### **TWYVER WI MEETING MAY 2024**

# Warning: this report contains some shocking details and is not for the faint-hearted. *Ed.*

Meeting on a rainy evening after two days of amazing sunshine didn't dampen our spirits and we began with our Speaker for the evening, Dorothy Cook, Midwife and Public Speaker on Tales of the Midwife. Dorothy started by telling us that being a midwife was nothing like watching BBC's saga *Call the Midwife*!

Dorothy has been in the midwifery world for 44 years, and admitted this service is suffering bad press at the moment. She told us that a report is due, inspections having finished last Christmas. Unfortunate situations happen, such as a case where 16 midwives are due to turn up for work and only 4 arrive. Chaos ensues on the wards.

Nowadays students of midwifery have to pay £10K per year for their training, which is separate from a nursing degree. When Dorothy started out in her career, nursing was the primary objective and then, at the end of that training, they could go on if they wished to specialise, but things have changed. She finds it magical and a privilege to welcome new life, but women lose their voices and confidence in the system and admission rates are going down. There is not enough training especially for emergencies and midwives are there to be the voice of the mum.

She regaled us with tales from the delivery room both funny and poignant – one story took us by surprise, of a lady who was in labour who declared she had just shaken hands with her baby! This had never been heard of, but sure enough, upon examination, the baby's hand was extended and its little sharp nails were scratching her leg. They rushed her to the operating room for an emergency C-section and all went well. Another story involved naming the baby – a nurse thought the name on the tag was Baby Rio – in fact it was Baby Room 10!

Another funny and really remarkable tale involved a lady who asked if sperm could live inside a woman for

16 months – her husband had been in prison and was due to come out, so she was concocting a story. When she was told no, this wasn't possible, she replied: "Plan B then" – we don't know what that plan was, but it would have to have been a good one!

One couple wanted their baby to be born on a white horse – the one on the plains at Chippenham – where it was apparently conceived – so the team obliged by setting up a tent under the stars and the baby came into the world just as they wanted.

Post-natal doesn't really exist now like it used to and things have changed a lot over the years from people keeping placentas to bury in gardens and make drinks - !!! – to one man actually biting off the placenta at his wife's request – she said it was the least he could do.

Dorothy spent time in Oman, in the Middle East, where ancient apothecaries' remedies such as frankincense and myrrh are still used in healing. She was horrified to see all the women in labour who had been subjected to female genital mutilation (FGM) at 8 years of age. Some of these women were very young, and had had several babies by the time they were 18. Enemas were made of carbolic soap and water. The same tube was used for each patient and never cleaned. The women would squat to have their babies, so both enema and baby usually came out together causing cross infection. FGM leaves only a small aperture for urine and blood to pass so consequently giving birth for these women is very dangerous and leads to tissue loss and a lifetime of pain and suffering.

To end on a lighter note, after discussing the nonexistent and banned use of contraception in that part of the world, we swung back to Glasgow, Dorothy's origins, to the story of a woman who decided to use an empty crisp packet to prevent conception. The mind boggles! Are we so different in our 'civilised' society?

Footnote: Hundreds of women die each year from poor, or lack, of maternal care and knowledge, administration and nursing – it has to change.



We are having our annual outing on Thursday June 20th at 2pm to St Paul's Church, Shurdington. It is a medieval village church set next to the

village green and borders the fields leading away to Cheltenham and Badgeworth. Its most striking feature is the fine broach spire of elegant proportion reaching to 110 feet. The church is thus higher than it is in length! As a smaller intimate building inside it's a special place and the interior features a rare 13th century font and fine 12th century sturdy chancel arch. The Church Warden will be telling us about the history of the building and there are also two "Denny" windows to see, both dedicated to local parishioners exhibiting personal things to look for.

The cost is £4 which includes drinks and cakes served by their Mothers Union Branch and those attending will be using their own transport. There is plenty of parking available alongside the church. Visitors are welcome to join us so please contact me on the number shown below.

