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What's Been Happening in the Village

A Lot of Hot Air in Upton

At around 7.30am on Saturday, 5th September local residents may well have heard the roar of hot air being released into the envelopes of hot air balloons. Over a dozen balloons were seen to be rising slowly, from a field just off Rance Pitch. The sight was spectacular, as they hovered for some time, appearing, from a distance, to be on the point of collision.

The strange part was that the balloons didn't rise as rapidly as would normally be expected and indeed, some seemed to drop down again before rising again and eventually floating gracefully off into the distance. The colours and markings were clearly visible, providing a spectacle in our skies.

6.50, Sunday morning: your correspondent, not being an early morning person, was lying in his bed and once again heard that sound of hot air blasts being released. From his bedroom window could be seen the top part of a balloon, close to rising up. Senior management was roused from her slumbers and a decision made to dress quickly and view the sights at close quarters.

The gate to the field was open and several vehicles, with trailers attached, had long since disgorged their contents and 16-17 balloons were rising slowly up. Again, they seemed to rise above the ground and above the tree line but make no further progress. The air was very still. Enquiries from people with clipboards revealed the answer: this was no leisure flight but a competition. On the ground in the field was a large white plastic X. The balloonists / pilots had to lift off, remain as close as possible to the field for a minimum of ten minutes and drop a red marker, as near to the cross as possible. One that we saw was no more than about 10 yards from the cross. Others could be seen releasing their markers in adjacent fields, with their ground crew running out to retrieve the markers, tracking the distance from the cross with GPS devices. Once the markers were dropped the balloons continued their flights, with the next destination (with a similar objective) being Aston Down airfield.

Concern was expressed that the noise of the burners may have disturbed the sleep of some residents. However, from the small but curious groups of people on the pavements in the village, I believe that generally people had enjoyed the spectacle and not minded having the slight disturbance.

Hannah Hunt: Paracycling

After winning two bronze medals in Italy, Hannah (on the right in the picture) was invited to take part in the World Championships in Switzerland in July. She was very excited, having not expected to be selected but sadly had to withdraw at the last minute because of illness. Her funding may run out in November, so the possibility of a Rio Olympics place is in the balance as the guideline is that only potential gold medal winners will make up the team.

Whatever the outcome Hannah says the degree of fitness she has achieved and the new friends she has made whilst training and racing have been a great benefit to her over the past 18 months. Thanks to everyone who has supported her.

Volunteering - Samaritans

In 1938 Chad Varah, a 24 year old Anglican priest conducted his first funeral service. It was for a 14 yr old girl who took her own life after having her first period. With no-one to tell her otherwise, she presumed she had a sexually transmitted disease and killed herself for the shame it would bring. Chad was deeply affected by this experience and after he was given his own parish in Mansion House in London, he launched a 999 telephone service for people feeling suicidal. He was, he said "a man willing to listen". On 5th Nov 1953 Samaritans was born, "a listening service that was non judgemental, confidential and non religious." It was the world's first crisis listening service for those contemplating suicide. As well as telephone listening Chad and his volunteers welcomed callers at the Centre in Mansion House.

I started volunteering for the Samaritans over 6 years ago, prompted by hearing the Radio 4 Charity Appeal whilst having a Sunday morning lie-in. During the appeal the role of the volunteer was mentioned several times. The importance of their commitment coupled with good training was central to the aim of the Samaritan organisation, which is to reduce the number of suicides. I remember feeling quite clearly that this was for me. I hasten to add that I was not looking for "something to do". The next day I phoned my local Samaritan Branch who invited me to an Information Evening the following week. I went along, was later interviewed and accepted for training. Everything seemed to fall into place.

Volunteers undergo a 6 month training course, usually one day a week for the first 6 weeks. The training feels quite intense at the beginning because not only are you learning new skills in empathy, listening and responding, but you discover things about yourself and others that will benefit you in other areas of your life. Confidentiality and non-judgement are at the heart of the Samaritan Training. The "work" is to be quietly with the caller and encourage them to explore their thoughts and feelings. Above all we are Listeners, we are not Counsellors and we never give advice or tell callers what to do, preferring instead to explore possibilities, but always leaving decisions to the caller. Towards the end of the training we are given a mentor for ongoing support. With the initial training over, I worked alongside my mentor until I was ready to take calls and so began the process of becoming a Samaritan.

