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Upton WI Report for June

President Lynne welcomed all members and one visitor. Our outing to Bristol Aerospace to view and walk on Concorde was a great success and an exhilarating experience. Our guide explained the history of aviation in Bristol up to the present day. Concorde was known for its speed and beauty, an icon of British engineering. Thanks go to Judy for organising the trip. On Wednesday July 11th we meet at Tewkesbury Abbey for a tour and tea. Our lunch club this month meets at the Wagon and Horses at Hucclecote on Monday June 18th. We lost the skittles to Yew Trees at Painswick but the evening was a friendly social time with a good buffet. Denman vouchers will be drawn at our next meeting. Angela is hosting a strawberry tea at Rose Cottage, Upton Hill on Thursday 5th July in aid of Breast and Brain Cancer, please support this worthy cause. A reminder that our August meeting is a pudding tasting and you are all encouraged to bring a friend.

Our speaker Sue Down gave an interesting talk on the German Occupation of Guernsey during World War Two. For some reason the government of the day decided not to defend the Channel Islands, in fact a letter from King George VI was received and read on 15th June 1940 and two days later the Germans invaded; not before most women and children under 5 years of age were evacuated. Tired and weary after a 4 hour boat trip they were transported north to Bradford to begin a new life away from home. Sue's mother and young brother were amongst them. The Royal Hotel Guernsey was the Commandants residence, followed by 20,000 German troops who took over the locals' houses and schools. If owners stayed they became their servants. German was taught in schools, a curfew was imposed for 10pm later changed to 9pm, all rules had to be obeyed. Secret messages which only locals could decipher were printed in the Guernsey Press and in small ways the Germans were outwitted – freshly baked bread was swapped for stale, or driving fast round a corner so vegetables fell off lorries. All this came at a risk as many people were shot. In 1942 all Jews were shipped to Auschwitz. Life was harsh, people were starving but relief came in Dec 1944 when Red Cross parcels were delivered and the island was liberated on 9th May 1945, this special day being celebrated every year. A warm round of applause followed a vote of thanks from Marlene. We meet again on Monday July 2nd for a talk on Chorleys Antiques

Ladies Probus

With the centenary in 2018 of the ending of the First World War, it was especially interesting to hear our speaker, Bob Skelt, tell us about the episode in history referred to as the "Zimmerman Telegram" that brought about the entry of the United States of America into battle in 1917 and led to the Armistice in November 1918. This was unknown history to most of us and I shall try to sum it up here.

The Germans were not faring well in 1917, their battleships were blockaded and stayed in port after the sinking of the Bismarck off Jutland. Trench warfare was at a stalemate in Europe. Supplies from across the Atlantic and other parts of the world were reaching and sustaining Britain whereas the well-being of the German population was suffering from the effective British blockade of German ports. At that time German military command was not convinced about the effectiveness of submarine warfare which was thought to be "ungentlemanly". Admiral Donitz sought to convince them otherwise, arguing that submarines (U boats) would be very effective in reaching, attacking and sinking merchant vessels in the Atlantic and beyond. He orchestrated a U boat raid on ships stationed at Scapa Flow which led to the sinking of HMS Royal Oak. The German command was persuaded by this action and more U boats were commissioned and began their deadly raids on merchants ships in the Atlantic in 1917. At the same time the Kaiser decided to flout the rules of war current at that time which stated that any merchant ship should be stopped, challenged and crew evacuated before sinking the vessel but his main concern was how would the USA react if one of its ships should be sunk by a U boat.

In the event of that happening, the Kaiser's plan was encourage to Mexico to attack the USA so it would be pre-occupied by a war on its own front. He instructed his Foreign Secretary, Arthur Zimmerman, to convey this plan to the Mexican government. Because the British had severed German undersea communication cables at the start of the war and radio traffic was not secure, the Germans decided to send a coded telegram outlining the plan to the Mexican government and German Ambassadors in Mexico and USA. Unfortunately for the Germans, all telegrams had to be routed through London. The telegram was partially decoded by British Intelligence in London but because it did not want the Germans to know that the British were now aware of the plan and the British government was not 100% convinced of its authenticity due to its outrageousness, a way had to be found to seize the original telegram. A burglary at the Western Union office in Mexico was staged and the telegram successfully recovered, returned to Britain and decoded. The British government was now convinced and told the USA about the plan. All this happened in about the space of two weeks and was a major triumph for British intelligence and diplomacy that contributed to the entry of USA to the war in 1917. Later Foreign Secretary Zimmerman confirmed that the telegram was genuine.

