# Nearly Spring-time!

February 2017

Days getting longer and brighter, lambs skipping, daffodils, birds starting to claim their territories. It's a great time of year. Time to get the mowers serviced, early planting, spring cleaning. Valentine's Day!

Oh yes - and pancakes. We've sometimes had Village pancake races, but what a waste of this lovely food. I like mine cooked very thin, with sugar and lemon juice. (Pancake day is Tuesday 28 February this year)



Here's a simple recipe: For the pancake mixture 110g/4oz plain flour, sifted pinch of salt 2 eggs 200ml/7fl oz milk 75ml/3fl oz water 50g/2oz butter To serve caster sugar lemon juice

Two tablespoons of the butter, melted, goes with the batter mixture. The rest is to grease the pan. The pan needs to be hot. Do a test pancake to check the temperature and to see you are using the right amount of batter for the size of pan you are using maybe 2 tablespoons for a 18cm/7in pan (tip - transfer the right amount of batter to a separate ladle or cup first so it is all poured in one go.)

#### RECENT PLANNING APPLICATIONS

These cover applications made at the end of 2016 and up to mid-January 2017.

#### PRINKNASH DEVELOPMENT APPLICATION REFUSED

On 7<sup>th</sup> December Stroud District Council issued a refusal notice on the planning application (Ref S.15/2122/FUL) for the development of the Abbey site.

In its refusal the Council states: "The proposed development is for the demolition of the existing Abbey and the construction of 10 houses. It is not considered that a development of this type would be in accordance with the mini vision or guiding principles for the Cotswold cluster. The strategy of the Local Plan seeks to encourage location of new development to settlements with existing facilities that can accommodate the new development."

"In this case the site lies outside the development limits of any settlement. Upton St Leonards is the nearest significant settlement being 1.5km from the site. This is identified in the Local Plan as a third tier settlement, recognised as having limited facilities. Cranham is about 750m from the site. This is a fifth tier settlement which has a lack of basic facilities and where scope for new development is very limited. Consequently, the site is considered to lie within the countryside which is not considered to be a sustainable location."

USL Life comment: There is no mention (yet) of an appeal against this decision; the applicants have until May to make any appeal.

So the saga of what happens to the site and the building continues, with no resolution in sight.

**WINNYCROFT development:** Permission for the 450 houses outline plan on the land between Winnycroft Lane, Matson, and the motorway, was granted over a year ago by Gloucester City Council, on the condition that 20% of the houses would be so-called "affordable". The developers have since claimed that this proviso makes the scheme unviable financially, so the status of the proposed development is uncertain (Ref 14/01063/OUT). There is another outline planning application (Ref 14/01470/OUT) for a further 250 houses off Corncroft Lane, adjacent to the Winnycroft Lane development. The Gloucester City Council website giving access to planning applications has not got the most recent decisions and papers on either development.

# Church Fabric and fundraising update:

We have been blessed during 2016 with magnificent responses through individual donations and with proceeds from various events – and our income towards fabric and churchyard repairs has been nearly £8700. Amongst these we are again thankful for our shares of Village Day and Gnome Hunt at £1100 and £850 respectively, and to HMRC (yes it's true!) for VAT recovery of just over £1700.

In 2016 we have had to spend £14745, and fortunately we had £19000 in the kitty from 2015 thanks to your generous donations and grants in years past. In addition to ongoing maintenance commitments we have spent £2300 on boiler and heating repairs (but the church is now WARM!), £2100 on repairs to the Vestry roof, £8700 on emergency repairs to other parts of the roof. Sadly as you may recall the church suffered a break-in and the net cost of window repairs was £330. Overall we have been able to carry £13000 forward to 2017 towards our continuing needs amongst which are replacing rotten wood flooring in the Chancel with stone slabs.

Our greatest challenge remains to fulfil the major requirements of the 2014/15 Quinquennial Inspection (QI) by major repair works to virtually the whole roof and to improve significantly the rain-water drainage facilities as a whole.

As has been mentioned in previous USL Life pieces, this is probably the largest work project the church has been required to undertake for several decades and will cost in the region of a quarter of a million pounds. Thanks to Mike Blanch and a small team of volunteers we have made progress and have submitted a bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for their approval in principle of a major grant. Following the hoped-for approval we then have to apply again, this time with detailed costings and specialist reports and plans – so it's not a quick process and it will take some time before the funding is confirmed and the major repair work can start.

We are warm and broadly weatherproof for now. The HLF will have noted the generosity of parishioners and organisers of events in their financial support to date – but we will still need your help as items continually emerge (the organ now needs expensive repairs and the sound system is long overdue an upgrade) which are over and above the QI/HLF project. Please continue to support your Church by whatever means you are able. Thank you so much.


December draw winners were Mike Stratford, Mike Blanch, Clive Winstanley and Zoe Ellis.

#### **Book Review**



#### "Dethroning Mammon" by Justin Welby

ISBN 978-1-4729-2977-8 (£6.99 at Amazon)

Archbishop Justin Welby's former career in commerce and finance makes him very well qualified to write on the subject of how wealth and possessions ("Mammon" in some of Jesus' sayings) so often take over our lives, and how we must try to stop being slaves to them.

