

Brief history of the Leap Day

Leap Days are needed to keep our calendar in alignment with the Earth's revolutions around the Sun. It takes the Earth approximately 365.2422 days (a tropical year) to circle once around the Sun. If we didn't add a day on February 29 nearly every 4 years, we would lose almost six hours every year. After only 100 years, our calendar would be off by approximately 24 days in relation to the seasons.

Coming of Age

Did you know that many countries have laws defining which date a person born on February 29 comes of age in legal terms? In some countries such as New Zealand, the official birthday falls on February 28 in common years; in other countries like the United Kingdom, Leap Year babies have to wait until March 1.

NEW GARDEN WASTE COLLECTION SERVICE - BUYER BEWARE!

This new garden waste collection is being rolled out, with residents being invited to purchase their own brown wheelie bins.

Reading the leaflet (distributed by Stroud District Council) that I recently picked up in the village Post Office about the service, residents may wish to note that the current green coloured waste recycling bin has a 240 litre capacity, holding 1/3rd more than the new 180 litre brown bin for garden waste mentioned on page 3 of the leaflet.



Our neighbouring councils provide the larger 240 litre bins for garden waste collection, with a comparable annual service charge, but no initial purchase cost.

I have reservations about the adequacy of a 180 litre bin as part of a <u>fortnightly</u> collection service, given the flexibility of the current <u>year round weekly</u> green bag facility the new scheme will replace.

Having spoken briefly to a few USL residents, who generally share my concerns and were not aware of the smaller bin capacity, I have raised the issues, with suggestions to make minor scheme modifications, to our District Councillor, who will raise this with Stroud District Council.

Volunteering The Village Hall and Why it is Important!

What is a village hall? Well in most cases it is the lifeblood of a village community and that is no exception in Upton St Leonards.

The Village Hall and the grounds in which it stands were given to the village in 1922 by the Birchall Family of Bowden Hall and has run successfully ever since, now being administered by The Village Hall Trust as a registered charity.

There are some 27 different groups which use the hall on a regular basis, be it daily, weekly or monthly along with those casual bookings for various events, parties, christenings, fund-raising sales etc.

In the case of groups like the Gettogether club it provides a venue for people, who otherwise are perhaps on their own, to meet with others.

We are fortunate to have two halls for hire together with the meeting rooms. The Hall underwent a refurbishment some 6 years ago, giving it enhanced facilities. Other upgrades happen all the time.

It does however mean that a number of Volunteer Trustees are needed to oversee the running of the Hall and it has become more challenging of late to find people who are prepared to take on that role.

The fewer we have, the more time consuming it becomes on the rest. What happens if there are no Trustees available, you may well ask?

The simple answer is that the Hall



mean? Well it would take away a huge facility in the community and the village would be the poorer without it.

Being a Trustee is not at all timeconsuming; particularly when the load is spread.

The Trust has insurance that protects Trustees.

There are about three meetings a year and its two main fund-raising events requiring support, are the Spring Show and Bonfire Night.

Currently we lack a Secretary, who would be required to write letters, convene meetings etc, .



Many churches and primary schools in the Diocese

PLOUGH SUNDAY SERVICE

You're used to seeing Andrew Herring's bright red tractor around the village, but why was it parked outside the Church on Sunday 10 January?

It wasn't there waiting for a trailer or to pick up a hay bale, but to advertise the Plough Sunday Service that evening! This traditional service was reintroduced at St Leonards in 2014 to give thanks to the farming community for all that they do for us. Modern machinery and straw bales being too large to fit inside, the church was decorated with farming implements from a bygone and very manual age. Thanks go to Andrew Herrring (Portway Farm) for loan of the Victorian wheeled seed drill, and Mel Moore (Grove Court) for the scythe, hay rake, spade and of course the Perry and Cider bottles!

Sunday's service was lead by Rev David Eady who, despite 10 years at Highnam, had never taken a Plough Sunday service before. He reminded us, at the start of the agricultural year, of the dedicated work of our farmers and encouraged us to dedicate ourselves to God and remember those less fortunate than ourselves, for whom growing their essential food is a daily struggle.



Members of the Upton farming community were prominent in their support to the evening service - with Ann Herring (Portway Farm) and Jennifer Watts (Gastrells Farm) leading prayers to dedicate the plough and the labours of farmers



locally and world wide. The classic hymn "We Plough the Fields and Scatter" was sung - with special note of the chorus "All good things surround us are sent from Heaven above, then thank the Lord, Oh thank the Lord, for all His love". I suppose the seeds are not really "scattered" as such these days, but "We Plough the fields and plant seeds in mechanically drilled lines".





In 1982, a young man by the name of Graham Taylor came to live in Upton St Leonards, at Bullens Manor Farm on the High Street. He was 17 at the time and in a Design Engineering apprenticeship at GCHQ in Cheltenham. But his one great passion was motor racing. His dream was to become a racing driver.

