The Upton Ladies Probus Club first met on the 31st of March 2006. The first president, Jacquie Clouting remembers that a group of ladies got together following the Tuesday Men's Probus Christmas lunch in 2005 to see if there was any interest among the ladies in forming their own club. After a good response, the B.M.I. was selected as the chosen venue. Unfortunately at that time the B.M.I. restricted membership to the wives of the Men's Probus Club and the women were not allowed to become members in their own right (a policy now thankfully scrapped, of course).

The original group comprised President Jacquie Clouting, Vice President Jackie Hunt, Secretary Genevieve Dancey, Treasurer Glynis Wright and Social Secretary Ruth Simm. In all there were twenty-eight ladies. They met every other month. Meetings at the B.M.I. were very informal usually with a guest speaker. In the alternate months, a lunch or trip was organised for the group. The first trip was to the Malvern Theatre to see The Naked Gardener. Jacquie recalls much excitement on the coach.

As I write, winter has started to sharpen its claws and for some people the time is coming when difficult decisions have to be made. Limited resources often have to cover both keeping warm and keeping fed. Sometimes essential pieces of household equipment begin to show their age and with an increased workload fail at what always seems to be the worst moment. At other times a close relative may fall ill and as we know the costs of regular visits to the hospital can be difficult to find. There can be many times when it is hard to meet the challenges which face us. In Upton the Dowager Lady Downe all those years ago realized that this was something she could help with and so part of her legacy through the trust named after her was allocated to providing support to those in need and suffering hardship.

Any application to the Trust for help in these circumstances is always dealt with in strictest confidence. Quite often however, possible beneficiaries are either not aware of the help the Charity can give or feel very reluctant to apply. Neighbours and friends can help by quietly supporting someone they know to approach us. A leaflet is distributed twice a year which gives our contact details and full information and an application form is available on our website www.Ladydowne.org. Alternatively contact can be made with our Clerk who will be very helpful.

I think it is important to say again that any application made to the Trust is treated in absolute confidence.

Fancy a Drink / making new friends? In case you hadn't noticed!

Only a few weeks ago I had the pleasure of signing the application forms for a couple of Upton residents, who had after very many years living in the village, realised that the BMI existed. What's the BMI you may ask yourself, well not the Body Mass Index, although there just might be a connection, no the BMI (Birchall Memorial Institute) Club, situated in Bondend Road next to the Village Hall.

The club is the village club, your club, kindly built and given to the people of Upton in trust in 1898 by the Birchall family of Bowden Hall. It is not a working men's club; it is a club for all. Over the past 6 years or so a considerable amount of money, in excess of £50k has been spent making it a really comfortable place to come with your friends and family, whether in our Lounge Bar or the Long Room which has a large screen TV with Sky Sports/BT Sport, a snooker and pool room.

We take bookings from members for birthday parties, weddings etc. The membership fees are very low, £10 per annum (half price for Senior Citizens) and the bar prices are very reasonable compared to the average pub. So if you are like my new-found friends who just didn't realise we were here, please come and see us, you will like what you see..

Get your brown wheelie bin!

No doubt you will have seen and read about changes in rubbish collection coming up in the Stroud District soon. The first of the changes to be activated involves garden waste. From the end of January, the green waste sack collection will stop.

In its place you can subscribe to a fortnightly collection service at a cost of £36 per year. plus an initial £20 for the purchase and delivery of a brown wheelie bin. The service will operate from February to November each year.

See the poster about this on the notice board by the Village Hall.



You can already apply to join the scheme and get your bin, online at www.stroud.gov.uk/gardenwaste or by contacting the Council's Customer Services Team on 01453 754424.

Subscribers to the service will receive a brown wheelie-bin for grass clippings, twigs, leaves, bark, hedge cuttings, flowers, plants, weeds, fallen fruit and small branches, which will be collected fortnightly over the 10-month period from February to November.

USL News/Information

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

At the Parish Council meeting on 7 December, Keith Pearson reported that a question was recently raised in Parliament regarding the noise from the M5 motorway, and in response the Parliamentary Under Secretary for Transport advised that work to reduce the noise problem was in the works programme and an assessment was due to be conducted shortly. The Parish Council will confirm in writing their wish to be involved in the consultation and works programme.

The budget for 2015/16 will be set at the January meeting. It is proposed to include a very small rise in Council Tax amounting to an average £3 per household pa.

The next meeting will be on Monday 11th January, in the Pavilion. As usual it will start with consideration of planning applications, at 7pm. Villagers are invited to attend the meeting, and may put questions to the Council.

