With grateful thanks to Mike Stratford here are reminders of the past taken from the annals of our village history:

#### The Upstagers of 1918

\*Five-shillings worth for Half a crown.

Five shillings worth of enjoyment may be had for half a crown, eight pence or nine pence (including tax) at the Entertainment in Upton School on Thursday December 18<sup>th</sup> at half past seven, when a varied and delightful programme will be offered by "Artistes" resident in the village. The proceeds will be given for the provision of uniform capes for the Upton Boy Scouts".

#### From March 1919 Parish Magazine

A meeting held in the School Room to discuss the social life of the village after the war.

The meeting was called to consider what should be done to build up the life of the Parish after the war, and there was general feeling that some step forward should be made in our social life. Everyone felt the need of this but the exact way in which it should be done was not so clear.

Two proposals were made:

- The need of a central place of meeting in Upton, a Parish Hall for all kinds of gathering
- A club for women

Members of the BMI have approved of an offer to extend its premises and include women as members, thus becoming a joint club for both sexes.

Mrs Leicester, in a charming speech sketched the uses to which a Parish Hall might be put, "dances, whist drives, concerts, entertainments, lectures and cinematograph. All would help to make Upton an ideal parish to live in". The Village Hall foundation stone was laid in July 1919 but the women would have to wait many years to become members of the BMI.

The birds sit chittering in the thorn, A'day they fare but sparely; And langs the night frae e'en to morn, I'm sure it's winter fairly.



#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Gentlemen Prefer Blondes : The Intimate Diary of a Professional Lady by Anita Loos, published in 1925.

This month we recommend a light hearted and very witty book to lighten the dark January days. It is rumoured to be a favourite book of George VI !

Originally published as a series of short sketches in Harper's Bazaar magazine, *Gentlemen Prefer Blondes* was dismissed by critics as 'too light in texture to be



very enduring'. However, the book was an immediate best seller and was quickly translated into over thirteen languages. The story follows the escapades of a young blonde flapper in New York and Europe during the Roaring Twenties. A sequel, *But Gentlemen Marry Brunettes,* was published three years later in 1928.


Loos was a script writer and wrote many of the Douglas Fairbanks films as well as the stage adaptation of Colette's Gigi.



Rev James Turk writes

Happy New Year! I hope you had, (and if you are reading this before January 6<sup>th</sup> continue to have) a joyful Christmas. Because of the December printing deadline for the magazine I

am writing this article at the very beginning of advent. There is still the General Election to happen and Christmas is 3 weeks away, I've not even had a sniff of a mince pie yet! What I have been doing though is trying to think and plan for 2020. Yes, even though Christmas for me hasn't happened yet, I am moving on to next year already... well my mind is anyway.

When I was younger, I was never very good at resting in the moment. Once I reached a goal or achievement, I found myself thinking about the next thing that would happen in my life. This was true with journeys too and my mum will often remind me of a time when we went to Brean Sands, near Weston, for a family holiday. I was about 7 years old and obviously very excited about going on holiday, but nearly as soon as we arrived I was asking when we were going home! Now I can't remember saying this, but it does have a ring of truth about it, it is certainly something I may have said. You see, once I'd arrived, I was already thinking about the next destination. As an adult I really had to try hard to stop this tendency to constantly think about the future.

Of course, it's natural to spend moments of thought in the past or in daydreams of the future. Identifying impending dangers through associations with things that have happened in the past is important for self-preservation, but when our lives become dictated by thoughts and emotions attached to past events and potential future outcomes, standing peacefully rooted in the present becomes increasingly rare. So often our routine, our habit, is to be off in our heads somewhere mulling over negativity and struggles of the past or becoming anxious and fearful of the future. Seldom are we fully "here"; neutrally centred to see through life's lens with clarity and awareness. And being in the present moment, or the "here and now," means that we are aware and mindful of what is happening at this very moment. We are not distracted by ruminations on the past or worries about the future but centred in the here and now because all our attention is focused on the present moment. Christian thought about rest and being present in the moment has a long tradition. In the early church Benedict of Nursia taught that, like our bodies, our souls were designed for rest. The thinking is that while sleep is an important aspect of rest for us in the busyness of

balancing work and home life, there is another aspect of rest Christians need to make room for in their calendars. The kind of rest where we are setting aside our usual busyness to spend time listening, praying and being with God in the present, purposefully showing God that he is our priority.

As we begin 2020 and our minds inevitably think to what may or may not happen in the year ahead, I hope you will all find the right balance between planning for the future and resting in the moment. As the saying goes, the moment we have right now is a gift, that is why it is called the present. Happy new year to you all, and I pray that we will all find time this year to enjoy this gift.

Affirmations of Faith - Baptism and Confirmation



In the early months of this New Year we will welcome two families who have asked to have their babies christened and on the 16th February we will be holding a Confirmation service. We are a Christian faith community and God is adding to our number and we rejoice and thank God for that blessing. Baptism expresses the identity we have in Jesus Christ; it is a response to faith and reminds us that we are a baptised community who are called to participate in the life of God and in the mission of God to the world.

