

BUS ROUTE CHANGED - AGAIN

The weird bus routes introduced in March, with each bus coming in and out of the village twice, were much disliked. In response to a number of requests, Stagecoach changed them again in September to something more rational. Both 2 and 2A now revert to the old No 5 route into the village via the Painswick Road. The 2 follows the old number 5 route out of the village, turning from Churchfield Road into Staites Orchard, Woodland Green and over the motorway via the Ash Path. The 2A doesn't go to Woodland Green, but stays on Upton Lane. So if you are coming home on the 2A remember to get off at the Post Office or you'll be back in Abbeymead!

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Parish Council Report

SUMMARY NOTES FROM THE SEPTEMBER COUNCIL MEETING

The Council is arranging a meeting with Gloucestershire County Council to discus concerns about trees, hedges and shrubs encroaching onto pavements, restricting width and blocking signs from view.

A vacancy exists on the Council. If you are interested and require more information please contact the Clerk, Roy Balgobin on 621688.

The Chairman, Keith Pearson, sincerely thanked all those involved in the production of the USL Life Newsletter. It was a superb and professional publication, he said.

Police Report. PCSO Mortimer advised of the following incidents in the Village since the last meeting: Anti-social behaviour (motorcycle use off road), two domestic burglaries.

Parish Website. Cllr. Wilson reported that progress has been made on the upgrading of the Parish Website which is expected to go live towards the end of October 2014.

World War One Centenary. Following on from the remarkable memorial displays in August, Cllr. Roberts reported the projects including the War Memorial Restoration, Memorial Plaques for the Church and a funding bid to the Heritage Lottery in the region of £4,000. The Chairman extended thanks Mike Stratford and Cllr. Roberts for the tremendous organisational work committed to providing an excellent and fitting World War One Centenary in the Village.

WWI Centenary Tree on the Village Green. The Council agreed in principle to remove the roots of the recently felled Cedar Tree and replace it with a semi mature tree that does not overpower the area. The Clerk will seek advice on cost and type of tree for consideration at the next meeting.

Allotment Windmill. The Council received correspondence from an allotment holder requesting retrospective permission to erect a windmill on his allotment. The Council, mindful of the allotment holders' tenancy agreement, deemed that the windmill is a structure and felt that it was unsightly and therefore agreed to refuse the request.

Recreation Ground Drainage. The Council agreed to a quote to lay an additional land drain by the practice goal mouth on the Recreation Ground, subject to seeking a professional view that the specifications detailed in the quotation are adequate.

NEW CHURCHYARD GATE

Thanks to an anonymous donor, the very unusual turnstile gate into the churchyard from Churchfield Road has been replaced with a new, and very elegant one. The gate was originally put in place in 1919 in memory of Henry Isaac Tranter who was killed in action in WW1. It has been replaced a few times since. The newest version is a fine piece, displaying great craftsmanship - the work of village resident Roy Simpson.

UPTON ST LEONARDS NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH REPORT

Following on from last month I can give more of an update of what has been happening in Upton St Leonards relating to police matters. Between 1st April and 8th September the public has been involved in contacting the Police on 95 occasions mostly passing on information or seeking information about their concerns. Of the crimes reported over the period there has only been 1 non-domestic burglary (3 cycles were stolen from a locked shed). There have been 6 vehicle related crimes, mainly theft from, but one instance of a car being stolen from a garage and there has also been a theft of fuel oil.

So Upton St Leonards is not exactly a crime hotspot and long may it remain as such. However you should remember that if you have any concerns about your family security or about other matters related to crime or disorder, please use the Police as they are a public service. In an emergency I am sure

we all know the right number to ring is 999. This is for instances where LIFE IS THREATENED or THERE IS A CRIME IN PROGRESS or A CRIME IS LIKELY TO OCCUR or SOMEONE IS INJURED.

For all other instances of contacting the Police there is a new simple number to remember 101. The call is charged at local rate and this should be used for informing the police or seeking information on non urgent matters. This number can also be used to ask for a local Officer or PCSO to call to see you to address your concerns face to face.

