My father in law, Walter Harvey, worked at GAC and did the riveting on the nose cone of the E28. Wally was the ultimate craftsman, very precise in his work and one day a man passing stopped to watch him at work. After a couple of minutes, the man asked Walter if he couldn't do the job a bit faster. Walter immediately turned round, offered the man his tools and said "if you can do it any faster then I suggest you do it yourself"! The unknown man was of course Frank Whittle. I have visited the Jet Age Museum at Staverton and had a brick engraved in memory of Walter in their Wall of Fame.

Continuing on the Jet theme and Upton, shortly after we moved to our cottage in High Street, Upton in 1959, my son Steven who had been playing happily at the top of the garden ran into the house white faced and terrified. A Gloucester Javelin had screamed overhead, seemingly just over the top of the garden shed. Steven refused to go into the garden for several days after that experience in case this monster came back. Evidently the new Javelin planes could take off from Brockworth but not land, this had to be done at Moreton Valance.

The produce was auctioned off, raising over £120 for the Gloucester Foodbank.

Thanks go to Rev Christine and the Parochial Church Council for thinking up the idea and doing all the hard work of getting chairs and tables out, preparing food and coffee and to Gloucester Brass for the music.

Thanks also go to Dick Powell, a most entertaining auctioneer, a former village resident, who is remembered from many years ago, doing harvest auctions in the Village Hall.

CANOES AND KAYAKS

Over the weekend of 19-20 September,

Gloucestershire Scouts ran a canoeing and kayaking training course on the river Avon near Defford in Worcestershire.

Scouts from 1st Upton St Leonards Scout Troop and Explorer Scouts from the Nutty Badgers Explorer Scout Unit, together with leaders from both, went along.

Saturday morning started off misty, but towards late morning the mist burnt off and the rest of the day's weather couldn't have been better. Clear blue skies and warm September sunshine.

The young people spent Saturday paddling in canoes and working towards the Scouts' new Paddle Sports Staged Activity Badge (Staged Activity Badges allow the youngsters to build on their skills in a particular area throughout their Scouting careers).

In the canoes, the trainers took the

Scouts through paddling techniques and how to paddle forward in a straight line. Some of the Scouts – and at least one leader – found that particular aspect a little frustrating!

Towards the end of the day, the Scouts went through their capsize drills. Knowing what to do in the event of an accidental dunking is, of course, vital. Thankfully the warm weather meant that capsizing and the consequent swimming weren't too traumatic.

After dinner on Saturday evening, there was a film show complete with popcorn.

Sunday started off misty, but once again it soon disappeared and the sun came out. The Scouts switched to kayaks, and went through similar exercises to the ones they'd learnt in the canoes. As well as being able to self-rescue, the Scouts were taught how to assist others when they capsize.

We were also treated to a guest appearance by a monster Stand Up Paddle (SUP) board known as a SUPsquatch. It's an inflatable, surfboard-shaped raft that's approximately 16 feet long, 6.5 feet wide and 8 inches thick. A surprisingly

What to do on your Allotment or Garden in November

There's no time to rest, but there is just enough daylight to finish clearing your plot of any old crops, to prepare for next

Now is the time to harvest winter cabbage, Brussels sprouts and leeks, but wait until the first frosts before harvesting Parsnips, so that the starches are turned into sugars.

General work is to dig over your plot. It is also a good time to plant fruit trees and bushes and prune your soft fruit bushes, if you haven't already done so.

This is also a good time to turn over your compost heap and clean garden tools. Hopefully one final cut of the lawns can be made but remember to carry on picking up leaves from lawns to enable good aeration.



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November - the month to Remember

In Memoriam

In USL Life we have been running a series of articles about men who died in WWI, at approximately the 100th anniversary of their deaths. As it happens, there haven't been any recently - no Upton men were killed in the war in the second half of 1915.

However, in the month of November it remains always our duty to remember those who were killed fighting for their country, and for this issue of USL Life we make special mention of a WWII soldier. Special because, of course, this man's close relatives are still well known to many villagers.

Edward Thomas Higgs Rumsey

Edward Thomas Higgs Rumsey joined the 2nd Royal Gloucestershire Hussars, part of the Royal Armoured Corps. He rose to the rank of sergeant and was posted to Egypt to join the effort to drive German and Italian troops out of North Africa. British forces had entered Libya from Egypt in mid 1940, and from then on the front moved backwards and forwards with offences and counter-offences for over two years.

