FLOODING RISK UPDATE

It's been a while (August's magazine) since the Parish Council has been able to provide an update on what progress the specialist Flood Risk Team in Gloucestershire County Council and Highways have made in flood alleviation works for the local River Twyver. In the meantime, the Parish Council and our very helpful County Councillor Sue Williams, have been pressing for action and information.

New contractors have been employed to survey the area and you may have seen them last month in Bondend Road and Nuthill. A hydraulic "model" of river flow and flooding risk will be produced. The Flood Risk Team fully understand that the model needs local evidence for accuracy, so a workshop will be arranged for mid-June/July when residents can provide local knowledge. We aim to publish the date/time in the June edition of USL Life.

New Oak Tree for The Glebe Field

As a result of losing the oak tree on the village green, the Parish Council decided to replace it with a semi-mature Oak and relocate to the Glebe Field.

On Friday 11 March, our local contractor, David Cridland, collected a mature tree and planted it in an open area of the field thus avoiding a number of drainage pipes that cross the field nearer the

motorway side.

We are very grateful to David for doing this in his own time and at no charge to the Parish.

The tree will be dedicated to The Queen's Platinum Jubilee and a short ceremony will take place on the morning of Sunday 5 June



Upton WI Report

At our April meeting we were treated to a display and talk by David Cramp on Garden Birds. From early morning until dusk, bird songs bring joy and pleasure. Birds require food, water, security and safe hidden places for nesting.

Weeks before pairing up, birds check out suitable, safe gardens in which to nest and rear their young. After mating they are busy building the nests, usually intricately made and softly lined with moss and feathers and sometimes mud. The number of eggs varies from species to species and the habitat. In a garden, blue tits will have a hatch of 5 or 6 but larger clutches are found in woodland where food tends to be even more abundant. In our gardens the birds need clean water and bird tables or hanging food in a place safe from predators.

As many will have observed, the numbers of starlings and house sparrows have gone down dramatically, often due to loss of suitable habitat or farming methods. Wrens, one of our commonest birds, are so tiny and shy that we rarely see them under the bushes.

You can attract birds to your garden with berries, sunflower and other seed heads, even lavender, and they will bring hours of joy.

Our next meeting is on Monday 2 May at the Pavilion at 2pm, and the talk will be on Hilarious Hats, presented by Alex Stanbrook. All will be most welcome. If you are not a member, why not come to taste one of our most enjoyable meetings?

Kathy Quant reported on the events of the Annual Gloucestershire WI Council Meeting which she attended on our behalf. Also in attendance was Princess Anne who congratulated everyone on their continued success. The theme of the meeting was war on waste and especially in the fashion industry, and how much of unused, unwanted clothing is sent to various countries and just ends up in landfill.

There is enough clothing in the world to last us for six generations. Entertainment was provided by the singer, Mary Jess, who honed her singing talent in China after learning to speak Mandarin at school – she is an inspiring young woman who has exceeded all her own expectations by following her dream.

Our Speaker for the evening was Carolyn Moss, Colour Therapist.

Chromotherapy: - Carolyn decided after losing a child a short time after giving birth in 2001 that she wanted to maintain a positive mental attitude in order to deal with the grief, and so decided to lift her spirits with Yoga and studying to be a Happiness Facilitator. She felt this calling to be a positive approachable person who could help other people who were suffering from depression and 'darkness'.

We learned how the colours of the rainbow each have a different wavelength and that colour affects our mood and health in ways which we are only just beginning to analyse and understand in the 21st Century. The clothes we wear, the food we eat, the colours we choose to decorate our homes with, all affect our mood and wellbeing. Ancient civilisations knew about the power of nature, music, colour and foods, they even built healing temples.

Red has the longest wavelength on the colour spectrum and is a powerful colour, orange is nourishing, yellow for happiness, green for harmony, blue is calming, indigo for healing and violet is inspiring. So many people are now exploring the healing properties of alternative 'medicine' rather than conventional methods.

Scientists and dieticians have proved that a diet of multi-coloured foods on your plate is much healthier and contains all the nutrients our bodies need to function at the optimum level. Exposure to colour in all its forms is good for a balanced and positive life. Colour is a language, key to who we are. Choose wisely!

