
Clocks Change

TWYVER WI News - February Report



For the past year, the WI, along with hundreds of other organisations, has worked to raise awareness of climate change and show politicians that there is a strong mandate to make tackling climate change a priority. Twyver members happily embraced the wearing of the

green heart during their monthly meeting, to show their support and this February, members across the country will show their love for all the things that are affected by climate change.

After the conclusion of the usual notices, President Margaret Buckley welcomed our speaker for the evening, Magistrate Celia Hargrave. Celia both enlightened and delighted us with her humorous interactive delivery of all



things connected with the Magisterial world. Whilst we learned that the judicial system in England and Wales dated back to 1195 we also learned that the only Magistrates' court in the whole of Gloucestershire is now in Cheltenham, with Gloucester and Stroud Courts being closed in the last few months. Celia, (a former headteacher), has been a Magistrate for twenty years, acts as an Appraiser amongst her peers and also works in the Family Courts. So, with this vast experience she was able to recreate numerous scenarios at will and suddenly Twyver members found themselves 'answerable' to some of the less serious criminal cases, such as minor theft, criminal damage, assaults, public disorder and motoring offences - that would be typically addressed in the Magistrates' Court. Amidst the banter that ensued, there was a renewed appreciation of what a significant role is played by the Magistrates; and especially to their dedication to ensure that fairness is the essence of everything they do and all this is voluntary! A truly gifted and inspirational lady.

Our next meeting will be held on Monday, 13th March at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall. Our speaker will be the GFWI County Chairwoman, Anne Turner who will talk to us about Centenary Celebrations in 2019. Visitors are always welcome.

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

Letter to The Editor

The article last month about John Speed's historic (1600's) map of the area asked about the village of "Nework" showing between Gloucester and Hempsted. Janet Carr emailed us to say the current Ordinance Survey maps still show an area labelled as "Newark" just to the north of Hempsted and south of the landfill site.



There is no village there now, only Newark House, on Honeythorne Close. IIt is dated 1830 but incorporates parts of a 17th Century house that used to be there.

Janet also pointed out that in Tuffley there is a Newark Road. This is some distance from Hempsted, and it is unknown whether the road name is in any way connected with Newark House or village. It does happen to lie along a line that points to Newark House, however. Coincidence or not?

Tips for your Garden/Allotment in March

In your garden its time to mulch your soft fruits and plant out new canes etc. Also plant bare rooted roses, ideal for planting herbaceous, sow annual flower seeds, dead head hydrangeas and pot up the begonias.

In the allotment continue winter digging and fertilising and at the end of March plant out your chitted first early potatoes, sow brussels, summer cabbage, broccoli, onions and leeks in nursery beds.

You can also weather permitting, in open ground, plant seeds of spinach, swiss chard, early beetroot, carrots, parsnips, early lettuce, peas, broad beans and turnips.

This year I am going to try soya beans as an experiment. Will keep you informed of progress and if I get a good crop.

Village Agent Report

March News from your Village Agent Gill Cannon

What is Careline?

As you know I am working closely with the Neighbourhood Wardens, Community Police and Fire Service. This month Carol Novoth and I, neighbourhood warden would like to remind people about Careline, a service provided by Stroud Dristrict Council.

It is a way of getting help through your telephone system quickly and efficiently 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. A small personal radio transmitter is worn as a pendant around the neck, on a wrist-strap or clipped to clothing. This is linked to special unit - the Careline - which plugs in to a modern telephone point with an adjacent 13amp electrical socket.



Careline plays a key role in helping older and/or vulnerable people to live independently and safely in their own homes. For many people the telephone is their only means of talking with friends and neighbours. But in a crisis the Stroud District Council Careline could provide help when you need it most, day or night. The service benefits older people, those with a disability and people feeling vulnerable who need reassurance.

How does it work? By pressing the pendant a signal is sent to the Careline, which will then dial automatically to our Control Room. Your pre-programmed personal details will come up on a computer screen and a fully-trained operator will be able to talk to you through a very powerful speaker and listen to you through a very sensitive microphone.

How will they help me? The Control Room will quickly establish what assistance you require i.e. an Ambulance, Doctor, or perhaps one of your nominated contacts (neighbour, friend or a family member who ideally holds a key to your property). The Control Room Staff will stay on the line to reassure you until help arrives

How are they available? A Careline can be bought or rented. There may be some financial assistance available for anyone over the age of sixty who is in receipt of a means-tested benefit such as Council tax benefit, housing benefit or income support. For those under sixty and in receipt of Disability Living Allowance (DLA) you may be eligible for financial assistance if you are also in receipt of one of the mentioned benefits.

