## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The resurfacing work in Bondend Road that was due to be done in August will now take place at the end of October - during half-term week.

The work will now include some repairs on kerbs and pavements, and the area being resurfaced has been extended along the Perry Orchard allotments. It is hoped there will also be some resurfacing done in Six Acres, in Spring 2018.

We were shown the Education Suite where children from 4 to 18 come with their schools from all over the County. There are working traffic lights with crossing lights and the children are shown how to cross the road safely. There is also a working rail crossing. There are sounds of a train approaching, then the train blows its whistle and you then hear the sound of the train speeding past. It is very realistic! The children are taken into shops and taught what they can buy at what age - cigarettes, alcohol for instance. There is a Custody Suite and Court. Next month we meet in the Village Hall where the talk will be about "Making a Garden at the Chelsea Flower Show". - Attendance at rehearsals two or three weeks prior to the actual performances: Wednesday evenings (and occasional Sunday afternoons and Monday evenings).
- Attendance at performances usually Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings.

## **Phone and Computer Clinic**



Our session on clearing up and backing up was the most successful of the seminars to date. It was great to see the training room at the Village Hall filled to capacity with laptops and tablets, wires everywhere – just what that

room was designed for. Most of the attendees ran a de-clutter task there and then – we hope they have since noticed an improvement on their computers.

We used a free program "Ccleaner". There are others available for downloading, but this one is popular and good. If you don't regularly run something like this to clear up unnecessary junk that piles up in your computer's storage, we strongly suggest you try it! To get hold of it, just search using the name and if you instead search the net for "declutter free", you will see some of the other products available. Getting rid of clutter can speed up your computer, tablet or phone considerably.

We also discussed backing up. If you have files, messages, emails, photos, music tracks on your computer, and you'd rather not lose them, you need to back them up regularly. Some of these things, it is quite likely, are automatically backed up for you, particularly if you use apps like iTunes for music, or photography apps. It takes a little bit of understanding of File Managers (like Windows Explorer or Apple Finder) to look to see what is stored on your computer that might need backing up. But backing up is easy and can be free. We recommend using "Dropbox" and Microsoft's "OneDrive", and there are others, to store precious items on the net, or you can simply use a memory stick or removable drive.

We have been asked about what we think is the best way to manage photos. There are plenty of apps set up to do this; we suggest you try using "Picasa" – it's free. This, and other apps, help you select "keepers" and organise your photos by topic or date into albums. The apps let you do lots of other things, e.g. adding titles, dates, editing the photos themselves.

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## An Invitation from St Leonards Church

We live in a world full of conflict. We are each one

of us unique and with our uniqueness comes diversity. Diversity brings richness to our lives but often we find ourselves feeling frightened by people whose ideas are different from our own and rather than embrace one another we put up barriers and find ourselves in conflict.

We see and hear about conflict all the time - it exists in our own relationships, in our families, in our communities, in the news of the wider world and it even saturates our TV and film viewing. Conflict appears to be the norm and yet many of us want to avoid conflict at all costs because we see it only as destructive. Christians and non-Christians alike mistakenly think conflict is wrong, that it is sinful. However it is not conflict itself that is sinful, it is our inability to address conflict in ways that lead to the restoration of broken relationships that is wrong. Jesus himself didn't say conflict between believers is wrong, he assumed that there would be conflict and provided teaching to enable those who followed him to resolve conflict and find reconciliation with one another. (Ref: Matthew chapter 20 verses 15-20)

Sadly communities of faith are often as reticent as others to face up to conflict and those of you who have lived in the village for some time have experienced that reality. Unresolved conflict diminishes the faith of individuals and diminishes the witness of St Leonards to the Son of God who came to restore relationships between humanity and God and between individuals. Unresolved conflict leaves people hurting and sometimes even hating.

It is with great sadness that I have been hearing of the hurt and damage conflict has caused here in the past. I am sorry for what has happened and it seems important to take the opportunity to acknowledge what has not been done well and for us as a community of faith to express our sorrow for what has gone wrong, as well as thanking God for his

faithfulness and praying for the future witness and ministry of St Leonard's. With all this in mind we are holding a special service at 10am on Sunday 5th November to mark St Leonard's Day. I am issuing an invitation to each and every person who would like to come along and join us for that service and I am doing so on behalf of the PCC and the church community. We are also planning a Bring and Share lunch to take place after the service in the church to which all are welcome.

Jesus teaching about how to handle disagreement is hugely challenging and it turns our normal way of thinking on its head. Jesus taught us to care for the offender and not necessarily establish the rights of the offended, particularly challenging when we are the one feeling offended. Jesus places the responsibility on the offended to seek reconciliation with the offender. In fact the responsibility for seeking reconciliation rests with the individual and the church community for the benefit of those who has offended and for the well-being of the whole community. Each one of us needs humility if we are going to carry out this ongoing work of reconciliation day by day and week by week.

