

Hello Upton. I have been asked by one of our magazine Feature Writers to avail you readers on a subject of my choosing — a pageful I was told! After much soul searching and brain wracking I have come up with the subject — **Nostalgia** which the Collins Dictionary defines as a <u>Sentimental Yearning for the Past.</u>

This subject of nostalgia is very close to my heart So much has happened in our village I don't know where to start.

Before the coming of the Motorway And the bridge by The King's Head Pub Back then we had no street lights In our friendly village hub.

Everyone knew everyone, our community was "close knit"

But now with all the new estates there's not so much of it!!

I suppose you can call it progress
But I don't think that's so
The village has none of the characters
That we had so long ago.

The meadows where we used to roam So long ago have all gone It's all new estates with no field gates For kids to swing upon.

No child picks wild flowers or sticky buds
To take home to their mum.
No one gathers bluebells when the springtime comes.
Oh to go back to my childhood, just for a single day
And live the life we used to in the good old-fashioned
way.

Having spent some 80 years in our beautiful village I consider myself qualified to speak to you with nostalgia about Upton St Leonards. I well remember the time when there was no Six Acres, no Perry Orchard, no St Leonards Close, no Woodland Green, no Ash Grove, no Staites Orchard. All those new estates have been developed during the last 50 or so years.

The Rec was much larger and where the Tennis Courts and Pavilion now stand was the Pounders Field. Some folk won't believe that a person was employed to collect and retain stray animals and house them in that field. A fee was paid by the owner when the animal was collected.

On Saturdays in summer a Cricket Match was a local event, with tea and sandwiches at half-time for the visiting team. Local team wives provided the hospitality. The Village Flower Show was held in the field that is now Six Acres, with a Gymkhana, A Dog Show and a Tug of War (Upton Team was second to none!). There were many other events for children and entrance was 1 shilling for adults and 6d for kids. (10p and 5p in modern currency)

Whist Drives and Dances at the Village Hall were regular events with a Raffle and a Spot Prize. Everyone dressed in their Sunday Best and there was strict tempo dancing of course.

School Holidays were spent helping with Hay Making, Fruit Picking and Blackberrying for Jam.

Many hours were spent 'dipping' in the local ponds, which have all gone now, for frogs, newts and tadpoles. Most kids had a collection of something and I look back on my growing up and think that, with my friends, we had the best times. GOOD OLD UPTON.

BOOK REVIEW by Ted Gardner

I had two favourites -TREASURE ISLAND by Robert Louis Stevenson published in 1882 and TARZAN OF THE APES by Edgar Rice Burroughs published in 1914. The stories of both, although fiction, to a young lad were real adventures. I read them both about half a dozen times. In Treasure Island the cabin boy, Jim Hawkins, was my hero. Characters like Ben Gunn,



Israel Hands, Long John Silver and Squire Trelawney became well known to me. The Treasure Island story of buccaneers and buried gold is full of atmosphere and action.

The story of Tarzan of the Apes tells of an ape-man, Tarzan, raised in the wild by the great ape Kala. Tarzan learns to survive in the jungle – to talk to the animals, swing through the trees and fight the predators. I remember the film entitled Tarzan the Ape Man starring



Johnny Weismuller, Maureen O'Sullivan and Alexander Skarsgard Senior. I have happy memories of plaiting baler twine for ropes and swinging from them over the brook that runs through the bottom of the Rec field. We swung from one bough to another, running branch to branch to the far bank and back. No one does this now but we did! Enjoy the books.

KEEP UPTON TIDY!

Those of mature years will remember the 1960s/1970s campaigns to "Keep Britain Tidy". The campaign continues to this day but is less well publicised. Surely, we can all do our bit for our local environment by **Keeping Upton Tidy!**

Writing this on a sunny day in February more people – and dogs – are out and about and the level of litter in our beautiful village is much more evident. Last week, in a 150 yard stretch

from the Upton Lane bridge (to Gloucester) to the cross at Staites Orchard/Bondend Road/Churchfield Road, I collected two full black bin liners of rubbish which contained beer bottles, soft drinks cartons, crisp packets, sweet packets and dog poo bags! Stroud District Council's street cleaners regularly visit our village so let's make their job a whole lot easier by taking litter home or putting it in the bins provided.

