

## **Letters to the Editor**



#### **Exciting news from the Village Hall**

There have been a number of projects recently to enhance the village hall so that users have a better experience.

A few years ago we built the new entrance and extension and created the Training room and the Parish Office. Toilet facilities were refurbished and the old plastic chairs were replaced by more comfortable ones. We have also improved the look of the building by having the outside completely decorated a couple years ago. We replaced a whole section of rendering on the rear gable which was causing damp to penetrate.

This summer we have carried out more improvements. We have replaced the flooring to the stairs which was old, dirty and cracked and laid a new carpet in the old hallway.

However the big recent news is that we have completely replaced the main kitchen. Gone is the old kitchen range and the cupboards and in their place we have installed 2 built in ovens, 2 built in microwaves and hobs in the new work tops. All the crockery is now stored in purpose made drawers capable of taking loads up to 50 kilos. There is a new fridge and an extractor fan..



This was all done for us by The Kitchen Broker of Brockworth. Their designers and installers have done an excellent job and now we must all do an excellent job in looking after it properly. All users should treat it like they would their own kitchen. It must always be left clean and free of any items lying around. Any crockery used must be washed up and put away at all times after use.

The Management Committee has committed £11,000 to this project and we are sure that when you see it you will realise it represents very good value for money. It is hoped that all users will enjoy this excellent new facility.



### CLIMBING FOR CROHN'S AND COLITIS UK



## **SCAFELL PIKE**

On Saturday, 10th September, Millie Barnes and I climbed Scafell Pike, England's highest mountain at 978 metres, in aid of Crohn's and Colitis UK.

Our first attempt on the previous day turned out not to be viable with rain and high winds forecast, but with the absurdities of our British climate, the following day thankfully dawned bright and clear and we set off to scale the summit, sporting our fundraising tee shirts.

Armed with rucksacks full of energy giving foods, plenty of fluids, an array of clothing, compasses, maps and all the other paraphernalia that is essential for such a climb, we set off to achieve the challenge we had set ourselves.

Our approach was from Wasdale Head, a remote valley in the Western Fells. We were immediately struck by the



sheer grandeur and majesty of our surroundings as we began our walk by the side of Wast Water, England's deepest lake. Although this is the shortest and most direct route it is also unrelentingly steep and we were grateful for the practice walks we had completed during the past months to improve our stamina.

With heavy rains from the previous day, crossing the beck at Lingmell Gill was a little precarious and we were glad of our poles to steady us as we stepped, hearts pumping, through the rushing water.

On reaching the summit we took the final steps to the flat top of the circular stone cairn, next to the OS trig point. The views were astoundingly beautiful albeit in soft focus, due to a light mist, but this only seemed to enhance the wonder of our ethereal surroundings.

We had hoped to be able to see the Isle of Man, being told that it was visible on a clear day. However whilst it was clear below the summit, the slight haze at the top prevented this, although it didn't prevent us from being welcomed to the Isle of Man on our smartphones! (in silent mode of course). The mysteries of modern telecommunications....

After boosting our calorie intake with a few chocolate bars and the famous Kendal Mint Cake, we reluctantly agreed it was time to make our descent. This required a great deal of concentration



over the rocky terrain and as neither of us were keen to sustain any injuries, conversation was somewhat restricted! All the while we were being passed by more and more eager climbers; some going up, some going down, climbers of varied nationalities, ages and abilities, with several stopping us on the way to tell us about someone they knew with Crohn's; one chap even gave us a tenner and wished us good luck!

After several hours or so of picking our way down the stony lunar-like landscape we finally reached the safety of the Wasdale Head Car Park, feeling both exhilarated and proud that we had accomplished our walk without mishap.

On most summer evenings there were groups or individuals making use of them. One school group has used them regularly and a Gloucestershire disabled team has been there most weeks.

# Churchwarden Keith Robbins writes about St Leonard:

Dear Friends, this year St Leonard's Day (6th November) falls on a Sunday and we will celebrate our patronal festival in church.

In England there are 177 churches named after St Leonard.

So who was St Leonard? Well, it is documented that he was a French nobleman who became a Christian around 496. The King wanted him to continue with his noble duties; Leonard declined and went instead to the monastery of Micy near Orleans. The fact that he became the patron saint of midwives arises from the legend that King Theodebert was hunting in a forest near Leonard's hermitage when the Queen was suddenly taken with birth pangs. Leonard came to her aid with prayers and practical help and she had a fine baby.

Once Leonard became a monk he tried to help prisoners and pleaded for their release with many prison governors. As true Benedictines the monks earned their living by agriculture and used their earnings to help the poor. Leonard used his money to ransom prisoners; thus he also became the patron saint of prisoners. He died in about 559.

There is also a legend that he once visited England and lived for some years in a forest in Sussex. In a fight with a dragon he was wounded, killed the beast, so holy was the saints blood that where it touched the ground, lilies-of-the-valley sprang up, and they have flowered in spring time ever since.

The forest is known as St. Leonards Forest today, and there are places where beds of wild lilies-of-the-valley can still be found.

So there you have it, a brief summary of our patron saint.



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## **News from your Village Agent**

We are fortunate enough to live in a beautiful area but it is an area with limited public transport and as such we all tend to rely on our cars. What then when we get older and maybe are faced with having to stop driving?

Many of us enjoy the freedom and independence that driving gives us, and we don't want to give it up. An illness, comments by friends and family or negative stories in the media about older drivers can lead to some people losing their confidence on the road and giving up driving before they need to. But in fact, statistics show that older drivers are relatively safe.