The Other Side of the Coin – The Queen, the Dresser and the Wardrobe.


Angela Kelly, published 2019.

Dear friends in Upton St Leonard's,

Some of you will know about Bishop Rachel's vision for our Diocese, spelt out in the word LIFE. Over the next few years the Diocese is going to be exploring that vision, which is based on the Bible verse in John, chapter 10 and verse 10.

(Jesus said) "I have come that they might have life, life in all its fullness."

In the vision, the different letters of the word LIFE each have a word attached to them, as follows:

- L for Leadership
- I for Imagination
- F for Faith
- E for Encouragement

The idea is to find out what is happening in our parishes in each of these areas, and to see how we can encourage all that is going on, and to enable other ideas to be expressed and to flourish. So I had a think about this and here's what I came up with:

L for Leadership. We are very blessed to have our Flourish Team in the church to help lead some of our services. This year we made a decision that they would lead the service on the 5th Sunday of the month – which happens about 4 times a year. They led our service very ably in January and would have led again in May, only

develop their skills just speak to me or to Dave Knight who heads up the team.

I for Imagination As we begin to recover from the worst of the Covid pandemic and our world continues to change, the church constantly needs to think of imaginative ways it can connect with its local community.



An example of this was the wonderful renovation of the schoolroom during lockdown, and now various different groups from the village meet there.

Faith

F for Faith It was really encouraging during Lent to have some people come and talk to us at our Lent lunches, about how their faith helps them at work. We heard from lan Donald, a retired doctor, Paul Hobbs, a Christian artist who lives in Gloucester, Graeme Hunter, a Scottish businessman who lives and works in Gloucester, Nicole Rich, one of the managers of the Christian bookshop, Bookplus, in the hospital, and Simon Trapnell, whose family had the vision to set up Nature in Art in Twigworth,

and Simon is the Director there now. Each person had a different story to tell about how God enabled them to shine his love to everyone they met. It was also lovely to share in the Easter worship at the school last month and to hear the children reading the Easter story and singing songs of the faith.

E for Encouragement. Some people are good at talking about their faith, and others are good at listening to people and drawing alongside those who are lonely or bereaved. And some people have the gift of encouragement. When I was training as a curate, the first thing my vicar always said to me when I had

preached a sermon, or led a service was 'Well done!' Sometimes that meant I had done really well, sometimes it meant that I had just managed to get through, and sometimes it meant that I'd recovered well after making mistakes! We would talk about what had happened later, but her first comment was always the same 'Well done!' Encouraging each other is really important.

I feel very encouraged by all I see happening in our parish and I've only mentioned a few things - there are lots of other things going on too.

This month, let's encourage others in their different gifts, let's keep learning about the faith, let's be imaginative in our thinking as to how we can spread the message of Jesus to others, and let's ask ourselves whether we might be able to help in any kind of leadership in our church or community.



School Literature Festival 2022

The children of the School had a real treat at the 3rd Annual Literature Festival. Mrs Wood, the Lead Teacher for Reading, organised several visitors to help inspire the children to read more and to become writers themselves. The focus this year was on poetry and we were lucky enough to have two brilliant poets visit us.

The launch event had a zoom session with our own author ambassador, Tracey Corderoy. Tracey is the author of many books including the Shifty McGifty & Slippery Sam series and Mouse's night before Christmas. Tracey visited the school during our first festival and has been a contributor every year since. In a great honour to the School, her latest book is dedicated to our children and to Mrs Wood.

Tracey read her book "Impossible" - the story of a dog's amazing trip to return a crab back to the seaside and how they overcame impossible odds to achieve their goal. The whole school thoroughly enjoyed the tale and Tracey then taught them all how to draw her character Crab.

On World Book Day, the Children came to school dressed in something comfortable to read in. They made reading dens and had an afternoon of quiet reading. Then, at 5pm, the children got the chance to come back into school, have some warm milk and cookies and then have bedtime stories read to them by the teachers and governors. The response to this was fantastic and we had lots of pupils and parents who really enjoyed this session.



