

#### **Hadwen Health PPG Update**

The PPG met four times in 2023, March, June, Sept and Dec. The role of the PPG is to be a support as well as a critical friend. This proves very useful as the members can make suggestions and ask questions that otherwise might be more challenging for patients in their relationship with their clinician. PPG has 17 members and is keen to recruit a member with experience of disability or special needs. The minutes of each meeting are available on the website under Practice Information.

There have been some very positive developments at Hadwen over the year. Staff recruitment has improved and at the Sept meeting we learned that they had a full complement of Gps, which is hard to achieve in this time of GP shortages. Hadwen has been encouraged to collect feedback from patients as a basis of learning and improving the service. This has taken the form of text requests from around 200 patients a month who had engagements with Hadwen. This enables learning to take place. Patients tend to respond when they feel strongly about an issue.

They now have three What meetings asking the questions: What has gone well? What's not gone well? What would we want to do differently? This is a great initiative and is bringing the spotlight onto developing good practice.

It is pleasing to report that waiting times for appointments have improved and now 90% of appointments are within the 20 day guideline set by the NHS. Those outside the 20 days are appropriate where a 6 week review is advised. If a patient needs to be seen urgently we are asked to ring up on the day and triage will advise on the most appropriate plan for you.

Things do not always go to plan and if you have an issue you can message them directly by using the envelope symbol on the home page. This will get you to the right person to deal with your concern.

They now have a new MD, who is Dr Ruth Thompson. She has been at Hadwen for eight years and has an interest in frailty. She is also the lead for medical students who will return to the practice shortly. There have been Health and Fitness programmes at Hadwen this year and these have been very successful, with weight and B/P reductions. A CQC visit looked at data in Oct and they were pleased with what they found.

The PPG has a positive influence on the Hadwen and our engagement helps the staff see the patients perspective on their work.



#### The ILIAD by Homer (circa 8th Century BC)

This is the most famous poem in Greek Literature portraying in 24 books the 10 years of the Trojan War. Set towards the end of the war the poem depicts significant events in the final weeks of the siege of Troy. In particular it describes a fierce quarrel between King Agamemnon and a celebrated warrior, Achilles. The Iliad is often regarded as the first substantial piece of European literature. It has been translated many times into English, most recently by Emily Wilson in 2023. A gripping read!





#### Message from Chrissie Castle, Chair of USL Parish Council

I would like to wish all parishioners a Happy New Year 2024 and just update you on a couple of notices:

As you know, we meet as a Parish Council on the first Monday of every month and all parishioners are welcome to attend. Minutes of the meetings are on the parish website. In May 2024 there will be parish council elections and there are 10 councillor seats in our parish for election. New blood is always needed with new ideas to take our Parish forward and no previous experience is needed. We have a very capable Clerk, Roy Balgobin, and his assistant Tracy Slator who help manage parish matters. More information will be given nearer the time about what it involves and how to apply.

On another note, Gloucestershire County Council (GCC) have had a share of extra funding for road repairs and we ask them regularly to repair the never ending formation of pot holes in our locality. There is an app 'Fix My Street' which can be found on their website or can be downloaded from Apple's App Store or Google Play. GCC aim to repair all significant potholes (more than 4cms deep and 30cms wide) within 28 days of receiving a report. We have reported to GCC the state of the roads such as Portway and Nuthill, so the more we all pressure them the better the chance we may finally get the promised works completed.

The Parish Council would like to thank all those volunteers in the village who do so much for our Parish to make it such a lovely community to be part of and live in.

#### 1. Parish Council Meetings

#### 2. Dogs on The Recreation Ground

People are still being seen exercising their dogs off the lead on the recreation ground. Although we believe that these may be from outside of the village, can we just repeat the request to keep dogs on leads to protect the sports fied from potential damage.

#### INDOOR CRICKET

The cricket season used to be limited to April-September. Not now. It is played indoors, and it might surprise you to know that most cricket clubs in the area field an adult indoor team through the winter. Upton has done so (but not at the moment; the Village club has indoor training, but not matches, in the winter.)

Indoor cricket is played in sports halls. Locally we have used Gloucester Academy, St Peter's, Gloucester Uni, Hartpury Uni, and currently the Gloucester area games are being played at the King's School. There are many versions of the game played indoors, hard ball, soft ball, etc. Here we play with a hard ball, 6-a-side, 10 overs per innings. The game is very fast and exciting. A 10-over innings game lasts under 1 hour. There are, of course, special rules for indoor games (e.g. the ball stays in play after bouncing from a wall or roof), but the basics of cricket are all present.

Usually, because the game is so fast paced and the skill standard is generally high, it needs a qualified and experienced umpire and scorer to officiate at the match. I am qualified both as an umpire and a scorer, so get called upon most weeks, helping at two or three games per evening.

One difficulty is the cost. The sports hall might cost £60 per hour, the ball probably £10, and the umpire and scorer get £10 each per game. So that's maybe £80-90 per game, which the participating clubs or players have to find.

If you are interested in seeing this happening, contact me and I can let you know when the games are.

You can watch from a viewing area, safely out of reach of whizzing hard cricket balls!
