Thank you all for entering the Centenary Wall Hanging Competition. In all, 12 Institutes entered and there were very many good ideas. In some ways it was a pity it could not be a composite of them all.

The judges were looking first of all for entries that filled the criteria and some failed on this. Size and orientation are primary, as is presentation. Then consideration was given to whether the hangings spoke of Gloucestershire, for example did they include the Cathedral, Cotswold sheep, the Forest and the River Severn? Also did they involve several techniques? Based on these criteria, four designs were short listed and from these four, two were chosen and then placed in rank order.

The design from Twyver WI was the winning entry and is chosen to be placed in the Gloucester room at Denman. Lydney was the runner-up and has been asked to complete its design, for WI House. Both will be on display locally during the GFWI Centenary year, 2019.


At the December meeting, Tywver WI welcomed three new guests. Members were congratulated on their successful submission of the best wall hanging, depicting the county of Gloucestershire.

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#### **Parish Council report:**

A very informative presentation was given by Conrad Moore and Mark Graham from Stroud District Council on the Local Plan review, which includes three potential development sites within the parish. These were identified in last month's USL Life.

In response the Parish Council has sent a formal letter to the District Council about the review. Here are some extracts from that letter:

The Parish Council feels that at this early stage it is more relevant to comment on the overall Strategy for development within the District than detailed comments about possible individual development sites. Although having said that, we would wish to reiterate our comments already made in connection with site UPT006 (North of Upton Lane, beside the M5).

We firmly believe that this site is wholly inappropriate for housing development by virtue of its extreme proximity to the M5. Development here will only increase the number of residents having to live with the effects of the unacceptable extreme noise and pollution as already experienced in this area.

If, however at any point this site is seriously considered, noise mitigation must be of the utmost priority, and the whole site would require bunding to separate it from the motorway. Pure mitigation in house design will not be enough.

Regarding the possible development of sites in proximity to the M5, the Parish Council draws attention to the points raised concerning site UPT006. The principles raised here should apply to all sites in proximity to the motorway. In particular the Parish asks that the District Council actively promotes via planning policy and direct lobbying the following initiatives:

- (a) The extension and improvement of existing acoustic barriers in sensitive areas.
- (b) A policy to renew low noise surfaces when noise reduction ceases to be effective (rather than when it becomes unsafe).
- (c) The introduction of a motorway speed limit through the Gloucester/Cheltenham urban area to reduce noise and air pollution.

These initiatives would have the benefit of improving conditions in existing residential areas, as well as enabling development on some sites adjacent to the motorway.

Any future planned developments should take account of the current demographics that show many young and older people desire to stay within the community they have been brought up in and for many, lived in, all their lives.

Many older people are now living in large properties on their own or as a couple, with a great desire to downsize, but desperate to stay within the community they know. Therefore any development planned should be sympathetic to that desire. Planners should ensure that the size and style of homes planned, take account of this issue. Community should be at the heart of any of these developments, which may include recreational areas etc.

With regard to UPT003 and UPT004 (the Perry Orchard and Stanley sites), a detailed response to issues raised here should



await selection of a District-wide strategy. However the Parish Council points out that both sites are sensitive edge of village sites with an environmental sensitivity relating to the village setting at the foot of the AONB protected scarp edge. The District Council (and the Secretary of State) has recognised this in the past with a long history of refusal to grant

planning consent on both sites, upheld at appeal.

The Parish Council also considers it appropriate to point out that whilst consistently opposing the outward spread of the village towards the scarp edge, it has nevertheless supported development to the north of the Parish, on a substantial scale.

# **Stroud District Council Christmas Tree Recycling**

After the festive season the council will be supporting the local hospice, Longfield, by recycling Christmas trees. For



a donation, however big or small, the trees will be collected from residents' doors. The council will not be providing Christmas tree skips this year.

The organisation, 'Just Helping', working on behalf of Longfield, will be collecting trees in the Stroud District on 5th, 6th and 7th January.

The trees will be shredded at the hospice and used on their gardens.



### Abbeydale Gardening Club - A Year Long Walk in Woodchester Park

Robert Bryant began his talk by giving us a brief background of some of his more recent work, which included designing the rose gardens at Highnam Court and Snowshill. For the past 4 years he had worked as a volunteer guide at Highgrove for 2 days a week. However, being a member of the Royal Photographic Society was really where his talk came alive as the quality of his photographs was exceptional.

As Robert took us through the seasons, we were able to enjoy some fabulous photography of plants, wild garlic, great swathes of bluebells as well as insects, ducks and damsel flies.

As a Grade 1 listed house in the Victorian Gothic style, Woodchester is absolutely unique because it is unfinished and so offers visitors the opportunity to see how a house of this period was constructed. We learned that building began in the 1850's but the house was eventually purchased in 1986 by Stroud District Council for £20,000 when it had fallen into considerable disrepair.



The Woodchester Mansion Trust was formed to restore the property and whilst the house is still incomplete the roofs are now safe so that the public can enjoy guided tours.

The Woodchester Valley is classified as an area of special biological interest

and one of the the most popular walks is called The Boathouse Walk which passes the mansion and includes parkland, woodland, three of the ponds and the picturesque boathouse.

The walk takes approximately 2 hours to complete and is 3½ miles long.

New members are always welcome. We meet on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Monday of the month.

#### **Our Christingle Service**

Thank you to all who braved the snow and wintry weather to attend our Christingle Service led by Revd Clodagh.

