

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

## WHAT TO DO ON THE ALLOTMENT IN JULY

**July** is one of the driest months so you must keep up the watering. Hoeing can help to break up the soil to remove weeds and allow water to soak down into the ground. Water in the cool mornings or evenings.

#### Harvesting in July

Keep harvesting your crops, lift early new potatoes, harvest garlic and shallots as the foliage begins to yellow.



Pick the first tomatoes. Continue picking

rhubarb, spinach, swiss chard, baby turnips, pak choi, kohl rabi, salad crops, strawberries and raspberries.

#### Sowing and Planting

You can now sow seeds of overwintering kale, spring cabbage, spinach beet and hardy onions so that they mature early in the Spring.

Continue sowings of lettuce and beetroot and salad leaves which can be sown every 2 - 4 weeks, but refer to reverse of seed packet for full planting advice.

#### **Diseases and Pests**

Watch for potato blight which can set in with wet and humid



weather, infected plant material should be binned or burnt and not placed in your compost heap, as this will increase your chances of blight being spread next year.

Some of the main pests are aphids and cabbage white butterfly caterpillars. You can spray with an insecticidal soap or washing up liquid and water mix.

#### Dear Friends

We will have travelled halfway through this year by the time you read this, and I am hoping that summer will be well and truly upon us and the holiday season flourishing. I trust that it will be a 'Bon voyage' for all concerned.

However, 75 years ago, on the first of July in 1937, the 999 service was launched in London; it was the world's first emergency phone number. Another notable introduction happened on the same day but one hundred years earlier in 1837 when the registration of births, deaths and marriages began.

Hatches, matches and despatches are something that we engage with regularly in church. They are each special events for the community when folk come together to mark a special occasion in someone's life as they give thanks to God and receive blessing. But there are also many other ways we mark the passage of time; we observe the church's year with feast days or festivals and suchlike.

July 25th brings us the feast of St James, the patron saint of pilgrims.

According to the rock musician, Eric Clapton, 'everybody has their own way of looking at their lives as some kind of pilgrimage. Some people will see their role as a pilgrim in terms of setting up a fine family, or establishing a business inheritance. Everyone's got their own definition. Mine, I suppose, is to know myself.'

As Christians we sometimes refer to the concept of pilgrim and pilgrimage as the experience of life in the world which may be considered as a period of exile - John Bunyan writes about 'The Pilgrim's Progress from This World to That Which Is to Come'.

Pilgrim's Progress recounts, in allegorical form, the experience of a person called Christian, from the first awareness of his sinfulness and spiritual need, to his personal conversion to Christ and his life as a believer. The book follows Christian's pilgrimage to the "Celestial City", his true and eternal home. Bunyan wrote 'He who would valiant be' in 1684 as part of Pilgrim's Progress. The words are spoken by Mr Valiant-for-truth to Mr Greatheart:

He who would valiant be 'gainst all disaster, Let him in constancy follow the Master. There's no discouragement shall make him once relent His first avowed intent to be a pilgrim.

#### The Revd Ian Bussell, Director of Ordinands

Ordination sounds like 'ordered' and 'orderly'. It doesn't really reflect the messiness of our lives, or the riskiness of God. You might wonder at its relevance, or its usefulness. At the ordinations in June in the Cathedral

you will have seen the Church of England at its most gloriously polished, rehearsed, tidied and ordered. As the clergy and Readers process in and out you'd think they do this every day. And there was a new group of clergy being ordained, who have completed their modules in how to walk in twos and wear robes, and who will soon be taking up their very important roles of walking in twos and wearing robes around our towns and country lanes of Gloucestershire. Or maybe not!

The truth is that they leave the cathedral and get stuck in, up to their armpits, in the messiness of life. From feuding families, to grieving parents, from despairing loss of faith to its joyful discovery. They are creating the places where you and I can do what we need to do: touch the eternal, risk loving, express shame, be reconciled, discover community, rage at injustice, let go, and in it all find that Christ walks with us. These are not saints (believe me, I know), in fact we all have our stories to tell, but they are people who are able to believe that God might use them despite their weaknesses, and often because of them.

The orders into which we are ordained free us to serve in a disordered world, not to tidy it up, but to proclaim that the Lord is here, his spirit is with us, not despite the mess, but right in it with us. And before you say 'not me, Lord', just remember, most of us who are ordained have said that at one time or another. 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

## The Legacy of a Lady

When the Dowager Lady Downe lived at Bowden Hall in the mid 1800s, one of her overriding interests was the education of the children of the village and the development of the village school, which at one time was located within the grounds of the Hall. Then in 1850 she commissioned the magnificent building in front of the Church which was to be home to the school until 1995. Clearly when the Lady Downe Charity was set up in her name it was important that the key provision related to education, even if on a larger scale than she might have imagined, as many of the investments the Charity now owns came from the sale of land for building, the rental income from which she used to provide materials for classes such as sewing.

Now the Charity continues her work in a variety of ways, and in particular makes a major annual grant to help the Village School provide those activities for its pupils which would not normally be funded by the County Council. In recent times the Charity has also supported the new school at Coopers Edge, which lies within what was the parish in 1966 and which, in fact, has a larger proportion of pupils attending from the parish than does Upton School.