With this very much in mind, Graham applied for an award from the Lady Downe Trust to do a Racing Drivers' Course at the world famous Jim Russell

Everything about the Racing School was first class and the young hopefuls came from all over the world. Each driver was assigned a personal instructor, who gave guidance and taught them how to get the best out of the car. It was very intense and the culmination of the course was the Drivers' Race Day.

Graham remembers not sleeping well the night before the race, feeling that this was "make or



eak" time. After the qualifying round in the morning, he was placed towards the back of the grid; not good, but in the fternoon the race went really Graham consistently achieving

t h e fastest lap, overtaking driver after driver, to finish second.

Quite pleased with the result and after a big splash about him in the Citizen, he set about looking for financial backing. However, everywhere he went he drew an absolute blank, businesses were very interested but not interested enough to invest large sums of money.

Still determined to have a life in motor racing, Graham decided if he couldn't be a racing driver, he'd be a racing engineer. He now focussed on getting good grades in his apprenticeship and did so well that GCHQ offered him a career in the R & D Department, also known as "Q" Division.

When you see a James Bond film and Bond mentions "Q" - that's where he was. The work was very challenging but exciting too, and after achieving a good report in his first year he was put forward for promotion. However, the promotion was refused on the grounds that he would be the youngest to achieve this status by four years and therefore he would have to wait. Graham felt let down and angry and when he saw an advert in the Motoring News for an engineer for a new racing team, he applied and became Racing Engineer to a young Mika Hakkinen who subsequently went on to become a World Champion. Graham was just 23 years old: he couldn't believe his luck.



Race Engineers have sole responsibility for coaching the driver, developing the car and organising the pit crew. Everything has to be well planned and tightly co-ordinated to get the best out of the whole team.

Graham says he found this relatively easy for he employed all the skills taught to him by his Personal Instructor at the Jim Russell School. "That Racing Course was now serving me well, not as a Racing Driver but as a Race Engineer". Mika went on to win the Championship which was great for Graham's career and the following year he joined Jackie Stewart's outfit.

winning three Formula Junior Championships running, with David Coulthard who went on to Formula One and Dario Franchitti who became Indy 500 Champion three times and Indycar Champion four times. It was frequently exhausting, immensely adrenaline raising but incredibly exciting."



In 1999 Graham moved into Formula One with Tom Walkinshaw's Orange Arrows running Pedro de la Rosa and Jos Verstappen. The team took part in a 13 part TV series named Racing Arrows which followed the team and drivers

around the world throughout the season. Murray Walker, the great Formula One commentator, always keen to support new teams and drivers, frequently travelled with the Arrows outfit to the world's circuits and was always encouraging and very entertaining.

Respecting local residents and parking with due consideration

The Highway Code rule 244 says "You MUST NOT **park** partially or wholly on the **pavement** in London, and should not do so elsewhere unless signs permit it. **Parking on the pavement** can obstruct and seriously inconvenience pedestrians, people in wheelchairs or with visual impairments and people with prams or pushchairs".

It is however, illegal to drive on a pavement.

In the absence of signs permitting parking, on or partially on the pavement, notably in the vicinity of the Primary School, perhaps those who currently do so, could park with due consideration and safety uppermost in their minds, for both other road users and pedestrians alike, in order to avoid scenes such as witnessed in recent days.

AGMs

The USCAN AGM will be on the same night, also in the Pavilion, at 8.15pm, after the USL Life AGM. The USCAN Footpath Group still remains active around the Village. Funding for its work comes from the Parish Council and we are required to have a short AGM to present the accounts, receive a report from the work done and discuss any other relevant business. All Villagers are members of USCAN so all are welcome to attend.

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The Local Planning Process ... Continued from last month's article

In my article about the planning process in the January issue,



I ended by mentioning, but without any detail, the Stroud Local Plan, and the terms "The Protocol" and " N e ig h b o u r h o o d Development Plans". In this article, you can read a bit more about these.

Each district should

have its own "Local Plan", and this sets the background for all planning decisions. The plan will state, for example, how many new houses are likely to be required and roughly where those should be located. The Stroud Local Plan that was published in 2005, for example, stated that in Upton St Leonards only "infill" new housing would be allowed. The 2014 outline planning proposal for houses at Bondend breached this, but in examining that application, it was ruled that the 2005 Stroud Local Plan, which expired on 30 June 2011, was out of date and therefore not relevant. Aaaaaaargh!

However there now is a new Stroud Local Plan. It was adopted on 19 November 2015 and will be in force until 2031. In the new plan, Upton St Leonards is classified (along with Hardwicke) in the "Gloucester Fringe" area of Stroud district. This whole area is expected to be providing 750 more houses up to 2031, but nearly all of that will be in the areas adjacent to Quedgeley. However, the plan does not rule out development in Upton St Leonards. See pages 77 and 78 of the 2015 plan. The plan is available for anyone to see at Ebley Mill. A call to the Council (01453 754143) will tell how else you can see it. It is also available on-line, of course, see below. If space allows we could try to reproduce the two relevant pages in this newsletter.

