The Church Roof

About 7 years ago, an inspection showed that the northern part of the church roof, shown here outlined in red, would have to be re-covered in the next few years before it started to become leaky and dangerous. If you look there now you can see a few stone tiles that have broken off. (In one place above the porch you can see a blue plastic patch!)

This is a <u>very expensive</u> job. It's a listed Grade 2* building, so the Cotswold stone tiles have to be replaced with the same, and replacement wooden beams, plaster and cement have to be of the same type that was used two hundred years ago. The lowest, most optimistic cost estimates are £250,000. It will almost certainly be substantially more than that.

A few years ago the church sold a field it owned and that was a significant start to raising the funds. It means that <u>if</u> it can find grants (that usually require match funding), the amount it already has, and matched amounts, come near to making it possible to start work. But with such a huge total needed, the Church Council will have to make a big appeal to all of us. This is our Village Church It is there for everyone, whether a regular worshipper or not. So this appeal is to everyone in the Village or friend of the Village. The church was passed down to us from hundreds of years ago, and we need to pass it on for the next generations.

The regular worshippers can be expected to pay for most of the running costs, and they do, but they can't raise the sort of money needed to repair the roof.

We have two reports from Twyver WI, because of the altered date of the May meeting, too late for the last issue.

TWYVER WI MEETING 22 MAY 2023

Having foregone meetings in April and at the start of May due to extra public holidays and the King's Coronation, this meeting was arranged in order to stay focused on WI matters and ensure continuity of our group.

Speaker for the evening Ged Cassel, butterfly enthusiast, gave an interesting and colourfully illustrated lecture on butterflies in and around Gloucestershire. The wide range of habitat on offer here and the different species was insightful. For instance, did you know that the difference between a butterfly and a moth is simply as plain as night and day – and that butterflies rest with wings open and moths with wings closed and there are no nocturnal butterflies? There are 2000 species of moths in

the UK and 60 species of butterflies so theoretically we should see more moths. Most butterflies die soon after mating though some hibernate then die soon after. Painted ladies migrate so some years you see very few. We have all noticed a decline in butterfly numbers in recent years, however this is not unusual due to weather patterns and loss and changes of habitat. However if you know where to look there are still plenty about in our county and who doesn't like to see them? Check out Butterfly Conservation Gloucestershire Branch and acquaint yourselves with these amazing creatures in our area, lots of information for both yourselves and children alike. A lovely evening's talk was followed by the usual business.

TWYVER WI MEETING 12 JUNE 2023

We met on a very warm evening, and lovely to see lots of faces we haven't seen for a while – welcome back!

We began with our Speaker, Nigel Warwick from BLOOD BIKERS. Most of us it seems had never heard of these unsung heroes

who volunteer through the night delivering as a support charity for the NHS (unpaid) to hospitals, care homes and other facilities such as baby care units, from 7pm to 7am.

Many of these riders have day jobs too, so obviously they have to bear in mind safety regulations: getting tired on a motor bike at speed is not good. However, they have a good track record of safety.

They deliver blood, frozen breast milk and other lifesaving medical equipment and supplies, drugs and samples between hospitals. Also they deliver patient notes which are required urgently (not all notes are digitised). He regaled us with stories of strange things they have had requests to deliver over the years but none as bizarre as a medical skeleton, which would have had to be strapped to the back of the rider – this request could not be enacted for obvious reasons and they couldn't guarantee it getting there in one piece. They don't get involved in transporting organs, only corneas, but the one item which is always requested is false teeth!

Blood Bikers save the NHS over a quarter of a million pounds a year; that's the estimated commercial cost of all the journeys the bikers undertake.





Nigel is a member of the Severn Freewheelers, part of the National Association of Blood Bikers. His group covers Gloucestershire, Herefordshire, North Wiltshire and Worcestershire. The bikes they use cost around £16,000 each and the Severn group needs £1,800 per week to run the service, all paid for by fundraising. If you feel you would like to send a donation or support this service in another way, there is information on their website: severnfreewheelers.org.uk.