Editor: Last month's USL Life published a letter asking whether the agenda can be published before the meeting. The answer is that the agenda is displayed on the notice board in Bondend Road a week or so in advance, but that misses the deadline for USL Life, and it tends to be in the form of the list of routine reports expected from officers. The actual agenda is more dynamic, and tends to be set by reaction to current events. For example, the council considers planning applications, so the agenda merely states "Consideration of Planning Applications", but usually the council only knows details about applications up to three weeks in advance. Therefore it is not possible less than a week or so in advance to say which proposals will be discussed.

You can see above that an item for the January meeting is to set the Council Tax and budget.

The scheduled Parish Council meetings are shown in the diary pages of our newsletter (usually the first Monday in the month).

A message from the Dean of Women Clergy, the Revd Canon Robbin Clark

"Happy Christmas" may have given way to "Happy New Year", but the season of celebration of Christ's coming among us continues. So does the theme of light in darkness Bishop Rachel explored in her message last month. But there's a difference. In December we were

watching the days grow shorter and the nights close in. Now, slowly but surely we see the light returning a little more each day. And that ties right in with the emphasis of the Epiphany season: manifestation or showing forth.

The light that the darkness can never overcome has dawned upon us in the birth of Jesus and now it is our responsibility as his followers to show that Light in the world. That's why we give all new disciples a candle at Baptism

and tell them to: "Shine as a light in the world to the glory of God the Father."

Each and every one of us can add a bit of light to the troubled world we inhabit through acts of attention and kindness, and each time we do so, we bring a glimpse of God's glory to people hungry for hope and belonging. Just as Jesus is our best Christmas gift, sharing his love in the world is our best New Year's resolution and one well worth keeping.

Gloucester Cathedral is Going Green ->

Gloucester Cathedral has launched an appeal to fund the placement of up to 200 solar panels on the South Nave roof of the Cathedral. The project has captured the imaginations of lots of generous donors, who have given over £35,000 since the appeal began in October.

The development of Project Pilgrim is well underway and an integral part of the proposal is the installation of approximately 200 solar panels. As part of our commitment to a greener and more sustainable future, it is anticipated that this will reduce the Cathedral's annual energy costs by 25 percent.

Bishop Rachel writes: Welcoming Refugees and Asylum Seekers

The Diocese of Gloucester is exploring a number of options which will enable us to offer real and practical support to Syrian refugees when they arrive in our area. The local councils are planning to house families in population centres across Gloucestershire, with some refugees expected to arrive each year for the next five years. I very much hope that the Christians of the Diocese can play a key role in enabling refugees to be housed effectively and in a way that helps them to integrate well with local communities.

Our partners in these conversations are GARAS (Gloucestershire Action for Refugees and Asylum Seekers) and Chapter 1. GARAS is a significant project, born out of diocesan social responsibility work, that has been supporting refugees and asylum seekers in Gloucester since 1999.

Chapter 1 is a charity with a Christian foundation that works in our region to enable more properties to become available to families that might be deemed high risk for a private landlord.

There are a number of ways in which we might be able to get involved. Firstly, there may be clergy or church members who are currently private landlords and who might consider making their property available to a refugee family. Housing is being sought in significant areas of population (especially Gloucester, Cheltenham, Tewkesbury, Cirencester and the towns of the Forest) so that families without cars are not isolated; that is in good condition with 2-3 bedrooms; and that is available for a minimum contract of 12 months. Chapter 1 offers a package of support including the continued on next page

As you know, the Church requires significant repairs to the fabric, particularly the roof. To gain access to various grants it is essential that we can demonstrate that we have raised money ourselves. We have a separate fund so that monies raised specifically for church repairs don't get used for any other general purposes. This effort started in 2014 with the Gift Day and Flower Festival which raised well over £6,000. Add to that last year's Village Day and Gnome Hunt, and you can see we are well up and running.

underwriting of any damage in lieu of a deposit, guaranteed rental income and interpersonal support of the tenants. This means that landlords who might otherwise have sought to use a traditional letting agency can be confident in offering their property to a more vulnerable family.

Secondly, there is also a need for foster carers for unaccompanied children. Accommodation with families in spare bedrooms is not currently being sought.

To find out about other ways in which to help, please see the GARAS website which is regularly updated to reflect current needs.

You might like to know that we have also been exploring the possibility of diocesan housing stock being used to provide homes for refugees, as well as discussing options that involve the resources of the national church.

All of us will have been moved by the situation unfolding in recent months across the Middle East and in Europe. Please continue to hold refugees and asylum seekers in your prayers as you consider the help you might be able to offer them.

This is a very special service that reminds us all of the wonders of God's world as shown in the land as it is used for food production.



So successful has been the Churchwarden's Heating Appeal, that visitors to the building can expect a toasty-warm feeling inside all through the winter. Something like £900 was contributed - this appeal obviously struck a chord with previously cold worshippers!

The money raised was more than adequate to cover this winter, so the surplus may be used towards a replacement of the oil-fired system that is many, many years old now.