Christingle means 'Christ's Light' and it is a symbol of what Christians believe about Jesus Christ. Each piece of the Christingle holds special significance to help children, and us all, understand what it means when we say Jesus is the light of the world. During the service a Christingle was assembled:

- the orange represents the world,
- the red tape symbolises the blood of Jesus who died to save us from our sins,
- the four cocktail sticks, with sweets and dried fruit, represent all of God's gifts to us, the four seasons and the food which the earth provides,
- the lit candle represents Jesus's light in the world bringing hope to people living in darkness, and
- the tin foil reminds us that Jesus invites us to join in his work of love and reflect his light and love into the world around us. Jesus taught us to love our family and friends but also to love those we don't know in need of our help.

# Revd Clodagh writes:

Greetings as we step into a new year. January first, is the beginning of the calendar year and a time when many people take the opportunity to consider what they might do differently: the New Year equalling a new beginning.

As a minister, I have the opportunity, once a year, to sit down and reflect formally on my working life, with a colleague. There are two helpful outcomes from the process. The first is that I am enabled by someone who listens and asks questions to help me work things out for myself. The agenda is mine and it is not the role of the other person to give advice or direction. The second is that it helps me to see for myself what is going well and where the challenges lie and identify what steps I want to take moving forward having acknowledged the disappointments and successes of the past year.

The New Year is traditionally a time for making New Year's Resolutions. Resolutions are often made because of the things we are unhappy about rather than Resolutions connected to the things that are going well in our lives. I offer a challenge to you this year. The challenge is to stop and consider the positive aspects of your life as well as the challenges you are facing because in doing so you will begin the New Year differently than you might otherwise have done.

Revd James led singing and prayers, culminating in the lighting of the Christingles, a special moment for everyone, when St Leonards was lit only by candles. There was also a collection for The Children's Society, who work with some of the most vulnerable children in our country.

It was a really uplifting service full of hope for the future, and a wonderful way to start our preparations for Christmas.

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#### Our Feature Article this month is: IT'S RESOLUTION TIME!

#### Tribute to Evelyn Rumsey - reprinted in its entirety from USL Life Issue 1 Sept 2014



Evelyn, who died in November, shortly before her 95<sup>th</sup> birthday, will be remembered with great fondness and admiration for her contributions on so many levels to Village life.

Evelyn was our first featured resident as she edited the Church News almost non-stop

since 1967! Now 91 years young, she was born and schooled in Erdington before becoming a shorthand typist for a solicitor, an insurance company and then the Birmingham National Fire Service. After moving to Wylde Green, a trip with her sister to Weston-super-Mare in 1939 provided a chance meeting with John, USL resident and future husband - just like in the movies! They married in 1943 and she became a telephonist for Gloucester Fire Service when John joined the Fleet Air Arm at Locking. They moved to Brockworth in 1946, had two children, Jenny and Tony and she joined the Mothers' Union in 1951. In 1956 they moved to Cross House, USL where Christine was born. Sadly, Christine died from breast cancer in 2005.

USL had no street lighting when she moved here. With gaslight downstairs and loos outside, you had to go to bed with a candle. Some things change for the better it seems, although it was far smaller then. Six Acres, St. Leonards Close, Perry Orchard and the M5 didn't exist.

She was an active member of the church, a choir member for over 25 years and on the Parochial Church Council for 40 years in the catering department. Evelyn still organises the Church Flower Rota and is the secretary of Upton Mothers' Union. She has been President and Secretary of the Upton W.I. This group raised money from carol singing

for a tea for the Upton elderly in 1961 and this became the 'Get-Together Club' where Evelyn was treasurer, then chairman, and she has only recently retired from its committee. Evelyn was chosen to visit Highgrove where she and others represented the W.I. to celebrate its 90th Anniversary at a tea hosted by Camilla, Duchess of Cornwall. For years she made Upton cricketers' teas, often on both weekend days!

As if this wasn't enough, Evelyn joined the Upton St. Leonards Players and became treasurer, and fondly remembers the many soirées where she organised suppers. She served as secretary on the Village Hall Committee, joined the Social Committee when the Spring Show was formed and is delighted that it is still running. Other achievements include organising adult and junior village quizzes, and the junior one is still popular.

For over 30 years Evelyn served on the Flower Show committee as Catering Officer, Secretary and now sorts entry forms as she can 'do that sitting down' - we think she deserves a sit down now!

With five grandchildren and eight great grandchildren to occupy her and hobbies of crochet and knitting, Evelyn reflects that Upton is a 'lovely, friendly village' with many activities on offer. She believes modern families' many commitments make it hard to support events but she's glad the Flower Show remains popular. She was pleased to see so many supporters at the opening of our beautiful new village green in July.

We're pleased to see you looking good, Evelyn, and that many of the village events that you helped to start are still going strong.

#### We will remember them

Continuing our series on the death toll from WWI, this month sees the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the death of

#### THEO DASHWOOD

Theo Dashwood was born in Kidderminster in 1893, the son of Christian and Edith Dashwood. He trained as a market gardener. His family had moved to Gloucester some time before 1911, and his younger brother Campion Dashwood lived at Mill Cottage, Bondend, Upton St Leonards.

He signed up to serve in the Mercantile Marine Reserve and had reached the rank of Second Officer. On 18 January 1918 his vessel, HMS Louvain, carrying mail and troops, set off from Malta headed to the Greek island of Lemnos, the base for the blockade of the Dardanelles. On 20 January the ship was torpedoed in the Aegean Sea. It sank very quickly, and though there was a Navy escort, of the 240 people on board only 16 survived.

His name is recorded on the Plymouth Hoe Memorial to those buried at sea. He was awarded the Mercantile Marine War Medal.