Please consider joining Neighbourhood Watch with a registered scheme and if you want more information please contact me.

Gloucester doesn't often have a world class exhibition, but Crucible 2 surely falls into that category. Where else can one see 100 works of sculpture brought together from 60 leading contemporary artists? The exhibition at the Cathedral opened in September and continues through October. Very well worth a visit.

Pets' Corner As we head into Autumn, here's a few things to bear in mind...

Ticks have been really prevalent this year. There has been a lack of really effective long-lasting treatments but a completely new prescription product is now available, for dogs only at the moment, that treats fleas and ticks for at least 3 months just by giving a chewable tablet! Marvellous. If you don't know what Lyme's Disease is, then check it out. It affects dogs and people and can lead to a prolonged flu-like illness.

Keep vigilant for fly strike in rabbits mainly (but any old or infirm pet with a mucky bottom or wound). Fly blown refers to hatched maggots that disgustingly eat the flesh of the affected animal. This can lead to disastrous illness within a matter of hours so check at least once a day right up until late autumn.

Remember to consider treatments and strategies for pets that have noise phobias especially fireworks. There are various over the counter "calmers" but also prescription medicines that can significantly reduce the fear and anxiety associated with loud bangs. Early intervention makes a big difference to the outcome. Your vet practice has all the tools to keep your pets calmer this firework period. Leaving it until they are fearful rarely works as well as preventative treatment.

Harvest mites (tiny orange dots found between the fur) can cause great itchiness to cats and dogs mainly. The larval stages around at this time of year can be a real nuisance.

Dogs love fruit and in moderation is fine but did you know that grapes or similar in all forms (raisins, sultanas, currants) can be a significant kidney toxin? This is not dose-dependant, i.e. just a few can cause harm. So keep your grapes and fruit cake to yourself!

Gardening Tips for Autumn

It's surprising how many people don't give their lawns any attention and a decent lawn gives a better overall impression of the garden. Grass after all is a plant and, if nurtured, pays dividends. You should now be mowing less, with the blades raised. The lawn needs scarifying or raking over to remove the moss and thatch to make room for the grass to grow. Next job is to aerate to relieve compaction and let the air, water and nutrients move through the soil. The lawn now needs a feed but make sure you use autumn fertilizer as the spring/summer fertilizers are high in nitrogen to produce a rich green lawn but as summer comes to an end, lawns need a different nutrient blend that is low in nitrogen but high in phosphate and potash to toughen up the roots ready for winter. You can then top dress with gritty sand or turf dressing, if needed.

This time of year is all about cutting down and tidying up, planting bulbs, and if you are lucky enough to have a greenhouse, remove shading and a bit of scrubbing with hot water will bring the glass up sparkling clean. Check guttering for trapped leaves. Use a hot solution like Jeyes Fluid to disinfect the inside, but make sure you take out any plants and sweep the debris out first. Ventilate well over the next couple of days to dry it thoroughly.

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
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Upton St Leonards People

MIKE STRATFORD

Mike is one of those residents who seem to have been involved in all aspects of village life. He is motivated by serving people, as his many roles confirm. Name almost any committee and Mike's been on it!

A little history first, Mike and wife Pam have three children and four grandchildren. They relocated from Harrow with Andrew and Helen in July 1978 and Emily was born a year later. Pam was a Specialist Nurse Practitioner with a BSc (Hons) in Community Nursing and Mike worked at GCHQ. They remember how dark the village seemed at night compared with the city and felt awe-struck at the star-filled sky.



Children's activities brought about the Stratford family's involvement in the village and over the years they have supported many USL events. Mike served for 25 years as the 11th Gloucester Upton Pack

Assistant Cub Scout leader, later 1st Upton St. Leonards Cub Scouts, where he became Baloo.