Sergeant Rumsey was killed, at the age of 29, on 28th December 1941, during this phase. (The decisive battle of El Alamein took place in November 1942). Sergeant Rumsey's name appears on the Alamein memorial, in Libya. He was born in the Village in 1912, the son of Harold and Charlotte Rumsey of Upton St Leonards. He left a widow Joan Rumsey and daughter Sandra aged 8 months. He is the brother-in-law of Evelyn and uncle of Jenny Cunningham.

November's Feature Article is on Kites Hill

In Upton St Leonards we are very fortunate to be surrounded by beautiful countryside, much of which is designated as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, and which includes two significant nature reserves. One is Cud Hill Common, an important area of limestone grassland near Painswick Beacon, owned and managed by our Parish Council. The other is the less well known Kites Hill Reserve, also limestone grassland but including some semi-natural woodland, situated at the top of The Portway and owned by the World Land Trust (WLT).

Although some villagers have been involved with the management of Kites Hill, others may be interested to know a little more about the reserve and the WLT. After all, it is open to all of us for a walk around to enjoy the beauty of the wildflowers, trees, birds and other wildlife.

Once a farm, the reserve covers 40 acres, and as well as limestone grassland it includes one of the UK's best examples of ancient beech woodland. It is part of the Cotswold Commons and Beechwoods Site of Special Scientific Interest and is recognised at European level as a Special Area of Conservation – and on our very own doorstep!

Amongst the beech trees there are superb examples of oak and ash, and round the meadow areas, the hedges of native



species such as hawthorn, hazel and elder provide excellent habitat for many species of birds, bats and invertebrates.

In 2009 The WLT built a pond and within a short time it was colonised with native plant species, dragonflies and amphibians. Spring and early summer are probably the best times to visit to spot dragonflies such as the Hairy Dragonfly, the large Emperor Dragonfly, frogs and toads spawning and possibly Palmate Newts.

The WLT have involved The Conservation Volunteers to help manage the reserve at a local level, and work parties can be seen regularly cutting back invasive species and maintaining hedges and fences etc on the reserve.

The reserve was donated to the WLT early in the Millennium by the late Miss

Jane Pointer, who appreciated the conservation value of her farm and wanted it preserved for the future. The WLT is an international conservation charity which protects many of the world's most biologically important and threatened habitats. Since foundation in 1989 WLT has funded organisations around the world to create reserves and give permanent protection to habitats and wildlife. Miss Pointer had visited one of their reserves abroad and was so impressed that she chose them to take on the stewardship of her land as a living legacy.

I would encourage everyone to take a walk around Kites Hill, not so much now, but particularly in spring and summer, to enjoy the beauty of the flora and fauna as well as the beautiful views over the village and local area.

Dear Friends

In days gone by there used to be an old English tradition, in places close to the Welsh borders, of "soul-caking". Singers went about on All Souls Day, which is November 2nd, singing psalms and songs in remembrance of those

who had died and in return, they expected cake. The singing was lamentful, as would be expected, and Shakespeare refers to it in The Two Gentlemen of Verona, as "puling". These soul cakes are a rather spicy short cake, rich in butter and egg and very often have a cross inscribed on the top.

November is a month to remember. November 1st is All Saints' Day when the Church remembers and celebrates those women and men of every age who have provided a glimpse of heaven on earth. On November 6th we celebrate St Leonard, also patron saint of prisoners. We will be showing the film, The Railway Man in church at 7pm in commemoration of those prisoners of war in Burma.

November can be a melancholy month, with the nights drawing in very fast, the strong westerly winds blowing and the leaves accumulating deeply on the lawn.

It does somehow seem to be a good time to remember our loved ones. For more than a thousand years, people have been commemorating lost relatives and friends in some way at this time.

On the 15th November at 4.00pm, here in St Leonard's Church, we will hold a service of thanksgiving and remembrance, to offer a reflective service of readings, music, prayer and thanksgiving and where, if you wish, you will have the opportunity to light a candle in memory of your departed loved one. This is an open service and all are welcome to bring with you your memories and celebrations and to join with us.

The previous Sunday, 8th November, is Remembrance Sunday where we remember those men and women who have fallen in war and we shall have our usual act of remembrance at the War Memorial followed by Holy Communion in Church and refreshments afterwards. Conscious that our servicemen and women are in action in various troubled areas of the world, we will be offering prayers for their safety and for the peaceful resolution of these conflicts.

Remembrance describes a profound process. To remember is to invite the past into the present. When we do this, people, places and shared experiences can be so valued and cherished that greater meaning, depth and joy are brought to our lives today. Remembrance can be holy ground. In 1 Corinthians chapter 11, St Paul gave instructions on how the Eucharist should be conducted in churches, i.e. in remembrance of Christ.