Your licence entitlement will expire when you turn 70, this doesn't automatically mean you have to stop driving – you'll just need to apply to the Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency (DVLA) to renew it every three years.

However it may be time to give up driving if:

- your reactions are noticeably slower than they used to be
- you find traffic conditions increasingly stressful
- your eyesight is getting worse, or you have a medical condition that may affect your ability to drive safely. It's a legal obligation for you to declare certain conditions and if you have an accident where your health condition may have been a factor and you haven't declared it, you could be prosecuted and your insurance might not cover you.

It is good to have a plan as not being able to drive should not be the end of you getting out and about. Not driving or having lost confidence in driving should not men that you loose confidence in living. There are local voluntary schemes in most areas with drivers willing to take you to appointments and social activities. My own Dad was faced with this and obtained a mobility scooter which maintained his independence locally. It meant a weekly trip to the shops with me but coupled with a stop for coffee and cake that gave us time together. The clubs and organisations he belonged to arranged pick ups and

new friendships were formed. A Mobility Centre can advise you on the best options for your particular circumstances.

Some of the medical conditions that you must declare are: dementia, diabetes — if it is insulin-treated, Parkinson's, epilepsy, any chronic neurological condition, such as multiple sclerosis, any condition that affects both eyes, or total loss of sight in one eye.

For a full list of medical conditions and disabilities you must declare, check the Gov.uk website at www.gov.uk/health-conditions-and-driving or read the DVLA's D100 Driving licences booklet. Ask your GP for advice.

#### Other options:

Residents of Gloucestershire who are of pensionable age, or residents who are disabled and/or cannot drive for medical reasons, are entitled to free off-peak travel on local buses anywhere in England.

The Senior Railcard is an annual savings card that's available to anyone aged 60 or over. You buy it for a one-off cost and it will allow you to make big savings on most rail fares in the UK.

Gloucestershire County Council run a county wide scheme called SAGE- Safer Driving with Age. It is a programme which provides support, guidance and coaching if necessary to be able to continue driving for as long as it is safe to do so. The cost is £30 for a one hour assessment and report and it is done from your home and in your own car and on roads you are familiar with.

If you calculate how much it costs to run a car, taking in MOT's, services, annual maintenance, insurance and tax, that can add up to a lot of taxis!

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## This month's feature article is on Rescue Dogs

When I was asked if I would write an article about rescue dogs, I was a bit dubious but I thought, this is one of my favourite topics of conversation so why not!

There are many people with rescue dogs in and around the village and I meet them regularly on my walks. We love to exchange our experiences, with advice and funny stories. But most of all we agree that the rewards are great, that's not to say there aren't a few hiccups along the way.

I have had dogs for nearly 40 years and they all have been 'second hand' or rescued one way or another. They have settled into my home with the cats that I have had and fitted around my full time employment. For this to work, I have found that a good routine is key, along with plenty of exercise and very few rules!! The rules that do exist have to be adhered to but they have always been accepted and we can then get on with having fun.

Since I retired I seem to be collecting dogs from abroad. I was first introduced to "Greyhounds in Need" by a friend of mine and after reading about the plight of the Galgos (Spanish for greyhound) in Spain, I decide that I had to give a second chance to one of these beautiful dogs. I first met Freddie after she was brought over and was in quarantine kennels in Newnham. From first sight I knew she was the dog for me. Not the best looking dog but I could see that she would be OK, even though she was too nervous for me to get anywhere near her.

As she had to spend six months in quarantine, I visited her at the kennels every Sunday and gradually gained her confidence and we became firm friends. The day came when I was able to take her home and she was quite happy to jump in the car and start her new life. In kennels she had become very destructive and chewed up any bedding that was given her, so poor girl only had a wooden pallet to sleep on. I was quite expecting to have to spend time getting her out of this habit but she has never destroyed anything since. Her frustration at being penned up must have triggered this bad behaviour so I knew that she was happy when she didn't show any signs of doing it at home.

My other two dogs have come from Greece through the charity "The Friends of the Stray of Greece". After looking at their website (the wrong thing to do for any animal lover!!), I saw Pointers that needed homes. I have always had a Pointer and adore this breed so seeing them languishing in shelters in Greece broke my heart. I made enquires as to why there were so many Pointers there and was told that people get them for the hunting season, then tend to leave them behind when the season is over. So Sally arrived here 2 ½ years ago and as there is no

quarantine now, all she had to do was to get her passport and health checks and come over with her foster mother. This re-homing was so successful I couldn't resist looking on the website again, only to find a desperate little soul that had been in a shelter for three years and was unlikely to survive another sever winter in the mountains of Thassos. It took a lot if determination and devotion, by the wonderful people working for the charity, to get her out and I picked her up from Cobham Services in January, so now I have Jasmine.



I urge anyone considering having a companion dog to think about a rescue dog. There are so many beautiful dogs in shelters in this country just waiting for their chance of a new, loving home. These animals seem to know that they have been given a second chance and try their hardest to do what is expected of them and the knowledge that you have made them happy and contented is so worthwhile.

If you do think about rescuing a dog from abroad and possibly from persecution, the rewards are even greater in my opinion, but they often come with a few problems and need a lot of understanding and patience but that is about all they ask for and the rewards are endless. The dogs that find themselves in a rescue centre in the UK are usually well looked after, with good food and veterinary care but the shelters abroad are very short of money and although the people looking after them work so hard to do their very best for the injured and abandoned, only a few ever get the chance of finding a new home.....

I wouldn't be without my dogs and the love they give me but those of you out there, sharing their lives with a four legged friend, know what I mean!!!