On the Friday, some of the youngsters had the pleasure of listening to Karl Nova. Karl is a poet and a Hip Hop artist, the winner of CLiPPA 2018 for Rhythm and Poetry, his first published collection. The children loved learning about Rhythm & Poetry, i.e. RAP. Karl excited the children about how, unexpectedly, he went to live in Africa with his father at the age of 8 and this is where he learned about

RAP. Karl then taught them a RAP which the children performed at the celebration assembly later that afternoon.

Karl got all the children to write a Haiku, and this was his:
Karl visits the school
He teaches children to RAP
They all write Haikus

In the 2nd week, children in Y3 and 4 had a visit from local author Petra Crofton. Petra is a scientist, environmentalist, author and children's worker from Barnwood. Her most popular book is "Science Geek Christy and Her Eco-Logbook". Petra explained how she used her own experiences to help her write the book. She also explained about the process of writing and that she had to edit her story many times before she had it ready for publication.



The final visit of the week brought Joshua Seigal to the school. Joshua is a highly acclaimed, award-winning professional poet, performer and educator. He has been nominated for The People's Book Prize. He worked with younger children to help them produce their own poetry. Y1 produced a Monster step poem using lots of adjectives and Y2 produced a 'feelings' poem. Through Joshua's poems we learned a little about his pets and he recited a number of his other poems in a very lively assembly.

On the last two evenings of the festival the Yellow Lighted Book Shop Book Fair were in school, the children had all been given a voucher they could use to buy books from the book fair. Feature Article - The Moon in May

Back in January, the very visible Wolf Moon became one of the highlights of the month, probably because, on this side of planet Earth, most of the daylight had disappeared by 4pm and, as rainfall was scarce, the sky was clear and we were privileged to see the moon almost throughout the whole month, and not just the waxing and waning of the moon but many star formations as well. If I checked the sky early in the morning, I could see the pale moon descending at the front of my house and at the back, a thin wide red and golden line of the rising sun's rays creeping along the horizon at High Brotheridge as the new day began. Wonderful!

Since then, my interest in all things skyward has increased considerably and now, as soon as I rise around 6am I find myself searching the sky for Venus; this lady is easy to identify because she's the brightest star in the sky and frequently in the morning she's the only visible star. By 6.30am the view to the front of my house in Churchfield Road is already busy, not just the stars doing their own thing in the heavens, but joggers, early dog walkers and runners are already hurrying up and down and to and fro and the paperboy can be spotted pedalling along in a rush to finish his round before school. All this is going on as the hum from the motorway increases, buses start their daylong circuit of Gloucester to Upton to Gloucester and the birds deliver their glorious dawn chorus! Hello Day!

I'm now noticing other stars and formations and I feel prompted to investigate the world that we see from Earth and further to the world beyond. Once interest is kindled, Google is king! Our natural inquisitiveness can carry us to places that exist far beyond sight and tests the imagination about the territory we call 'Outer Space' which has, we are told, no beginning and no end and within that endless vastness, the one constant is change. Imagine that! If you can!

Did you know that each month's moon has it's own name? This year, the moon

in May, the Flower Moon, has an eclipse on the night of 15th/16th May; the total lunar eclipse will only be seen from Earth in North America. Here in Gloucester there will be a partial eclipse around 5am. So, mark your diaries, rise early and begin the week by witnessing this partial eclipse. Something as wonderful as an eclipse of the sun or moon is likely to leave a mark on memory whether positive or negative and is all part of living on a small planet in the solar system that we belong to. You may wish to go into the fields in Upton for a moon walk or even up Nut Hill and witness it from there. My own memories of moon walks flood back; did you know the best time to spot an owl is when it's a clear night and a full moon so there's plenty of light to see them! They'll fly off if you have a torch, and please, 'no talking', but they don't seem to mind underfoot noise. You're unlikely to forget the image of an owl, perched perfectly still on a tree branch. Last year Brother Giles from Prinknash told me that there are owls up in their woods; you may wish to do some owl spotting there! Another memorable moonlight walk was on Painswick Beacon, torches are recommended if you're intending to go into the wooded area or to the Lookout Point, to see if you can spot the moon shining on the Severn or descending behind the trees on May Hill.