For those who are not eligible for Careline there are other privately run carelines such as Telecare. Other "panic buttons" can also be obtained. I will be happy to talk through the options with you.

The Village Agent scheme is county wide, helping over 50's with information and support.

Your vote matters so make sure you're registered!
Ahead of the County Council Elections taking place on
Thursday 4 May 2017, Stroud District Council is urging
its residents to get involved by registering to vote.

Since the law changed in June 2014, every individual is now responsible for their own registration, rather than registering as a household.

Anyone who has changed their address or is a new voter needs to make sure that they are registered. Not being on the electoral register could also affect your credit rating.

Registering to vote is easy and can be done online by visiting www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. Those registering will need to provide their date of birth and national insurance number. Anyone without internet can contact the elections team.

You can register to vote at any time, but the deadlines for registration ahead of the election are:

- Last date for Registration Thursday 13 April
 2017
- Last date for Postal Vote Applications Tuesday
 18 April 2017
- Last date for Proxy Vote Applications Tuesday
 25 April 2017

The publication of candidates standing in the elections will be available from Tuesday 4 April for the County Council Elections.

Village Improvements

You will see the latest position below on the various ideas contributed by residents towards the end of last year.

The Parish Council will be organising an afternoon (date to be decided and communicated in USL Life) where the specific proposals will be shared and feedback gained before the final decision to spend is taken. This will ensure any investments are more likely to be used given the use of public funds.

Siting of Benches in the Village

Several discussions have taken place around this subject and it was agreed at a recent Parish Council Meeting that the opportunity for residents to Sponsor a bench would be offered. If this offer was taken up, the Parish Council would commit to the maintenance of any benches sponsored in the village. Possible sites include the corner of The Stanley, the Recreation Ground, Woodland Green and Twyver Bank.

Vehicle Speed / Safety Issues

A meeting was held with Highways before Xmas including visiting specific areas in the village. This included the possible siting of Vehicle Activation Signs (VAS) to reduce vehicle speeds and improved road markings / signage where it would improve safety.

It was agreed in principle that we would jointly fund the necessary vehicle speed assessments to establish whether VAS was necessary as the cost of each sign is approx £6k. This will happen sometime in the new financial year (post April 2017). Assuming the analysis supports moving forward we are looking to fund jointly with highways.



Xmas Tree on Village Green

The Parish Council have already agreed to plant a permanent Xmas Tree on the Green (the first tree was a temporary arrangement) and this will be taking place in the Spring (within the next couple of months).



Outdoor Gym Equipment

Suitable equipment has been researched with associated costs. The siting of this equipment was discussed at January's Recreation Committee Meeting and a site proposed and supported by the Council. The final decision to purchase will be taken after consultation with residents. If we go ahead on this, the Council will be seeking Grant support where possible to help fund equipment purchases.



Children's Play Equipment

The proposal is to purchase a Multi-Play piece of equipment that would be suitable for ages 2-10 years. The siting of this equipment, if we go ahead, is likely to be in the Ash Grove area but again this will be subject to resident consultation.



Lighting in Six Acres

We will be consulting with residents of Six Acres shortly to establish demand for Street Lighting and a decision will be made after this has taken place.

History of Upton St. Leonards Church building

PART 3



Most of the stained glass in the church dates from the 19th century, put in place to commemorate various people of the Village.

The stained glass in the small lancet window in the north wall of the chancel was given in memory of Canon Scobell.

It depicts Saint Leonard as the patron saint of prisoners, in a black cloak and hood, with handcuffs or manacles in his hand, and a scene showing him in prison with a prisoner at his feet and the executioner at the door. Joan Howson, who designed this window, also designed the windows in Kampala Cathedral.

The reredos, behind the altar, is an exceptionally fine example of mosaic work, either brought from Italy or at least of Italianate design.

Just inside the main entrance door is an inscription paying tribute to one of England's longest serving Nannies who died in 1891 after being with one family in Upton for 62 years!

There are three "parish chests" representing vastly different periods: one fairly modern, one dated 1637, and one of a very early date with fine examples of iron strappings and double locks - and fashioned out of a solid oak tree trunk.