Gloucester Brass

It was a great night out for those who came to the Gloucester Brass Christmas concert in the Church. It was a delight to see the church nave almost full, and the church heating (see above) was working so well that those who had come wrapped up against a cold night were very quickly shedding gloves, scarves and coats!

Gloucester Brass did us proud. They seemed to have a bigger than usual band for us - Mark Knight, the conductor, told us that he doesn't often get such a big turn-out from his musicians! And that warm brass band sound filled the air, so it seemed to be coming from all around, with the seats seeming to vibrate with the bass tuba's loudest notes.



Mark's tempos tended to be on the slow side, though the band really came to life when they played a few less traditional and more jazzy Christmas numbers, such as "All I want for Christmas is you".

There was warm punch and mince pies in the interval, and the inevitable

raffle. Huge thanks to Rachel, Trevor, Sheila, Dorothy, Carol and no doubt others who provided the refreshments.

Admission tickets and the raffle raised over £500. A great success. Mark this event down in your diaries for a year's time when I'm sure the band will be back!



The Local Planning Process

This article was written by Andy Russell in response to the query in last month's newsletter asking how the planning process worked.

The process changes from time to time, often as a result of Acts of Parliament. This is the current system, as I have understood it by reading various documents on the web. Probably the most useful source for me has been the "Plain English Guide to the Planning System" published by the Government in January 2015, and available on-line.

Most planning decisions are taken at District Council level, Stroud in our case. The Parish Council has an important role in commenting on planning applications, but it has no power to make planning decisions.

Minor and non-controversial planning decisions, which account for something like 90% of applications, are made by a delegated Council Officer. Larger and more controversial decisions are made by the Development Control Committee (DCC) of the District Council.

When a planning application is received, the District Council must publicise the proposal, using methods such as site notices and letters to neighbours, so that people have a chance to express their views. The Parish Council clerk receives notice of all applications. You can sign up, at no cost, to receive an e-mail notification from Stroud District Council of every planning application affecting the Village.

Once the plan has been publicised, there is a mandatory 21 day consultation period. Anyone may comment by writing to the District Council or using



the on-line system. All the documents relating to an application can be seen on-line, including comments already sent in. Unfortunately, for those not internet connected, it means a visit to Ebley Mill. Or ask your computer-savvy neighbour to look it up for you?

The Parish Council considers its responses at its monthly meetings. The meeting dates are shown in this newsletter, and planning applications are usually first on the agenda at 7pm.

What about pre-application consultation? In the interests of openness and good governance, those making applications that affect many people or make big changes are urged to consult locally before sending in an application. But there is no mandatory requirement to do so.

In a follow-up article I will describe "The Protocol", and "Neighbourhood Development Plans". Did you know that Stroud District Council have very recently (in November) adopted a new Local Plan, which replaces the 2005 plan, for the Stroud District? This provides a framework for planning policy for the next 15 years.







Upton St Leonards in 1973

This is reproduced, with permission, from Angela Marks' publication "Upton St Leonards Remembered", which contains memories from USL residents as collected by USL Guides. This particular article was written by Angela herself, in 1973.

The character of the village began to change when new suburban estates were built from the early sixties onwards until the present day. First came Six Acres, then Perry Orchard and Woodland Green. Building is now taking place behind Whornes Cottage, between Bondend Road and Churchfield Road. The new houses are mainly in the middle to expensive range with practically all families owning at least one car. Employment is provided in both Gloucester and Cheltenham.

In spite of this development, the local people have worked hard to preserve village life, so that there is still a strong community spirit. Newcomers join with older residents in the various activities offered.

The Birchall Memorial Institute (BMI) still provides a gathering place for the men of the village and also offers billiards and skittles. There are various opportunities for sport, most of which use the recreation ground which was altered, flattened and re-seeded as a result of the Motorway works in 1970. There are Cricket and Football Clubs and since the opening of the new courts in 1972/3, a Netball and a Tennis Club. The Tug of War Team meets at the Village Hall and distinguished themselves in 1973 by winning several competitions.

The Church is important both as a spiritual and social centre for village life. The Church Choir meets on Friday evenings and the Bell Ringers practise on Wednesdays. After some morning services, coffee is provided in the school building so that parishioners can meet together and chat. A monthly Church Parade service is attended by Brownies and Guides. The Mothers' Union meets monthly in the village hall for a short service, followed by a talk. A Communion service takes place on the second Tuesday in each month, attended by the Mothers'Union.

A Playgroup for children from 3-5 years was started in the village hall by Mrs Gledhill of the Mothers' Union. It meets on four days of the week from 0930 - 1130 and is run by mothers on a rota basis when they are willing and able to help. The children have various activities and a project planned by a regular helper for each session.

A Youth Club was started in 1973 for a younger and an older age group. It meets weekly in the village hall. Much of the meeting takes the form of a disco. Parents volunteer to help on a rota basis.