The Samaritan approach is to allow the caller to see moods and changes in mood as normal and not a deficiency in character,

and to help them change the question from "how can I make things different" to "how can I take care of myself". In other words we encourage the caller to be gentle with themselves as they go through the turmoil that heightened emotions can bring. As Listeners we have found that to share your inner life, to expose it to another can free us from the damaging grip that dark thoughts and feelings can have on our daily lives. To recognise that all people have varying emotions, sometimes frighteningly so, can be very liberating to the individual racked with self doubt and hopelessness. Samaritans are not shy of exploring how or why callers are thinking of killing themselves. "Are you feeling suicidal?" is a frequently asked question. We also recognise that for some people the pain of living can become intolerable and as Samaritans we always respect their choice.

Samaritans attract like-minded people who come from all walks of life and I find their passion for "the work" both uplifting and inspiring. As a Listener I find it a strange honour to be told the secret emotions of another person's life, to be trusted with the fragility of humanity is deeply moving. The attitude and practice of non judgement, empathetic listening and confidentiality has for me become my way of life, and slowly, slowly I am becoming a Samaritan.

Today there are over 200 Centres in the UK and Ireland. Samaritans still see face to face callers, do telephone listening, letter, E-mail and text. If you think you might be interested in volunteering have a look at the website, samaritans.org or telephone the local Gloucester Branch 01452 302100.



A message for Bible Sunday, 25 October from the Archdeacon of Gloucester, Jackie Searle

'I rejoice at your word, like one who finds great treasure' Ps 119:162

One rainy day, a few years back, I spent a happy half an hour in the Sir John Ritblat Treasures gallery of the British Library. 'Treasures' is the right word. Along with scribbled lyrics by John Lennon and hand-written script from Charlotte Bronte and Shakespeare, was a 4th century fragment of the gospel of St John. I stood in awe and looked for a long time at the neat Greek script on ancient, torn parchment. I thought of the original writer, the careful copying, the safe keeping and guarding of such treasure over centuries.

It is so easy for us to take the Bible for granted, opening it up as we can these days on our tablets or screens. Bible Sunday is a reminder to rejoice at God's word, like one who finds great treasure.

We remember with gratitude the authors, the copiers, the guardians, the translators, the printers, the publishers, many of whom risked or gave their lives that we might access this treasure in our own homes, in our own language, every day. Let us value this treasure and, like them, make sure we pass it on.

Have you or someone in your church ever considered becoming a foster carer? Gloucestershire County Council is in need

of foster carers for children of all ages but especially older children, teenagers and children with additional needs.

All children are different, and to meet their needs, the county council is looking for a wide variety of people from many different backgrounds. For some fosterers, faith is a motivating factor. What all foster carers have in common is a desire to care for young people to help them achieve their full potential. Foster carers need to be patient, tolerant and resilient and having a good sense of humour is very useful.

Foster carers with the county council receive substantial support including a dedicated fostering social worker, monthly home visits, ongoing training and monthly support groups. In addition foster carers receive a weekly maintenance and skills allowance that can amount to more than £300 a week if you foster a teenager. Fostering families with a church background may also benefit from having a supportive church community around them who are willing to listen, help and understand.

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Celebrating Some USL History

The Jet Age in Upton

What is the most important thing that ever happened in sleepy Upton St Leonards? Was it the Lady Downe legacy...her school and Trust Fund? Could it be the Birchall family, funding both the Village Hall and the BMI? Did Henry VIII sleep here? Was it perhaps the monastic establishment at Prinknash Abbey or Taena and its community?

Or was it the first jet flight at our local airfield? Could Upton's greatest claim to fame be that the Gloster Aircraft Company designed, built and test flew Britain's first jet here in Upton St Leonards, powered by the world's first Jet engine, designed by Sir Frank Whittle?

Fields straddling the parish boundaries of Hucclecote, Brockworth and Upton St Leonards were selected by the 'Air Board' as a suitable site for an 'Aircraft Acceptance Park' early in 1915.

The Gloster Aircraft Company (GAC) formally established its headquarters here, partially within our Parish in 1928, having already used the airfield since 1921. Approximately 1/3 of the main runway (originally a grass strip) was sited within Upton, running between the foot of Nut Hill towards the Hucclecote Road and Ermin Street.