They are well supported by local companies and organisations. GCHQ even had a cake sale – they must have sold a lot of cakes as they were able to fund another bike.

Nigel was most insistent that Blood Bikers is not a Biker Group (such as Hell's Angels!). In bad weather they are using cars more and more but the Bike is still no. 1 for getting around quickly and efficiently. They are always wanting coordinators and we were told women are good at it and shifts can be booked on line: they will be very grateful for your help.

The next meeting is on 10th July, all welcome.



ROAD CLOSURES IN JULY - BONDEND ROAD & BONDEND LANE



The new houses at Bowden Hall Farm

As you will almost certainly have seen, building is now going ahead on the plot of land within the Bondend 'loop'. We felt readers might like to see the site plans. There are due to be 15 dwellings built: 1 x 5 bed detached, 3 x 4 bed detached, 1 x 3 bed detached, 8 x 3 bed, 2 x 2 bed. If you want to look at the various planning permission documents on the Stroud District website, look for reference S.13/1844. Planning permission was first applied for in 2013! Shown here is the 2013 layout plan, and while we believe this is still the proposed site layout, things may have changed slightly.

USL AFC will enter the 2023/24 season with two senior men's sides and two boys' sides.



Vacancy Update

From Revd Ali Mepham, Diocese of Gloucester

The PCC recently met with the Archdeacon of Gloucester, Hilary Dawson, our Assistant Area Dean Sarah Todd, and me, to discuss the next steps for the appointment of a priest to serve the parish.

We are immensely grateful for the interim ministry of Philippa Donald and the work she has done in the parish, not only in supporting the ministry here, but in enabling frank and open conversation about the future. All this has been happening at a time of much change as the whole diocese has been exploring, through a strategic review in every deanery, how to be the Church in our communities with the challenges that face us.

Following conversations emerging from this deanery review and Philippa's interim ministry in Upton, a process will begin to enable the two benefices of Hucclecote and Upton to begin working together, informally in the first instance. This will help to enable long term sustainability and build on long standing relationships.

The Diocesan Mission and Pastoral Group, which is responsible for approving all clergy posts, met last week and endorsed the appointment of a half-time priest based in Upton. As the parishes of Hucclecote and Upton St Leonards begin working more closely together this will mean there will be one full time and one half time priest across the two parishes.

In addition, Gloucester City Deanery is exploring external funding for a 0.5 youth work facilitator for the deanery. It is possible that this could be combined with the 0.5 post for Upton and Hucclecote, which would link well to the work that is already happening in this part of the deanery.

This month was called QUINTILUS until Julius Caesar became powerful in Rome and changed the name to JULY In his honour. Although conflict played a large part in the Roman Empire, it was also a period of great poets whose works have been translated from Latin by other poets. In this Arts Page we feature poems by Quintus Horatius Flaccus known as Horace, Gaius Valerius Catullus known as Catullus and Publius Vergilius Maro known as Virgil.

HAPPY THE MAN by Horace, translated by John Dryden (1631 – 1700)

Happy the man, and happy he alone, He, who can call today his own: He, who secure within, can say
Tomorrow do thy worst, for I have lived today. Be fair or foul or rain, or shine,
The joys I have possessed, in spite of fate are mine. Not heaven itself upon the past has power;

But what has been, has been, and I have had my hour.

EPILOGUE by Horace, translated by Robert Louis Stevenson (1850 – 1894)

WHERE'ER YOU WALK by Virgil, translated by Alexander Pope (1688 – 1744)



BOOK REVIEW

The Cicero Trilogy by Robert Harris published (2021), has been described as "one of the great triumphs of contemporary historical literature". It combines three books – Imperium (2009), Lustrum (2010) and Dictator (2015) – which follow the life of a Roman lawyer and philosopher, Marcus Tullius Cicero,




to the role of Consul, disputes with his political rival, Julius Caesar, and conflict with Mark Antony leading to Cicero's assassination in 46 BC. Cicero defended the Roman Republic fiercely in his writing and speeches to the Senate. His political beliefs lost favour and Imperial Rome followed the fall of the Roman Republic in 31 BC. These books are novels and not works of history and we recommend them to you and would welcome your reviews.