February Meeting issues

- Stroud District Council (SDC) are looking to raise Council Tax and with the increase for the Police Commissioner element included is likely to exceed 3%
- A formal complaint regarding noise from the M5 that was sent to the Office for Environmental Protection has been dismissed. As a result, and ably supported by Tony Pryce, a formal complaint to the Environment Ombudsman will be made via our MP
- SDC have applied for a grant of £1.8m to help fund the purchase of 16 houses across the Stroud Council area. These will initially be used to house Ukrainian refugees and eventually become part of the council tenant stock.
- The Parish Council are currently pursuing possible funding for vehicle activation system devices (VAS) to support reduced speeding in the village and are now asking our County Councillor to get involved due to delays.
- The Council are still in the process of obtaining quotes for repairing/cladding the exterior of The Pavilion
- The Trees which were planted in The Glebe Field are still looking healthy with many buds waiting to burst as Spring approaches

Stations of the Cross



During Lent there will be an exhibition in St Mary de Crypt church, in the city centre, called 'Stations of the Cross.' This is a set of 21 drawings, following Jesus's journey to the cross, and the crucifixion and then to the resurrection. These are charcoal drawings on white canvas, some of which will be hung up around the church and some will be on boards, more at eye level. The difference in this exhibition is that instead of us looking up at pictures of Jesus, we

are seeing the scenes as if from Jesus's viewpoint. The exhibition is called 'Stations of the Cross, as from the eyes of Jesus.'

These drawings have been created by Jonathon Brown, an artist living and working in France, and a lifelong friend of Rev Philippa and her husband Ian.

There is an accompanying booklet, describing each picture, with a Bible verse and reflection for the viewer. The exhibition is free.

Do take the opportunity to view these drawings, and let them draw you into the Easter story this year.

The exhibition will run until Sunday April 16th from Wednesdays to Sundays 11.00 - 3.00pm.

Dear friends in Upton St Leonard's,

As you turn to these pages from the church in this month's magazine, you'll find that we are in the season of Lent – those 40 days leading up to Easter, which this year is on April 9^{th} .

Pancake Day and Ash Wednesday were about 10 days ago, so we're on that journey towards Good Friday and through to Easter Sunday. Christians believe that the death and resurrection of Jesus is the central point on which our faith is founded, and Easter the pinnacle of the Christian year.

So what are you 'giving up' for Lent?

This can seem a strange question if you're not used to it. There is a church tradition of 'giving up something' during these 40 days. When I was at boarding school we had to choose something we liked, to 'give up' during Lent, as a sort of self-discipline. One year I gave up taking sugar in my tea, which meant that to me, at that time, it tasted pretty disgusting for a while. Another year I gave up cake and biscuits, which we bought at the village shop with our pocket money sometimes, to have with our tea when we had spent all afternoon on the sports field. But I'm not really sure if I understood the point of all that, at the time, because looking back at it now – isn't hindsight a wonderful gift?! - I see that the 'giving up' was only one half of a sentence, and I hadn't known the other half, which was that you gave up something in order to give something to someone else - so the money that I might have saved by not buying cake or biscuits would be given to a charity of my choosing. Or, if you were thinking more spiritually, the time you would have spent sitting around drinking tea and eating cake might have been spent reading your Bible, or in prayer.

Of course, as teenage girls we didn't spend our teatimes reading our Bibles or praying! But as I have grown older in years and deeper in faith, each year I put some time aside each day in Lent to read and to

pray. To ponder the Christian faith, to try and learn more about it and more about Jesus, whom I follow and base my life upon – don't ever think that the clergy know it all, they don't!

Of course, we could turn the 'giving up something' idea round the other way. Lent can also be a time for 'taking up something.' This could be practical — helping your neighbour or member of your family a bit more than usual — or spiritual — for example, reading a Psalm every day — there are 150 in the Bible, so you won't run out. There's always more you can read and learn.

This Lent we are holding our Lent lunches in the schoolroom as usual, but on Thursdays this year. When you read this, the first one will already have happened, but there are 5 more you could join. Each week alongside your soup, bread and cheese and fruit lunch, there will be a speaker coming to share a little of their work and their faith and how those two things work together. We have a variety of people coming — John Thompson, who is one of our hospital chaplains, Adrian Partington, who is the organist and choirmaster at the cathedral, Gareth Moseley, a local undertaker, Teresa Pietroni, a local GP, and a couple of others.

Why not 'take up' coming to our Lent lunches this year? 'Take up' coming to listen to others talk about their faith and work. 'Take up' listening to friends and see how you could help them. 'Give up' your usual lunch and enjoy a simple meal together. 'Give up' £6 to go towards the church roof. Every little helps — as one of our leading supermarkets says.

My prayer for you this Lent is that in thinking about giving up and taking up you will be drawn to think more about Jesus, who in taking up his cross, and in giving up his life for us- which we think about on Good Friday gave the gift of the offer of eternal life, to those who choose to follow him.

Knife Angel

Gloucester Cathedral played host to the Knife Angel again this year and it was in place until the end of February.

Some of the members of the congregation were able to visit this thought provoking monument.

Completed in 2018, the structure of the angel stands at 27 ft (8.2 m) tall. In order to create the sculpture, 200 knife banks were produced by the Ironworks and amnesties held for individuals to anonymously donate their knives. Knives seized

by police were also included, some of which arrived in evidence tubes.

The sculpture was created in order to highlight knife crime in the United Kingdom and educate young people on the harmful effect violent behaviour can have on their communities.

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Spring Watch In Upton

Spring watch in Upton, no not the TV programme but a look forward to longer days and the start of new growth both in plants and wild life.