Mike was a Parish Councillor and Chaired the Village Hall Committee for six years, during which time the Lady Downe Annex was built. He still organises social functions in the Village Hall via the Social Committee. When Gloucester threatened to take over USL in the 1980's, he joined the fight to halt the takeover with USCAN, an organisation which now maintains the village environment.

Mike served on the Flower Show Committee for fifteen years come rain or shine and after retiring, helped Upton Primary School improve facilities during his five years as Governor. He facilitates the church-funded 'Open the Book' events by reenacting Bible stories with a tea-towel on his head.

History has been Mike's passion since winning a school exam prize. In 2000 he helped to organise an end of the century exhibition from which grew the Upton History Group and in August 2014 he organised an amazing exhibition to commemorate the village's involvement in the First World War. Perhaps the old adage is true - if you want anything doing, ask a busy person.

His is a member of Upton PROBUS, an organisation for retired men and women, which continues to flourish in the village. TV fame was secured by pushing the button when the National Lottery came to USL in 1995. He still has a copy of his performance and we'd love to see it some time!

Mike firmly believes that the future of Upton is in the hands of its residents and would encourage them to participate in village life, either by attending events, joining in the many societies or volunteering for service. 'Perhaps it is my Scout promise to help other people', he says, 'but I believe in a community where people help each other. I hope this does not become old-fashioned'. We agree Mike and thank you for your many years of humble service.

Oh, and as for hidden talents? He can walk on stilts - now, that we do have to see!

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CHURCH NEWS for the Parish Church, Upton St Leonards

The Priest-in-Charge, Rev Christine Birkett writes ...

Dear Friends

As I write this letter, we are enjoying some wonderful early autumnal weather and I have been able to enjoy chatting with some lovely folk in their gardens as they have been weeding and pruning.

I am sure you will have noticed the ongoing transformation of the churchyard recently as various individuals and work parties including USCAN, have been laboriously clearing away overgrowth. Others have also been working hard inside the church as we have been preparing for our 'Quinquennial Inspection' which is very much overdue. It is always a delight to see transformation but it is only achieved by effort. So I should like to say a big thank you to Jenny our churchwarden and everyone for giving up their time and energy to make this happen. You are very much valued and appreciated.

By the time I next write, the architectural surveyor should have given us his verdict and we will be able to begin planning for the inevitable repairs and the perpetual maintenance that an ancient church building like Upton St Leonards demands.

This month we celebrate the goodness of God in providing for our needs in the form of the food we have to eat. We can also think of those through whom God works to actually grow and harvest our food. Jesus often refers to the people who do the donkey work, the sower in the field, the farmer who stores in barns, the men who sort out the wheat from the tares, the labourers in the vineyard.

These days, however, such people are often overlooked or forgotten, especially if they are far away. We are very happy to find the fruits of their labours on our plates, the bananas or rice or chocolate or coffee or tea, but we seldom acknowledge those who produce this nutritious food. This is not God's way. He is a God of justice and fairness and he calls his people to a similar pattern of life.



At harvest time, therefore, we are called to be thankful. Thankful to God, yes, certainly but also thankful also to those children of God who work tirelessly so that we might be nourished with such a selection of delicious fare in the more prosperous parts of the world. But thankfulness is empty unless we give it substance. Therefore Christians and others work hard trying to overcome the inequalities which exist in our world and also enable a fairer deal for poor farm workers. This can be done partly by financial giving through organisations like Christian Aid and Oxfam but it's also good to support fair trade. Poor farmers need the opportunity to sell their produce at a fair price and not one that keeps them in poverty.

Please take some time out to enjoy this wonderful time of year when we can savour our beautiful environment, ponder on mellow mists and fruitfulness and give thanks to God our creator. With every blessing and prayer,

QUINQUENNIAL INSPECTION

The most iconic building in Upton St Leonards is St Leonards Church which was started in the 12th century to conduct Christian Church services. Unless the building is properly maintained it will be condemned and unusable.

The process to maintain this building, which we are required to follow, is to employ a qualified and registered Architect, at our own cost, every five years to conduct a survey of the church and churchyard and identify any cases of deterioration. This is called The Quinquennial Inspection.