Feature Artícle

This is the second of the articles written by Jane Read on Ivor Middlecote's memories. The first appeared in the April issue this year.



Here are a few more of Ivor's general memories of living in Upton plus a few of his memories of what it was like during the Second World War.

The Middlecote family were Methodists and attended services at Wesleyan Chapel with the youngest children going to the nearby Sunday School. The Chapel was situated on the corner of what is now Perry Orchard and the High Street. I found it interesting to discover Upton St Leonards had both a church and a chapel and, I wonder if anyone has a photograph of the chapel they would like to share? (*Ed: See USL Life May 2019, on the website*)

As a young man one of Ivor's first jobs was to deliver newspapers to Upton households but before he could do this he had to ride his bike to Gloucester Railway Station so he could collect the newspapers. Later he had a job with Brigadier Patsy Pagan at Belmont House, Upton Hill as under gardener to Frank White. Also during the time Ivor lived in Upton he worked as a drover for Farmer Jackson who worked the farm near Bowden Hall and, needed his cows and calves moved from Painswick to Upton. According to Ivor "it was easy as the roads were quiet and they walked up through the plantations and down Upton Hill"; I think Ivor's definition of easy is vastly different than mine! He mentioned that one of his older brothers worked for as a carpenter for W T Nichols, a local building contractor.

It is only in more recent years that a bus has come through the village. When Ivor was growing up, the closest it got was the Kings Head. The landlord at the time was a thoughtful or a shrewd business man because he allowed people to leave their bikes in his barn when they took the bus into town.

During the war the Middlecote's next door neighbours (the Reads) built an air raid shelter in their back garden which, thankfully, was only needed a couple of times. Once, a bomb exploded, without any real damage, close to Whitley Court. Another time a barrage balloon was shot down near Whitley Court with a second being shot down in field opposite where the primary school is now. Some of the villagers were watching and thought they'd witness lots of action but luckily that wasn't the case. To Ivor and his siblings' amusement the lady next door to them came running outside, then instantly turned tail and ran back inside screaming. The following day found children out searching for spent cartridges. Ivor said the "squaddies" billeted on Nuthill were amazing, and very accepting of him and his friends being on Nuthill too. The squaddies manned a Bofers anti-aircraft gun and Browning machine guns whereas over on Belmont Hill there was a 3.7in AA battery.

Other memories include being invited to the squaddies hut to play bingo along with members of the Auxiliary Territorial Service (ATS). Army Cadet training took place in the village hall and was led by a variety of people including Captain Peacey and Bill Gardener; Bill taught self-defence. And with Upton being as friendly and welcoming then as it is now the BMI welcomed the servicemen stationed locally, foregoing the usual membership rules and fees.

DYNAMOS is a franchise organised by the England and Wales Cricket Board to get youngsters aged 7 to 11 along to cricket grounds, and the cricket club is running it. The Cricket Board supplies colourful T-shirts, flags, banners and playing equipment and provides training for the volunteer adults that run it, and lots of short game-type activities. It is great fun (indeed that is the emphasis - make cricket fun). Every Thursday evening through May, June and most of July we have had up to 35 youngsters enjoying themselves running around and picking up cricket skills. Most of these girls and boys go on to play for the club.

At the end of May there was a big "Club Day". This was organised by the Gregg family in memory of Steve Gregg, who set up our Junior Section back in 1989. Many of the lads he trained turned up to play or watch, joined by many other past and present players and their families. It was a great day, and something like £1300 profit on bar and BBQ sales went into club funds. Steve died in February this year. One of his sons still plays regularly for the club.

We are about halfway through the playing season. Top team in terms of success is the Saturday 2nd XI, played 6, won 6 at the time of writing. Last season they won just 2 games and were relegated. Looks like they are going straight back up. The Saturday 1st XI is mid-table in its Division. Wins are a bit of a scarcity among the other teams: Wed XI, U15, U13, U11, U9, but every team has won at least one game.