A note here about use of language and the words 'christen' and 'baptise'. The Church of England website explains the words in this way: "Babies are 'baptised' during a 'christening' service just as couples are 'married' during a 'wedding' service.

All baptisms take place within the context of our Sunday worship (on the first Sunday of the month) because we are called into relationship with God and with one another and we support and pray for those being baptised and their families as we all journey in our faith.

As an Anglican parish church we can offer: Infant Baptism/ Christening; Infant Thanksgiving; Adult Baptism; Confirmation. Each in its own right is a way of marking an individual's journey of faith. It can be confusing to understand how they all fit together. So I offer a brief explanation for each of the above:

#### Infant Baptism/Christening

When parents make a decision that they wish to raise their child as a Christian they can do so through Baptism. Parents and Godparents accept the Christian faith on behalf of the child and make promises to raise the child within the faith. There is a long tradition within the Church of England of offering infant baptism as it was a practice within the early church. Jesus welcomed and blessed little children (Mark 10:13-15). Baptism does not make a child a Christian and those baptised as infants still need to make their own decision to follow Christ when they are old enough to do so. Those baptised as infants are much more likely to choose to become Christians when they are raised within a Christian household and experience Christianity through experience and teaching.

#### Thanksgiving Service

A Thanksgiving service allows parents to express their thanks to God for their baby without having to promise to raise the child as a Christian and affirm a faith they do not necessarily have themselves. Along with giving thanks for the child we pray God's blessing upon them and their family.

#### Adult Baptism

For young people and adults who are not baptised as infants, Baptism is the way to acknowledge that they have come to believe in the Lord Jesus Christ as their Saviour. There is a tradition for those who are being baptised to give testimony as to why they have made the decision to be baptised and they and the community are encouraged through hearing such testimonies.

#### Confirmation

Confirmation is the traditional follow up marker on the faith journey after infant baptism. It marks the point at which an individual accepts the faith they were baptised into. The individual confirms their faith publicly to the congregation. The Bishop confirms God's acceptance by the laying on of hands. Confirmation does not make a person a Christian. Confirmation acts as a public witness by candidate and the Bishop.

Affirmation of Baptism and Confirmation are two markers of the journey of faith that do the same job. They allow a young person or an adult to own their infant baptism for themselves. There are various reasons why individuals might choose one over the other including tradition and personal preference: full immersion in a pool might feel too exposing.

Traditionally Confirmation was the point at which individuals could participate in Communion but the regulations regarding the admittance of children to communion have changed in the past ten years. We welcome children who are regular members of our community to share in communion regardless of their having been confirmed or not.


#### Affirmation of Baptismal Vows

Within the wider Anglican tradition there is another marker of faith. An individual can only be baptised once into the Christian faith but for some young people and adults who were baptized as infants it feels helpful for them to affirm that Baptism, as a public marker of their journey of faith. In these circumstances it is possible to affirm the baptismal vows that were made on their behalf by their Parents and Godparents. The symbolism of the Baptism is the same whether a person is Affirming their Baptism or being baptised for the first time. It is the wording that clearly differentiates between the two.

I hope this has helped clarify the different ways in which we welcome and help mark an individual's journey of faith within the context of our faith community. The Upton St Leonards Flower Show Committee AGM was held on Tuesday 26th November 2019. Committee members and volunteers all felt this year's show had gone well and the Chairman opened the meeting by thanking everyone for their help and support both on the day and throughout the year. The weather on the day was good, dry, fairly sunny and not too cold and visitors were entertained by the young and talented Tom Hopper Trio. The Secretary reported that, in common with other village shows across Gloucestershire, entries were down a little on last year. The difficult growing season and unpredictable weather had particularly affected entries in both fruit and vegetable classes, although entries in handicrafts and preserve classes were up. Despite the difficulties, the quality of the entries was, as always, very high.

The Secretary also acknowledged the generous support the show had received from the Lady Downe Board of Trustees, Upton St Leonard's Parish Council and Upton Life Magazine.

The Treasurer reported that overall the show had broken even, which as a non-profit making event is what the committee aim for. This was in spite of visitor numbers being slightly down and the disappointing behaviour of a few who broke through the locked gate from the BMI club or squeezed through the hedge next to the telephone box in order to avoid paying the nominal entry charge. The Secretary, Peter Macey, has stepped down after 22 years service, although he will continue to be an important member of the committee. The Chairman, on behalf of all the committee both past and present, thanked him for everything he has done over the years and for the valuable contribution he has made to the organisation of the show.

The next show will be held on 5th September 2020 and as always we will be looking for volunteers to help and donations for the various stalls. As Peter himself said, "this show plays an important part in the life of our village", but it can only continue with your support.

# Feature article - Willie Lonie

This Month's Feature Article is by Linda Munnoch with grateful thanks to Willie

#### Willie Lonie – Amazing Memories of a Seafarer

Those of us who are privileged to hear Willie recount his stories of life as a mariner will know what interesting and unusual experiences his amazing memory holds and for those of you who haven't, I hope you will enjoy this taster, and I do mean taster, as it's only a fraction of the tales he has to tell. The sheer joy in his story telling and our laughter at coffee mornings keeps us 'buoyant' for hours. Having read his self-penned autobiography, which, in itself, reads like a film script, I decided to concentrate my feeble efforts on just a few tales that have raised eyebrows and spirits at our gatherings.

