# **Letters to the Editor**

Some of you will remember living in the village pre M5 days in 1967, but for the vast majority of us the motorway is part of our everyday life and whilst we readily acknowledge its convenience, it comes at a price - NOISE!

However, since the noise reduction work has been completed, favourable comments have been received about the reduction in the noise so a very big thank you to the Parish Council which has made this possible.

A disabled villager who uses a ride-on buggy asks car drivers not to park across the dropped kerbs which disabled buggy and wheelchair users need when they cross the road.

A "dropped kerb" is the small ramp, usually found near road junctions so that the wheelchair users or adults with pushchairs can move from the pavement onto the road surface and back from the road to the pavement. If the ramp is blocked by a parked car, it becomes unusable and the disabled person is stuck or the people with pushchairs have to step into the road thus endangering themselves and the children they are pushing.

"There has been reported rowdiness and garden vandalism in the Village in the last couple of weeks. Homes in the Bondend Road area by the primary school on the weekend of 9th April, have had plants and shrubs stolen from their front gardens. Youth rowdiness was reported in Whornes Orchard, water thrown at windows in Churchfield Road, and youths urinating in the alleyway by the shops. It was also reported that youths were playing football in the Church grounds. If you see or suffer any of these instances please report it to the Police by calling 101 or by emailing 101@gloucestershire.police.uk and reporting the incident. The more people report these instances, the more the Police will respond."

Respect other people's lives. Even if it doesn't mean anything to you, it could mean everything to them.

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

#### **USL LIFE AGM REPORT**

At the AGM of the USL Life, Chairman Peter Wilson reported that the company had had another positive year keeping in the black. There was an overall net profit of £110 on a turnover of £4749. Though we have continued to stay in profit since we started in September 2014, we haven't generated enough advertising income to build a reserve, which we will need to do things like replace our laptop and software when the time comes. We also have team members who are spending their own money and not claiming expenses which has effectively hidden the true cost of running things (although not large amounts, we wish to cover everyone's expenses as they are incurred). In 2016 we did not take up the offer of a grant from the Parish Council.

Feedback received about our newsletter has continued to be positive from village residents. Two examples of our contribution are: firstly, helping Marilyn and Millie in August 2016 to establish the excellent Coffee Club held each Monday at the BMI, with attendance of 40 or so people every week. Secondly we have been told by people who run events in the village that attendance has grown since the start of USL Life.

We have taken a grant from the Parish Council for 2017, and this will cover, among other things, the additional cost of printing colour pages on the front and back every month. Feedback has already come back after the April issue that this is a very welcome improvement.

We will have a couple of fund-raising activities to build up the capital. The first is a bring-and-buy in May (advertised elsewhere) and we are planning another event for the autumn.

The chairman and directors wish to give hearty thanks to all in the USL Life Team for their continued support and efforts. The distribution system seems to go smoothly every month, and the editorial and features teams have made great efforts to keep the quality of the newsletter really high. Ian Crowe had to resign his post as Treasurer in 2016, and we are so grateful that Janine Black took on this role temporarily. Owen Stinchcombe has now taken up the Treasurer's role, and has become a director of the company. The other directors are: Peter Wilson (Chairman), Cliff Alderman (Company Secretary), Andy Russell and Paul Rosewell.

#### **USCAN AGM REPORT**

Though USCAN itself, as an organisation, is not really running, it is still the vehicle for some Village activities, mainly the footpath maintenance group at the moment.

We continue to need it so that funds for footpaths etc can be properly budgeted, received, held and spent and the activities can be covered by insurance. To that end Cliff Alderman continues to take the role of USCAN secretary and Owen Stinchcombe manages the banking and accounts. Andy Russell leads the footpaths group.

There was a report in the January 2017 USL Life on the work of the footpaths group. For 2017 we shall be asking the Parish Council for funds to cover the proposed expenditure on equipment and materials for the footpath maintenance, insurance and training.

USCAN holds a small reserve, being slowly built up to cover replacement of equipment.

## Twyver WI

April's speaker was Phil Collins - not **the** Phil Collins of international Rock stardom - but our very own local Professor Colleywobbles, an accomplished and amusing puppeteer, born in Cheltenham.

Phil told us of his lifelong fascination with Punch and Judy and how after 40 years, he finally decided to buy some props from Ebay and set up his own business in which he performs at children's parties and public events.

