The weather was just right – dry, warm and sometimes sunny – the bouncy castle went up and all the months of planning came together for a fantastic afternoon. Despite this summer's unpredictable weather there were plenty of fruit, vegetables and floral entries and people had clearly been putting their spare time during various lockdowns to good use, as entries of jams & chutneys, baking and handicrafts were all up on 2019. It was particularly pleasing to see so many people exhibiting for the first time and despite their show day nerves did very well, with a number winning first prize in their chosen classes.

The family dog show proved particularly popular, and it is the first time this has been held for many years. It was great to see so many dogs taking part and all the dogs (and their owners) were very well behaved. The winner of the "dog that looks most like its owner" was a particularly popular choice; thanks to Cliff Alderman for judging the dog show at short notice.

## Upton WI

The tea and strawberries event, in president Angela Harris' garden last month, raised £141 for Breast Cancer research.

A new Pilates Class for Upton WI members is starting in October for 6 weeks.

Judy Eaketts has resigned after many years service to us as Treasurer. She was heartily thanked.

Lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer inspire us to think of beautiful visions of butterflies, dragonflies, damselflies and moths. Our first speaker this year, Ged Cassell, enthralled us with colourful pictures of these fascinating insects. The main difference between butterflies and moths is that the former love the sunshine and have long slender antennae, folding their wings vertically at rest, whereas moths fly mainly at night, have blunt, feather-like or bristle-like antennae, and wings are folded flat when resting.

We treat nettles as something to avoid and chop down, but they are vital in the life-cycle of some of our most well-known butterflies - including Red Admiral, Peacock, Painted Lady and Tortoiseshell. They lay their eggs under the leaves and the nettles protect the caterpillars from grazing animals.

Wild-flower meadows, hedgerows and gardens are havens for all kinds of insects, and many readers will know that Buddleia is a particular favourite of butterflies.

Dragonflies have inhabited the earth at least since the Carboniferous era 300 million years ago. Beautiful to look at with their iridescent wings, hovering. They are territorial and aggressively scare off rivals. Damselflies are similar to dragonflies, just as colourful but smaller with slimmer bodies. You can help these beautiful insects to survive by planting more cottage-style plants, native shrubs\* rather than exotics, leaving a corner of weeds, nettles even, and by not using chemical sprays near those parts of your garden.

(\*Buddleia isn't a native species but obviously butterflies have taken to it!)

The next meeting is Monday 4 October at 2pm in the Pavilion. The speaker will Pam Slater on the subject of her 'Cotswold Perfumery'.

On Monday 11 October we are serving a ploughman's 'Harvest Lunch' from 12.30pm, in the Pavilion. This is for anyone! The cost will be £7.50. Come and enjoy lunch and a chat in a different setting. For catering purposes, please let Angela know by Monday 4th if you intend to be there.

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## Fred Monks writes about another volunteering opportunity

## SkillZONE in Tuffley



Some of you may know of Skillzone. Perhaps your children have been on a school visit or maybe you went on a visit yourself with the Tuesday Probus group. SkillZONE is part of the Fire and Rescue Service located in the Tuffley Lane Fire Station. It's a unique safety education centre with an indoor "village" and activities to help children and adults learn to stay safe at home, online and out in their community. The village features rail, road, home, online and other aspects of safety education which are delivered in real life settings where practical. For example within the Skillzone village we have a full size house and a real double-decker bus. The first word uttered by most visitors to our village is WOW!

Skillzone has a small permanent staff supported by volunteers. There are currently two volunteers from Upton, that's myself, Fred Monks, and Janine Black. I've been involved since Skillzone opened 10 years ago and act either as a lead guide or a session guide. Janine joined us more recently as a session guide. The role of the lead guide is to set up the village for the visit, welcome the visitors and then allocate the visitors to smaller groups for the session guides to take around the village and present the safety messages.

I've found volunteering at Skillzone to be both challenging and rewarding and the people I have met, both fire service staff and fellow volunteers, have been really friendly.

