# Public Consultation on village improvements

We were originally hoping to hold this in May but the date had to be changed, so apologies for any confusion ! The revised date is now Thursday 15 June 2017.

#### **Village Improvements**

As a reminder, the Parish Council are looking at a number of ideas submitted by residents, and if there is sufficient interest and demand we intend to apply for grants to help part fund their purchase. We would like to see as many of you as possible on the day and will be in the Pavilion from 1400 until 1900 to give as many of you as possible the opportunity to give your input.

Specific ideas we are looking for input on include the following :

- Outdoor Gym Equipment ( to be located at our Recreation Ground if we went ahead )
- Children's Multi-Play Equipment ( possible location in Woodland Green area )

We are also considering the placement of several benches within the village and would welcome iideas on locations.

#### Why Consult?

As mentioned above, we need residents to come along to the Pavilion and give us their views, enabling us to :

- Evaluate the demand and potential useage of any equipment we may go for
- Decide on the type of equipment we may purchase
- Provide evidence that we have sought input thus strengthening any grant applications for equipment funding

There will be light refreshments available during the afternoon / early evening and we would be very grateful for your support if you are able to spare the time.

We will only commit to spending public money if we believe it will enhance village facilities, and most importantly get used.

A charity cricket match between USLCC and a Lord's Taverners team consisting of an array of celebrities from stage and screen and ex professional cricket players.




Spectators are asked to make a donation to watch the event. Refreshments are available all day.

### **Upton St Leonards Parish Council - Annual Report 2017**

#### Chairman's Report: Cllr Keith Pearson

Once again I should like to take this opportunity to thank all members of the Council for their hard work during the past year. This has been another busy year for the Council. The main thrust of our efforts was to try to get some action on the Motorway noise that the Village has suffered for long enough. I am of course very pleased to be able to say that we did achieve a result, in that after much badgering of the authorities at the highest level, including the Roads Minister, we managed to get Highways England to bring forward their resurfacing works for a low noise surface by 2 years or so. Our efforts will not stop there and we will continue to push for improvements to the noise barriers as well. Last Summer saw the Village hold another Village Day, although this was not originally planned as we agreed to hold it every two years, but as it was the Queen's 90th birthday celebration we felt it right to join in. This was once again organised by a small Committee headed up by Carol Evans; thanks to all for a job well done. The Village Hall, the Church and the Upton St Leonards Playgroup all benefited from the funds raised, thank you to all who supported us. The Chairs of Committees will outline the highlights of this year below.

I have once again enjoyed the privilege of chairing an excellent Parish Council, which has the benefit of an excellent Clerk, thanks again to all.

#### **Recreation Committee: Cllr David Hunt**

A stand out moment in the past 12 months at the Rec has been the success enjoyed by the USL 1<sup>st</sup> Team (Football) who are Stroud League winners, earning promotion to the Gloucestershire Northern Senior League for the first time in the club's history. Many congratulations to all involved and best wishes for the season to come.

Ground conditions are generally good following a mild winter and spring .The new cricket nets provided by the Cricket Club last year are a quality facility and are already being intensively used. Recent repainting of the hardcourt surface by the Tennis Club has produced a revitalised 'as new' appearance which is much appreciated. In recent months, at the edge of the pitch, the Telecom mast has been upgraded and provided with a fenced in compound to ensure security. It should be noted that rental from the mast is an important contribution to the running costs of the grounds and pavilion.

Improvements at the Pavilion have been made and are ongoing. New easier to clean flooring has been installed on the ground floor, and motion switched lighting fitted. WiFi has been introduced to improve facilities in the function room. Outside work is currently being undertaken to improve and extend the patio area.

Consideration is now being given to the possible introduction of an outdoor gym for adults (apparently we all need more exercise!) A possible siting for the exercise equipment could be on the edge of the Glebe Field adjacent to the children's playground. A consultation process, asking for your views, is about to commence (see USL Life and Notice Boards for further details). USCAN continues to maintain and manage an interesting wildflower walk on the boundary between the Rec and the Glebe Field.

Andy Russell continues as volunteer Pavilion Manager and I would like to extend a formal thank you for the considerable time and effort he devotes to this. Thank you also to Richard Stevenson who ensures the parking area is locked at night.

Finally, the Recreation Ground can be booked for special events by private organisations/clubs etc, subject to no detriment to the facility's main users. A constraining factor when considering this is the restricted on-site car parking, and the council is monitoring this to ensure that bookings do not cause undue problems for neighbours.