We learned much of the history associated with Punch and Judy and how much of a tradition the show has been in this country for over 350 years, despite its Italian origins, where Mr Punch was called Punchinello.

Mr. Punch made his first recorded appearance in England

on 9 May 1662 when the diarist Samuel Pepys observed a marionette show featuring an early version of the Punch character in Covent Garden in London.

Over time, the string puppet became a hand puppet and shows could be seen in all major cities across Britain in Victorian and Edwardian times, usually mocking the politicians of the day. Performers relied on donations from those watching the show to earn a living and the money was often collected in a bottle. Collecting the money was, and still is, known as "Bottling".

WI member, Janine Black, Professor Colleywobbles' assistant for the night, can be seen

here with her 'Collection Bottle' as she cajoled the audience to part with their pennies! It has to be said that she did a sterling job and much laughter ensued from her antics cavorting around the Village Hall banging a drum and blowing a penny whistle!

Sunday, 7<sup>th</sup> May




#### Sees the twentieth running of the popular annual Dragonboat Regatta, held in Gloucester Docks.


The first race is scheduled for 10 am and there will then be races every 10-15 minutes right through until roughly 5.30pm. We hope to see you there!

He stipulated in his will that the money in the fund is to be used to fund organ repairs in Gloucestershire. It is fantastic news to hear that we have been given a grant from this source. A great start, but a long way still to go.

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# This month we are featuring:- The Pirate and the Mermaid

as told to 'landlubber' Linda Munnoch

"I'm always in awe of the talented people who live in and around our community, and this young couple have 'it' in spades."

Ian Black grew up in the village from a 1 year old to his now 30 years, with parents Paul and Janine and brother Stuart.

After completing his secondary education with 'A' levels at Ribston Hall High School, with plenty of performance opportunities for theatre and dance, he was offered a place at the prestigious Laine Theatre Arts College in Epsom, Surrey, where he began a three-year course encompassing drama, dance and singing. His aspirations were diverted before the end of the first year due to a health glitch, and his dreams had to move on to a BA (Hons) in Community Theatre at the, again prestigious, E15 Acting School, under the banner of the University of Essex. He is particularly grateful for the support of the Lady Downe Trust (available to young people from the Village) during this time.



As we know, getting a break in the entertainment industry can be fraught with disappointment, with 'overnight sensations' usually coming after many years of hard slog doing any job to put bread on the table, and Ian is no exception. He has worked continuously doing pantomime, children's parties, promotions work, and in the early days worked as a temp for Cheltenham Borough Council and many local factories. He has worked in theatres and venues in the UK and around Europe, even doing a stint as a Teddy Bear on one occasion!

Ian has added many strings to his bow to survive in the competitive industry to which he has committed, with driving, horse-riding, stage fighting, karate, first aid and scuba diving all appearing on his CV, together with a high-profile position within Equity, the actors' union, as the elected representative of the South West sitting on the National Council, with a particular emphasis on fair pay and diversity issues, and a focus on work for local actors.

Ian met Michelle Roberts while visiting a friend in Mallorca in 2013, when she was performing in a production of 'Mamma Mia'. They struck up an instant rapport which endured even though she lived in London and he was in



Gloucester. After Ian tragically lost his best friend early in 2016, they decided life was too short to procrastinate, and took the decision to join forces both personally and professionally, and that's when this double act came into focus, and within 6 months, Michelle had moved to Gloucester.

Michelle is a professional 'Mermaid', who grew up in Blackpool with her parents Carol and Vic and 3 sisters, and has performed from an early age.

She studied at the Blackpool Fylde Drama College where she completed a BTEC in Musical Theatre. She has a wealth of experience already in her portfolio having entertained on stage, film theatre, cruise ships and tours, refining her skills in acting, singing and dancing and as an illusionist, but her childhood dream was to become a Mermaid!

Whilst working at The Golden Hind in London, Michelle found it difficult getting around when wearing her tail - especially as it weighs 3½ stones - so whilst she could heave herself out of the water, getting off the floor was impossible without help and there's never a Merman around when you need one!

So to assist her, 'Pirate Pete' was created and the innovative couple, 'Mermaid Merchelle and Pirate Pete' are now a popular party booking, along with personas of Princesses and Super Heroes in their repertoire. # Shock headline "Bowden Hall destroyed in an air raid"

No, you might say, Bowden Hall Hotel is still there and open in Upton.

