
Sports Report



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Upton St Leonards People-

This month we feature Mary McLachlan

Mary (nee Rosemary Gardner) is a Clerical Support Officer at Gloucester Royal Hospital's Head and Neck Services Department. She was credited in Dr Dutta's paper in *The Lancet*, for ably assisting his research.

She has four children from her first marriage - Andrew, Nigel, Elizabeth and Michael, and one step-daughter, Sinead, from her second marriage to Lachlan McLachlan (Mac). She has seven grandchildren and one two year old great grandson, Oscar. Mary and Mac enjoy sporting their tartan to McLachlan clan gatherings in Scotland. Mac is a kit drummer in the Gloucester Excelsior Brass Band and is in the Drum Corps of West Midlands Fire Service Band.



Mary was born in 'Rest Haven' (now Rance Cottage) and since the Davis branch of her family, eight generations have lived in USL. Her mother, Rose Peace Gardner (so-called because she was born in 1918) lived in Yew Tree Cottage with mother and blacksmith father, brother Bill and sisters, Violet and May (Graham Hayes' mother - see USL Life, Issue 7). At 97 years, Rose is the oldest Uptoner.

When Mary was a child the rectory was in Pinlocks and Reverend Graham kept cows, so an interesting aroma accompanied him to 8am Holy Communion. She attended the village school and children weren't allowed to speak in class or ask for the loo. They had a ruler between shoulder blades to make them sit straight and knuckles rapped with a ruler for misbehaving. Once, a boy dipped her plaits in his inkwell and covered them in black ink. Although her mother attended Ribston Hall High School, Mary didn't fancy an all girls' school, so tried to deliberately fail the 11+. She didn't regret it and enjoyed following the trends, whether becoming 'Beatnicky', a Mod, or her favourite, jiving to Rock'n Roll in petticoats and flared skirts. She loved frothy coffee and 'gattucks' in the Cadena Café, Eastgate Street and a drink or several in the Lemon and Parker (now Waterstones).

With a characteristic twinkle of laughter, Mary remembers that Brian Wood was the first boy she 'properly kissed'. She continued to enjoy kissing as a teenager ('and still does'!) and was in the Hippodrome with Basher Badhams when she felt a tap on her shoulder from the lad she was meant to be with instead. 'I'll see you tomorrow if you like' was her quick riposte. Ah, those were the days!

Family is of upmost importance to Mary. She and siblings, Teresa, Ted and Mickey felt 'very much loved'. Their father, Bill, was a Stone Maker and fired the anvil for the annual village event in the Rec. She remembers family outings to Cranham Feast with venison cooked by army cooks. The family would catch the bus to Painswick Beacon and walk down to the feast behind The Royal William then walk down Portway at night. Her father said the lights of Gloucester were Fairy Land. 'When I'm gone, pick the brightest star in the sky' he'd say 'and it's me looking down on thee'. She still feels a deep, emotional bond here and senses the family's presence everywhere.

Mary serves USL in her roles as a Parish Councillor and BMI Committee member. 'This is my village' she says and believes it's vital to keep USL a place for all. She urges us to remember to say 'hello' when passing each other and to join in events in order to keep the community spirit alive.

Little known fact: Mary owns approximately 2,000 pieces of elephant paraphernalia. She is pictured with just a few of them.

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Dear Friends.

As I sit at my desk, reflecting on the past year, it is a very cold May Day. But by the time you read this June will be busting out all over - look around - the song belts out full of hope and

excitement. How wonderful it is to be part of the family of Upton St Leonards!

Thank you to you all for enabling me to be parish priest in such a beautiful village.

Thank you to you all for just being you as we would not be a family without each one of you.

We have lost a lot of our family as they have either passed away or moved away from the area - they are sorely missed and were much appreciated for all their support.

However, last year we had 14 Weddings; 13 Baptisms; 16 Funerals; 13 Burial of Ashes and 1 Confirmation Service.

We have enjoyed some wonderful social events and special services. Although this past year has proved to be an eventful one it has brought us challenges which we need to learn how to deal with effectively.

A part time incumbent, declining numbers and very limited finances, excessive repairs and lack of expertise have had their toll on the morale of church folk as we recognise that our church is no longer viable in the way folk are used to and would like.