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### Chairman's Report: Cllr Chrissie Castle

This has been another challenging year for the Parish with high inflation and the costs of all services rising. Hopefully, as this report goes out, there will be better times ahead with inflation finally dropping. I would like to thank all the volunteers, both councillors and parish members, who help to keep our wonderful village looking so lovely and things running smoothly.

As more legislation is passed to the Parish Council (PC) for implementation, the workload of our clerk has somewhat increased and to this end we recruited Tracy Slator. She has proved invaluable as an assistant to Roy the clerk who continually works hard to keep us up to date on all things regarding the running of the parish.

We have had to raise our PC charge this year due to all the increased costs for maintaining our building and sports grounds, play equipment, maintenance of Cud Hill, grass cutting, and grants to various village organisations etc. We are considering various projects in the coming year including upgrading our website, as well as making a contribution along with Hucclecote and Brockworth parishes to provide youth provisions in Coopers Edge. We are also hoping to provide 2 Speedwatch cameras for Churchfield Road as traffic increases due to the new houses at Winnycroft. We are also adding information signs at either end of the village on the amenities available for visitors to our area.

As you are all aware, utilities and contractors' fees have drastically risen but we still have one of the cheapest precepts among the Town/Parish precepts in the Stroud District. With a monetary increase of only 33p per week for a band D property we hope to be able to maintain all our current services and keep well within the prescribed budget.

### Highways

Meetings have been held with Highways regarding the junction of Bondend with Rance Pitch and Churchfield Road where cars often cut the corner and where it is difficult to cross the road for pedestrians. We have asked for dropped curbs and an official crossing on Churchfield Road but without success so far. We are also attempting to have the potholes filled and roads repaired both on Nuthill and Portway but have been told there is no money left and that is already allocated for 2026/27.

We are fighting this, along with our County Councillor, who has requested a meeting with the senior highways team. We have also requested dropped curbs to ensure there is a circular route for pushchairs etc. around the village.

### Retirements

As I write we are aware that a long serving member of the council, Graham Hayes, has decided to retire after some 41 years on the PC.

His knowledge of the village has been invaluable, having lived here all his life, and we all owe him for his dedication and the time he has given. We wish him well in the future.

### Meetings

By the time this report has been issued the elections will have taken place on 2 May and any new members on the parish council will attend the next PC meeting for the first time in May on a date to be announced. All members of the parish are welcome to attend, and the meetings are normally held on the first Monday of each month at 7.30pm upstairs in the sports pavilion. The dates are available on both the website and notice boards.

Once again recognition must be given to our volunteers of the various groups who are always looking for new helpers. More young people with fresh ideas are more than welcome. Below you will see reports regarding other aspects of work we do on the Parish Council.

### Planning Report: Cllr Keith Pearson

This year was a fairly normal year for planning applications, in fact probably a little less than in recent years. The Council considered 30 applications over the year, in the main these were supported as they were generally acceptable extensions etc. We did have several where the Council felt it was not in the interest of the Parish to support and in most of those cases the District Council was inclined to agree. There were no major applications at all in the Parish during the year, but residents will have noticed that the Bowden Hall Farm development has progressed and at present appears very near completion. Currently 3 dwellings have been sold, plus the 5 affordable homes which are we believe, going to City Homes. The Stroud Local plan is still being considered and if approved does not include any large development plans for Upton Parish. However there are difficulties with the submitted plan due to major road infrastructure being seen as inadequate for the planned sites, this may cause a rethink of the whole plan, we await the Inspector's verdict.

### Environment Report: Cllr Peter Wilson

It has been another positive year for Upton with the usual activities supported by the Parish Council.

### The day Job

Based on previous reports, you will be familiar with the regular activities supported by your Parish Council (PC). These include grass cutting, monthly paid litter picks, maintenance of the Recreation Ground (including Glebe Field) and much more.

We also lobby people like Highways England, trying to reduce our risk of flooding in certain areas of the village and trying to improve other issues like road safety.