It is a headline you would not have seen in Gloucester because it actually happened in Plymouth. On 30th April 1941 the Great Western Railway locomotive number 4911 "Bowden Hall" was destroyed in an air raid. The locomotive, heading a freight train, had stopped at a signal box during the air raid, as was the rule. It was destroyed by a direct hit but the crew survived by sheltering under the steps of the signal box. The locomotive was so badly damaged it was never repaired.

GWR "Hall" class locomotives were designed by Charles Collett and built at Swindon between 1928 and 1950. They were general purpose work-horse engines and used on freight and passenger trains. Over 300 were built and they were all named after halls in the GWR region. Withdrawal of the Halls started in 1959 and by 1965 all were out of service.



Eleven examples were rescued from scrap yards for preservation, including 5972 Olton Hall which has appeared in the Harry Potter films. To see a Hall class loco close up,

why not visit the Gloucester Warwickshire Railway where you can see 7903 Foremarke Hall, built in 1947, in all its glory? The picture is of this locomotive. We can't find a picture of Bowden Hall!

By the way if you know where the name plates of Bowden Hall are, they are worth £10,000's now!



## WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

This month marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the deaths of two more men from our Village in WWI.

#### Frederick John Chorley

Frederick was born in Bath, in 1884, son of James and Ellen Chorley. James Chorley was a tailor and Frederick followed his father into the same trade. His parents moved to Gloucester (Barton Street area) and Frederick then married a Gloucester girl, Alice Charles. They had two children, Frederick and Doris. At some point they moved further out of the city to USL.

He enlisted on 8th September 1914 into the 1st/5th Battalion Gloucestershire Regiment. He was promoted to Corporal; his number was 240851. He sailed to France on 25th June 1915 and died of wounds on 17th May 1917 aged 34. He is buried in Grevillers British Cemetery, Pas de Calais.

In 1919 his widow Alice was remarried in USL Church to William Caswell, and lived in Kimberley, Bondend Road. Many readers will know the Caswells and their relations.

#### Arthur Edwin Barnard

Arthur was the son of Thomas Henry and Caroline Barnard of Bowden Villa, Matson. He was born on 13th May 1896 and attended Upton School on 12th June 1900. He served in the 1st Division Ammunition Column Royal Field Artillery. He was a driver and his number was 832077. He died on Monday 28th May 1917 aged 21 and is buried in Bailleul Communal Cemetery Nord, in France near the Belgian border, 16kms south west of Ypres.

Bailleul was a base HQ and field hospital. In a letter to his sweetheart in Quedgeley on 24th February 1917 he says, "I have been in hospital for the last month but pleased to say I am well again. I am still at the base and having a good time and a rest. We are having top hole weather for instance it is like a summers day." It cannot be confirmed if he was wounded or suffering from illness when he died three months later.

In other letters he says, "When I go back I am going to a different lot. How is Gloucester looking now as quiet as ever I suppose? Well dear it seems a treat to be back from the line from all the wet and all the mud."

Some of Arthur's relatives still live in and around the Village.

## The mistake in the window

The large stained glass window on the North side of the



church, which you see as you come down the main path, has an intriguing mistake!

The window was made in about 1850. The dedication at the base states: "This window was put up to the memory of Mary, wife of James Ackers of Prinknash Park, who departed this life December 17th 1848 aged 37 years".

There are three large figures in the window. In the centre is a depiction of Christ. Looking at the window

from inside the church, to the right, is a woman dressed mostly in green, and she is carrying a white jar. To the right is another woman dressed mostly in blue, carrying a book. This woman also has a much more ornate halo than the other woman. Below each figure one can read who is portrayed. Below Christ are the words "Salvator Mundi" (Saviour of the world). The woman on the left in blue is described as "S<sup>ta</sup> Maria Mag", i.e. Saint Mary Magdalen. The woman on the right in green is, as it appears, "Sancta Maria", i.e. Mary, the mother of Jesus. The women's names are clearly the wrong way round. Mary Magdalen is often shown dressed in green and even more often carrying a jar (of ointment). Mary, the mother of Jesus, is nearly always shown as dressed in blue, and the more ornate halo is another sign of who she is.

It is a very beautiful window, dedicated to a wife who died too young. And note of course that her name was also Mary.

I wonder when the mistake was first spotted! I was told about it by Peter Jackson when I first moved into the Village.