#### Environment Committee: Cllr Peter Wilson

All of the good activities that make our village such a nice place to live have continued over the last year. Our USCAN volunteers have done another sterling job of maintaining our footpaths through their weekly efforts on a Tuesday morning. They have organised litter picks, helped maintain several areas around USL and Cud Hill which are owned by the Parish Council. They have also greatly improved the church grounds over the last 12 months. We have also continued with our cattle grazing arrangements which contribute to keeping Cud Hill in good condition. Our Parish Clerk organises grass cutting in various areas of the village eg the Village Green, and liaises with our Water Warden to ensure our water courses are kept clear. During a Council meeting earlier in the year we agreed to go out to residents via our village newsletter to ask for improvement ideas. As a result we are currently working on a number of areas including restricting vehicle speeds (in conjunction with Highways), siting benches in different places, providing outdoor gym equipment for adults (see Recreation Report) and play equipment for children. Updates on all the ideas will be covered in USL Life as progress is made.

Another improvement already implemented is the Christmas Tree (with lights) on the Village Green, and feedback received has been very positive.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the Parish Clerk for all his support through the year, and every volunteer who has made a contribution to keeping our village in excellent condition.

### Planning Committee: Cllr Chrissie Castle

Formal applications for planning in the village this year were up, at 46 compared to 32 last year. We have seen the completion of the small development on the Ash Path and the nearly completed development of two bungalows on Bondend Road. Most applications were for extensions/modifications to homes as people opt to renovate rather than move. The current stamp duty levels may well have something to do with this. The building of bungalows has allowed people to downsize and so release larger homes for families to buy. More homes have also been built in Coopers Edge but this will now be the last of the homes on that site which will come within our parish.

The planning objections at Prinknash were considered and the application has been turned down, much to the relief of those who would have been affected. We have still received no further news on the development of the land by Bowden Hall although we understand the land has now been sold to a developer. We are waiting for more information regarding the application for some 650 homes on Winnycroft Road. The committee has raised concerns regarding the impact of these homes being built, even though they are outside our area for planning, as we feel they will have an adverse impact regarding traffic in the village.

As a reminder, planning meetings are held on the first Monday of each month prior to the Parish Council Meetings, and all are always welcome.

### Allotment Report: Cllr Hilary Morris

The last year has been very successful for the allotment society. As fast as sites become available, particularly at Perry Orchard, they are quickly let. It seems we may need to start a waiting list for Perry Orchard soon.

The big thank you has to go to the allotment managers for their hard work, and particularly to Carol Evans who did a stalwart job helping Roy and myself with the contract renewals. Her spreadsheets are invaluable. We also have to say a thank you to some allotment holders for their assistance on occasions.

The Parish Council has received many compliments about the standard of care the allotment holders put into their plots. Perry Orchard in particular has been praised as it is in the middle of the village and gives a very good impression of how much care is given. Thank you all very much.

I am informed that Carol has details of someone who does rotavating and also maintenance of equipment, should allotment holders need help.

It is hoped that a BBQ will be arranged this year in Perry Orchard.

I have to advise all allotment holders that with effect from 1st April 2018 the fees for allotments will rise, to help cover the increased costs we are experiencing. The costs will be £20 for a full plot and £10 for half a plot. The costs have been posted at each site.

#### Finance: Roy Balgobin Clerk

The Accounts for the year ended 2017 show a deficit of £363.63 for the year. The Council received income of £47,645 of which £33,000 is made up of the precept. The expenditure covers the upkeep of the Pavilion, the Recreation Ground, allotments, Village Green, and also ensuring that the high standards of maintenance are achieved throughout the village. # Revd Clodagh writes . . .

Some months ago I was asked by a friend, 'How will you begin your new job?' She had just heard that I had been appointed to the role of Priest in Charge at St Leonard's in Upton on a half time basis. It struck me as a great question.



# Focus on The Barnwood Trust

In this the second of the occasional series about the best and least well known charitable trusts based in Gloucestershire, our focus is on the **Barnwood Trust**. Today's article is a <u>very</u> condensed version of the charity's history which spans 200 hundred years. Its journey tells us much about the passion of people to pursue an ideal and has everything from philanthropy and aspiration to deceit and duplicity. There is more information about the charity's history available online.

The Trust had its roots in the philanthropic movement of the late eighteenth century which sought to improve the care and conditions of people with a mental illness. In January 1792 the Governors of the then Gloucester Infirmary wanted to extend the remit of the Infirmary to provide suitable care for the mentally ill. And in 1794 a subscription list was opened for the purpose of raising funds to build a separate hospital. In 1811 land in Horton Road, Gloucester was purchased. By the middle of 1812 the fund amounted to £11,000, but this was deemed insufficient to proceed with building works, so the Subscribers joined forces with the magistrates of the County and the City of Gloucester to realise their ambitions of building a new hospital. This was finally achieved in 1823. The crescent shaped building in Horton Road still stands today and has now been converted to residential apartments.