## Revd James Turk reflects on "Songs of Praise"

### Singing In The Rain? ..... Not this time!

Music plays a very important part in our spiritual journeying. Hymn lyrics are very often remembered more than biblical texts. New Christian songs have been the vehicle for much renewal in the life of the church and great music always has the capacity to touch people profoundly. If our spirituality is so deeply shaped by music, it follows that it can be helpful sometimes to make music the basis for an entire church service, and this is exactly what happened one Sunday evening at St Leonards. And what an inspiring evening of praise, worship and fellowship it was!

As the newly arrived curate, it was a personal privilege to be invited by Clodagh to lead such a joyous and special service. The original plan was to hold the service outdoors on the village green, however, it became very clear to us that God had other plans! .... It was an easy decision to move the service to inside the church because of the rain. We also welcomed congregations from St Oswalds in Coney Hill, St Phillip and St James in Hucclecote, Christchurch in Abbeydale and St Lawrence in Barnwood. A couple of people from St Barnabas in Tuffley were also there along with folks from the Methodist church in Matson. Afterwards we all shared in the refreshments laid on by the team at St Leonards.

As is traditional in a Songs of Praise service, some members of the congregation were asked to choose a hymn that had a special meaning for them. They were invited to share with the congregation the reason for choosing their hymn and I was interested to hear how the familiar hymns of the church have so deeply touched people in so many different ways. To some people it is the melody or words, to others it is because the hymn invokes memories of a specific point or person in their life. Trying to articulate how music makes us feel can be incredibly difficult, and quite rightly so, since, I think music has to be experienced. This is even more true with worship music and to sing these specially chosen hymns in a packed out church with the sound of the Gloucester Brass band, on a late summers evening was a wonderful experience indeed. Revd Clodagh gave an inspiring sermon on Psalm 67. In this Psalm we see that every verse mentions God's relationship with the entire globe. Throughout history God repeatedly speaks about his love for all nations and all people. The peoples response to God's love is to sing for joy!

I am so grateful that God puts songs in our hearts and lyrics on our lips, to express what is sometimes the deepest part of us. God gave us music for joy and celebration, for sadness and consolation, and for faith and inspiration, and for every season in our lives there is a song. Listening to the carefully chosen words from those people who had picked a hymn to be sung that night, one characteristic was constant, they had all been touched by the music. My personal thanks to everyone that made the service such a success, Gloucester Brass were a delight and they led the sung worship beautifully. It seems right to also give thanks for the great hymn writers of old - Charles Wesley, Isaac Watts, George Herbert and others, and for their modern counterparts, all seeking to take our hearts and minds to heavenly places.

## WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

### Arthur Charles Rice



Arthur was born in 1895 in Gloucester, the son of Albert Edward and Florence Kate Rice. He enlisted in Gloucester and served in the 1st/5th Battalion of the Gloucestershire Regiment. He went to France on 29th March 1915 at which time he was living in Snedhams Green, Upton St Leonards. He died on Thursday 4th October 1917 age 22. At the time of his death he was a Sergeant with service number 240110. He has no known grave and his name is recorded on the Memorial Wall to the missing at Tyne Cot Cemetery Passchendaele. It is reported he was wounded in the back while attacking a German trench on Passchendaele ridge.

### Harold Samuel Millard

Harold was born in Deerhurst near Tewkesbury, in 1889, the son of John and Alice Millard. The family moved to Pincott Farm, Nut Hill, Upton St Leonards. John Millard died in 1901, not long after moving here, but Harold's mother Alice, with her 7 sons and 3 daughters carried on working the farm. Six of the Millard boys joined up in the war and two were killed. Harold's brother Sydney was killed in July 1916. Harold served in the Gloucestershire Regiment and the 1st Battalion Devonshire

Regiment, a Private with service number was 33594. He died of wounds on Sunday 7th October 1917 age 28. He is buried in Estaples Military Cemetery 27kms south of Boulogne near a large military hospital.

### **Edwin James Mills**

Edwin was born in 1881, the son of James and Jane Mills of Birch Tree Cottage, The Pound, Upton St Leonards. He married Alice Jones in 1912, and they had one son – James. Edwin served in the 6th Battalion Berkshire Regiment; he was a Private with service number 220225. He died on Friday 12th October 1917 age 36. He has no known grave and his name is recorded on the Memorial Wall to the missing at Tyne Cot Cemetery Passchendaele.

## Barbara Swindin - A Woman of Fortitude

In a quiet corner of this village there lives a quintessentially English lady, Barbara Swindin.