Another body we work with is Gloucestershire County Council Flood Risk Management Team who have been doing a lot of upstream improvement work. This has had positive effects downstream but there is still more work to do. There is always an ongoing focus on how we can improve the village and are currently reviewing a number of ideas submitted to the council for consideration. Our local newsletter, USL Life, continues to provide an important communication link between the PC and village residents with such things as road closures, any work with government agencies and how we try to improve Upton by asking for views. We provided a grant in December 2023 to ensure USL Life covered its expenses during the year. My usual thanks go to Roy Balgobin (Parish Clerk) who works hard in the background to provide advice to councillors and helps make many of the things mentioned happen each year. He is now ably helped by Tracy Slator who joined the council in October 2023.

#### Thanks to the Footpath Team

We are very grateful for the hard work of the Footpath Team, who, in addition to their core work, help repair, maintain and prepare the Cud Hill area so cattle can be placed there to control growth and allow certain plants/flowers to flourish. The cattle will already be at Cud Hill as you read this report. The team's work makes a valuable contribution to our agreement with Natural England on how we manage Cud Hill and in turn we receive a small grant each year which contributes to the associated costs incurred.

The village volunteers who make up the footpath team have done their usual great job of keeping our network of footpaths maintained and usable by all in Upton and many who travel into Upton to enjoy the lovely countryside that surrounds our village.

They also organise occasional litter picks (over and above the regular ones funded by the parish council) where local volunteers help to keep Upton looking tidy.

### What has happened in the last 12 months

A snapshot of things that have been supported by the parish council in the last 12 months is shown below: -

1. Continued to look after the trees planted on the Glebe Field (supported by helpful dog walkers who keep an eye on them)

2. Named the owl on the village green through residents' ideas (Ollie was successful!!)

3. We have tried very hard to get Highways to help Upton with a number of issues such as flooding prevention, road safety, ANPRS (automatic number plate recognition systems) and poor road surface conditions e.g. Portway and Nut Hill. We have essentially been faced with a lack of funding which has frustrated our efforts as a council but we continue to push 4. Supported a village Climate Group to see what we can do collectively as a village to minimise our impact on the wider global climate (3 parish councillors are members and 2 residents). You will have seen a number of articles in USL Life advising on things like saving money, using repair cafes, encouraging an e-bike hire scheme (no interest was shown) and effective recycling (over and above the district council's arrangements) to name a few. The climate group is currently developing a biodiversity policy which will inform everything we do to support our local environment. This will be shared with residents when completed and agreed by the parish council

5. Provided financial support to the village newsletter team (USL Life) to close the gap on advertising revenue received and annual operating costs incurred

6. Asked village residents for ideas to improve the village. They are being considered by the council and any decisions and progress will be communicated through our newsletter

In summary, my usual thanks to council colleagues, Roy and Tracy and all the volunteers who really make a difference around our village across many activities through the year. They all make a difference to the environment we live in and make Upton such a nice place.

#### **Recreation Report: Cllr David Hunt**

We have all experienced the consequences of a record rainfall over the past few months, with highway flooding, soggy lawns and impassable field paths. Not surprisingly, the Recreation Ground has been badly affected on occasions, with football games postponed and now our cricketers wondering if the new season will be delayed. Hopefully a drier spell of weather will be coming our way but in the meantime, works (micro drilling ) have recently been undertaken, to improve the soccer pitch drainage, and a major overhaul of pitch drainage is proposed for which a grant is now being sought.

Our local football team merged with Robinswood Athletic at the end of the 2023 season and the future of the club is looking good with a positive family vibe being widely enjoyed. The club has recently been awarded Accredited Club status by the F.A. acknowledging that the club is well run and efficient. As the season closes, after a poor start, our local 1st team is now picking up points and hoping to avoid the relegation zone. The reserves have been relegated with one game to play but they have made it to a cup final. U16s have had a good season and are hoping for runners-up spot with two games to play. U13s have enjoyed a fantastic season, undefeated and top of their league with a Cup Final on the 27th April.

