# Letter from a concerned reader:

For the first and so far, only time I recently decided to catch the No. 66 bus back down Upton Hill from Castle End at the junction that goes across to Edge.

Having looked up the timetable online, in particular, the full list of stops, I waited there for the bus. A double decker duly arrived at the scheduled time and as there is no actual bus stop sign, I hailed it and it pulled in for me. As I got on, the driver gave me a very angry reception, telling me that this was not

a bus stop and that I shouldn't be hailing the bus as if it were a taxi service. It was a very unpleasant experience and left me quite shaken.

On my return home, I put in a complaint to Stagecoach, who did reply confirming that Castle End is definitely a scheduled stop. If you look at the timetable, you will see that there are numerous scheduled stops between Cemetery Road on the outskirts of Painswick



and the King's Head in Upton. However, none of them has any sign at the roadside at all. This really is unacceptable and a great pity for the few of us who might find the 66 bus a very useful connection at the end of a walk up the hill from home. I was very disappointed. It has now been reported to the Parish Council and the necessary action has been taken.

# What's Been Happening in Upton?

As an active member of both Upton's men's Probus Clubs, I am frequently asked, what exactly is a 'Probus'

Club?



Could it be a group supporting sustainable transport? - 'bus' travel - rather than using the car? No such thing! The local Probus Clubs are social get-

togethers, for retired professional (pro) and business (bus) people.

Upton has two such clubs for men. Upton Probus meets every other Wednesday and Upton Twyver Probus meets every other Tuesday.

'Probus' was born in the U.K. in the early 1960s and now we have over 2,000 clubs in Britain. We are very informal - every club makes its own rules. In Upton, the get-togethers consist of a morning meeting at our local BMI.

After a coffee starter, there follows a talk from a 'paidfor' speaker or occasionally from a member himself. (You'd be surprised how many of your neighbours have led interesting lives and visited fascinating places).

Subjects vary enormously and offer interesting topics on a wide range of subjects. Talks have included the history of our once very local aircraft industry, how GCHQ cracked codes during the Cold War, and a detailed study of ancient Egyptian music - which turned out to be a rather risqué belly dance session!

After the talks – and questions - have finished, the bar is open for a lunchtime drink, snack and chat. Finally, both clubs arrange occasional visits out, to interesting venues (museums, visitor centres etc).

So, if you are retired and would like to hear a range of talks in a friendly setting why not come along? You can make a free visit before deciding.

Both clubs are actively seeking new members. Membership is only £35 per year (plus BMI membership). You will be very welcome.

It was very sad to hear that Mike's uncle died in 1916 after dreadful hardships endured as one of the many prisoners of war of the Turks.

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# **Update on Abbeydale Gardening Club**

### A short history of how the Gardening Club was born.



The Abbeydale Garden Club was the brainchild of a canny Scotsman, the late David Hay of Six Acres. He was a patient of mine who subsequently became a good friend. He realized that the surgery waiting room would be a good venue for committee meetings and he persuaded me to join him as a founder member of the Abbeydale Gardening Club in 1985, enabling him to use the office facilities for printing and distribution; and so began my long association with the club. I have served on the committee since then until moving away from Gloucestershire three years ago.

In the early days the club meetings were held in Abbbeydale Community Centre before moving to a more suitable venue in Upton Saint Leonards. David was a regular at the King's Head in Upton and it was on one of his visits that he spotted an outbuilding that was not being used and he persuaded the landlord to let us use this. We were then able to purchase garden supplies and seeds etc. which were then sold at a discount to members on Saturday mornings. There was no shortage of willing volunteers to help and it soon became a great place to meet and socialise before retiring to the bar.

The Club thrived and it was very satisfying to see the numbers increase. Sadly, the King's Head was taken over and refurbished and we lost our building. As the older members passed away it became more difficult to recruit younger members and the Covid epidemic contributed to a further decline.

However, at a time when many garden clubs are folding, our Club has continued and will, I sincerely hope, continue to develop in the future. I wish you every success.

The main news at this time, therefore, is that our longtime president and founder of the club, Andrew Nicol, is retiring. He and his wife Helen have moved to a small hamlet in Worcestershire where they are in the process of creating a beautiful new garden. 

## **BOOK REVIEW**

### The Double Helix by James D Watson

This book was published in 1968 and recounts the discovery in 1953 of the structure of DNA for which James D Watson received the 1962 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine with his collaborator, Francis Crick, and another scientist, Maurice Wilkins.

Crick and Watson worked together at the Cavendish Laboratory, Cambridge University in 1951 – 1953. Wilkins was based at Kings College, London. A challenging read about something which plays an important part in all our lives.



# The National Lottery is 30 Years Old



Where were you on Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> January 1995 at 6.15 pm, when, on BBC1, Upton St Leonards appeared on live TV?