Bob went on to talk about the capture of the enigma coding machines in WWII and most importantly the decoding manual without which codes could not be cracked but I have not written about these as the story is well known. These episodes in history had our members really spellbound and he was thanked for his absorbing and informative talk. The next meeting is on 18th July 2018 when our speaker will be Margaret Daniels, "The Bard of Barnwood"." Chris Ellson

Family Wellbeing

I want to raise awareness of a campaign group that fights the injustice wrought on women born in the 1950s regarding the changes to their State Pension Age, and aims to achieve fair transitional State Pension arrangements.

The group is called Women Against State Pension Inequality, (WASPI). They run a campaign and are challenging the government to make fair transitionalarrangements for 1950s women's state pensions. These pension changes affect all women who were born in the 1950's.. Many of these women will not realise the £££s they will lose from their State Pension until it's too late to make alternative arrangements to make up the shortfall.This website gives lots of useful

The 1995 Conservative Government's Pension Act included plans to increase

women's State Pension Age to 65, the same as men's. WASPI agrees with equalisation but does not agree with the unfair way the changes were implemented – with little or no personal notice (1995/2011 Pension Acts), faster than promised (2011 Pension Act), leaving no time to make alternative plans.

Retirement plans have been shattered with devastating consequences. In my case I expected to receive my pension when aged 60, now I have to wait until I am 66yrs old. The pension is around £8,000 a year so I am left £48,000 short in my pension, a tidy sum to make up on my own. I have written to the Dept for Works & Pensions to complain about the lack of notice and I would encourage you to do so, too. There is a sample letter on the website to guide you.

If photography is your thing then there a variety of sections that might tickle your fancy. These will be displayed in the annexe.


As usual we will be entertained by the Cotswold Big Band and there will be a

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Feature Article

Our feature article this month was submitted by Tim James of our local garage Cedar Motor House who, along with his wife Val just completed this amazing travelogue.

Hello folks,

Just thought that we'd send in a report from our amazing trip to Canada and Yellowstone National Park Tour recently, riding a Harley Davidson Tourer motorcycle. Valerie and I were fortunate enough to ride the Route 66 earlier in the year which was amazing, however this Yellowstone Tour can only be described as stunningly amazing!

We covered 3100 miles of touring on an Electra Glide from Seattle, up in to Canada and through Yellowstone National Park and Rocky mountains National Park. We visited Old Faithful which is a steam Geyser which explodes steam 100 foot into the air every 45 minutes! A huge visitor attraction and a marvel of the world. How does it do that???





A total of 15 Motorcycles and 25 folks set off from Seattle on 11th July.....

Our route consisted of 15 days riding with a free day and two night stopover in Cody and Waterton Lakes. 200 to 300 miles per day. The route visited Snoquamimie, Snohomish, Winthrop and over the Canadian border in to Kamloops. It felt a little scary crossing the border in to Canada as it is a very stern and serious affair, so best behaviour there! We crossed through vineyards and lakes, and more vineyards and more bigger and grander lakes and headed right on in to British Columbia. The lakes were an amazing sight, pure aqua blue and mountains that just increased in size. The ooohhs and ahhhs got louder each time another huge mountain pass was crossed. We headed on to Jasper arriving at Mount Robson National Park. We saw the Emperor's Face and Rearguard Falls.

These sights, sounds and smells were amazing and plenty of wildlife was to be seen along the route, including a Grizzly bear just wandering about on the edge of a forest! Not your everyday sight!! We were all in an official bike tour led by a professional tour guide. We all hired Harley Davidsons and also had a support vehicle behind us carrying a spare bike in case of mishaps, punctures or breakdowns. Fortunately no serious incidents occurred. A couple of folks dropped their bikes on the gravel surface and I had a close one when the old foot slipped on the pesky gravel! Those Electra Glides are heavy, aren't they!!

The whole trip was amazingly well organised with little stop offs here and there. We visited all sorts of places and saw all sorts of things including Evil Knievel's grave (my childhood absolute hero, had all his toys and windup motorbikes!) and went to a Rodeo championship all dressed up as cowboys! Glacier after glacier! Mountains and rivers, and mountains and rivers!! All quite amazing. We had all four seasons in one day! Hot sun, cold, really cold, snow, sleet, rain -10 degrees back up in to late 30 degrees all in the same day??! Explain that one!! Huge mileage each day and very tiring, but well worth the efforts! Each day had a different adventure lined up for us, with very good accommodation each evening. It felt normal to do 300 plus miles in a day, just easy riding, stereo blasting and chilling whist riding.



