

A heartfelt thank you from a recipient of the Lady Downe Award

I was awarded a grant from the Lady Downe Trust some years ago having applied to secure some extra funding for a trip to Sri Lanka as part of my medical training. During my 4th year of study at Bristol University, students were encouraged to use the time allocated for their 'elective' to experience medicine somewhere totally different. I was interested in paediatric medicine at the time and chose to visit Sri Lanka having never visited this part of the world. I spent 4 weeks at the Kandy General Hospital with the funds that I had received being used to pay for my flights and accommodation while I was away. I had an incredible experience, both on a cultural and educational level and without the financial help this wouldn't have been possible. My time away gave me a really unique experience of healthcare in a developing country and consolidated my interest and enthusiasm for paediatric medicine. I have since gone on to qualify as a consultant paediatrician and am in no doubt that this early exposure was an essential part of my journey. I do hope to return to Kandy one day - it is such a beautiful city and the people are so kind and welcoming. I feel huge gratitude to the Lady Downe Trust for contributing to this experience all those years ago and would encourage anyone needing extra funding for education or training to apply.

As speaker Liz Spurway introduced us to the subject of 'fused glass', eye-catching, coloured objects caught our attention.

Liz is an artist and furthered her interest by attending a summer school at Marlborough College ten years ago. It was clear that Liz's love has grown for all things glass.

Glass is very flexible when heated to high temperatures and is then cut and moulded into fantastic shapes. Blue glass is Liz's favourite. Using bullseye glass, which expands at 90 degrees, she fuses 2 or 3 layers of transparent or opaque glass in the kiln.

For her demonstration Liz used powdered glass or "frit" granules to give a rougher texture to the test piece. This was placed in a microwave for 8 minutes for us to see a streaky or clear colour develop over textured glass. Streaks of light danced on the beautiful glass as we watched an artistic genius at work.

Many questions were asked, but, possibly, to understand this complicated subject, we need to attend a workshop ourselves. Kathy gave a vote of thanks on behalf of all our members for a truly entertaining evening.

We meet again on Monday 4th November at 7.30pm for our AGM followed by a talk from Angela Harris. All ladies very welcome to attend. *Kathy Quant*

Katkinz Rescue Centre by Christina Caldwell

Jane Ballard loves cats; in her childhood home there were usually ten cats. Currently she has 14 of her own as well as the residents in Katkinz Rescue Centre which she runs from her home here in USL.

In 2012, Jane volunteered with 'Cats Protection' and in Katkinz is on Facebook where it recruits volunteers and



more I worked with animals, the more I realised that my chief concern was particularly cat welfare. welfare, Because of the huge need in Gloucestershire to help stray, abandoned, sick and pregnant cats, I set

up 'Katkinz Rescue Centre' earlier this year." Katkinz networks with all the Gloucestershire animal help agencies.

"Every cat that comes to Katkinz is deflead, wormed, neutered, microchipped and assessed before rehoming. Stray or abandoned cats go into 'isolation' before full vet clearance. All cats have their own pen and equipment and are observed over at least a week to ascertain temperament, habits, and dietary preferences. Currently



Katkinz has 17 pens, a maternity unit and family unit. Some special breeds or traumatised cats need special attention so new owners may need 'acquaintance sessions' prior to taking their new pet home.

2014 with 'Animals Lost & Found'. "The new owners. Homes are also found through vets, previous adopters, neighbours and friends. Jane is very appreciative of all the volunteers and Upton 'Seniors' for knitting 'kitty-blankets' and giving 'kitty-cuddles'. When I called to interview Jane, she'd had nine carrier-bags of wool donated that morning. which will go to 'Seniors' in Upton and in local nursing homes to knit 'kitty-blankets'. All knitters are sent a picture of the cat with 'their' kitty-blanket. Some local ladies who can no longer manage to have their own cat visit Katkinz for a 'kitty-fix', a time to cuddle a cat.

> Katkinz is self funded. Jane and volunteers raise funds through Re-Homing, Photo Displays and sales of cat paraphernalia at Charity Fun Days, Car Boot sales and Village Shows. They also run Pub Quizzes.

It is not only a beautifully written boy's-eye view of the landscape of his youth, Barefoot at the Lake is also delightfully funny, with a moving wisdom at its heart. I found this book enchanting and relaxing, and it evoked memories of less troubled times past.

Most people in the village will hopefully be aware of the Cubs, Scouts, Beavers and Explorers who have met at the Village Hall for the last 30 years and contributed so much to the life of the village and the surrounding area. They may not be aware that the Scout Group, which now includes two Beaver Colonies, a Cub Pack, a Scout Troop and an Explorer Unit together with a further Beaver Colony and Cub Pack who meet in Coopers Edge, is now the largest of the 18 Scout Groups in the Gloucester Scout District with more than 120 young people and 18 adults on its books.

While we take our inspiration from Baden-Powell and his book, "Scouting for Boys", Scouting in the UK is now fully co-educational, meaning we welcome boys and girls, men and women, in all our sections. Although we know our young people come to us to have fun and spend time with their friends, we nonetheless aim to ensure that every child follows a structured progressive programme that encourages them to learn a range of skills that they may not have the opportunity to experience at school or at home and year by year to develop these skills to higher levels and in greater depth, often without realising it, hence our recently adopted emphasis on "skills for life". However, we also aim to share with our young people the values of Integrity, Respect, Care and Belief as expressed in the Promise that every member makes when they join the Movement which are reinforced in all our projects and activities.

