# What's Been Happening in USL?



#### **Twyver WI Report**

Jenny Eastwood, Editor of the Gloucester Citizen was our first speaker of the evening. Jenny became the first female editor in the history of the newspaper in 2013 and spoke with great energy and enthusiasm about **Inspiring Women** and clearly she is one inspirational woman herself. She told us that The Citizen,

Gloucestershire Echo and Stroud Life are dedicated to supporting the community and with an ever growing number of sponsors, all three newspapers actively champion the Women in Business Awards. This annual event aims to recognise and showcase a number of extraordinary women in Gloucestershire and thereby inspire the next generation. Whilst newspaper sales in general, may be falling, the Citizen continues to draw an audience of 675,000 a month, due to its online version and media coverage through Facebook and Twitter.

Our second speakers Louise and Stacey came from the charity named Gloucestershire Bundles based in Podsmead, but operating county wide. Some startling figures on child poverty were revealed (28% of the children in the UK fall into this category)



and that even Upton has its share of families that are struggling financially.

#### Parish Council Report (Monday 6 June)

Prior to a full council meeting, the Planning Committee met to review 2 applications. Following discussion, the Committee supported applications for 21A Bondend Road (single storey front extension) and Manor Cottage, Portway (single storey side and rear extensions and first floor extension).

During the Parish Council meeting some of the key points covered were : -

- The café at the new Coopers Edge Leisure Centre is now fully open
- An internal refurbishment of the Pavilion building was agreed, including provision of broadband WiFi there
- Some repairs to the Play Equipment and Car Park area were agreed
- The kitchen in the Village Hall will be re-fitted
- Meetings with Highways England regarding noise from the M5 Motorway had taken place and a detailed update on progress for village residents will be written later this summer by Keith Pearson in USL Life

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# USL Víllage Day - Sat 11 June

What a great Village Day, surpassing last year's both in money raised for our charities and the number of visitors. In spitting rain the Committee and helpers gathered at 8.30am Saturday to finalise all the stalls, and erect the Marquees. Of course these things don't just happen overnight. Eight months of planning and booking shows and in the week leading up to Village Day, getting the Village Green up to spec, putting all the bunting around the Village Green, Village Hall and the BMI Club. By the time the procession started from Perry Orchard, the rain had stopped and we were blessed with a dry day from then on. The procession was lead by our first "Queen for the Day" Eleanor Cleverly (see front page) followed by the giant St Blaise, the Queen supported by her soldiers and St George on his horse. They were followed by the Maypole dancers from USL Primary School and fetching up the rear were the ever popular Gloucestershire Morris Men.



Once gathered on the Village Green, the large crowd was entertained with a display of Morris Dancing, Maypole Dancing and the Giants St Blaise and The Queen and their henchmen parading around the green. The crowd then dispersed and headed for the Village Hall and grounds. Activities for the children were in abundance from sumo wrestling, Punch & Judy, Discodome, shuttlecock challenge, face painting, the coconut shy, skittles in the BMI Club, beat the goalie, the amazing display of reptiles and finally the children's races. For the Adults, inside the Hall there was the USL History stand run by our own Mike Stratford, and a display of paintings from our local artists. ## JOBS FOR JULY/AUGUST FOR YOUR ALLOTMENT OR GARDEN

All that hoeing up of 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> early potatoes was well worth it, as now you can harvest them and enjoy the fresh flavours. You can now if you have room on your plot, sew second cropping potatoes for Christmas. Train cucumber stems upwards instead of trailing to save space. Aubergines, courgettes and squash should now have their growing tip pinched out to encourage branching. Boost your tomatoes, peppers, chillies, cucumbers, courgettes, marrows and squashes by feeding with a high-potash fertiliser.

Pick runner beans, green beans, beetroot, peas, carrots, chard, lettuce and anything that may be ready. It may be a bit late for 'the Chelsea Chop' but any herbaceous/perennial plants in your borders can be cut back to encourage a second flourish of flowers. Dead head roses and sweet peas and if you are suffering from rust on hollyhocks spray with a fungicide.

