St Leonards Parish Church - Raise the Roof Appeal Update - Where is the Money?

Historic England gave St Leonards Church a Grade II* listing, which means it is a building of special or national interest. Only 8% of all listed buildings fall into this category so not only is it important to our community but also to the heritage of the country. I thought I would look at the listing on Historic England website (list entry number 1154810) which is available for everyone to view. The listing is very detailed and a degree in Church Architecture would be helpful to understand it all! However, it does illustrate why many parts of the church are considered of special interest.

Our village is rightly proud of the status of our church, but it does endow us with a greater responsibility for its upkeep. Repairs have to be made using the same type of materials and installation can only be carried out by skilled, conservation contractors.

This brings me to the current Raise the Roof Appeal project for repairing the leaking church roof. A restoration scheme was prepared by our architects and put out to tender, resulting in a huge repair cost that we all know about. The Raise the Roof fund has raised about one third of the sum which is required by the end of the year. so what are we doing to bridge the gap. . . .

I have written about the Church's historic status because it is helpful to promote this status to grant awarders who are very interested in preservation of heritage buildings. They are keen to see that the church will be open to everybody because of its special interest as well as ensuring the continuity of its religious and community value. They are also encouraged that we are continuing to raise money ourselves and many grantors prefer to see 50% of the amount raised before considering grants. I urge you all to continue to support the efforts of all the volunteers who are organising and helping produce an exciting programme of events.

In reality the funding gap can only be bridged with grants and the fund raising committee are applying to organisations who may be willing to assist and already have received two grants amounting to £4,000 which has encouraged us to believe our case for assistance is valid. Major grant awarding organisations offering up to £50,000 take rather longer to agree awards but applications have been made and we are being patient and hoping for positive outcomes.

Our committee is working hard and we are confident with help from all the other dedicated fundraisers and the support from the village that we can achieve a sooner, rather than later, successful outcome to the project.

So that's where money will be!



BOOK REVIEW – A NOVEL OF LIFE AND LOVE

I Capture the Castle by Dodie Smith (1896 - 1990)

This is the first novel of the English author Dodie Smith, written during the Second World War when she and her husband Alec Beesley, an English conscientious objector, moved to California. The novel relates the adventures of an eccentric family struggling to live in genteel poverty in a decaying castle during the 1930s.

After publication of this novel in 1948 Dodie Smith went on to write a children's novel – The Hundred and One Dalmations. It was published in 1956 and adapted into an animated film and a live-action film by Disney.

Upton Climate Group - Repair Cafes

Discussion took place around the idea of a Repair Cafe in Upton.

For information, there are now 16 Repair Cafes in Gloucestershire including Gloucester, Cheltenham and Stroud areas.

The point of having such places is for people in a community to repair items that might otherwise be thrown into landfill and help their neighbours re-use them Most Repair Cafés offer repairs across the following areas: small household appliances, sewing, computers and bicycles. Other repairs are possible depending on the skills of the volunteers present that day : sharpening, repairing jewellery or wooden objects, etc. Many of these workshops meet on a monthly basis but frequency would be decided by the people who get involved.

Is This Something Anyone Would Be Interested In?

The first step is to see if anyone who has skills in repairing items eg electrical, furniture, clothing, other, would be interested in supporting such an idea. If yes, please contact Peter Wilson with your contact details and what you could offer as a skill.

If there is sufficient interest, the Climate Group will explore potential spaces that could act as a workshop, look at any relevant issues that need to be considered and get interested people together to discuss the way forward.

CCS TAIKO (Taiko is the ancient Japanese art of drumming)

Back in 2010, amidst the ancient small town of Lostwithiel, Cornwall, came the most mesmerising murmur of what appeared to be distant drums. Following this beautiful sound as it crept louder to my ears, I eventually came upon four youths playing an intricate piece of music on a set of large drums and it was magical. It captured the very depths of my soul and I wanted it to go on forever!

I found Taiko. The drumming spoke to me – it evoked deep emotions. My immediate thought was perhaps Taiko could provide a means for children with special or additional needs, for example autistic youngsters. Could this be a route to communication? This exciting potential decided to occupy my every waking thought thereafter. CCS Taiko (Collective Conscious Society), non-for-profit, was born.



Six months down the line, having

researched Taiko; sought and undertook intensive training in how to teach Taiko, I was ready to approach my first challenge - Milestone School in Longlevens. After much discussion and deliberation, their amazing headmistress was prepared to allow me to examine my thesis on a few select pupils. With the bare minimum of equipment (we began with cut-to-size broom handles, played on the backs of chairs.(Yes really!!) The sessions took off and became a great source of joy to those pupils and transformation of some by way of vocalization and confidence was evident in terms of their improved communication. I am pleased to say that, after some fourteen years or so, the sessions at Milestone remain and many pupils, I believe, have benefited from their interaction with the group.

After growing interest in Taiko became apparent, the group expanded to offer community workshops to all ages from ten years upwards. The emphasis being on inclusivity thereby anyone of any age - both typical, with special needs or any particular ability or disability they may present with, are welcomed to the group. The second emphasis is about fun. Integration and acceptance being the principals of CCS. Perfection has never been a priority with the group, but the emphasis is all about enjoyment.

In 2021, CCS Taiko was taken over and is now owned by my grandson, Joe Bond, from USL himself, who is one of the original players in the group. Joe is carrying out a spectacular job in modernising and running CCS, whilst continuing with his work as an accomplished kit drummer. In fact, Joe has integrated his full drum kit into the CCS programme, which created the first Taiko group in the country to incorporate kit and Taiko drums. It's brilliant! He has just completed updating the website which can be found at <u>www.ccstaiko.co.uk</u> and provides contact details; workshops; costs and much more for anyone who may be interested. The next plan is to form CCS Junior Taiko as a separate entity.