The intention of the Subscribers at that time was that the County and City authorities would be responsible for the cost of caring for those on parish relief, the wealthy patients would pay for their own care, and those in need but not qualified to receive parish relief would be subsidised from fees paid by the wealthy patients. (Nothing changes!) This latter group were known as the "charity patients". However, this scheme eventually proved unsatisfactory as the two parties to the union had incompatible aims. In short, the local authorities were using the income from the wealthy patients to subsidise the parish relief part of the hospital, which had the effect of excluding the "charity patients" group. A new agreement was established in 1846 and the County and City had to pay back sums "credited in error"! This new arrangement was not to last and a final break was made in 1856 when by agreement the City and County bought out the Subscribers' (i.e. the Trustees) share of the property and assets. This paved the way for the Trustees to make a fresh start in making provision for those of "easy means" and those "educated persons of moderate means" (i.e the middle classes) for whom there was no provision following the breakdown between the local authorities and the trustees. This was finally achieved by the purchase of a substantial property in Barnwood Road in 1858 and the opening of the hospital for up to one hundred patients in 1860. It took five years before the hospital became self-supporting, and over the following decades, right into the 20<sup>th</sup> century, the hospital grew to accommodate 400 patients and acquired much land and property in and around Gloucester to provide food for the hospital and recreation for the patients.

Its success - due to the high standard of its care and innovative treatments - made the hospital a very wellregarded organisation, even allowing it to escape nationalisation following the NHS Act 1946. However, by the 1960s it became apparent that the hospital was no longer sustainable when patients could receive free care and treatment from the NHS. The decision was made to sell the assets of the Trust and start afresh once more. Nothing now remains of the Barnwood House Hospital, except for the arboretum behind it that is now maintained by the City. The story continues, and an account of the Trust's more recent history and work today will follow in a later edition.

#### Things to do in your Garden / Allotment in June

I remember my father telling me about the old saying "Ne'er cast a clout till May be out" which meant it's wise not to plant tender plants until the end of May when all signs of frost are gone. We also celebrate the longest day on the 21<sup>st</sup> of June, which encourages extra light and warmth to put on a burst of growth, which also means weeds will sprout up from nowhere.

So here are a few things you can be going on with in your patch. Hoe borders to keep down weeds, pinch out side shoots on tomatoes, harvest lettuce and early potatoes, put out hanging baskets and summer bedding, stake plants, mow lawns at least once a week. If you have planted sweet peas, keep picking to encourage more blooms, and dead head roses. Remember to open vents and doors in the greenhouse on hot days.

In the Vegetable patch, you can now plant out courgettes, squash, outdoor tomatoes, and it's not too late to plant runner beans and any other legumes. Also keep planting your salad seeds. Everything benefits from a good feed at this time of year.

**Update on my Soya Beans.** First two tries and planting seed only one plant survived. Last week I bought some more seeds and third time lucky I have plants two inches tall. I will plant them out this month and let you know how they are doing. **Carol Evans**





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# We will Remember Them

#### **HENRY HOPKINS**

Henry was born in Tuffley in 1897, the son of Frederick and Phoebe Hopkins. His father was an Upton man, and after Henry was born the family moved back to the Village, living in "Bick's Brook, Portway" (according to the 1901 census). Henry attended Upton School from February 1901. He enlisted at age 16 into the 1/5th, Gloucestershire Regiment, with service number 240652, He was wounded in 1916, but returned to active service and was killed in action during the battle for Cambrai on 5 April 1917, aged 19. He is buried in Unicorn Cemetery north of St Quetin, France.

(The Village War memorial shows his name in the panel for deaths in 1916, and as a result, our researchers missed his name for the correct centenary of April 1917 for this magazine).

#### LUTHER HARDY

This month marks the centenary of the death in WWI of another young man from Upton, Luther Hardy. Luther wasn't Upton born and bred, in fact he was born in the city of Lincoln in 1888. He became a gardener, and moved to Upton in about 1912, probably to work at one of the large houses in the Village. Luther signed up in the very first days of the war, and was in a cycle brigade of the Worcestershire Regiment, service number 15650. In 1916 he transferred to the Army Cycle Corps (service number 5389) and was killed by an enemy shell near Dunkirk on 27 June 1917, aged 29. He is buried in Dunkirk Town Cemetry. Luther was unmarried - next of kin at his death was in fact his grandfather - he was orphaned at a very young age and brought up by his grandparents.

# The Whittle Walk

Jet Age Museum staff have plotted a route called The Whittle and Wildflowers Walk, round the former

Brockworth airfield site. As its name implies, the walk is a tribute to the work of Sir Frank Whittle in designing the world's first jet engine.

It also commemorates the work of the Gloster Aircraft Company which designed and contructed the first British aircraft powered by this 'world shrinking' invention, all achieved in the early years of WW2. The walk was opened in early April this year by Ian Whittle, son of Sir Frank.

The walk is about 4 miles long, through parts of what is now the Gloucester Business Park and Coopers Edge development. On the walk's southern and western legs, it passes through the Hucclecote wildlife meadows and the fields in the village that border Coopers Edge.
