Events at the BMI

Christmas Eve at the BMI was once again a very busy night. Eighty members enjoyed the music provided by Bak 2 Bak. A lovely start to the Christmas festivities.

Ninety members attended the annual New Year's Eve entertainment night on 31st December. Again this was a most enjoyable evening with Ian Oliver providing the music in the lounge. There were the usual party pieces on the tables including rocket balloons, hats and blowers, and at 12.00 o'clock we welcomed in the new year in the traditional way. The evening came to an end at around 12.30a.m. after which we made our weary way home!

The first quiz of the year took place on Saturday 6th January, and as usual was extremely busy with 16 teams. Everyone enjoyed the quiz. The winners on the night were "Julie's Team" with a score of 127 just 3 points ahead of the joint runners up, "Good Neighbours" and "No Name", each with 124. A total of £213.70 was made on the night which will be added to the BMI Charity for 2023-2024, The Upton St Leonards Church Roof Fund. The Spring quiz will take place on Saturday 23rd March 2024.

TWYVER WI MEETING 8 JANUARY 2024

First meeting of the new year 2024, and as expected we were all happy to wish each other greetings. First point of business was voting for the Resolutions:

Resolution 1: Dental Health Matters

There is a chronic shortage of NHS dentists and people are suffering health issues as a result. The NFWI calls on the Government to increase investment in the training and retention of dentists and to review the current inadequate NHS contracts in order to ensure everyone can access an NHS dentist wherever they live.

Resolution 2: Impacts of poor housing conditions.

Poor housing can have a deleterious effect on human health and well-being, safety and quality of life and can disproportionately affect the most vulnerable groups in society. The NFWI calls on the UK Government to boost housing standards and regulations, increase funding for housing renovations, increase the supply of affordable and secure housing and strengthen collaboration with local authorities, housing associations and other relevant stakeholders to develop strategies that address local housing challenges.

Resolution 3: Say 'no' to gambling advertising.

Harm caused by excessive gambling is a global problem. Some countries are already addressing this by banning advertising. The NFWI calls on members, the Government, regulators, the NHS, educationalists and gambling charities to work together towards achieving a

complete ban on gambling advertising. This will reduce gambling harm, save the NHS money, protect family relationships and decrease the number of suicides, around 400 per year at present.

Resolution 4: Improving outcomes for women in the criminal justice system.

There is an urgent need to radically reform decision making in respect of women in the criminal justice system and, in particular, pregnant women and women with children. We urge cross-government collaboration to deliver on the 2018 female offender strategy by setting goals, robust governance and performance measures to reduce the number of women who have committed non-violent offences from being imprisoned.

We, who attended the meeting, have all voted and await the outcome. Which would you have voted for? In 1918 the first resolution was passed at the second annual meeting, calling for convenient and sanitary housing for all - not much change there then in 100 years. In 1943 a resolution was passed for Equal pay for Equal work ... Do you think this has been attained?

We moved on to forming teams and participating in a great quiz organised by Nicola, testing our knowledge of WI, birds and music, which was won by The Misfits with the rest of us not far behind. A very welcome light supper followed, to which members contributed 'a plate'.

The meeting was brought to a close, next one 12th February, all welcome. *Linda Munnoch*



BOOK REVIEW

SNOW by John Banville published in 2020

Looking back 100 years in Upton

An article written for us by Mike Stratford

What will 2024 mean for the people of Upton? We can't foretell the future even using AI. What we can do is look back one hundred years to 1924 to what awaited the residents then.

Unknown to most people at the time the Birchall family were planning to leave Upton. This family had since 1869 played a very important part in the life of the village. Not least among their legacy are the BMI and the Village Hall. 1924 was to be the Birchalls' last year in Upton. The family had sold Saint Bridge House in 1908 together with 76 acres of pasture land. Saint Bridge was at that time part of Upton Parish.



