

This piece was written for us by *our resident poet, Ted Gardner.* Ted was born in the village and has lived here throughout his long life.

Christmas Then

As a young lad Christmas time meant snow and ice as we nearly always had snow at Christmas. I well remember the days leading up to Christmas making sledges out of any scrap timber we could find, in readiness for the first snow fall.



Some days were spent "wooding" to build up the coal house with logs so that we could enjoy our evenings in the warmth. We looked forward to playing with whatever toys we found in our stockings – Ludo, Draughts, Tiddlywinks and jigsaw puzzles were always around.

We had mince pies and hot chocolate before we went to bed on Christmas Eve. My birthday falls in January and my old Aunty would give me a Christmas box that had to do for my birthday as well – 23 days later! The waiting was something I learned to live with.



As children we spent a lot of time carol singing. We spent every evening the week before Christmas singing around the neighbours' doorsteps, collecting a handful of sweets and a few coppers for our rendition of "Away in a Manger" and "Hark the Herald Angels sing." The payment was always shared out between our mates; it was part of the Christmas tradition. Sadly, for various reasons, this does not happen today.

Christmas Day was special, stockings to be opened, toys to be examined and assembled. I remember my first clockwork train set. I had extra straight tracks to make an oval circuit and a

tunnel made out of an empty Cornflakes box.

Christmas Now

How different it is — we rarely see snow and ice for Christmas. The world is warmer. Sledging still happens when snow falls but do children make their own sledges using offcuts of wood? Boys and girls are seldom seen "wooding" as central heating is here instead. Door to door Carol Singing in the evenings has virtually stopped mainly because of parental fears. I don't want to sound cynical but who wants to cook turkey, sprouts and roast spuds when you can phone McDonalds or Nandos for a takeaway instead of the long cooking of a full Christmas dinner? Perhaps Christmas has lost some of its magic; is this because I am a lot older and perhaps get more pleasure by looking back at my childhood Christmas?

Clockwork train sets can hardly compare with I-Phones, tablets and computers. Who wants to play Ludo when there are Pokemon, Super Mario and other games where one can chase around a screen and shoot at images with the latest action device at your disposal? Past days are gone. Nowadays Christmas cards are rarely sent, instead "Seasons Greetings" are texted and on your Superflip smartphone you can send a picture of your new trainers!

Has Christmas got a future? I wonder.

The village's Climate Action Group met recently and spent a lot of the meeting discussing an E-bike proposal. This article is to gauge interest in the village from volunteers willing to help run a scheme in Upton (with lots of support) and also from those that would consider hiring an e-bike.



The definition of an E-Bike is, a bicycle equipped with an electric bike motor to assist you when you're pedalling. The motor gets its power from a battery mounted on the bike. To classify as an e-bike, the motor has to help you rather than propel you on its own.

Transition Stroud, along with Brimscombe-based social enterprise, **The Bike Drop**, have successfully secured £20,000 to set up a series of e-bike hire schemes in the Stroud District.

The scheme is designed to give local people the opportunity to hire an e-bike, and the funding will enable the installation of community/neighbourhood bike 'pods' in and around Stroud District. These pods will consist of a police-approved cycle store, e-bikes, plus the accessories and utilities necessary to keep them maintained.

Each pod will be located somewhere central in the community and will need a group of volunteers drawn from its locality to run it. Each group of volunteers will determine the exact way in which their pod is run. The pods will be able to retain a proportion of the hire fees. The Climate Action Group has a couple of locations for a pod that are being considered.

The scheme will provide ongoing administration, booking, insurance, maintenance, and volunteer support in partnership with each pod's volunteer group.

There was concern regarding road safety and insurance in particular, but the Group remained interested as the village is close to cycle routes into Gloucester and Cheltenham. The general idea is to give people a chance to hire an e-bike, initially for a short time (day/s) as a



'taster' but in time, if successful, longer hires would be encouraged, and then moving to hire-to-buy schemes.

If you have a potential interest in hiring an e-bike in the future (even if only for a few days a year) or you would be interested in helping to run a scheme as a volunteer, please leave a message for Cliff Alderman.