But how did the company, busily making biplanes and then Hurricane fighters under licence, come to be chosen to design and build the experimental jet plane code named the E28/39 Pioneer (and unofficially the 'squirt')? The story goes that Frank Whittle, struggling to persuade officialdom of the viability of his 'turbojet', patented his project in 1931 and successfully bench tested his engine in 1937. The Air Ministry at last took an interest and the race was on to find a company to build an airframe to house the revolutionary engine. In February 1940 GAC was issued with a contract to design and build a prototype, primarily, it is believed because the firm was identified as having not only the capability but also the capacity to undertake the task. Other

firms were too busy! Another factor was that Frank Whittle got on extremely well with George Carter, GAC's Chief Designer. GAC gave the project top priority and work started on two prototypes in the factory's experimental department. Air raid fears caused the project to be switched in great secrecy to Regent Motors in Cheltenham (the site of the Regent Arcade) where final assembly took place. Brought back to Brockworth on 7th April 1941, the tiny jet plane was ready to do a ground run. The scene was set. Tuesday 8th April saw the aircraft put through its paces with greater confidence but not before the Home Guard ensured security by taking up positions on the roads surrounding the airfield. Although the engine was only calibrated for ground testing, Gerry Sayer, the pilot, made three short hops. The final run was the longest, from Ermin Street towards Nut Hill and saw the aircraft rise 6ft off the ground and fly for about 200 yards.

Afterwards, a delighted Frank Whittle took the controls and completed a taxiing test. Whilst some have dismissed the Gloucester flights as hops and the official records show a flight at Cranwell on the 15th May as the first take-off, just note that in the record books the Wright Brothers' first powered flight was also a short hop of 284 yards. The GAC pilot's report of the day in 1941 clearly states , 'The aeroplane left the ground on each of these three runs'. Britain's first jet plane was first airborne here in our parish.

Until recently a walk to the top of Nut Hill revealed not only the old gun emplacement protecting the airfield but a clear view of the airfield itself. However with the development of the site for housing, the disused runway is now barely visible. Nevertheless a walk around Coopers Edge reveals that the new housing acknowledges its history with roads named after GAC personnel, pilots and aircraft. Reminders of our aviation heritage are there. The new school has an aircraft themed playground and the far end of the old runway abuts the new Tesco where the window glass is etched with an outline of the first Gloster jet. Outside the superstore a piece of installation art in the form of a trumpet, plays, on demand, a sound track from the days when the factory was operational. Closer to home there are still a few Uptonians who can remember aircraft flying out from GAC - low over the church and just a short flight down to Moreton Valence airfield (now Javelin Park!) for flight tests.

David Cannon, whose farm bordered the airfield, tells of a Meteor jet, losing power on take off and crash landing through a hedge onto his field. Luckily no one was hurt. I can recall a neighbour, Elsie Robins, who worked in the GAC canteen, relating how she walked to and from work every day via field paths from the side of Bowden Hall around the edge of the airfield.

The Jet Age in Upton, cont ...

All gone now and just memories remain but was Britain's first jet really a world first? It was not until after hostilities ceased that the extent of German successes with early jet flight became clear. Whilst Frank Whittle's patent and early bench testing still appears to be a world first, German engineers were not far behind with similar experiments. Just before the war and in great secrecy Dr Heinkel built and flight tested an aircraft (looking very similar to the Whittle) on Sunday 27 August 1939 at Rostock, on the Baltic, some 20 months before our first Gloucester 'hop'. So whilst Frank Whittle was the first to successfully design, build and operate a working jet engine, the Gloster E28 or 'Whittle' as it later became known was not the first aircraft to fly under jet power. That accolade must go to the Heinkel He 178.

Nevertheless the little Gloster aircraft was undoubtedly the first British and Allied jet and went on to be the forerunner of a massive international industry in commercial and military aviation. Something to think about next time you board that holiday flight.

Want to know more? Visit the recently opened Jet Age Museum at Staverton, specifically established and run by local volunteers to commemorate and tell the story of the pioneering work of the Gloster Aircraft Company. The Museum is open Saturday and Sunday, 10am till 4pm. (also Wednesday in school holidays). I almost forgot to say...entrance is free!

Electoral Boundary Changes

Earlier this year the Electoral Commission enforced a boundary review on Stroud District Council, following the growth in numbers of residents over the past 10 years, which meant there are now population imbalances between wards within the Council District. Boundaries will be changed and all District Councillors will be up for re-election, in May 2016.

Upton St Leonards is affected by the change; from next May we will be grouped with Painswick, and no longer with Brookthorpe, Whaddon and Harescombe. The changes do not affect the Parish structures.

The new Painswick and Upton St Leonards Ward will elect 3 District Councillors. You will be able to vote for up to 3 candidates and you will need to remember that you are electing Councillors for the whole ward and not just one part of it, so for example if you cast a vote for a candidate thinking that person is the right one to represent the Village, that candidate may not be elected if he/she does not get enough votes from the other parts of the ward. There will be further guidance on this in due course, but if anyone has any questions in the meantime please do not hesitate to contact me.

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
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