In this context, the New Testament Greek word for remembrance, anamnesis, is more than mere commemoration; it means a sacramental presence. In other words, the life, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ are so movingly

Soul Cake Recipe (makes 14 large 'cakes')

(See Christine's letter on the previous page)

340g plain flour (sifted)

170g sugar

170g butter (softened & diced)

½ tsp ground cinnamon

½ tsp ground mixed spice

½ tsp ground nutmeg

1 egg (beaten)

2 tsp of white wine vinegar

Preheat the oven to 200C and grease 2 flat baking trays. Thoroughly mix all the dry ingredients into a mixing bowl - sifted flour, spices, and sugar.

Rub in the diced butter until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.

Add in the beaten egg and white wine vinegar and mix with a wooden spoon until firm dough is made; cover it and put it in the fridge for 20 minutes.

Flour a working surface and roll out the dough to 7mm thick and, using a large round pastry cutter, cut into rounds.

Place these rounds on the greased baking tray and bake in the oven for 15 to 20 minutes at 200°C until slightly coloured. Serve warm or cold.

Faith in the World: Artist PJ Crook reflects on her faith

Since the dawn of time we mortals have made images, whether it be painted on a cave wall or carved in bone, trying to express the mysteries of that which we feel but cannot comprehend. So it is not surprising that this tradition has brought forth the creation of some of the most sublimely moving art forms that draw believers and non-believers alike to flock to the places where these wonders can be seen, like pilgrims of old. Thus art, the silent, universal, visual language, helped hand down Christianity through the ages long before the printing press, and still inspires us today.

Our magnificent Cathedral is Gloucestershire's most visited attraction. Within its walls the soul uplifted is totally in awe of this magnificent edifice lovingly crafted by the hands of so many to render it glorious; this is echoed throughout the churches of the Diocese. How eloquent that art inspired by Christianity can also speak to those of other creeds or none.

Working in the solitary confines of my studio is not unlike the monastic life. I feel I am in silent dialogue with my Maker, working intuitively from memory and playing with time. When the work becomes problematic I often flounder in the struggle to make it right but then as if from nowhere comes the answer; like inspiration itself sometimes mysterious and unbid. Is it this intensity of emotion between the artist and canvas that entices the viewer in to partake in the dialogue, for without the viewer the story would remain untold?

Art speaks in many different ways; two of the charities I have the honour of being patron of are Artshape (based in Gloucester) which works with the disadvantaged and COS, a conglomerate of two hundred artists, some of whom are therapists working with patients on prescription; others, like Deepspace, with schools and the community; and a group who are organising a Christian Arts Festival 8 - 24 April 2016 in Cheltenham, www.ChristianArtsFestival.org







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Stir-Up Sunday 22nd November

Many people will have fond memories of the time when families made their own Christmas pudding as part of their traditional Christmas preparations. So if you have never attempted to make one, why not give it a go on "Stir-Up Sunday" which this year will be on 22nd November. There is plenty of time to gather in all the ingredients!

Stir-Up Sunday is the last Sunday before the church season of Advent, and takes its name from a prayer said in the



church on that day, which begins, "Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people ..." As well as being the intended exhortation to the congregation, the words had the unintended effect of reminding churchgoers to start making their plum pudding, so it had time to mature before

Christmas Day. It is a great tradition in which the whole family can be involved. The idea is that everyone gets a turn to mix the pudding and that they make a wish during their turn.

Make A Wish

Christmas Pudding Traditions

A Christmas pudding is traditionally made with 13 ingredients to represent Christ and His Disciples.

A proper Christmas pudding is always stirred from East to West in honour of the three Wise Men who visited the baby Jesus.

Every member of the family must give the pudding a stir and make a secret wish.

A coin was traditionally added to the ingredients and cooked in the pudding. It was supposedly to bring wealth to whoever found it on their plate on Christmas Day. This coin would have been an old silver sixpence or threepenny bit.

Other traditional additions to the pudding included a ring, to foretell a marriage and a thimble for a lucky life.

Christmas Pudding Recipe

Serves 8-10

New to Christmas pudding making? Why not try making your own this year for a change?