The book is set out as a study (for Lent 2017) in 6 chapters. This is very definitely a book for individual reading rather than group discussion, because each chapter develops its theme with well-reasoned argument, rather than snappy summaries. So it needs to be taken carefully and at the individual reader's pace.

It sets out to link each chapter to an episode in Jesus' last journey to Jerusalem. Though

that is of course highly relevant for the season of Lent, it feels slightly artificial to me, and in the end I seemed to get more from my reading by paying less attention than I should have to the attached gospel episode. And indeed the author himself strays from the journey idea in his 6th chapter which uses biblical quotes from the Book of Revelation. I found that the sixth chapter, and the fifth before it, to be the best. (Amid more personal suggestions aimed at me and my giving, chapter 5 contains a really helpful critique of governmental International Aid, I thought.)

There are some very useful questions posed directly to the reader. Here is an example of three questions asked at the end of chapter 3:

"Do you remember a time when someone acted in a surprisingly selfless manner to your benefit?"

- "Do you remember a time when you acted in that way?"
- "Have you ever regretted it?"


I hope you can see in my example how well constructed those questions are, leading one, surely, to a conclusion that acting selflessly brings huge benefits to the giver as well as the receiver.

I do thoroughly recommend this book to you. I found it very readable.

#### WE WILL REMEMBER THEM . . .

This month marks the centenary of the death of yet another young man from Upton, serving his country in WW1.



#### **Private William Francis Dyer**

William was the son of Thomas and Honor Dyer who lived and worked at Bowden Hall. He was born in Cheltenham and attended Upton School from 4th May 1896. He served with 21st Battalion Australian Infantry Australian Imperial Forces. His service number was 607 and he died on 10th February 1917, aged 23. He was killed in action attacking the Butte de Warlencourt, a Roman mound of excavated chalk about 17 metres high. It was not relinquished by the Germans until 26th February, when they withdrew to the Hindenburg Line. He is buried in Warlencourt British Cemetery, Pas de Calais.

### Interview with John Skelton

How many of the regulars frequenting the BMI have admired the paintings on the walls and wondered who painted them?

Curiosity certainly got the better of me and I decided to track him or her down, so you can imagine my surprise to find this amazing artist living within a stone's throw, and when John agreed to the interview I was in for a fascinating afternoon, to say the least.



John was brought up near here on the Haresfield Court Estate and from an early age would

take himself off for the day and with 5000 acres to choose from, he found his inspiration in nature and would spend hours drawing. As a result he is a self-taught artist.

However, around 1962 music called and became his passion, playing guitar and travelling with a band, and he even found himself in Germany on gigs, around the same time as the Beatles. He spent a couple of years with the Jet Harris Band (Jet was a world-famous guitarist with the Shadows). John says, wryly, he soon grew up after being exposed to the seedier side of life witnessed when playing the clubs and pubs.

In 1983 John set up business as a typesetter and was doing OK, but along came computers heralding the dawn of a new era in the publishing and printing business, and compositors were no longer needed. However John faced up to the challenge, bought new equipment, joined a partnership and made a success in the business world of graphics. But eventually his love for art began calling to him again, and he sold his share of the company in 1997 to be a free spirit. This was a really brave step, as from the ages of 19 to 60 he'd done no painting at all!

His paintings are realistic in style. He loves to research his subjects thoroughly and puts composite pictures and prints together. Wartime was his inspiration for the wonderful "Plane, Pilot and Girl" which graced the walls of the BMI until it was sold.

We chatted at length of artists from Tracey Emin and Damian Hirst, Michelangelo, da Vinci, to Pop Art, graffiti, native American and aboriginal art. We agreed that the Tower of London Poppy display was incredible. ### A Former Upton poet - E R P Berryman


What timing - completely unplanned! On day after the USL Life editorial group was looking at the poems from current Upton residents, the History Group had a talk on a former Upton poet - Colonel E R P Berryman. The talk was given by David Walton.


"Ted" Berryman was born in Hampshire in 1883. He joined the British Army, and before WWI was serving in India with the Garwhal Rifles. In 1914 his unit was called to fight in France. In 1915 Berryman was wounded, and during his convalescence stayed in Upton St Leonards with the Fielding family in the house that is now the Hatton Court Hotel.

To cut a long story short, after the war he married one of the daughters and settled in to live in Edmonds Hill, just below Hatton Court on Upton Hill. His daughter Felicity married Major Robert Nesham who also lived on Upton Hill - many remember him as the Reverend Robert Nesham, who was a curate at the church in the 1960s.

Back in the 1920s Berryman was inspired to write nursery rhymes for his children, and they were reckoned to be so good that he was persuaded to publish them. He weaved magic rhymes (he refused to call them poems) taking Gloucester and Gloucestershire names as their theme. So a rhyme about Seven Springs was all about a kangaroo which escaped from Bristol Zoo and in 7 huge bounds ended up at the eponymous spot. Where did the name "Ladybellgate Street" come from? Of course it was about a lady who rang a bell to get through a gate.

Colonel Berryman's rhymes have been collected into two major books, "Gloucester Nursery Rhymes" and "Nursery Rhymes of Gloucestershire". A Painswick artist produced a wonderfully illustrated and hand-written version of the latter (see right), and some of the rhymes have been set to music.
