What's Been Happening in Upton?

St Leonard's Raise the Roof Fundraising National Lottery Heritage Fund Application Success!

On Thursday 16 January we received the wonderful news from the National Lottery Heritage Fund that the Church has been awarded a grant of £248,558 to help with our project to repair the Church roof. This is a fantastic achievement and reflects a huge amount of work (weeks and months) from a number of people. My thanks, in particular, to Jo Wilson for her dedication in preparing and submitting the long and detailed application.

At the beginning of 2024 the amount raised for the project stood at just over £139,000 and by the end of the year this figure had risen to just over £195,000. This included £20,000 from various grants awarded and over £36,000 raised through various events and donations given. These ranged from a small donation from an enterprising schoolboy through to the magnificent generosity of those who contributed to the envelope collection, small events raising a few hundred

pounds to the thousands raised from the Barn Dance. We also benefited from the generosity of the BMI Committee who chose us for their annual charity donating over £3,000. A great big thank you to everyone who organised, helped and supported us this year.

This means we can now start the programme of works and look forward to getting the job done. There is much to do in setting up the programme of works, negotiating and agreeing the contract as well as many smaller details to be arranged. We will keep everyone informed as progress is made through USL Life.



The way forward

A new budget will now be prepared to clarify estimated costs of the project. Once the contract is signed, it may show the need for a small amount of additional funds. As a result, we will continue with our fundraising efforts at least until we can finalise the overall costs.

We ask for your continued support and patience, so our ancient and magnificent Church is there for not only ourselves but for future generations.

BIODIVERSITY IN UPTON

You may remember the article about Biodiversity in the December issue of USL Life.

Biodiversity refers to all living things, from tiny microorganisms to large land and ocean-dwelling mammals, from moss to massive trees.

To improve biodiversity we need to preserve the habitats where these living things can thrive, and reduce our impact on them to reverse the decline in habitat and species numbers.

In Upton St Leonards habitats means our gardens, hedges, woodland, orchards, farmland, grass verges, the playing field, the churchyard, our allotments, ponds and streams.

The Parish Council has developed a Biodiversity Policy and has to consider the impact of what they do and say, including planning applications. As part of this process an evening to hear more about Biodiversity in our area has been organised for **Monday 17 March at 7.30 pm.**

The evening will start with an introduction by Rebecca Charley, Strategic Lead for Nature Recovery and Biodiversity, Stroud District Council. Then, the Parish Council Environment Lead, will discuss the Council's policy. You can find information about the Parish Council's biodiversity policy at uptonstleonards-pc.gov.uk.

Megan Adamou from Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust will then introduce the concept of a **Bioblitz**. This will be held in June and should interest all the family looking for bugs, bats and birds, amongst other bits and bobs. This should encourage us to start recognising the range of fauna out there. Megan will also talk about the work of Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust which may encourage some new members

After a short break the remainder of the evening will comprise short presentations from local landowners. We've invited Rob Seex from Whitley Court (dairy farm), the Herrings from Portway Farm (beef and arable) and Jo Twinning from Springbank Stables (equine). We hope to hear what these landowners are doing to promote biodiversity. Finally, we will open up the floor to a question and answer session.

This event should be very informative and help us all do that little bit more to protect not just our environment in Upton St Leonards, but everywhere beyond it. This really is a global crisis and we all have a duty to consider the impact of what we do each and every day.

Dear Villagers,

As we enter the new year, it's a good time to gently remind everyone about the churchyard regulations in place across the Diocese of Gloucester. The regulations are not only about ensuring that burials and memorials are handled with respect, but also about maintaining the churchyard as a peaceful and beautiful space for all who visit.

The churchyard is a place of both remembrance and community—a space where we gather for baptisms, weddings, and moments of reflection. It holds great historical and aesthetic value, and its sanctity is something we all share a responsibility to uphold.

In keeping with the Christian principles that guide our



church, the regulations help us manage the churchyard in a way that respects both the departed and the wider community. While these regulations are binding across the Diocese, the responsibility for their enforcement falls to the Parochial Church Council (PCC) and the Priest in Charge.


Many of you already help with the upkeep of our churchyard, and we are so grateful for your support. The PCC relies on volunteers as there are no paid workers to help and no council bin collection services for the churchyard. Everyone can help by taking their waste home with them. Together, we make sure this sacred space remains neat and welcoming.

That being said, there are a few important regulations we all need to be aware of to ensure the churchyard remains in compliance.

If you are planning to make any changes, like adding a memorial or a new inscription to an existing memorial, legal permission is required. We're happy to assist with the process of these requests.

There are other regulations that will bring about noticeable change, such as: while placing cut flowers on graves is encouraged, they must be in small removable containers, not glass, and should be removed once they've withered. Artificial flowers, potted plants in

containers, and lights or lanterns are not permitted, apart from wreaths for Christmas or Remembrance Day, which should be removed within two months.





that planting trees, shrubs (for example – roses), or placing stones and other embellishments on graves or where ashes have been interred are not permitted, as aren't cards, small markers and ornaments (except in certain circumstances – please see the summary of regulations).

Over the next three months, we'll be more actively working to make sure all areas of the churchyard are in line with these regulations, and we ask for your help and cooperation as we gently implement these changes.

A summary of the regulations can be found at the entrance to the churchyard on Churchfield Road and in the church porch. For a full list of the regulations, you can find more information in the church porch or on the Diocese of Gloucester website on the downloads list of the Churchyards page. Users of the churchyard are obliged to familiarise themselves with the regulations so as to be fully aware of what is acceptable and what is not. Not knowing what they are does not give permission to go against them.

Thank you for your kindness and understanding as we work together to maintain this sacred and cherished space.




We're getting excited!

MAZEPPA'S RIDE by Lord Byron 1788-1824



SMALL THINGS LIKE THESE by Claire Keegan

Neighbours who have bright security lighting on constantly

This is a problem which the team were asked to cover. How councils deal with complaints about artificial light nuisances can be found at www.gov.uk.

Steps you can take:

- Talk to your neighbour in person, call them or write to them to explain how their light is affecting you and what would help. You can ask your neighbour to modify the light, ie. add a motion sensor or perhaps make changes from your property side to reduce the impact.
- If the problem persists you can approach your council to make a complaint.

When looking into complaints about potential light nuisances, councils can assess one or more of the following:

- whether it interferes with the use of a property
- whether it may affect health
- how it's likely to affect the average person (unusual sensitivities are not included)
- how often it happens
- how long it lasts
- when it happens
- whether it's in the town or country

There are no set levels for light to be considered a statutory nuisance.

When thinking about biodiversity in our gardens, perhaps we can consider the amount of lighting we have outside, to minimise the impact of artificial light on nocturnal animals. For example, studies have shown that insects are very sensitive to artificial light at night which can affect their circadian rhythms, mating rituals and ability to navigate. Studies have shown that lights at night impact nocturnal pollinators, including many species of moths.