The cricket season is about to commence - whatever the weather!. Good news is that cricket only suffered 5 rain cancellations in 2023 and many clubs were worse off! During the last season Upton hosted 17 adult home games and 21 youth games. Coopers Edge played 5 games here.

The club now has 2 adult Saturday teams and youth teams in the U9/U11/U13 and U15 groups. There is an adult game played every Wednesday with Sunday friendlies now and then. Do come and watch!

Our tennis hardcourts may be less affected by ground conditions but clearly members would also welcome a drier climate. From a total club membership of 60, Club mornings are well attended. The Club had a very good 2023 with Ladies Doubles promoted to Division 3 in the forthcoming Dunlop Glos. Summer League. The Mixed Doubles also achieved a Winter League promotion to Division 3, and we now have a 2nd team entered in the Men's League. With drier weather the Club will be replacing the court side hut, with court repainting planned for May.

The Petanque Club is also weather sensitive and on occasions the 'piste' has been waterlogged after heavy rain. The new season starts soon with the Early Bird Competition. Club games take place on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday at 1.30pm. A team plays local clubs in the Cotswold League and the club holds internal tournaments (Keith Smith Trophy and Yorke Shield ) The Club invites new members to come and join in what is a fun game with gentle exercise. Spare 'boules' are available for anyone wishing to give it a try.

All clubs are inviting new members and contact details can be obtained from the Parish Clerk or from the club websites.

Our Pavilion is due for further maintenance, including external painting, when the weather permits. In this respect I would like to thank club volunteers for their valuable assistance with pavilion and grounds maintenance generally, over the past 12 months.

Finally, a special 'thank you' to Andy Russell for all his work in helping to maintain our Pavilion.

### Allotment Report: Clir Mary McLachlan

Both sites are mostly doing well in general. David Fleming has taken on the role as Allotment Manager for Perry Orchard and is doing a fantastic job. We hope to be sorting out the boundaries between plots as soon as the weather permits so they can be better defined as to what they are i.e. full or half plots. There are a few plots on Stanley that need a good tidy up and we are still trying to keep the manure heap under control so it doesn't spread onto the car park area. Hopefully this will be a project for the summer and when the weather improves!? My sincere thanks to both David Fleming and Peter Macey for the tremendous amount of work they undertake as Voluntary Allotment Managers.

### Coopers Edge Report: Cllr Matt Sergeant

Over the past year, Coopers Edge has suffered an increase from anti-social behaviour that has resulted in damage to the community centre and various children's parks within the parish. There have also been threats to residents. Parish councillors from Upton, Hucclecote and Brockworth parishes have worked with Stroud District Council, Bromford Housing Association and the Police to address these issues. This has resulted in three teenage perpetrators having served community service orders under police observation. It is worth noting that two of the three teenagers are not residents of Coopers Edge. Working with the police has seen a detainment order covering the community centre to address any future anti-social behaviour occurring in that vicinity.

As a result of the anti-social behaviour the community centre has removed elements of the building that could be climbed or used to damage other property. Whilst this has resulted in a cost being occurred by the community centre, I am pleased to report that the centre is in a good financial position and has continued to see growth since lockdown restrictions were removed. Utilisation of the centre remains high. We have seen a new church form and use the centre and we held our first Upton parish council meeting in March 2024. Deli Edge remains a destination eatery which has helped attract footfall to the centre.

The Community Trust has facilitated a variety of community events throughout the year, with highlights being a Christmas and Summer event that included free children's activities, craft stalls for independent traders and visits from Father Christmas and Micky Mouse!

There is due to be public art installed around Coopers Edge, and I would like to thank Cllr Hunt for his involvement in ensuring the display boards will reflect the aviation history linked to the area.

Whilst not in the parish or district, the sports facilities went out to tender by Tewkesbury Council. The successful bidder for the site was Barnwood United. At present it is not clear when the site will be operational.