We motored on visiting Lake Louise and Banff National Park, all of which were gobsmacking to say the least. Soon we were dropping back in to the USA and crossed the border. We travelled so many time zones we had to keep watches and bikes clocks changed regularly. We travelled on through Utah and Wyoming. These states are vast and you just keep riding and riding! All good roads and the bikes just munched up the miles. We did white water rafting, visited Buffalo Bills County, firearms museums, Ski resorts, mountain cars and gold rush sites. We travelled on again through Titan National Forest and National Park. All amazing photo calls for the team. A real form of camaraderie formed amongst us and we all enjoyed each other's company in the evenings. Some (most) days we partied till late and smashed the Jack Daniels in true biker form and other days we could just have a chilled out evening, all grown up and in bed by 11! Yes I was a teenager again. Each day giggling and laughing with our gang of bikers to ACDC highway to hell blasting out from my bike each morning! Gotta blow out the cobwebs and JD from the night before. Everyone knew the words by day 3 or 4! What a wonderful experience. We visited many HD Dealerships along the way and naturally a few necessary purchases were made! Clothing, pins and goodies galore!



On day 16 it was back in to Colorado for our farewell dinner. A great chance for all of the riders to get together to say farewell and thank our tour guides for an awe inspiring and unforgetable experience. We all said that we must do this again sometime...... Normally that is just a figure of speech, but we have rebooked again for this year to travel the 3000 mile Wild West tour from Los Angeles all around through Vegas, up to San Franscisco and back down again to LA two weeks later. 11 couples from the Yellowstone trip have signed up for the Wild West Trip leaving LA in September too. We look forward to travelling with these comrades again. Ohhh that Jack Daniels in my veins!!!

I can honestly say that this was a once in a lifetime trip. Never to be underestimated or forgotten. Just amazing and thoroughly recommended. Each trip takes us a year to save up and pay for but it really is a treat to ride a Harley in the USA. You are welcomed everywhere and lorry drivers love you to bits and wave and let you in and allow you to cross etc!! Wonderful. Like on the Rolling Hills Club trips, you meet and ride with some fantastic people and form lifelong friendships. We are very lucky.

We had a truly amazing time, spent far too much cash but hey man.... You really do only live once!

A lichen covered stone place.


St Leonard's Churchyard is a grieving place, a private yet communal space, a gathering place, a leave taking place, a shared space, a sunny spot.

St Leonard's Churchyard is a dappled shady prayerful place, a spot for a quiet chat, a silent word, a teardrop blinking place.

A meeting place, a fleeting place, a quiet moment in time space. A touching place, a respectful space, a motorway thrumming, church bell ringing, bird song filled place.

St Leonard's Churchyard is a soulful place, a gracious spot, a between heaven and earth place, a space for our dead, a set aside place.

Throughout the week and throughout the year people visit graves and the Garden of Remembrance to remember those who have died. The churchyard is a place that holds enormous significance for many people and for that reason we are holding a service in the churchyard on the 8th July at 4pm when we will gather to remember our loved ones. Word and Worship At St Leonard's Church

Parish Council Report for June

Motorway Working Group

The group are still looking at the impact of air quality on our village from motorway traffic, the specification of the re-surfacing already completed and the extension/replacement of suitable noise reduction barriers/fencing. Any progress will be reported in USL Life.

Fly Tipping

Fly tipping is a blight on our society these days and it happens just about everywhere, but here in Upton we appear to have some hot spots. These are Portway, Nuthill, Birchall Lane, Rance Lane and Upton Lane near the bridge over the M5. If you do see this occurring then please try to take a vehicle number, equally even if you just see the resulting mess, please report these issues directly to Stroud District Council, the number to ring is 01453766321, and follow the instructions.

We are fortunate in the fact that Stroud are very good regarding this issue and will arrange to have the fly tipped items removed very swiftly. It is often the case that this dreadful behaviour happens when a householder has items to be disposed of and is approached by someone purporting to be a waste disposal contractor. After receiving payment they just drive round the corner so to speak and dump the rubbish. If at any time you pay for such a service you must receive a certificate of waste disposal, if they can't provide that , don't use them.

Our District Council provides a disposal service for large items at a reasonable cost, currently £25 for 3 items plus £5 for each additional item.

Garden Waste Scheme - message from SDC

With over 10,000 subscribers we are reaching full capacity for garden waste collections in some areas of the district with our existing vehicles and crews. To increase capacity we would have to increase resources in vehicles and crew which would add £150,000 to the cost of providing this service. Consequently we have taken the decision to suspend any new subscribers in the towns and parishes where we have no spare capacity on the existing collection rounds (Upton is affected by this change and it is effective immediately).