Ingredients

110g Soft dark brown sugar

110g Vegetarian suet

450g Dried mixed fruits

25g Chopped candied peel

55g Sifted self raising flour

110g Fresh white breadcrumbs

25g Roughly chopped shelled almonds

Grated zest and juice of ½ large orange and ½ lemon

2 Large fresh eggs

1 small cooking apple peeled, cored and finely chopped Half teaspoon ground cinnamon

- 1 level teaspoon ground mixed spice
- 4 Tablespoons brandy plus a little extra

Place the dried fruits, candied peel, apple, orange and lemon juice into a large mixing bowl. Add the brandy and stir well. Cover the bowl with a clean tea towel and leave to marinate for a couple of hours or preferably overnight. Stir together the flour, mixed spice and cinnamon in a very large mixing bowl. Add the suet, sugar, lemon and orange zest, breadcrumbs and nuts and stir again until all the ingredients are well mixed. Finally add the marinaded dried fruits and mix again. Beat the eggs lightly in a small bowl then stir quickly into the dry ingredients. (This is the time to stir and make your wishes.) Turn the mixture into a 2 ½ pint lightly greased basin with a small circle of greaseproof paper in the base and leave 2.5cm head space. Press down with the back

of a spoon and cover the top of the pudding with a circle of baking parchment. Take a large piece of doubled foil, approximately 6" all round, larger than the top of the basin. Make a pleat and cover the basin pressing down the outer edges. Tie a piece of string around the top of the basin to secure the foil. Make a string handle, so it's easier to pick the basin out of the pan after cooking. Put the basin in a large steamer of

boiling water and cover with a lid. Boil for 7 hours, topping the boiling water from time to time. Do not allow to boil dry. If you do not have a steamer, put the basin in a large pan on an inverted saucer. Pour in boiling water to come up to 2/3rds of the way up the sides of the basin. Cover and steam as before, topping up with boiling



water so as not to boil dry. Remove the basin and allow to cool. Remove the baking parchment and foil cover and prick the pudding with a skewer and pour in a little extra brandy.

Cover the basin with fresh parchment and foil and tie as before. Store in a cool cupboard until Christmas Day. To serve, steam for an hour. Turn out on to a warm serving plate. Warm 2 tablespoons of brandy in a small saucepan. Set alight and pour carefully over the pudding. Serve with your favourite accompaniment; brandy butter, rum sauce or cream.

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November News from your Village Agent

This month I thought it would be helpful to pass on some information I have found doing research on behalf of some Village Agent clients I visited recently. I've learnt lots about some of the different mobile phones available if you have difficulty using standard designs.

The first is called "OwnFone". I found this looking for a phone that would be easy to use for a person who was in the early stages of dementia. He enjoys going out on his own but is beginning to feel disorientated occasionally. He also now finds it too complicated to operate a standard mobile. Anyone who finds it difficult to use a general mobile might find this really useful.

The OwnFone allows you to make and receive calls at a touch of a button. The phone is personalised with up to 12 preprogrammed numbers or images of your choice. There's no need to dial, just press a name or picture and you're connected. It arrives ready to use, costs from £40 and there are 3 price plans to choose from and no contract.

You can also contact the emergency services by pressing the 999 button 3 times (this will need to be 1 of the prechosen numbers). The OwnFone can be bought through Age UK by calling **0800 669 6644.** You will need details of how many people you want to call (up to 12) their names and contact numbers, your payment details and where you want it delivered.

I also needed to find a suitable phone that was easy to use with arthritic fingers and compatible with digital hearing aids. As always, the Gloucestershire Deaf Association (GDA) were very helpful and Samantha Quinson, the Hard of Hearing

service Coordinator, is happy to show you products at their base in Barnwood and order them for you. Postage is free and there is no VAT on their prices. Products recommended were the Doro 612 PhoneEasy (£82.94) and the Amplicomms M7000i (£64.27). Contact details at the end of this article.

In the same week I was able to help a lady who is losing her sight and is unable to use her current phone. The RNIB has a lot of information on its website. A young friend of mine, who has Macular Degeneration, agrees with them in their recommendation of touch phones, especially the iPhones. They come with a built in screen reader called VoiceOver and a screen magnifier called Zoom. They don't need extra software and come with Bluetooth refreshable braille displays. The Insight shop in Cheltenham is also a great place to go to try out products.

Lastly, there is a free Telephone Directory Service for people who are registered blind. By simply dialling 195 you can register for this service. When registered you are allocated a card and PIN which when you need a telephone number you quote your PIN and they can tell you the number for free, they can also help to dial a number for you if necessary.

There is a Blind person's tax allowance for those people who are registered blind or severely sight impaired and registered with the local council as being so. For the tax year 2015-2016 the amount is £2290. A couple can both claim this allowance. You can transfer your allowance to your spouse or civil partner if you don't pay tax or don't earn enough to use all of your allowance. This information and more can be found on the GOV.UK website.