Upton Church has had bells for several centuries - records show that there were six by 1682. These apparently were a type known as 'long bells', and the grooves cut into the tower walls to allow them to swing can still be seen. These bells were re-cast by the famous Gloucester bell-founder Abraham Rudhall in 1728. The tenor is 42.5 inches in diameter and has the inscription:

"I to the church the living call and to the grave do summon all 1728". Two more bells, treble and second, were added in 1872, cast by John Warner and Sons, of London, making the present peal of eight.

During the re-hanging of the bells in 1889, after some restoration work, it was found that one of Rudhall's bells was cracked, and had to be re-cast (the reason for the cracking was the subject of some dispute!).

A major overhaul of the bells was made in 1976 by the well-known Loughborough firm of John Taylor & Co. It was discovered that movement in the bell frame caused hammering of the tower when the bells were rung. A new frame was purpose built to hold all the bells, with two sets of girders supporting the load and spreading it onto all four walls safely. Much of the work was done with the aid of church volunteers. Many of today's Villagers will remember this work and the appeal for funds for it under the name USLOT (Upton St Leonards Operation Tower); a very appropriate choice of name because it showed that the whole Village was involved.

When you are next in the churchyard, look up to the unusual double sanctus bell housing on the gable at



the junction of the nave and chancel. In the Catholic liturgy, during the Eucharist, when the 'Tersanctus' (Holy Holy, Holy) was reached, the priest would have a bell-rope at hand to toll the bells, which hung here, three times. No doubt the bells disappeared at the Reformation, as no reference to them exists since that time.

Charitable Trusts in Gloucestershire

This article is one of an occasional series about some of Gloucestershire's best and least known charitable trusts which help improve the lives of Gloucestershire people. Today we feature the Gloucestershire Disability Fund (charity no. 1048489), the operating name of the Gloucestershire Association for Disability.

The Charity has its roots in the County Committee for the Care of the Physically Handicapped which was established under the umbrella of Gloucestershire Community Council in 1948. The Committee first met under the guidance of the Major Peter Birchall (late of Bowden Hall) who later became chairman of Gloucestershire County Council. The Committee worked in close association with the then Health Department of the County Council and cared for over 6,000 physically disabled people during its early history. In 1970 with the introduction of new laws expanding the welfare state, many of the Committee's original aims became the responsibility of the County Council. This meant the Committee needed to update its purpose. In 1974 it became an independent charity covering the new smaller County of Gloucestershire and started offering respite care.

A Miss Enid Stuart who lived at The Rectory in Minchinhampton became very interested in the work of the charity. She was born in 1897 and was herself disabled as result of polio as a child. She wore calipers, and in later life lost her sight and used a wheelchair. Miss Stuart was the only child of Robert and Edith Stuart and was a very well-connected lady with her own entry in Debrett's Peerage. Her father, Robert Stuart, was a direct descendant of the 3rd Earl of Bute, one of the country's wealthiest landowners. Robert Stuart drowned in the SS Stella ferry disaster off the Casquets near Guernsey in 1899. Miss Stuart never married, and had no siblings and inherited considerable wealth on the death of her mother in 1963. In 1981 the charity was extremely fortunate to be left a large amount of cash plus property and land in Minchinhampton by

Miss Stuart. Later the charity received another substantial legacy from Miss Kathleen Powell.

The Rectory, now renamed Stuart House, became the new base of the charity from which it operated day, respite care and other services for physically disabled people. The charity's cash reserves slowly became exhausted and in 1997 further changes to national social policy and loss of county council funding meant the care centre was no longer financially viable. Alternative uses for the buildings also proved financially risky, so it was decided to sell the property and revise the purpose of the charity once more – this time to cease operating any services and become a trust fund helping disabled people with grants. This was felt to be in keeping with the wishes of Miss Stuart. The sale proceeds were invested and as income has grown, the grant programme has expanded.

Today the charity has three funding streams. Wellbeing grants help people of all ages living in the county with needs arising from a physical, learning or sensory disability, grants to local organisations working with Gloucestershire people with disabilities and a future fund to help adults with disabilities wishing to improve their prospects though education or training or develop their skills and talents in the fields of arts and sports.

The Future Fund helped Piers Gilliver and Andy Lewis pursue their paralympian ambitions to represent GB in the Rio Paralympics 2016. Piers came home with a silver medal for wheelchair fencing and Andy with his prosthetic leg won a triathlon gold medal. The subject for the first meeting will be how to use apps like Skype / WhatsApp / Facebook Messenger to call and see your friends and relatives.