Sadly, there will be no firework display or bonfire at the Village Hall this November. As reported a few months ago, changing and stricter regulations meant the traditional Guy Fawkes bonfire could no longer take place. It has just been announced that there won't be a firework display either this year, caused by difficulties in ordering the fireworks. Large-scale displays had to be ordered a long time in advance, when Covid uncertainties meant the Hall Committee could not take the risk of having to cancel.

A fireworks display IS planned for November 2022.

## Farewell to James

Sunday 3 October sees the last service led by James Turk, who has been Curate and Associate Priest at St Leonards since 2017. James writes:




In 1974, Terry Jacks released the record "Seasons in the Sun". you may remember the song. As I was only 2 when it was released I do not remember the original release personally, but I am told it was the hit of the summer. I came across the song much later in life and the refrain has always struck

a melancholy note with me. None more so than at this time of my life.

"We had joy, we had fun, We had seasons in the sun, But the wine and the song, Like the seasons, have all gone."

My season with you at St Leonard's has come to an end and I will be leaving in early October to take up a new role within the diocese and joining the ministry team in the Hardwicke, Elmore and Longney benefice. Of course, any move comes with a huge sense of sadness because people and relationships are always left behind, and that is also the case for me as I prepare to take up this new role.

I joined the St Leonards community as Curate in July 2017 and the past four years have been the most extraordinary time for me and for my family. We have met such wonderful people and even though for me there was some doubt and uncertainty when first arriving in 2017, those doubts have been unwarranted.



There have been so many 'firsts' for me during my time at St Leonard's, this had been the place that I presided at my first baptism, my first wedding and my first Holy Communion. These are huge life events not only for the people involved, but also for me as a priest in the Church of England. Therefore, St Leonard's will always have a special place in my heart, and in the hearts of my wife Sarah, and my sons Oliver and Joshua. No matter where God takes us in the years to come, our time in this beautiful part of the county will always be special to us. The friendships and relationships that have been forged through our shared faith and worship, but also forged in no small part through negotiating adversity, which came in the shape of the illness, and subsequent resignation, through that illness, of Reverend Clodagh Ingram, and of course the shared experience and impact on church life of the Covid pandemic.

All these experiences have shaped me as a person and as a priest. But even more important are the people that God has placed before me during my time at St Leonard's. The wedding and baptism families that come for their big day, the bereaved families that come looking for practical support with funeral arrangements, but also looking to make some sense about their loss and looking for comfort. And there are the everyday experiences of leading a worshipping community and working and worshipping alongside the congregations, the PCC and Churchwarden.

There have been so many memories and experiences, sad and joyful, and these have forged lasting

relationships that I hope will continue even though my family and I have moved to a different parish to spend another 'season' with a different community.

The Bible tells us that "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven." (Ecclesiastes 3:1). The point of this message is that God has a plan for all people. Thus, he provides cycles of life, each with its work for us to do, and the challenge is to accept and appreciate God's perfect timing. Change is inevitable ...it comes with being human and being part of God's plan for us. And if we remember that it is God's plan, then we need not fear change. When Terry Jacks wrote Seasons in The Sun, the lyrics suggest an ending with little hope of anything more to come. But with God there is always a new season to look forward too, and even though for us a season is coming to an end, as Christians we know a new one is about to start. So go well my friends, have faith and trust in God's perfect timing. As I move into this new role Upton St Leonards, the village, and the community of faith that I have been part of, will never be far from my thoughts and always in my prayers.



#### **BOOK REVIEW**

The Secret Diary of Adrian Mole, Aged 13¾ by Sue Townsend

Published in 1982, this is the first book in the Adrian Mole series of comedic fiction. The book is written in a diary style and focuses on the worries and regrets of a teenager who believes himself to be an intellectual. The story is set in



1981 and 1982 and refers to some of the events of those years, such as the Falklands War and the wedding of Prince Charles and Lady Diana Spencer as well as the birth of Prince William. Adrian is a fierce critic of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, listing her as one of his worst enemies. Much of the humour in this book is a result of Adrian's misunderstanding of events. The book featured on BBC Radio 4 and as a stage play and on television.