The allotments have yet to be transferred to the Coopers Edge Trustees ownership by Stroud Council, however an allotment committee has been formed. I would like to thank the parish clerk for the advice he provided to community trustees to help facilitate the formation of an allotment committee.

Gauntlet Road/Sapphire Way remains in poor condition due to the developer not having done appropriate works to enable the road to be adopted. I would like to thank County Cllr Sue Williams for providing clarification as to who was ultimately responsible for the condition of the road as it has helped local residents understand the issue.

We still have a vacancy on the Parish Council The basic requirement is to attend 11 meetings per year (there are no meetings in August) and people from all backgrounds are very welcome and this improves our debate and decisions. 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# Gloucestershire Prepares for D-Day "The Longest Day"

Preparation and planning had been under way for more than two years. The arrival n this country of thousands of American troops signalled something big was about to happen. Areas of the country became even more restricted than before. American troops camped in Cranham Woods, an emergency hospital was built in Cheltenham. Roads to thes south coast were jammed with military vehicles. The railways were expanded with new marshalling yards, the line between Gloucester and Cheltenham was increased to four tracks. The many airfields in Gloucestershire were receiving new aircraft and gliders.

Invasion rehearsals took place, including a beach landing at Slapton Sands Dorset on 30<sup>th</sup> April 1944, which went terribly wrong when American landing ships were attacked by German torpedo boats. The exercise was called *Tiger* and 946 Americans died. The whole thing was kept secret and their next of kin were told they died in action. They did not know the exercise was preparation for a landing on Utah beach.

Those taking part did not know their destination until 48 hours before they boarded their ships or planes. They were then forbidden to leave camp or communicate with anyone. Due to a very well planned deception the Germans knew an invasion would come at some time but they did not know where. Crossing the channel from Dover was the obvious place, but the French ports were too well defended, so the largest invasion fleet in history was to head for Normandy.

First to land would be the glider and parachute troops, they would leave from numerous airfields, some in Gloucestershire:

• Aston Down saw gliders, which had tail sections made locally by Taylors Limited of Griffiths Mill, Bowbridge. This airfield remained under MOD control until 2002, it has since been sold to the Cotswold Gliding Club.

• Down Ampney was used by Dakotas towing gliders in the early hours of D-Day. The airfield closed in April 1946.

• Fairford in the early hours of D-Day 45 Stirlings took off with paratroops to land and hold bridges over the River Orme. After the war it was used as the BAC Flight Centre, the home of Concorde 002. It is now the home base for USAF B-52 bombers, U-2s and B-2s. It is also the home of the worlds largest air show.

• Moreton Valence was used as a training and refresher unit. In 1943 hangers were built for by Gloster Aircraft Company to house aircraft flown from Brockworth, before being ferried by female pilots to operational stations. The last aircraft left the airfield in July 1962, which was a Javelin. The M5 motorway now runs down the main runway.

• Kemble in May 1944 C-47 aircraft arrived to collect Horsa Gliders to carry American troops. In 2000 the airfield was sold by the MOD to Kemble Heritage Group.

• South Cerney was a training base and used as a dormitory station for Brize Norton. On 1<sup>st</sup> July 1971 it became the Duke of Gloucester Barracks of 29<sup>th</sup> Regiment of the Royal Logistic Corps.

The scale of Operation Overlord can be seen when the following airfields are also included – Bibury, Filton, Northleach, Staverton, Moreton-in-Marsh and Little Rissington. All these airfields were made ready for the invasion which was planned for the 5<sup>th</sup> June.

This was cancelled until the 6<sup>th</sup> June due to bad weather over the channel. Once landed the allies and the Germans

knew the first 24 hours would be critical to halt the invasion. The German Commander of the Atlantic Wall, as they called it, was Field Marshall Erwin Rommel. Due to the bad weather he thought the invasion would not take place so he had gone home to Germany for his wife's birthday, as a present he had bought her a pair of shoes in Paris

Rommel realised that where ever the invasion came the first 24 hours would be "DER LANGSTE TAG" – "THE LONGEST DAY". **Mike Stratford.**