An unusual name for an unusual woman, for Barbara's petite stature belies a life of rugged strength and determination.

Born in Widnes and migrating first to Nailsworth then Surrey and eventually back to the Gloucester area, she finished her secondary education at Pates Grammar where she showed a flair for languages. She went on to gain a place at Birmingham University, where, she says, 'that's where life began'. Whilst gaining a degree in French (Hons) with German, she was given the opportunity to study languages abroad for 18 months and then the world of academia came to an end. She spent time in Essex but returned to begin an independent life here and put down roots in her own flat on the edge of Gloucester whilst taking a position in export sales at a local engineering company.

One fateful holiday, Barbara and her sister were in Scotland walking on Arran when she became curious about mountain and rock climbing and when she met a lady who gave her the name of Gloucestershire Mountaineering Club – the die was cast.

It started with a meeting, then a rock climbing weekend on the Gower. She

found this experience frightening but exhilarating – having never even climbed a tree as a child! 'You just went out and did it!'

Climbing can be an expensive business but, with a rudimentary kit of climbing gear, a pair of jeans and walking boots, she headed out. During her first year climbing, Barbara met her future husband Les, who also climbed. He'd trained as a chemistry teacher 'in order to have the long summer holidays!'. They first got to know each other by chance, on a climbing trip when the Mountaineering Club was staying for a weekend Meet in a cottage in North Wales. Barbara speaks lovingly of him 'he had a sports car and he was tall, dark and handsome – good reasons to be together!'

By 1967 Barbara was teaching French at Selwyn School and mountain climbing by now had become a joint passion, climbing, even in winter, over snow gullies and rock faces. Barbara loves the snow. Their love of climbing propelled them on to tackle even more challenging prospects and the pull of the Alps was overwhelming.

### **Hairy Moments!**

Climbing the Matterhorn in 1970 with a group of climbers, negotiating loose rock which makes it dangerous, someone ahead of them clipped a boulder which rolled down and after 'jumping' over their rope, sailed on down the mountain – they'd heard it coming but there was nowhere to run!!

On the border of Switzerland and France they went rock climbing above a glacier on the eastern side of the mountain and when almost at the top, noticed a few snowflakes coming down (it's July/August time!) Two climbers in front suddenly called out "it doesn't look too good!" Seconds later, like the 'god's had awoken, black clouds appeared, there was a roar of thunder and lightning struck the mountain close to the man in front.

They hadn't been able to see over the ridge, and although none of them were novices, conditions on the mountains can be so unpredictable and it's easy



to get caught unawares. They abseiled back down to the glacier and the storm chased them back across the ice. They could hear their metal gear "singing" from the lightning around them!!

Twenty years later in 1990 on Les Droites in the Mont Blanc range, a piece of cliff (above a glacier) the size of a car was breaking off due to the hot summer – three of them, Barbara, Les and companion, were roped together walking down the sloping face to the glacier below. Les heard it coming and fortunately, it broke up into pieces and fanned out and they survived – Barbara flattening herself against a rock whilst Les dodged the debris. **Continued on page 15**

### Pause for thought

During our chat, the inevitable thought popped into my head -'Could I ask a very personal question?' - Barbara knew immediately what I was thinking! 'Ah yes! one has been known to tether oneself with a strong rope to an immovable object and very carefully position oneself out of sight in order to do what's necessary" ..... imagine that in the freezing cold!

In her late 40's climbing began to take its toll on her body and other interests began coming to the fore. The arts had always been something she'd mulled over to pursue but what to do – Art or Music? Art was guiet and contemplative so later, on early retirement, she took an Access Course at Stroud College and nowadays maintains a studio at the Painswick Centre. The hands and fingers that clung on to the crags now hold paint brushes and pencils. She's currently working on alpine paintings using old photos and the sketch books she now produces when she still goes out to the Alps on her own. She hopes to exhibit the paintings in future.


Sadly, Les died in May 2015 but later that summer she went out to Switzerland for the anniversary of the 1<sup>st</sup> Ascent of the Matterhorn in 1865 and this year she saw "Oetzi the Iceman" exhibited in Bolzano in the Italian Dolomites.

### So, plans for the future – EXTREME TRAVEL!

Barbara's cruising the South Pacific and later on visiting the Arctic Circle of Norway in the company of Sir Chris Bonnington, who will be leading groups on a walk to see the Northern Lights - 'Why not?'!

Had Barbara completed the 52 4000m peaks in the Alps she would have been the first British woman to do so. She has written a book on her and Les' exploits called 'All but One' and I can tell you, it puts my feeble attempt to enthuse our readers, in the shade and I recommend you get yourselves a copy. There are a few available for £10 each and all proceeds will go to Sue Ryder in memory of Les.
