Following the May elections, Upton St Leonards Parish Council has taken on a new look:

First of all, we have said goodbye to some long serving Councillors who have generously given their time and commitment over many years to ensure our village is well looked after. The longest time on the Council has been enjoyed by Graham Hayes, who stepped down after 41 years of service. The Parish Council thanked him for this and bestowed upon him the honour of the Freedom of Upton St Leonards. We have also lost the services of Roy Roberts who was on the Council for

some 16 years and our Chair, Chrissie Castle has decided to step down. Chrissie had been Vice Chair for several years before taking the Chair last year. Both Chrissie's and Roy's decisions are due to personal reasons and we thank them both and wish them well for the future.

The new Council going forward in 2024 comprises the following people:

Keith Pearson, Chair, Peter Wilson, Vice Chair and Environmental issues. David Hunt, Recreation, Mary McLachlan, Allotments, Jim Browne, Village Hall Representative, Hilary Morris, Matt Sargeant, Coopers Edge, and we welcome two new Councillors, Andrew Skelton and Cliff Alderman. All are ably assisted by our Parish Clerk, Roy

Balgobin and Tracy Slator who was recently appointed as Assistant.

What's Been Happening in Upton?

UPTON WI - THE GWR

Railways and nostalgia were intertwined when our speaker, Roger Coates from Hucclecote, gave an informative talk on the Gloucestershire Warwickshire Steam Railway, run by 900 volunteers and a few paid staff.

Running for over 14 miles through the beautiful Cotswold countryside, it follows the route of a line built by the GWR between Stratford-on-Avon and Cheltenham. Like many local lines, use declined from the 1950s onward and stations and then whole lines were closed. Gotherington Station was the first to close, in 1955. Others followed, and the last to close was Cheltenham Racecourse, in 1976. A derailment ended freight transport on the line in the same year. The abandoned stations fell into disrepair and the rails were removed.



However, railway enthusiasts collected enough money to purchase the 15 miles of track between Cheltenham Racecourse and Broadway when British Rail agreed to sell it in 1981 and the long process of rebuilding the line began. Until recently the line terminated at Toddington, but 6 years ago the section to Broadway was reopened.

Today the GWSR is thriving thanks to its dedicated and hardworking volunteers. There were over 125,000 passengers in 2019. Currently they run 4 steam engines, with 4 more being repaired and restored. There are also a number of restored diesel trains. Their latest appeal is for repairs to the viaduct at Stanway where water has damaged two arches. You can support the GWSR by visiting, by becoming a member and by volunteering. The website www.gwsr.com has much more information.

The next meeting is on 1 July at 2pm in the Pavilion, where the talk will be on "Fraud", something of concern to us all. All are welcome.

This month we welcomed Rhiannon Parker, Fraud Protection Officer, from the South West Regional Organised Crime Unit, who came with good advice on how to Stop Fraud.

Rhiannon visits fraud victims and finds them in disbelief that they have been so 'stupid' to fall for such scams. Her advice first and foremost is to Take Five That is to take five minutes after a call or a contact is made to calm yourself, ask yourself is this what the person I know would say, does it sound like them and if you're still unsure try to contact them by any other means available for confirmation if they are in trouble or needing assistance such as funds, in any way.

Only 41% of this type of crime is reported because people embarrassed.

Next Rule is Tell Two; Telling other (Mel B from the Spice Girls) Nazir through. Phone spoofing is on the increase when the caller ID looks like a local number – don't be fooled and never phone them back as they leave the line open to make you believe you are calling someone else for verification. Report it to ACTION FRAUD which is attached to City of London Police where all information regarding scammers is collated. Dial 7726 for nasty texts (spells SPAM) or if you do inadvertently give out any bank details ring 159 and you will be able to connect to your bank in order to block the account. 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

Or do you have the TV already lined up with what you want to be watching? Or are you dreading the back-to-back sports coverage? I'm not a particularly sporty person but I love to watch the Olympics. There is definitely something special about the Olympics and the spirit that dwells within the athletes and the stories that come from it.

In the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, the British runner Derek Redmond, was a favourite to win a medal in the 400m final. The first one I made was for my Dad, From an old Christmas Tree someone had Thrown out with the rubbish to wither and rot, It was too good for that so I had a plot To file it and stain it and carve it a lot; It was for my Dad's birthday of 65 years, And like all other years, He said, "Thanks my son. Cheers".