Since our focus must be turned to mission and outreach we recently have been looking at our range of services and have been trying out a new format which involved changing the mid Sunday morning Communion 4All Service from 11 am to 10 am twice per month. Once a month a Non-Communion Family Service and one Holy Communion service from Common Worship using books and service sheets instead of Power Point. One 8am BCP Holy Communion on the first Sunday of the month and one Evening Service at 6pm on the third Sunday. Our baptism services have changed to 12 midday on the first Sunday; and the burial of Ashes on a Sunday which is mutually convenient. We have also tried out a "Messy Church" for families at 3pm in our local C of E Primary School which turned out to be very encouraging and will be repeated again soon.

I would also like to offer a mid-week service of Holy Communion once a month on a Tuesday morning together with a coffee morning. However folk are invited to just come for coffee and cake and not receive Communion if they want. This gives us a chance to raise a bit of cash for church funds and have the church open during the week.

And so as our church community is in a state of transition - which is always difficult - we pray for God's guidance in seeking the right way forward as we manage change with grace and humility.



The Bishop of Tewkesbury, the Rt Revd Martyn Snow writes:

The Church is one of the largest voluntary organisations in the country. Like a tree which only flourishes because of its hidden but vast root system, so the Church can only flourish when every root and branch is healthy.

I once attended a voluntary sector training course in which we were each given a picture of

a tree and asked to decide where we would place ourselves on the tree. Am I a root who resources others and supports those in more visible places? Or am I right at the top of the tree, surveying the landscape and telling others what changes I see coming? Or am I sitting at the main junction of trunk and branches helping others to find their place in the tree?

Jesus spoke of the kingdom of God being like a tree which provides shelter and food for many people. However, finding our place on that tree is not always easy. We need to have a clear and honest understanding of our own gifts and abilities. We need to understand our preferred style of working (team or individual; task or relationship). And we need some insight into what motivates us (am I passionate about social justice or about church buildings?).



And once we have answered these questions (usually in conversation with others), we then need to know about specific roles and 'job opportunities' within our church or community, so that we find our place in the tree. Volunteering can be one of the most rewarding experiences in life. The church is truly blessed with so many faithful volunteers. But is it time you assessed your place on the tree?

Safer recruitment for volunteers

Volunteers are a huge part of church life-without your many hours of dedication, we would not be able to keep our church food banks, toddlers groups and fundraising events alive.

If your church is thinking of taking on new volunteers, make sure that you are following the Safer Recruitment processes and recommendations.

UPDATE ON THE CHURCH BUILDING RESTORATION PROGRAMME.

We are beginning to see positive signs of improvement to the Church's fabric and the Churchyard so I wanted to say a "thank you" to the volunteer working party on the morning of the VE Day weekend (Saturday 9 May - it was only the morning as Gloucester were playing at home that afternoon!). And thanks to Roger our Bell Captain for joining in the nationwide peal of bells at 11 o'clock.

We spruced up the graveyard and Remembrance gardens and inside undertook an inventory of furniture and books. Over time the Church has become somewhat cluttered as we don't have dedicated storage space. So to manage an effective "Spring Clean" we need to dispose of surplus furniture and hymn books. These can be sold, go to other churches if requested, or the books could go to our overseas Missions. Disposal isn't a simple matter however, as we have to obtain approval from the Diocesan authorities, but they have been very supportive so far.

Similarly we need to get Diocesan approval to remove or prune the major trees in the churchyard - particularly those at the east end of the North Aisle which are affecting the fabric - and we are engaging a professional tree surgeon to recommend the appropriate work. Maintenance work by Andrew and Mike to remove trees has already given us improved daylight to the south aisle (see the picture above) and Sheila is winning her personal war against encroaching ivy and brambles. So we hope you agree that things are looking much better, but there's still a long way to go.

We must of course remember, as David reminded us in his April article, that the Church is not just about the building - it's the people above all. So please support Reverend Christine and our congregation by joining us at Sunday Services - you will be most welcome.

Environmental Report

The Footpath Team (USCAN) has continued to do its excellent work in maintaining and improving our network of footpaths around the village. Everyone involved is a volunteer giving up their personal time to ensure those of you who enjoy walking around USL can do so using serviceable gates and stiles, clear signposts and paths clear of nettles, brambles and other undergrowth. I would like to thank the Group again on everyone's behalf for doing an excellent job.

The Parish Council has continued its work on grass cutting and tree maintenance around the village and thanks go to our Parish Clerk who coordinates the work throughout the year.