In June 1925 the Birchall estate of 512 acres was to be auctioned. The estate was put up for auction as one lot, but was withdrawn when the bids reached £26,000. It was then sold as separate parcels of land and farms.

Upton in 1924 was still recovering after the Great War, due to losing 37 men killed including two Birchall brothers. There was to be a General Election in October that year, and this is one event we can foresee in 2024. In 1924 it was won by the Conservative Party under Stanley Baldwin. At that election women could not vote, as it was not until 1928 that women over 21 could vote. At the turn of the year in Upton the school had an extra half day holiday as a reward to the pupils for the splendid attendance of the children in the last three months. Would this happen in 2024?

The last wedding of 1923 saw the marriage of Captain John Bourne to Isobel Fielding, the youngest daughter of Mr and Mrs John Fielding of Broadsground, Upton Hill (now Hatton Court). Community life consisted of the Young Men's Club at the Village Hall who had arranged a Dance for January. The Women's Institute was also well attended. Its President was the rector's wife Mrs Tanner. The Sunday School had their Christmas Party at the Village Hall. Prizes for games were presented by Mrs Birchall. The party ended with a verse of the National Anthem. Could that happen in 2024? The Tennis Club arranged to hold a Fancy Dress Carnival Dance later in the year. The Football Club were doing well and top scorer was T. Middlecote.

In the wider world of 1924, a small electrical company had just started called IBM. Adolf Hitler was sent to prison for the failed coup d'état by the Nazi Party. Vladimir Lenin dies, the first crossword is published and the Olympic Games are held in France. The British Empire Exhibition opens at Wembley Park. Despite being open for two years it still made a loss of 1.5 million pounds.

For home entertainment you could buy a 78rpm record of Al Jolson singing "California Here I come" or "Rhapsody in Blue" by George Gershwin. For a night out you could go to Gloucester and the cinema to see "The Thief of Baghdad". In 1924 a young director named Alfred Hitchcock started at Islington Studios.

In 1924 no one in Upton could foresee the changes that were to take place. It was still one of the largest parishes in England with most people working either in Gloucester or on one of the many farms. 2024 sees a very different Upton and a very different unstable world.

We can only wish everyone has a Happy and Peaceful New Year.

PLUM AND CARDAMOM CAKE

After the Twyver Walk which was reported in December, many of our ladies provided food and sustenance to the walkers, and cake was very much on the menu. Here is a recipe from one of our members for you all to enjoy – it was gone in a flash!

Ingredients:

200 g softened butter 200g caster sugar

3 large eggs 200g S/R flour

¼ tsp ground cardamom

Plum Sauce

6 plums, stoned and quartered

2 tbsp soft brown sugar¼ tsp ground cardamom1 tbsp water or dessert wine

Cream Cheese Filling 80g softened butter

120g full-fat cream cheese

80g icing sugar Glace Icing 100 icing sugar Warm water to mix

Gas 5, 170C

Grease and line 2 x 18cm sandwich tin

Start by making the plum sauce. Place plums in a pan with the sugar, cardamom and water or wine. Heat gently until the plums are tender and beginning to break down. Remove from the heat and strain through a sieve set over a bowl. Set liquid and plums aside.

Beat the butter and sugar add the beaten eggs a teaspoon at a time, adding a tbsp. of the flour after each addition. Continue until all the egg and flour are combined then add the cardamom.

Divide between the tins and bake for 15 minutes until golden. Leave to cool in the tins for a few minutes, then cover one of the sponges with ¾ of the cooled plum liquid, allowing it to soak in. Leave to cool in the tins completely.

Make the filling by beating the butter in a bowl until smooth. Add the cream cheese and mix until combined. Sift in the icing sugar at intervals until it is all combined. Add a tablespoon of the remaining plum liquid and mix well.

When the sponges are completely cool, turn the plumsoaked sponge onto a plate and cover it with the cream cheese filling, then the reserved plums. Place the other sponge on top.

Make the glace icing and drizzle over the cake and leave to cool.