It is then our responsibility to rectify all deficiencies reported.

Unfortunately this work has been allowed to lapse and we have a long list of outstanding tasks identified from previous QIs and another survey this year, which will certainly identify more work.

To overcome this situation Rev Christine initiated funding with an appeal, a few months ago and the response was overwhelming, over £7500 was donated. Also a dedicated team of volunteers has been created to conduct or organise the various tasks.

Work already completed

- All churchyard gates have been repainted
- Ivy has been removed from the church wall
- The vestry has been redecorated

Work in hand

- An approved contractor has conducted an electrical installation survey and will correct the many deficiencies identified.
- Doors to the belfry are being repaired
- Ivy is being removed from gravestones and outside monuments
- An approved architect is being commissioned to conduct the next QI.

The funding raised is sufficient to cover the above tasks but there are many more and all donations to the separate Quinquennial Fund will be greatly appreciated and should be sent for the attention of Rev Christine.

We propose to include a regular report in this village newsletter so that all of the village can be advised of our progress.

Meet the Church Team - this month Rev Christine

Christine was born in Sipson, Middlesex. Her father was a soldier so she became quite accustomed to travelling and went to 13 schools in Singapore, Germany and England. At 18 she enlisted and served with Army Medical Services as a medical clerk and medical assistant. She then married a soldier and had three boys.

During the late eighties and early nineties Christine served as a missionary with Youth With A Mission, working alongside a parish church in Southwark Diocese and a Christian Community School with families.

She was eventually led back to a Military Hospital, in Woolwich as chaplains' assistant. It was there during the Gulf War that she first sensed a call to ordained ministry and began her discernment process. She studied Practical Theology at Cardiff University and worked in the community with families and young children in Cardiff and Newport.

Her ministerial training was completed at Trinity College Bristol and she was ordained deacon in Gloucester Cathedral in 2008. She then served as a curate, first in Berkeley and then Cainscross in Stroud. She then became an associate minister with churches in Rodborough, Selsley and The Stanleys before coming to Upton St Leonards last year.

THE ARCHDEACON OF GLOUCESTER, THE VENERABLE JACKIE SEARLE, ON VOLUNTEERS

Some years ago I left my vicarage by taxi to go to the station to attend the four-day meeting of the Church of England's General Synod in London.

'Where are you off to?' asked the taxi driver. I explained as well as I could, and he followed up with the comment, 'I expect you get paid more for doing that?' 'Oh no,' I said. 'I do it for love!' He looked surprised: 'I didn't think anyone did anything for love anymore.'

He should come and look at the church. Church is full of people who do things for love. 'Love your neighbour as yourself' is the golden rule, and many people put this into practice in a myriad of ways. They set up lunch clubs for the elderly; they run toddler groups; they litter pick on Saturday mornings. They sing, act, bake, visit, run youth groups, organise food banks, support local charities, care for the sick... the list is endless.

I don't think of what Christians do as volunteering, more as loving God and neighbour; actions that flow out of our calling in Christ and our desire to serve him and one another. Of course, Christians don't have the monopoly on this but more people do unpaid work for church organisations than any other organisation in the UK and a quarter of regular churchgoers are involved in voluntary community service outside the church.

Churchgoers overall contribute 23.2 million hours voluntary service each month in their local communities outside the church. That's something to celebrate, and whether you think of it as 'volunteering', or as 'doing this for love', I'd like to say a big 'THANK YOU'.

HELPING THE CHURCH HELP OTHERS

Churches across the Diocese of Gloucester have strong involvements with their surrounding communities. They range from helping rebuild broken lives to protecting the vulnerable.

But running these schemes needs money and it is only through generous donations that they are able to keep running. Through people's generosity, the Church is able to help more than 600,000 people who live throughout our 325 parishes.

Churches want to journey with their community together. Often they are the only public building in the community, bringing people together in times of joy and sorrow, to celebrate and remember.