The moon steadies the Earth as she spins on her axis, she affects the tides, aids navigation and informs farmers and gardeners of the best sowing and harvesting times. It is believed that the moon can be an inspiration for much human creativity, including composers of music and song, poets and painters and who could forget those haunting paintings of a full moon through trees? This lady can be bewitching and is known to be a mood changer for humans. If you're experiencing mood changes, this could be the time for you check what's happening up there in the heavens. I'm now wondering if she's really female for whose face can we see when we stare at the moon?

When my children were between four and seven years old, I spent some time encouraging them to keep a lookout for the moon from their bedroom windows. I suggested that if they looked for a very long time they would be able to see a man's face and this is 'The Man in the Moon'. Later that year, during the Christmas holiday, we were downstairs with overnight guests, our children were upstairs getting ready for their parental 'goodnight tuck-in'. Suddenly our four year old son came rushing down the stairs, burst into the lounge, very excited and a little shocked saying, "Mummy mummy! Come quickly! I've just seen The Man in the moon and He saw me!"

The eclipse date again, May 16th around 5.15am: so mark your diaries and "come on, Upton Villagers" look up, look up and join the millions of people across Earth's five continents and witness the Flower Moon eclipse, with gratitude to Lady Moon for endlessly and graciously lighting up our nights on planet Earth. Village History - The Church Font

Hundreds of our readers will have been baptized, or had their children baptized, in the font that stands inside the main door of the Church. The upper section with rougher cut stone maybe, just maybe, dates from the very first church on the site built in the 1100's. It is certainly Norman in style. If so, it is the oldest part of the church. The wooden cover on the top was added in the early 1900's. But this font hasn't been in the church continually all that time, and there are stories about what happened to it, no doubt some a bit embroidered. Indeed, there is no real proof that it was originally in our church. It might have come from elsewhere.





In his writing about the church in 1905, Canon Scobell refers to the font pictured on the left as The Font. This picture is taken from a contemporary painting of the church interior, and shows this font in front of the West door and tower. He says "The Font was the gift of Mr Clements, on the birth of his daughter, Caroline." Caroline was born in 1845. This record doesn't state what font it replaced. It wasn't the "Norman" one, for the record goes on to say that much earlier, in 1818, the "old Font in the Churchyard" went to a garden in Barnwood. We have no way of knowing if that was the "Norman" font or not. However, says Canon Scobell, "it (the old font) was received back (no date given) and placed in its present place" — by which, one assumes, he means in the Churchyard, not the Church.

Our Village historian, Mike Stratford, found the following in the minutes of a Church committee meeting in April 1913: "An important discussion took place with reference to the font. A resolution was passed that a faculty be applied for to remove the present font and dispose of it as seems best with the approval of the bishop. To restore the old font now in the churchyard and place it in the church in the north west corner of the church. The rector was asked to take the necessary preliminary steps towards carrying out the work."

The Village History book by Canon Scobell, later updated by Canon Brewster in 1923, confirms this. It says the font pictured on the left was removed, and taken to the church of St Luke the Less on Bristol Road, Gloucester, being built and partially completed by 1910. (On completion, St Luke the Less was renamed St Stephen, and though St Stephen is no longer in use, we believe the font is still in there). The "old Norman font" was moved from the Churchyard to its present location, raised up on a new base that can be clearly seen in the picture.

Your Ideas for a Tree Sculpture?

You will be aware from the April edition of USL Life that much of the oak tree on the village green had to be removed due to a sizeable split in its trunk/branches creating a safety issue.

At the March Parish Council meeting a discussion took place to decide whether to replace the tree or do something with the remainder of the trunk. It was agreed that a replacement tree would be purchased and planted at the Glebe Field (see page 4).

The council also agreed to investigate the possibility of a sculpture being made from the remains of the oak tree on the village green.

A meeting took place in March to scope the possibilities with an experienced sculptor and he was able to show what is possible.



The Parish Council would like to progress with the sculpture idea and would be grateful for

any ideas village residents may have on themes.

For information, the person who advised us confirmed that a sculpture could have a number of themes but this would add to complexity and therefore cost. The council will need to decide on a cost ceiling once ideas are narrowed down then check on potential costs with identified sculptors.