There should be a glut of summer fruits to pick at this time of year and to make more strawberry plants for next year

begin to pin down runners from previous year's plants. This is the last time to feed your lawns to encourage healthy growth, and if there is a prolonged spell of dry weather lift your mower blades. The greenhouse will need damping down on hot days, and leave windows and doors open for ventilation in the day and remember to water first thing in the morning or last thing at night.



### **CHURCHYARD TALES**

Working in the churchyard early one Sunday morning in late May I was approached by a couple from America. "Is there any chance we could have a look inside your beautiful church?" "Of course" I replied and proceeded to invite them in. "Actually we're studying our respective genealogies and we were hoping to trace my wife's ancestor by the name of Atkyns." With the limited records we have, I was able to locate a record of Atkyns and the burial plot number. Then the tricky bit started. It was plot number 137 and on sheet 1 but nowhere could we find number 137. Suddenly divine intervention stepped in as the man spotted the faded plot number and its approximate whereabouts on the graveyard plans. Can to the village community in many ways. We are very grateful to Rahul and Seeta for continuing this support and their involvement in the community. you believe it was a table top tomb and the name Atkyns was just recognisable and it was dated 1625?!!

I learnt that if flour, (not "self-raising!") was gently rubbed over a moss and lichen-free tombstone, further inscriptions would be more easily deciphered. Sadly I could not locate flour of any description but they were happy with a cloth and bucket of water. They went away thrilled to bits with their discovery, returning to the States that Thursday. I never did ask them their name and regrettably overlooked asking them to sign the visitors' book. How amazing that I was in the churchyard early that morning, that the tomb was located and that it was dated 1625.

# We will remember them ...

We are continuing to note the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the death of Upton Villagers caught up in the WWI battles. We hope it will help our readers to appreciate how those living in the Village 100 years ago must have felt. In 2014 and early 2015 we marked a number of deaths. Since then just a single anniversary, mentioned in our April 2016 issue. So just maybe our predecessors could have started to feel the worst was behind them. How could they have known that July 1916 was to become the blackest month for the Village.

At 7.30 in the morning of 1st July 1916, hundreds of thousands of British and Commonwealth soldiers were waiting for the whistle blast that would signal time to go "over the top" from their trenches and advance towards the German positions. As you will no doubt have read or seen elsewhere the German positions were still heavily defended, despite enormous amounts of artillery shelling, and the Allied soldiers were killed or wounded in their thousands that day. Losses on the first day were horrendous but the battle continued for another 140 days until November 18th - over a million men on both sides were killed or wounded in that time. This would become known as the battle of the Somme.

The Gloucestershire Regiment was in the thick of it, and in July 1916 Upton St Leonards Villagers learnt of the death of no fewer than six of their young men in the single month. How unbearable that must have been.

Private Francis Spring - 2nd Battalion Royal Irish Regiment - killed 14 July, aged 24. He has no known grave.

**Private George Miles** - 2nd Battalion Royal Irish Regiment - killed 16 July aged 32. He is buried in Mericourt Cemetery on the Somme.

**Private Reuben Lloyd** - 1st/5th Battalion Gloucestershire Regiment - killed 23 July aged 23. He has no known grave.

**Bombardier Daniel Smith** - 95th Siege Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery - killed 31 July aged 26. He is buried in Bronfay Farm Cemetery on the Somme.

**Sergeant Sydney Millard** - 1st/5th Battalion Gloucestershire Regiment - killed 23 July aged 19. One of six Millard brothers who left the village to go to war.

Further away in the Middle East, war was also raging:

**Private Edward Bailey** - 7th Battalion Gloucestershire Regiment - was killed on 9th July aged 22. He is buried in Basra War Cemetery in present day Iraq.

On 21<sup>st</sup> July, the Village History Group has a special meeting on the battle of the Somme and its effect on the Village. See the calendar and notice elsewhere.

Ruben's story will be printed in USL Life in the August edition.



## Focus on a long serving resident of the village, Rachel Hall

Rachel Hall was born at Manor Cottage, the first child of Daisy and Hedley Staite. The house was bought by her parents in 1929, and would have originally been a home to farm workers. Her mother's mother, Gran Middlecote, lived at Winnycroft and came from a family of eight children.

