 'Well yes, we've had all the other months, you see, that's how it works. If we were into December straight after April, you'd have a point! Another thing he says is 'I don't feel Christmassy (if that's a word) yet.'

I wonder what makes you feel that it's really December, or makes you feel Christmassy?

For me, one of the things that used to make me feel it really was December, was receiving an Advent calendar, with the little doors to open every day of December until Christmas Eve. When I was a child you opened a door and looked at a picture, or had a verse from the Bible telling you about the Christmas story. Nowadays you can buy Advent calendars which have a chocolate to eat every day, or perhaps a little individual bottle of gin (I did actually see this in a shop) or maybe a beauty product. I'm swimming against the tide of commercialism here, but I think Advent calendars should focus on what Christmas is all about – the story of God coming into our world in the form of a human baby, to show us how to live in love and peace together.

So I've got plans for 3 sorts of Advent "calendars" this year and perhaps you would like to join me with one or all of these?

• My first plan is to read the book of Luke, starting on December 1<sup>st</sup> – or if you receive this magazine later than that you'll have to catch up! There are 24 chapters in the book of Luke, and if you read a chapter a day, you will have not only read the Christmas story but the Easter story as well. You can't really read one without the other, because of course the reason Jesus was born and came to live among us, which we celebrate at Christmas, was to die for us, and then be raised from the dead – which we remember at Easter. One chapter a day, with your cup of tea or coffee.

• My second plan is to put aside an item of food a day for the foodbank, for the 24 days of December, - - eg some tinned soup, a pack of mince pies, some shampoo and so on - although with this you have to work a little bit ahead, because the foodbanks like to receive these items in time for Christmas – so perhaps get them to your foodbank (or someone you know who knows about the foodbank) by December 20<sup>th</sup>, but still put in 24 items. If we stop to consider for a moment how much we are going to be buying and consuming over the Christmas period, one item a day isn't very much, is it?

• My third and final plan is to send a Christmas card with a short personal message in, through the post ( if there isn't a postal strike )to one person a day for the 24 days leading up to Christmas. Ian and I receive lots of 'round robin' letters from our friends and family, each year, which are great and save a lot of work, but you can't beat the personal touch. I'm particularly going to think of people who might be feeling lonely or sad and not 'Christmassy' for various reasons.

I wonder which of these ideas appeals to you ? Are you keen to read more of the word of God? Are you a letter writer? Are you an organised shopper? I'm going to try all 3, which may be a bit ambitious – ask me after Christmas if I managed it.

Whichever you do, may God bless you and your family and friends this Christmas, and may he use you to be a blessing to others.

## The Christmas Present That Keeps on Giving

Over the years I have received some lovely Christmas presents – jewellery, clothes, ornaments, and handmade Christmas decorations including a Christmas stocking. Along came December 2006 and my husband was desperately looking for one extra gift for me, finally he settled on a card making kit. Such an innocent looking box contained everything needed to make ten cards. Little did my poor husband know what he'd started!

The first card I made was for my Mother-in-law's birthday, I sat at the kitchen table and carefully followed the instructions. Sadly I can't remember exactly what it was like but looking back to that time it would have been quite amateurish. Luckily, she loved it and was very touched with being the first person to receive one of the cards.



Through 2007 I made the 10 cards, through 2008 I made 34, and over the next couple of years I experimented with various techniques. These included using stamps with coloured inks and with embossing powders that required heating to make the powder set, and iris folding, a paper craft technique involving folding strips of coloured paper in such a way that the centre of the design forms an iris which is reminiscent of the iris diaphragm of a camera lens. I also started experimenting with recycling cards we received and in the early days this mainly involved using the pictures almost as they were.

The first is that family and friends know I will always be happy to receive card making bits and pieces as presents, and these vary vastly in price meaning everyone could afford them. One year I received a die cutting and embossing machine, I was so excited as this meant I could add more dimensions to the cards I made. Though not another present, but rather a way to further add to my designs, I started using the computer to print text on the front of a few cards, as well as for inserts to make it easier to personalise the verses or wishes inside.

The second reason is that card making allows me to really design and tailor the cards to people's interests. For example, using favourite colours, coordinating colours with Merry Oristmos favourite teams for sports themed cards, or using favourite seasons for gardening

themed cards. It also means every card I give to family and friends is unique and personal, plus I can give cards for events and occasions not commercially available. Sometimes I have an idea in my mind for weeks before starting to cut, emboss, stamp, quill or fold. I then lay out all the pieces roughly where I plan to place them, although it can take another several days before I'm happy enough to stick anything! The result however, plus sense of achievement, makes it worth the effort

The third reason is that this hobby allows the creativity I didn't realise I had to grow and flourish. I now mix colours and textures with more confidence, and have a good idea of when to layer and when not to layer. The way I recycle cards we receive has evolved, especially since having the die cutting and embossing machine. I often use packaging from chocolate boxes and beauty products as well as wrapping paper,

buttons, and ribbons

Because making cards is one of my favourite things to do I have made about 220 cards this year and about double the number I need. So, I sold a few on Etsy and even more at the Spring Show, which has allowed me to buy a couple of dies and an embossing folder.

Finally a word for my husband, I know I drive you mad spreading all my card making bits and pieces out on every available surface when I am in creating mode but thank you for that original present which has given me, and continues to give me, so much pleasure.

## Grazing Muzzles / Dont Feed Horses

One of the stables has reported that almost as soon as a grazing muzzle was put on a horse, someone trespassed on their property and cut it off. The photos show a muzzle and the strap that was deliberately cut to remove one.



Grazing muzzles are used on horses to reduce the amount of grass that is consumed, as too much can kill them. In the wild they would not have had access to as much lush green grass as we provide in our fenced off paddocks, so for some horses their bodies cannot cope with it. If you see a horse wearing a muzzle you should make no attempt to remove it. It is not starving and can still eat. The muzzle is there for the welfare of the animal.



If you are concerned about the welfare of a horse or other animal, then contact the landowner. Please never feed horses and other animals that are not yours.

# Clímate Group Update

The group has now got together and started to look at what ideas are out there and what we should be focusing on. Thanks to those who have volunteered - much appreciated!



We have already discovered that there are 17 climate groups already up and running in the Stroud District area so we will be exploring what can be learnt from them over the coming months.

Some useful information is shown in the box below to raise awareness of the cost of running household appliances.

We will be sharing any suggestions we find that may be easy wins such as:

- Turning down heating by 1 degree could save on average £80 per year
- Instead of using a tumble dryer(if you have one), drying clothes outside when the weather is suitable based on 3 washloads per week could save an estimated £10 per month

Next month we will be looking at where investment can be made to save energy thereby reducing heating bills eg home insulation.