Residents will be able to put their name on a waiting list. Any existing customers who reside within these towns and parishes who have not yet renewed for 2018 will still be allowed to renew their subscription after this time. Residents who are not eligible for the service will be advised of the change when they attempt to book online or over the phone. We will keep this under review. Alternatively residents are encouraged to compost or they will still be able to take their garden waste to the County Council's Household Recycling Centres in Horsley and Hempsted.

Street Lighting Improvement Works - message from County Council

Skanska UK PLC have been engaged by the County Council to continue its program of LED conversions which will help meet its carbon reduction target of 60% by 2020. Work may necessitate temporarily reducing pavement widths, use of safety barriers and reduction in on-street parking. For USL, this is scheduled to take place during the month of August and Skanska will be doing their best to minimise any inconvenience to residents.

WHAT TO DO IN YOUR GARDEN IN JULY

Well what a funny year we have had so far with the weather cold, sunny not to mention snow and all the rain at the end of May. It's taken about 4 weeks for my garden to catch up with the seasons, but here we are at the beginning of July with lots to do. You should now have your hanging baskets and containers planted with summer bedding which need daily watering and a regular feed to promote flowering.

Hedges and perennials need cutting back. Now is the time to sow Foxgloves, Sweet William, Penstemon and Delphinium seeds for flowering next year.

If you grow soft fruit make the most of Strawberries, Raspberries, Redcurrants, Cherries, and Rhubarb, lots of recipes come to mind.

Lawns need a mow at least once a week but raise the blades and not so often in dry spells. Keep removing side shoots on Tomatoes and stop the plants when 4-5 trusses have been produced.

Vegetables. Onions should not go without water as it will affect the size of the crop.

It will be soon time to harvest second early Potatoes, examine one of the plants and if the crop is small leave them a little longer. Beetroot is the sweetest if harvested whilst young and tender and it is still not too late to keep sowing all salad crops.

Also still sow Carrots and Spinach for a continuous supply. Broad / French Beans can still be sown until the middle of the month.

When you are not busy in the garden, put your feet up, relax and enjoy our English Summer.

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Upton St Leonards Annual Parísh Report 2018

Chairman's Report by Councillor Keith Pearson:

Where has the year gone? I must first of all take this opportunity to thank all members of the Council for their hard work during the past year.

As always we are heavily involved in looking after the interests of the Parish. The motorway resurfacing has had some result in making things a little less noisy, but there are differing opinions on that. As said last year we would not stop there and are still actively involved in meetings regularly with Highways England to try to get the poor noise barriers addressed.

The Council is also looking at putting in some extra fitness features in the village to benefit both young and old. We have also just had it confirmed that we have met the requirements, after assessment, to have the whole village designated as a 20mph zone, which we hope will make it safer for all. The Chairs of Committees will outline the highlights of this year below.

We have of course unfortunately sadly lost quite a few of our friends in our village this year and our thoughts are with all their families. One gentleman, Mr Louis Rolla of Six Acres very kindly left a legacy to our Village Hall for which we are extremely grateful, it will be used to good effect.

I have once again enjoyed the privilege of chairing an excellent Parish Council, which has the benefit of a very efficient Clerk. Thanks again to all.

Planning Committee by Councillor Christine Castle:

Formal applications for planning in the village this year were 32 compared to 46 last year. Again, most applications were for extensions/modifications to homes as people opt to renovate rather than move. There has been a request for the building of bungalows which would allow current residents in the village to downsize and stay within the community. More homes have also been built in Coopers Edge but this will now be the last of the homes which will come within our parish.

The homes built within the village itself in the last year have been of a high quality and most have enhanced the aspect of the area. The appeal for the development of homes at Prinknash Abbey was refused by the Secretary of State and therefore there will no building on that site. The land at Bowden Hall has been sold to Dawn Homes and we have no information at the time of this report as to when building is likely to start. Outline planning has been permitted but reserved matters are still under consideration.

Regarding the Winneycroft development outside our parish boundary we have received no updates and it has gone very quiet. We are conscious of the number of requests to build in the surrounding areas of the village, but with the local plan now in force and more homes having been added to Coopers Edge, we have a good case for keeping within our boundaries and thus preserving the AONB. As a reminder, planning meetings are held on the first Monday of each month prior to the Parish Council Meetings and public are always welcome.

Recreation by Councillor David Hunt:

A number of improvements have been implemented at the Pavilion over the past twelve months.