The Scout Group recently held its Annual General Meeting at which we reviewed each Section's activities over the last year. For example, the Beavers had been on their torch walk (always a favourite), visited the fire station, shared skills with one another and explored the world around them. The Cubs went camping near Wottonunder-Edge, held a sleepover at Go Bananas in Stroud and spent a busy weekend exploring central London while in their weekly meetings they enjoyed a wide range of games and activities, collected bottle tops for recycling and were taken on a guided tour of Gloucester City Centre. The Scouts have been rebuilding their numbers following a change of leadership but had still managed to take part in an incident hike on Rodborough Common, the winter night hike "The Cotswold Marathon" which takes place in February each year, and camped with hundreds of other Scouts and Guides in Cirencester Park sharing in lots of different activities, games and experiences for the youngsters to enjoy. The Explorers went on an expedition to Devon and took part in a range of activities on and around the North Devon coast as well as some challenging and thought-provoking activities at their weekly meetings.

In the coming months we plan to offer more (indoor) sleepovers for the younger members and camping trips and expeditions for the older ones in addition to their weekly programme. In particular, we shall once again be taking an active part in the Remembrance Day commemoration here in Upton on 10 November and will be putting on some suitable activities for our members, the Rainbows, Brownies and Guides and their families in the Village Hall before joining the rest of the community at the War Memorial for the Act of Remembrance itself.

The fantastic thing is that this is all arranged and delivered by a dedicated team of volunteer leaders who give their time and energy every week to ensure there are plenty of new and exciting things for our members to participate in. However, we would greatly appreciate more willing hands to share the various tasks so if helping with any of our Sections appeals to you (especially the older ones) please let me know. We encourage flexible volunteering so you don't need to commit to every week. In addition, we also have a committee of trustees to oversee the work of the Group and its finances and could do with at least two more members to join the committee. However, most importantly the committee is currently lacking a Chair and this is a role we desperately need to fill. You do not have to be a parent or former Scout. Anyone with an interest in the development of young people and sympathy with Scouting's aims and values would be welcome. Further details can be provided. Simply call or email me - details below.

We want the Scout Group to be a valued part of the Upton St Leonards community. We are proud of our roots in the village and our connection with its people. If you have an idea for how the Scouts may be able to support the life of the village and the surrounding areas, please let me know.

My tale was heard, and yet it was not told, My fruit is fallen, and yet my leaves are green,


My youth is spent, and yet I am not old, I saw the world , and yet I was not seen: My thread is cut, and yet it is not spun, And now I live, and now my life is done.

The Loved One: An Anglo-American Tragedy by Evelyn Waugh, published in 1948, is a short, satirical novel about the funeral business in Los Angeles, the British expatriate community in Hollywood and the film industry. It was adapted in 1965 into a film which features many familiar Californian filming locations together with new characters and scenes. The novel is short and full of witticisms and euphemisms. It satirises the American way of death and depicts a world where love, reputation and death cost a very great deal.

HADWEN HEALTH PARTICIPATION GROUP

Hadwen Medical Practice is now known as Hadwen Health. The Patient Participation Group met in September and I can now update you on progress being made.

A new practice web site will be launched on 4th November, so do have a look and see what applies to you and your family. One of the aims of the new site is to promote self-care and direct patients to other services in a more user-intuitive way.

Flu Clinics: Letters have been going out to patients to confirm:

•That the clinics are all day, and their session is x to y time. Patients are encouraged to come at any point in their hour slot in order to spread out the queues.

•There will NOT be any 'mop up' clinics, so if patients cannot make the clinics offered, they will need to arrange a flu jab with their local pharmacy.

Dates: 16th November (Over 65s), 14 December (under 65s)

The Practice plans to employ two paramedics providing urgent same day home visits to patients. If they are not out seeing patients, they may provide triage in the surgeries. They also have plans for a Social Prescriber and a Clinical Pharmacist to be employed in due course.

Did Not Attends: Latest data shows improvement in the 'Did Not Attend' figures.

Staff confirmed several patients have been removed from the practice list for frequent DNAs. So effective steps are being taken.

Phone calls to patients who have missed appointments are being made on the same day or the next day to understand why the appointment was missed. It is harder for the patients to ignore a phone call than a letter, which is easier to put to one side and ignore.

Staff plan to increase the number of patients signed up for text message reminders. This should help improve awareness and further reduce DNAs. Have you signed up yet?

Hadwen's Health Garden is looking good and should start to see improvement next year. This a community garden for those who are grieving, as working together with others with similar experiences is very healing. Contact the surgery to get involved. Millie Barnes

AND NOW FOR SOME FUN! - STIR-UP SUNDAY!

Have you noticed the arrival of Christmas Puddings on our supermarket shelves? Always a sign that Christmas is coming, but perhaps you're thinking of making your own. The link with the Anglican Church seems to come from centuries ago. The expression comes from the collect for the day in the 1549 Book of Common Prayer and the first line is: "Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people..."

So what has that to do with cooking? It was perhaps in Victorian times that the words and traditions of the day were linked and the family would come together to stir the many ingredients into our famous pudding.

At some point it became traditional to stir in a silver sixpence (today a 5p coin is the nearest thing we have for the job), but A WORD OF WARNING HERE: IF YOU DO PUT A COIN OR OTHER METAL OBJECT IN, MAKE SURE YOU DON'T PUT THE PUDDING INTO THE MICROWAVE AT ANY STAGE!!!

The good fortune intended for the person who finds the coin will turn into a sudden and possibly dangerous DISASTER.



A homemade Christmas Pudding can be absolutely delicious, so good luck to all who have a go at making one and enjoy the fruits of your labour. Bon appétit!