A large and flourishing Cub Pack meets in the village hall on Wednesdays and Scouts meet on Fridays, although at the time of writing, the Scouts have had to disband through lack of a leader. The village Brownie Pack grew so large in 1973 that it split into two, one pack meeting on Thursdays, the other on Fridays. The Guides meet after the Brownies on Friday evenings.

A keen Drama Group, the St Leonards Players, has performed plays produced by Miss Daisy Bell in the village hall. Two plays are produced each winter season and are performed on three

nights. A high standard is reached in spite of the difficulties of using a small stage.

There are two Women's Institutes in the village. The Upton WI was founded in February 1923 and meets on the first Wednesday of the month in the village hall. There are at present 106 members. Twyver WI was founded in January 1966 because of the growth of the village. It has 54 members and meets on the second Monday of each month.

The Village Hall Committee seeks to promote entertainment in the village as well as supervising the letting and management of the hall. A fete was held in November 1973 to provide money for new chairs. A Spring Flower Show is planned for 1974.

The Flower Show Committee organises a village show on the first Saturday of September each year. In recent years, the Show and Gymkhana have been held at Pooles' Farm, the Stanley by courtesy of Mr and Mrs Stanbury. The Flower Show includes classes for fruit, flowers and vegetables, floral arrangement, handicrafts and special children's classes.

The village is served by seven shops. In 1972, the Post Office on Painswick Road lost its licence in favour of Mr Most's shop in Churchfield Road. This brought the Post Office into the village centre where it is conveniently placed for more people. The old Post Office, now Crooke's Family Store, remains as a grocery and general stores. The new Post Office is also a newsagent, confectioner and general store. Milk is delivered daily by Brian Warner. Next door to the Post Office is a Spar grocery shop. It is a self service shop and has a good choice of products.

Four new shops were opened in 1970 in Perry Orchard. Most of them have changed hands once or twice since first opening as trade can be rather quiet. There is a Butcher, Hardware / DIY / Gardening shop, a Wool and Drapery shop and a 'Wavy Line' grocery shop.

The move to grow vegetables is evident in Upton for all of the allotment plots at Perry Orchard are taken and gardening provides an important pastime for many.

Upton St Leonards is a pleasant place to live in 1973. The community life of the village is very much alive and the position of the village, nestling between the Cotswold hills remains as attractive as it always must have been.

Editor: it is interesting to compare things that have and have not changed over the last 42 years! I am sure some of our more mature residents will recognise this description of Upton and some of the people mentioned. What I think is pleasing is that many of the positive aspects of village life have been left intact.

"Upton St Leonards Remembered" was published by Angela Marks in 2014, to ensure there was a permanent record of all those Guide interviews recorded in 1973.

In Memoriam - Reverend Peter Jackson (1927-2015)

Peter was appointed to be Rector of Upton St Leonards in 1972. A truly remarkable character, anyone meeting him for the first time would, within 30 seconds, have worked out (a) that he was from Wales, (b) that he was very easy to get on with and (c) he was a great showman and extrovert. He loved spending time with children at the Village School and visited there often; many children he met there remember his visits with great joy. Judy, his widow, has had a number of letters from those children since Peter died. Church services, particularly the once-a-month family services, could be like a stage comedy performance. An occasional worshipper, used only to Catholic services from when she was a child, told me "I never knew church could be fun".

The showman side came out again and again. When Radio Severnside started up in the 80's, Peter was a natural to look after their "God slot" on Sunday mornings, and he revelled in it. One morning he told his listeners that the church in Upton had been sold to a rich American and was to be dismantled brick by brick and rebuilt as a tourist attraction in the USA. Coincidentally, or not, this

was when the organ was being re-built. An anxious parishioner dashed down to see what was happening, and the sight of dismantled organ pipes in the churchyard obviously confirmed the story. The date of the broadcast – April 1st. To publicise the Church fete one year, Peter had printed "lucky programmes" that looked very like oversize £5 notes. But of course the design of currency is copyright and he got a stiff letter from the Bank of England – more publicity! Few who were there could forget his performances at the harvest supper auctions, or as compère at the occasional "soirée" put on in the Village Hall.

But of course his calling was to be the Rector of the Parish. I'm sure many wondered if it was all acting – was there another Peter Jackson behind the mask? No, there wasn't. What you saw and heard was the real Peter Jackson, and he considered that part of his calling was to bring fun and light to the people of the Village. He loved listening to people talking about themselves, and would often start a conversation with a leading question, for example: "What have you done so far today?".

Peter retired in 1992, and moved to a house in Abbeydale, so he was never far away. Right up to a few weeks before his death, he was still joking, having a meal and a drink with friends at the King's Head and ribbing the manager there, being very Welsh and proud of it.