1. The chair lift on the stairs to the meeting room has been replaced with a new unit.

2. Easy clean flooring has been installed in the downstairs corridors and toilets.

3. Movement sensitive light switches have been installed in the toilets.

4. The outside patio has been extended to give an improved seating area. Two additional benches are about to be installed 5. Wi Fi has been installed in the meeting room.

6. New curtains have been hung in the meeting room.

7. The large depression in the tarmac at the car park entrance has been filled

Extremely wet weather over the winter and early spring has resulted in waterlogging of the pitch, causing match cancellations for football. Unfortunately this has coincided with the Football Club gaining league promotion. Although conditions have been exceptional, investigation of the drainage indicates that a part of the field drainage system may need replacing. Further investigation is being undertaken.

As a result of the recent public consultation on parish needs, a decision has been taken to install adult exercise equipment (an outdoor gym) at the Recreation Ground. A suitable site is being investigated and funding is being sought.

Finally thanks must be extended to the volunteers who help to keep the facilities in good shape. Richard Stephenson ensures that the site gates are closed at night and Andy Russell is our Pavilion Manager, with both operating on a voluntary basis.

Environment by Councillor Pete Wilson

We have continued to support the activities that make our village such a nice place to live. These include managing our grass cutting contract, general maintenance where needed and keeping our Water Courses clear (supported by our Water Warden).

Our financial support for USCAN (a group made up of volunteer residents from Upton) has enabled them to do their usual excellent work. Their main focus is maintenance of our numerous Footpaths / Styles but they also help with flower beds, organise Litter Picks and have done some really good work in the church grounds over the last 12 months.

They also help to maintain Cud Hill (owned by the Parish Council) and this together with our grazing arrangement each year keeps the area in good condition.

In June 2017 we held a public consultation on a range of village improvements submitted by residents. This was well

supported and enabled us to make decisions on how to progress.

We are continuing to work on these ideas and are making progress. One example is that after the necessary surveys by the Highways Agency, we have secured agreement to implement a 20mph Zone covering the main residential area of our village.

We planted a new Christmas Tree on the Village Green last December which will be lit every year and feedback has been very positive.

Also, we are exploring funding opportunities to help us pay for other ideas such as the Adult Gym and Children's Play Equipment. Progress has been reported in USL Life as we have moved forward.

Thanks go to Keith Pearson, David Hunt and the Working Group for their success in getting the M5 Resurfacing completed. This work is continuing with their efforts to replace fencing with Noise Barriers.

My ongoing thanks to members of USCAN and other volunteers who have worked hard on behalf of our village to keep it looking good, and to our Parish Clerk, Roy Balgobin whose support has been much appreciated.

Allotments by Councillor Hilary Morris

The last year has been very successful for the allotment society. We have also seen some changes.

A big thank you has to go to the allotment managers for their hard work and particularly to Carol Evans who did a stalwart job managing the Perry Orchard site. Carol has decided to retire from the job as Allotment manager and we wish to thank her for all her hard work.

We would like to say welcome to the new manager who is Holly Paton, who lives in the village. Holly has already helped greatly in establishing a community orchard on land that was not used at the Stanley site. We hope this will go on to be very popular with the village in years to come.

A big thank you also has to go to Peter Macey and some of his fellow allotment holders at the Stanley site who did a valiant job laying the scalpings from the road works on Bondend, that Roy Balgobin, Clerk to the parish, managed to obtain, to improve the car park.

The Parish Council receives many compliments about the standard of care the allotment holders put into their plots. Thank you all very much.

I have to advise all allotment holders that with effect from 1st April 2018 the fees for allotments will rise, to the help cover the increased costs we are experiencing. The costs will be £20 for a full plot and £10 for a half plot. The costs have been posted at each site.

I wish everyone a good growing year and hope that the extremes in weather this winter have not caused anyone any big problems


Oh, Adam was a gardener, and God who made him sees That half a proper gardener's work is done upon his knees, So when your work is finished, you can wash your hands and pray

This is a fascinating book, written by the Vicar of Selborne, Hampshire. It has inspired generations of naturalists with vivid descriptions of the parish flora and fauna plus comments on the weather and crops grown in the countryside around the vicarage. The book inspired Charles Darwin, who read it as a young man, and made a



pilgrimage to Selborne. Similarly, Chris Packham (BBC Spring Watch) read a tatty copy given to him by his biology teacher, and cycled from Southampton to Selborne to see it for himself. There is now a museum in Selborne which contains the original manuscript. The book has been published in more than 300 editions and has never been out of print. It is believed to be the most published book in English after the Bible, the works of Shakespeare and John Bunyan's The Pilgrim's Progress. The manuscript is now online as a digital flipbook. We recommend it to you in whichever form you prefer.