High Street at that time was a string of cottages and farms. There was a Baptist Chapel on the street, standing where now the road turns into Perry Orchard.

Rachel, as did most of the children in the village, attended the village school (next to the church) at five until she finished there at 14! Getting to school in those days was very healthy and companionable. The children at the highest point of Portway would walk to the next house and call for their friends until all the children were walking together to school and this would be repeated as they walked home at the end of the school day. The school staff consisted of a Headmaster, Mr Marler, an extremely good teacher, three other teachers and 50 children (those were the days of small classes and individual nurturing). The basic subjects were covered, and gardening - how to grow and propagate. The boys did woodwork and the girls went to a little school in Slad Road, Stroud to



take Domestic Science. This was not the period of the latch-key kids as doors were left unlocked and it was considered safe for children to get on with their lives unaccompanied!

At fourteen Rachel started work at J B Williams wholesale grocers, not far from the Cathedral. Her weekly wage was 10 shillings, 50 pence in our 'new' money! She cycled daily to her office job. After six months her wages went up to £1. At the time she attended the Commercial School in Gloucester in Midland Road in the evenings to learn shorthand and typing with Mr Faers and after some time she then went to work for the Eagle Star Insurance Company. During her married life, Rachel ran a wool shop in Innsworth, where she met some very interesting people, as at the time it was an RAF camp and married quarters. As well, over the years, she has pursued her hobbies of walking, dancing and embroidery, and has been involved in Church kneelers and cushions. She is a member of 'Stitchers' who have produced, among other things, blankets for the Family Haven in Gloucester, and items destined for Romania.

Rachel has a happy and optimistic personality. Her parents were very hardworking, and loving and encouraging to both her and her younger brother. The family had a cat and dog and during her childhood spent their holidays with an Aunt in the Forest of Dean. Church was an intrinsic part of family and village life: the school was very much connected to the Church and used for festivals and special occasions. On Sundays Holy Communion was followed by Matins, Sunday School and Evensong. The successful Youth Club was started by Mrs Salisbury, wife of the Rector at the Church, and continued by Miss Townsend, 'Misty' to friends. On occasions they would go to Cowley Manor sleeping in dormitories with young people from all walks of life. Later Rachel was branch leader of the Mother's Union. St Leonard's Church has always been integral to her life both spiritually and socially. Rachel joined all the village groups that were going, including the ladies cricket team, captained by Jean Randall and enjoyable matches were played home and away. The village also had a very successful drama group.

During the war, a soldier who was stationed locally, knocked on the door at Portway Manor Cottage and asked, "Do you know anybody who can take in my wife and children." His family were in London which was being bombed at the time. No doubt he was very concerned for their safety. The outcome was that Rachel's parents took in the family and kindly looked after them for the duration of the war.

In her teens Rachel took dancing lessons at the technical college with a Miss Whitaker. Dancing was popular and fun, and an opportunity to meet young men. The boys stood on one side of the room and the girls on the other. At the time her friend was going out with Mike Edgington and as the music struck up, and Trevor Hall spotted Rachel, Mike gave Trevor a nudge. The rest is history! Dances were held in the Village Hall and during the war soldiers stationed at Upton Hill Camp would come down to join in the fun. The band played, there were refreshments and it all cost 1s 6d!

Trevor and Rachel were married in 1954 in the Church in front of all the village. She had one bridesmaid and they spent their honeymoon in Cornwall. In 2014 they celebrated their sixty years together with a reception at the Village Hall. Firstly living in Brockworth and then Longlevens they had two sons, Phillip and David. In 1977 Rachel's father died and they moved to Portway Manor Cottage to support her mother.

Rachel and Trevor are in a very happy relationship, supporting each other all the way, with their complementary natures. Since 2013 they have settled happily in Perry Orchard finding this more convenient. They are the proud grandparents of five grandchildren and of their wide skills and achievements, are very much engaged in knowing what goes on today. Their positive approach to life, their readiness to get involved and enjoyment of each day is inspiring.