Last year, some members of USCAN proposed a project to the Parish Council to enhance the Village Green. The dividing hedge was removed, thanks in part to the footpath team, and this simple act opened up the whole green for all to see. The Village Sign was refurbished and some hard landscaping was introduced in front of the sign, including a couple of flower beds. This project was mainly driven by Carol Evans who worked hard to pull everything together leading to a really lovely grand opening day on 29 June 2014. Almost 300 people attended including local morris dancers and children from our local school who danced around a maypole. Its success has driven the decision to run an annual Village Fete, this year's being well publicised in this newsletter.

The lovely Cud Hill Common area has continued to be maintained through our annual cattle grazing arrangements. We have also successfully bid through Natural England for funding to support our environmental project and we are now in receipt of funding until 2024 which will help keep the common in good condition. Thanks to Roy Balgobin for his hard work in pulling our bid together.

Future Projects: We have been discussing how best to repair the track between Rooksmoor and Valley Lane over the last couple of years. Due to a lack of funding, this work has been delayed but the Parish Council has made a decision to do its best to improve the condition of this track and has ring-fenced funds for the work. Our County Councillor, Jason Bullingham has also committed a sum of money to this end and we thank him for his continued support. The initial works are to commence in the summer months.

The Council also intends to resurface the footpath that runs adjacent to the Village Green and it is hoped that this can be achieved in time for the Village Fete.

Finally, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to my fellow Council Members, its Clerk and all of the volunteers who have ensured that the village is maintained to a very high standard.

PLANNING REPORT

Our workload this year was busier than last, with 52 formal applications against 46 the previous year. These were considered by us, and usually Stroud District Council agreed with our recommendations. The Bowden Hall Farm application was eventually granted outline planning permission, much to the Parish Council's dismay. The site is now up for sale; to date we have received no detailed application for building. Villagers can keep up to date on this and other planning applications by visiting the Parish website.

Changes have taken place regarding the established planning procedures and we are still waiting for government agreement regarding the Stroud District Local Plan covering the next 15 years. Hearings on the Local Plan took place in May. Let us hope that the Secretary of State will now agree the plan and that later in the year it will be in place. RECREATION REPORT

Spring 2015 finds the Recreation Ground generally in very good shape. The playing surface is in a good condition, having had the benefit of a relatively mild winter. Our facilities are looking excellent with our still relatively new play ground equipment and ongoing improvements at the Pavilion in the form of a recently installed kitchen make over.

Further improvements are on the way with new cricket nets to be provided by the Cricket Club as soon as fund raising permits.

In the near future (date to be announced) the telecommunications mast at the side of the pitch will be replaced by a slightly higher mast at the same location. The Parish Council has negotiated to ensure that trees screening the base are retained and that construction vehicle disruption is minimised with any turf damage restored at company cost. It may not be generally known that the Parish Council receives an annual rental for the mast which is ring-fenced to ensure that the income is reserved for expenditure only on the Recreation Ground.

Concerns about motorway noise continue to be a problem on the Recreation Ground, as elsewhere, and the Parish Council continues to press the Highways Agency to replace the outworn noise reduction surface. Replacement is overdue, but it is hoped that lobbying will lead to reinstatement of the carriageway resurfacing programme, originally planned for 2015.

The Rec. continues to be well used for a wide variety of recreational activities. Cricket, football and tennis are the traditional sports on the site but relative newcomers, tug of war and petanque are proving very popular. In addition we now have a Coopers Edge Cricket Team using the pitch (parts of Coopers Edge are, of course, within our Parish). A mention must also be made of the Glebe Field where an off-lead dog exercising area is provided. This is a very well used facility and discourages poor dog control on other parts of the Rec (where dogs must be kept on a lead).

Informal enjoyment of the Rec has been much enhanced in recent months by the provision of a wildlife walk, designed and constructed by USCAN volunteers. The site is located near to the Tug of War track.

All the sports clubs are actively seeking new members and contact details can be found on the club websites (see below). USL Life is also carrying regular articles about the Clubs using the Rec., including details of progress in local competitions.

Finally, I would like to express a sincere thank you on behalf of all Recreation Ground users to two stalwart volunteers - Andy Russell our Pavilion Manager who takes bookings and oversees pavilion maintenance, and Richard Stephenson who ensures night time security by checking the Pavilion and locking the car park gates every evening after dark.

I was at the end of my tether; I had nowhere else left to go, What would have happened tomorrow, well I simply don't know. All my options had been exhausted, I was about to give up all hope, I had contemplated with suicide, with the help of a long piece of rope.

They tell me I am one in a hundred, of people they get through the door, Each week as their numbers are growing, does this government realise the score? We're living in the 21st century, this shouldn't be happening today! To all those who donate to foodbanks, THANK YOU is all I can say.