Having been born and raised in Scotland, at the age of 17 Willie said goodbye to his mother and boarded a bus for Scotstoun, Glasgow, to take up an engineering apprenticeship at John Brown's ship yard with a fiver in his pocket and all his worldly possessions in a suitcase. Towards the end of serving a five year apprenticeship learning the trades in each of the engine works departments, he was approached by an engineer from the White Star Line who was a regular visitor to the drawing office where Willie was now doing design work for the Saxonia, a 14,000 ton liner. Willie was due for call up on completion of his apprenticeship but Tom McLaren offered him a position with Cunard as an Engineering Officer and pulled out an application form and scribbled across the front "Accept this boy" and his future changed in a moment at the age of 22.



So, here are a couple o' yarns – those of you who are of a nervous disposition and planning a cruise any time soon, turn over now.....

#### Man the pumps!



In 1952 Willie was assigned to the RMS Ascania which had been put into service as a transatlantic passenger liner. Built to the same design as the Titanic, it had been in service since 1925, but had undergone a major overhaul and repair after surviving the war. His duties down below involved looking after the main engines and other operating systems and pumps, water-tight doors and the main electricity generating systems. During one particularly heavy storm, the waves battered the ship severely, stretching the rivets and forcing the plates of the hull apart and seawater began entering the vessel. Willie stood transfixed as this 'beautiful clear wall of water' poured in and he realised there was a 'problem'..... pumps were


working overtime but the water kept on coming.

A ships' carpenter appeared with some wood and made a box over the gaping leak and plastered around it with quick setting concrete to stem the flow. It worked! and the ship sailed on for a further three months with this quick fix until it was able to get into a dry dock. Wow!

#### Man (in) the lifeboat

In March 1955 Willie was asked to join RMS Mauretania giving a weekly sailing schedule to New York, in conjunction with the Queen Mary and the Queen Elizabeth. It was twice the size of the Ascania and Willie describes it as a

'magnificent vessel' taking around 900 passengers and the same number of crew members. The Port Authorities in New York were very thorough and strict on inspections of vessels departing their waters (the ghost of the Titanic disaster still permeating their zeal). On one such inspection Willie happened to be on deck in his officer's uniform and was asked to step into the lifeboat as he was the only senior officer in the vicinity at that moment. Slowly, slowly, the boat descended - past the decks one by one, and as it touched down, a 'lovely fountain of water' started gushing up from the bottom! The Plug was missing......!!!!! YES!!! There really is one!!!! The plug is always taken out of the lifeboats when at

heavy seas, but 'someone' had forgot to put it in. The look of horror on Willie's face and frantic gesticulating in a clockwise motion alerted the crew above and as fortune had it, the inspectors had momentarily turned their backs and the crew began winching them up and no-one was any the wiser.

#### Water, water everywhere (recognise the song?)

On one of the Mauretania cruises a number of new crew members and stewards were recruited and one of these young lads promoted from bell-boy was no other than Tommy Steele - a name familiar to those of us of a certain age. He would strum away on his guitar during his time on board and down the streets of Havana.

I hope you have enjoyed these wonderful memories of Willie's life at sea. He left the service to be with his beloved Margaret whom he was 'courting' after meeting her at a dance whilst on leave. But that is another saga best told maybe at a future time. Margaret passed away a few years ago and they were, and still are, well known as a couple in the village. He misses her greatly but still maintains his passion and thirst for knowledge and his wit and enthusiasm for telling us his stories.

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# Parish Council Report

As we approach the new year this report outlines some of the initiatives your Parish Council is currently working on.

Finances have now been approved and quotations are being sought with suppliers. We are aiming for everything shown below to be in place in the first half of 2020.

#### **Childrens' Play Equipment**

We are very grateful to the Lady Downe Trust for match funding us so we can put in place some play equipment for pre-school children. An area for this has already been fenced off on our Recreation Ground.

#### Other Village Improvements

We will be carrying out a number of improvements to our Pavilion as shown below: -

- Resurfacing the Pavilion Car Park
- Providing new Chairs for users' comfort
- Renewing the carpets
- Improving shower facilities
- Providing a Defibrillator on site enabling a quicker response by not relying on the one at our village hall
- Supplying Picnic Benches for people to use whilst enjoying the Recreation area / watching sport

We have received money for the "Other" village improvements shown above through what's called S106 funding which is linked to housing developments and is part of the planning process whereby a contribution to the local community is made.

A big thank you to New Dawn Homes for releasing their contribution early (Bowden Hall Farm development).

For information, we are exploring how we can use renewable energy as part of the Pavilion improvements (ie solar power), and the Picnic Benches will be made from recycled plastic as were those purchased previously for the village, and hopefully provide wheelchair access.

My thanks also to the Parish Council Team, many of whom have worked for a good few years to support their community and to everyone who has made a contribution to Upton during 2019.

We wish every resident of our lovely village a very Merry Christmas and a Happy, Healthy 2020.