What is a "Neighbourhood Development Plan"? Any area may create its own official plan of that name. So there could be one for Upton St Leonards. But it must mesh with the District Plan. Some areas within Stroud District do have Neighbourhood Development Plans – these are mostly the towns, e.g. Stroud and Dursley. I talked with Keith Pearson about the Parish Council's view on having a neighbourhood plan. He said the Council were not about to make such a plan. They are very expensive to produce, he said, and since they have to line up with the District Plan, in a small area such as our Village there is very little to be gained from one. A plan that said "No Development in Upton!" just wouldn't be accepted.

Finally, a word on "The Protocol". This is something that stems from national planning processes, and it seeks to encourage (enforcement is not possible) pre-application consultation, and lays down methods for doing this. Applications that demonstrate use of the protocol in preparing the design of a new development should be looked on more favourably in the approval process. You may have been aware that the Prinknash development went through consultation in the parish well before a planning application was made.

A NAME CHANGE......

Diana and I moved to Upton in July 2014 from the west of Gloucester, so not all that adventurous a move! Especially as we already had a lot of friends here, and had been to many social occasions in the village over the years. We were just ready for a move, and had our eyes on the village for quite a while - indeed we almost came here in 2002, but the deal fell through.

We eventually came across a house in Twyver Close called 'Sangria'. We learned that it had been built by Richard and Anita Owen, some 45 years before and that they had then built a new house more or less next door, about 12 years ago, when Ian and Fiona Nield bought 'Sangria'.

We agreed to buy and set about planning some changes to make it 'ours', including renaming it in order to put our identity on a house which had enjoyed such family history for two separate families.

But what name to choose? I had a look around at house names all over the place and could see that names often reflected garden features - trees, bushes and so on - or for no discernable reasons. I became keen on finding a name to reflect Upton St Leonards' history. An obvious source was the history on Stroud District Council's website, which relates that the earliest record was of Upton Mill in the fourteenth century.

Apparently little seems to have disturbed the peaceful rural life of the village until the Siege of Gloucester in 1643, when Royalist Troops were billeted in the Parish.

A letter from Robert Tayloe, who lived at Bond End Farm, was discovered under a bed, written to the officer in charge at Prinknash, asking for protection for himself and his property from the excesses of the soldiers. What the excesses were is not recorded!

The name Tayloe appealed to us but I thought that there would be some impediment to its use, perhaps people with the name or a road named after him. But all the usual sources revealed nothing. Google reveals about 34,900 results, most of them from the USA!

So an application was made to Stroud DC, who approved, except that we had to have a number as well. So, we are now Tayloe.

As a postscript, the late Ken Herbert, our next door neighbour, came to see me a few months before he died. He told me that Robert Tayloe was buried in the Churchyard, and that his is the most prominent grave nearest to the entrance to the Church.

IN MEMORIAM ROSE GARDNER (1918-2016)

It is very sad to report that, Rose, who had lived in the Village for almost a century, died on New Year's Day.

Though her father was from Upton, Rose was born away from the Village. Her parents moved back when she was just two and Rose then lived in the Village for the rest of her life. Rose's grandfather was Mr Davis the village blacksmith, and the Davis family lived at Yew Tree cottage on the Pound, an area at the junction of Rance Pitch and the High Street.

There is a long section in "Upton St Leonards Remembered" of Rose's description of life in the Village between the two World Wars.

Rose was a pupil at the Village School and later went to Ribston Hall High School. Her first job was at Robertson's toy factory in Alfred St. This was later refitted as a shirt factory, where she continued to work. She met her husband to be, Bill, in 1936 and they were married in 1938. They moved into a cottage on the Pound then called Rest Haven now known as Rance Cottage. Here they had three children, Ted, Mick & Mary.

In 1952 they moved to one of the newly built Council houses in Churchfield Road. Some years later when Rose was in her forties she had her fourth child Teresa. Rose continued to work doing varied jobs as well as bringing up a family and running the home. Rose was very skilled in sewing, knitting & crochet. She made most of her own clothes and those of the children. She was always patching up. "Waste not want not", "make do and mend" were continual themes.

She was a lifelong member of Upton WI, the Mothers' Union and more recently the BMI. Bill sadly died in 1986. Rose continued to live in Churchfield Road untill 2010 when she moved to one of the bungalows on the Ash Path.

She was a very forthright character; she very much loved & took great delight in spending time with her children, grandchildren & great grandchildren and she loved the village of Upton St Leonards.

Recently I was able to help a lady with Macular Degeneration and unable to use her current phone. The RNIB has a lot of information on its website, including recommendations on touch phones. They come with a built in screen reader called VoiceOver and a screen magnifier called Zoom. They don't need extra software and come with Bluetooth and refreshable braille displays. The Insight shop in Cheltenham is also a great place to go to try out products.

There is a free Telephone Directory Service for people who are registered blind. Dial 195 to register for this service. When registered you are allocated a card and pin number. When you need a telephone number, quote your pin number and the number is revealed for free.

There is a Blind person's tax allowance for those who are registered blind or severely sight impaired and registered with the local council as being so. For the tax year 2015-2016 the amount is £2290. More information can be found on the gov.uk website.