It is now 30 years since the start of the National Lottery and so much good has come from it for so many good causes. For the first ten draws Camelot wanted to broadcast

live. The BBC decided to tour the country with outside broadcasts for these draws and Programme number five was to be from The Cotswolds. The BBC were planning on using Painswick until visits proved that all their vehicles would not fit into the centre of the village.

Researchers found their way down Portway to Upton and the Village Hall. The Parish Council was approached about using the hall which they would require for at least two days. During the week before the broadcast, a crew filmed various groups using the hall including art classes, keep fit, Guides and a shot of the late Brian Warner delivering milk for the play group. These shots were used as an introduction to the show. Permission to facilitate the hall had been given by the Chairman of the Parish Council, the late Mr Colin Freshney, and the BBC arranged an initial payment of £250. Tickets for the night were limited to 150 people for safety reasons. The tickets (limited to two per family) were printed by the Parish Council and given out on the 18<sup>th</sup> January. They were vastly over-subscribed.

Thirty five members of the BBC and Camelot arrived in Upton, staying at either Bowden Hall or Matson Country Club, including the three presenters on the left of the photograph – Gordon Kennedy, Anthea Turner and Keith Floyd. The fourth person on the right is our very own Mike Stratford. Preparations included the installation of two telephone lines into the hall, one for the phone and one for the fax machine. The annex was used as a communication room, a dressing room and room to store a stand by the lottery machine. A rehearsal was held on the Saturday morning and the machine named Guinevere was chose for the broadcast. A large generator arrived to provide the power for lights and cameras. The old wiring in the Village Hall would not have taken the strain.

On the Wednesday I, as the Chairman of the Village Hall Committee, was filmed giving a short history of the hall. I was asked to press the button to start the draw for which I was given an "I pressed the button" trophy. Everything was timed to the second and every word spoken had been prepared on 'cue cards'. These cards were held up by the floor manager and had to be in large print as Anthea is dyslexic.



There was one change of plan late in the day on the Saturday; the Director didn't like the way the Set Designer had arranged the stage and he asked me who used the hall? As an assistant Cub Scout Leader at the time, I told him of the uniformed groups that used the hall, and that they each had their own flag. That is why if you ever see a recording of the programme you will the Scout, Cub, Brownie and Guide flags on the stage.

Keith Floyd was based in the BMI behind the bar in the lounge which he enjoyed greatly, therefore the lounge bar also appeared on the BBC. Previous millionaire winners were also presented with their cheques at the BMI.

The numbers for that night were 6, 16, 20, 30, 31, 47 and bonus 4. You could always try these now? After the event the Hall Committee received a cheque for £770. After the broadcast I received several begging letters addressed to 'Good Causes, National Lottery, Upton St Leonards' – the postman knew where to deliver them!

On the Sunday, the 'circus' left Upton and I had to clear up all the rubbish left inside and out, including bags of unused food which included bags of prawns from the BBC catering lorry – the crew certainly ate well on outside broadcasts! Taking the bags to the dump made my car smell nice... I guess that is the price of 15 minutes of fame.

# **Parish Council Report for December 2024**

Thanks to residents who attended the meeting on Monday, 2<sup>nd</sup> December and for the questions and issues raised (see below). The council were asked to action as appropriate.

- Several Bus Stops missing on the route from Painswick to Upton leading to passengers potentially not being picked up by drivers. Can this be rectified please?
- Dangerous junction at bottom of Nut Hill where it meets Bondend Road. Can a Stop sign be considered rather than a Give Way marking, or if not possible, erect a mirror to improve visibility for traffic?
- The path that runs next to the Village Green is unlit and therefore very dark for people walking in that direction eg customers of the BMI!! Can the path be lit using solar lighting?

• Can the white posts in the layby on the High Street leading towards Birchall Lane be removed so the verge can be properly maintained?

The Parish Council will work on solutions to the above and progress will be shared on our new website and in relevant editions of USL Life.

Recent activities/decisions are as follows: -

• A new Multi-Bin has been purchased for use at the Recreation Ground (the existing overflows on a regular basis) and will be installed soon.

- A new Basketball net at the Recreation Ground will be fitted on the court shortly.
- An increase in fees to hire The Pavilion have been agreed for 2025
- The Budget for 2025/26 was agreed at the meeting.
- As a result of expected expenditure, it was agreed to increase the current Precept by 5% (but Upton is still one of the lowest in Gloucestershire irrespective of size).

The subject of disposal of plastic wrapping was briefly discussed and currently this can be brought to a number of supermarkets including Tesco, Asda, Morrisons, Sainsburys, The Co-Op and Waitrose who will arrange for recycling.

All members of the Parish Council wish all residents of Upton St Leonards a healthy and happy New Year.

# OBITUARY




It is with deep sadness that the family of Sue Gabb wish to inform our readers of her death on 23<sup>rd</sup> November 2024.