We are now at that time of year when forthcoming exam results are at the forefront of students' minds and we can help them towards that important next step. For example, any young person starting their further education, degree or training, qualifies for a grant of £500 towards much needed textbooks, tools or, these days, a laptop. In addition if a young person needs help accessing specialist courses to start or develop their career, we are pleased to be able to offer support. One such person, now very well known to us all, actor Simon Pegg, wrote recently to say that, "without the Lady Downe Trust I simply would not be in the position I am today. It gave me my start and for that I will always be grateful."

Also we have a special scheme called the Lady Downe Award which can be a grant of up to £3000, which is available for young people, usually after further education and under the age of 25, to help them carry out a special project which they

believe will enable them to take a major step forward in their career. These projects often involve foreign travel which can be very expensive. Other students are often required to take placements during their courses which are outside normal student funding, and again we may be able to help. One of the pleasures of being a Trustee is seeing the wide variety of experiences undertaken by young people and of hearing about them on their return. Over the years we have come to the conclusion that a common thread when they apply to us is the range of their ambition and the breadth of their imagination, and it is a delight to help them reach those goals. Louisa Maria, the Dowager Lady Downe, would surely enjoy a reflective smile.

"The financial assistance which the Lady Downe Charity provided was of immeasurable value in ensuring that I could focus on my studies and enrich my academic experience. I was able to make those extra trips to the library when my thesis deadline was fast approaching, to purchase the most useful academic books, and to make use of specialist material in the British Library.

I am certain that the Charity's help made all the difference in enabling me to get the best possible grade".

### This month we feature Bob and Ann Tranter

Most of you will know Bob and Ann Tranter, stalwarts of our village for several decades now.

They have provided safe and reliable transportation for school runs, day trippers and late night revellers through Bob's Line. For all this time they've given us, in one way or another, a secure and trustworthy service for which we are most appreciative.

Bob's family goes back 100 years in the village. His father and grandparents lived in Jericho Pitch atop Upton Hill. Bob left school at 15; however he was working long before that. He was often up at the crack of dawn at the tender age of 9 delivering milk with Eunice Price.

In the summertime, he spent most of the holidays with the Prices. He remembers what happy, caring people they were and still has great affection for them and the memories he has of those times. They were based at St Leonard's Well, which was originally a pub, then a house, dating back to the 18<sup>th</sup> century. Both the well and the house are still there, close to Hatton Court.

Bob's first job after leaving school in 1959 was at LMS Eastgate Railway Station in the telegraph office until 1962. Of course, this building is no longer there and has been replaced by Asda. Whilst there, Bob had to learn Morse Code, in order to communicate with other stations both up and down the line - and he had to be quick!

It is hard to believe that trains ran for so long on this system without the use of modern computers. For this great responsibility and a 44 hour week Bob earned the princely sum of  $\pm 3$  6s 7d, Saturday mornings included!

From the railway Bob went on to Arnold Perrett & Co delivering wines and spirits and so began his love of driving. The financial reward was more than double, at £7 10s a week and no Saturdays! In time Arnold Perrett & Co were bought out by West Country Breweries, who in turn were taken over by Whitbreads. Twenty years later Bob took redundancy and moved to Fine Fare, driving forklifts. After a further 9 years and another redundancy, **Bob's Line** was born.

It goes without saying but I'm going to say it anyway - behind every successful entrepreneur is a woman!! Bob acknowledges Ann as his soul mate, rock and unwavering



supporter throughout their lives together.

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## **Update on the Parish Council WW1 Commemoration Project**

In previous months we have provided brief details of the men whose anniversary of death is being remembered.

Regular readers will know that we have been remembering the men of Upton in the month of the centenary of their death. Our next anniversaries are in 2016 so in the interim we will be focusing on some related items.

Of the 37 names on the Village War Memorial which relate to World War One, 12 men have no known grave and are remembered on memorials in France and Belgium.

In late May, my wife Penny and I took part in an organised "Battlefield Tour" of the WW1 sites in France and Belgium. It was a memorable visit. Penny's great-grandfather was killed climbing out of his tank in July 1917 and we visited his grave at Hooge in Belgium. We were also privileged to visit the large memorials to the fallen at Menin, Tyne Cot and Thiepval and laid a wreath at each of the sites remembering those men from Upton named there on panels according to the regiment they served in.

At the Menin Gate (Ypres) are named Henry Panter, George Avery Arthur Birchall, Walter Ireland, Ernest Phelps, Francis Smith.

At Thiepval (in France) to the Missing of the Somme are recorded Francis Spring, Reuben Lloyd, Sydney Millard.

At Tyne Cot, the largest Allied cemetery in the world, are named Lewis Lloyd, Arthur Rice and Edwin Mills.

Our April article featured information about Arthur Birchall who was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Royal Fusiliers attached to the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion Canadian Infantry and died on 24 April 1915. The Germans used gas for the first time and the Canadians, using make-shift gas masks, held the German advance. Arthur was killed in the battle near St Julien, and the Canadians have erected

a stunning memorial "The Brooding Soldier" to the 2000 men who fell and are buried nearby; Arthur's body was never found.

We will provide more details of those who died in 1916-18 in future editions of USL Life. I was able to photograph all the names of the Upton men and as part of our WW1 Commemoration Project will be creating a section of the Parish Website as a record and will save the images there in due course.