Walking Sticks

Together with other boys in Upton we wandered the woods and fields freely. We were always searching the hedgerows for suitably shaped branches to use for our games, bows, arrows and sticks for fishing rods. I realise now that I was always interested in the shape of sticks and liked to fashion them with my own carvings. Perhaps this love as a boy of fashioning wood was the beginning of my interest in Walking Sticks, which of course were used by many more people in those days.

Quite a long time passed after my teenage years before I carved my first stick. I was working for the Gas Board and just finished the job. As I left I noticed a Christmas Tree lying on the lawn in front of the house. The owner was throwing it out but he let me have it. I put it into the back of the van, later I cut off all the side branches, filed down the main stem, carved, polished and varnished it. It was Spruce, not ideal walking stick material, but I managed to carve out a squirrel, a snake, a frog and a harvest mouse. I gave this stick to my father for his 65th birthday. I fashioned another stick from a Christmas tree and carved a snake along part of it and attached part of a discarded Roe Deer antler as a handle. These two sticks were the only ones I made from Spruce; my preferred wood has always been Hazel.

A few years later whilst walking in the Forest of Dean with my wife, I made a unique find. We always looked into the hedges and it was there that I had tremendous good luck — I came across a perfect strangled Hazel branch. This happens to a growing Hazel branch which also has a growing wild honeysuckle spiralling around it. After a few years the honeysuckle dies leaving the imprint of the spiral embedded in the Hazel stick. It must have been years old. I treasure this find. I kept it for several years before I varnished it and added a handle — another part of the Roe Deer antler.

Since then I have made and fashioned several sticks — all Hazel wood. It is the best wood if it is mottled and striking. I have carved a snail, an elephant and of course, used parts of the Roe Deer antler. I have also carved a stick showing a crab, fish and a snake and made a right-handed stick for a friend. I also made a plait from a Hazel stick which I kept for my own use; it has a natural knob for a handle.

In my garden I found a shrub growing with two straight stems very close to each other. I bound them together for a couple of months, cut them, screwed them together in parallel and wrote Psalm 23 – my favourite – along the stem. I put an antler as a thumb stick on the top as a handle.

I still love handling wood. I have never asked for payment for my walking sticks. I have been happy to fashion them for friends as needed. I am now the oldest member of an Archery Club and I fish every year and belong to an Angling Club.

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Hadwen Update

- The Hadwen Patient Participation Group met in May. The practice has recruited a new salaried GP who starts in August.
- The friends and family tests which give feedback from patients were favourable on the whole, any negative comments can also be valuable for training and learning.
- Two GPs will be taking maternity leave later this year and their posts will be advertised at the appropriate time.
- Ian Robinson was presented with a leaving gift and card to mark his retirement after leading the team for 14 years and overseeing some major developments in the business. We wish him well in this new chapter of his life.
- Hadwen held a very successful Health and Wellness Day which was well attended with over 200 patients. These days will be repeated in the future, as will smaller events on a particular subject.
- Hadwen are introducing a named GP project slowly with those turning 70 being invited to join the scheme first. It is hoped, in time, that planned reviews will be booked with their named GP.
- Patients will be contacted by text or letter inviting them to join the project. It will take some time to be rolled out but should show benefits to both patients and GPs. Information will be available on the website in due course.
- Appointments can be made online from a text message only but any face to face appointment can be changed to a digital appointment by a phone call for a FaceTime appointment if a patient is unable to get to the surgery, due to other circumstances such as traffic or work commitments just contact the practice to request this.
- All blood results are available to patients on the NHS App and it saves time for staff if patients use this facility. Any irregular results will be raised with the patient, but generally no news is good news.
- If you request medical attention and staff are due to ring you back if this does not happen, please contact the practice again as staff will only try twice to contact patients in this instance.
- If you are unable to get an appointment when you feel you need it, do contact the Glos Health Access Centre in Quayside House. Tel 01452 336290. They may be able to help.
- Note that the 111 service is always there to advise on services available to meet your needs 24/7, either online or by phone.
- GPs are now providing over 25% more appointments now than before the pandemic but the demand is growing all the time.
- The hospital now has "digital letters" available for those receiving secondary care. Go to www.gloshospitals.nhs.uk. search "digital letters".
- If you have received good care do let the practice know. It



gives the staff a morale boost and if you are unhappy with the service send an email outlining your concerns - this provides learning opportunities for the team.