This is the Church's way of expressing God's love for the entire community which it serves. It is the generous giving of those who value and support the Churches work which underpins all its work.



More than 60 percent of the Church of England's

total income comes from individual regular giving. At a parish level, this can account for up to 85 percent of their income.

In this diocese we take the subject of giving seriously and have lots of advice and guidance for those who wish to donate to support their Church.

If you wish to support your Parish Church through a regular gift there are several ways you can do this. Talk to your vicar, parish treasurer, Gift Aid officer or churchwarden. ALL SAINTS' ACADEMY STUDENT HANNAH WHELAN, REFLECTS ON HER TRIP TO TANZANIA.

In July 2014 I was one of 21 students and staff from All Saints' Academy who was lucky enough to visit Kasulu in Western Tanzania on mission to help build Bishop Makaya Secondary School, visit local schools, towns and teach English. We were extremely humbled by the extraordinary greetings and generosity we received from the moment we touched down at Kasulu airport, to every school, church visit or meeting with local people, until the day we left.

We lived with 21 students and staff from a range of schools in the local area, who were exceptionally generous and patient at helping us feel welcome and settled with local cultures and ways of life; from meals, schools and church services. We were invited to the largest church in Kasulu where we were introduced to the local people. We also enjoyed a spectacular lunch they had provided for us. Even though many of the locals had very limited or no English, this didn't matter, as they still treated us like their friends / family.

Kasulu, Tanzania is a very special and spiritual place that will always have a space in our hearts. It was a life changing trip, which I wouldn't have been on if it wasn't for the Diocese of Gloucester, Western Tanzania and in particularly, Staff at ASA for organising and Helen Sammon for the support. I feel like we have made friends that will last forever, and it is something that I will never forget.



The drawing below is a butterfly - you knew that! But someone has taken away its beautiful colours. It is a quite common butterfly called a Red Admiral. There's a clue to some of its colour in its name! How about putting the colours back in with crayons? baby hippo is called a calf.

Hippos typically live for around 45 years. Hippos eat mostly grass.

There is a hippo and calf outside Gloucester Cathedral now! Have you seen them?

Victorian benefactor still benefits Village!

Upton St Leonards' residents can apply for financial assistance from a charity originating from the 1800's! At that time a certain Lady Downe came as a guest to stay with the Brooke Hunt family who lived at Bowden Hall. She was a wealthy widow who occupied herself with 'good works'. She replaced the small village school with a substantial school building close to the church (this is now a day nursery but was used as a school until 1995). Lady Downe also bought land locally and set up various small charities for the benefit of the poor. She showed interest in the life of the school children and would arrive at the school in her pony and trap, stabling them in the wooden shed in the school yard! When Lady Downe died in 1867 she was buried in the churchyard at Upton.

Over the years following, the charities contributed to village and school life, for example the little girls at the school were provided with red flannel aprons, and the poor of the village received a bag of coal each winter.

In 1982 the charities benefited greatly when the land was sold for development. It was agreed that the Charity Commission should be approached to set up 'The Lady Downe Charity' to provide a scheme respecting the original wishes of its benefactor for the inhabitants of the old Parish of Upton St Leonards as of 1966 (which included parts of Abbeymead, Abbeydale and Cooper's Edge). This does mean that the Charity is restricted to helping those who live in the Parish,

and have been resident for at least one year, or those who have lived previously in the Parish for at least a period of ten years and have moved away, though still have close connections locally.

Since 1982 the Charity has been able to offer financial assistance to local residents who are most in need in a variety of ways, as the Charity's Scheme operates for the relief of need, hardship or distress. The local village school is a major beneficiary of the Charity. Other local schools, clubs and organisations such as Scouts and Raleigh International have also benefited and young people between the ages of eighteen and twenty-five can apply for educational or training awards.

Times are very different now from the days of the Victorian Lady, whose concerns for the education of local children and her support of the needy, led to the establishment of the Lady Downe's Charitable Trust. Her generosity one hundred and fifty years ago is still influential in the life of Upton St Leonards today.