From an amateur point of view, what wild life you might see or might have seen in the village in the past amongst the 22 miles of public footpaths in Upton Parish, so a chance to get out and see many things.



One animal you are sure to see is the rabbit and they have been with us since Roman times. Said to have been introduced by the Romans and used as food for hundreds of years. Not on menus for some time, not since the spread of myxomatosis which reduced the wild rabbit population. Now more likely to be kept as pets rather than for food, as many people in Upton used to do. Did you know rabbits can turn their ears almost 180 degrees so their hearing is highly developed. They have almost 360 degree vision except for a blind spot at the end of their nose. They are all born with their eyes shut and can live from between 8 to 12 years. You are more likely to see active wild rabbits at dusk or dawn.

There are superstitions connected with rabbits. One is invoking a rabbit's name will bring good luck. Saying rabbit out loud upon waking on the first day of each month will ensure good fortune for the rest of that month.

A rabbit's foot was often carried as an amulet believed to be protection and good luck. This has been recorded in history since 600BC.







are not always happy to see them.

You may encounter deer on your walk. They won't hang around long once they see or hear you. Of the wild deer in the UK only red deer and roe deer are truly indigenous. Fallow deer were introduced by the Normans while muntjac arrived in the late 19th century.

Around Upton you are more likely to see muntjac deer with their white backside. In the Tudor times you might have seen wild boar. This was one reason why Henry VIII visited Upton with Anne Boleyn to hunt deer and boar. He hunted in Cranham woods and stopped briefly at Prinknash.

Of the many variety of birds you will see around Upton you will be bound to see pigeons. They may be in pairs or flying around in large groups, these are probably homing pigeons which are kept in special lofts. Pigeons have been kept as pets for a very long time, records show them as far back as 4500BC. They may have been the first birds humans ever domesticated or used as food. In many towns they are treated as pests and gardeners

Pigeons have helped man in many ways: In wartime carrying messages across enemy lines back to their home loft. In the First and Second World Wars people were banned from keeping pigeons in case you were a spy. German anti aircraft guns would target pigeons in case they were carrying messages.

Several pigeons have been awarded the animal VC, the Dicken Medal for their actions in continuing to get their messages through even after receiving bullet wounds.



No one knows how they find their way home some from great distances of 1,500 miles. They have built in navigational aids, some say they use the position of the sun. They are intelligent and can be trained to perform basic tasks. Because of their speed in the air they can be bred as racing pigeons. These can be very valuable and the record for a pigeon in the USA is nearly one million dollars. You are very unlikely to see baby pigeons as they stay in the nest for up to six weeks.

This was a very quick look at some aspects of wild life around Upton. Watch out for the new shoots of Spring which we hope won't be too far away.

We began once again with our Speakers at the start of the proceedings, who had set up equipment for us to view their film and video of various sightings accompanied by their continuous and interesting dialogue.

To begin, most public never see one but if you do, it's life changing. The sudden appearance of one of these elusive animals can be quite terrifying as they are predatory. Frank has been studying this phenomenon for over 50 years. To those who say there is no conclusive proof of existence – Frank says 'rubbish'! We watched a video of a panther-like cat – footage never shown before - how lucky were we to view this?!

The animal was shy and elusive, silent and stealthy. Frank assured us that if you were to suddenly come upon one of these incredible creatures you would be rooted to the spot as they are not frightened of human contact and they are BREEDING! There are currently no reports of attacks.

During their tracking exploits they have come across deer kills among other animals, and scratch marks on trees along with 'poo' and by this they can tell what the animal has been eating and also where they are hunting. We viewed various animal kills found in various states of decomposition, which again gives clues as to their hunting patterns. The cats have extremely rough tongues which they use to 'scrape' off fur and skin in order to get to the 'juice'. Those of you with a common house moggy will know from experience how a cat lick feels! In the winter months you would be most likely to come across a large 'kill' whereas in summer they can feast on the smaller creatures that are out of hibernation. Many sightings have been alluded to be dogs by the authorities who have taken the stance of not putting up signs in order not to encourage hunters and possibly disavow any stories.



Many of these animals including other species, such as wolf, 'the beast of bodmin', racoons and skunks among others, have been sighted and pooh poohed (pun intended) by various nay-sayers over the years but Frank and Alan know from experience these are not figments of their imaginations but very, very real. They know that many people have kept their own private menageries over the years, for example, a well-known pop star in the Bisley area we were told, and these animals have been released into the wild when they become too expensive to keep and feed. Circuses too have been known to 'lose' an animal or three. Most of the sightings are brushed under the carpet and hushed up — and spoken of in folklore and myth but those in the know, know different! So, if you go down in the woods today you'd better not go alone!!! But remember you're more likely to be in danger of being trampled by cows ..

These animals can live up to 10 years in the wild- roughly half the time they would in captivity, but who would want to be locked in a cage?