# The Flower Show - a history


# We asked Mike Stratford (who else!) to re-tell some of the history of the Upton Show, formerly known as the Flower Show. This is what he came up with.

I have been looking back at the history of the show over the years. The records I have access to go back to 1892. I have recorded some aspects of each show including the names of some of the prize winners. Many of the names will sound familiar to those who were born in Upton or have lived here for some time.

The show was based on three Horticultural Societies in Upton, Prinknash and Cranham.

I am sure the show dates back before 1892, probably founded around 1850 when Lady Downe gave land to the village for the foundation of the first allotments. Also villagers who at the time had very large gardens would grow a great deal of their own food. Classes in the show have changed a great deal over the years. The changing location of the show has also meant the show has got smaller.

In the past, classes included rabbit hutches made by boys, wood carving, best kept garden, honey in a comb, a domestic pet and a collection of vegetables. Houses employing an under-gardener, e.g. Bowden Hall, Kimsbury House, The Rectory, and St Leonards Court, were excluded from vegetable and flower competitions. How many readers have an under-gardener today?

Over the years the show has hosted running races, fireworks, a gymkhana, dog show and almost always a band.

To record full details of all the shows would require a volume of numerous pages so there follows some short details of past Flower Shows.

1892 at Bowden Hall. This was the first year Cranham was included. The band was from Leonard Stanley, Mr Souray of Highnam Court was a judge.

1893 at Prinknash Park, home of Mr & Mrs Dyer Edwards. The treasurer was the rector Rev E Scobell. Among the accounts the police cost 18 shillings and gate receipts were £4 13s 11d. Among prize winners were P, H, W, R, & A Barnfield, W Major, W Gardner, E Poole and T Hannis.

1894 at Bowden Hall. There were running races for boys and girls under 15. The band was the 1st Gloucester Royal Engineers Band. During the afternoon Mr Burt lectured on bees and bee-keeping, for which he charged 15 shillings and 9 pence.

1895 at Prinknash. It was attended by 800 people, there were fireworks in the evening. A class for any article made at home by a girl under 18 years was won by L Robbins. The number of prizes any person could win was limited to six.

1896 There was no show held because of a smallpox outbreak.

1897 The show was planned for Bowden Hall but due to the death of John Dearman Birchall it was held at Prinknash Park instead.

1898 Bowden Hall

1899 Bowden Hall. The show secretary was Bowden Hall head gardener Mr Keen. Eastington Band played for a cost of  $\pm 4.0.0$ .

1900 and 1901 Bowden Hall and the Painswick band played.

1902 A Flower Show and Coronation of Edward VII Garden Party was at Bowden Hall with a procession around the village.

1903 Bowden Hall. The Kings Stanley Band played for £5.0.0., a subscription was received from Mrs Bellows.

1904, 1905, 1906, 1907, 1908 and 1909 all Bowden Hall.

1911 No show was held because of the Coronation of George V.

1912, 1913, 1914-1918 No Shows

1920 Bowden Hall. The show chairman was Mr John Millard, and the Upton Band played, conducted by Melville Jordan. The band charged £10 10s 0d.

1921 Bowden Hall. Among the expenditure items was 1s 5½d for needles and thread, 1s 0d for flour for paste. Tea for the band cost £1 5s 0d.

1922, 1923 Bowden Hall

1924 The show held at Matson with 600 entries.

1925 Bowden Hall holds its last show as the estate is later sold. The band is the Gloucester Carriage & Wagon Works Band who charge  $\pm 10$ .

The show was then held at various locations and was not held after the war until the 1950's. For some years Arthur Cridland hosted the show at Commelines Farm, with a gymkhana, tug-o-war and other attractions. In 1970 it was held in the grounds of St Leonards Court. In 1975 it was held at Lake House Farm, Valley Lane, the home of Mr & Mrs Wickens. This show then included a gymkhana and dog show.

Another year it was held on the Stanley and before the show the marquee blew down in a storm.

In recent years the show has been held in the grounds of the Village Hall, with chairmen Mike Long and Robert Seex. Currently the chairman is Dr T Harbottle.

The show relies on many people to organise it and get it up and running. A great deal of this work falls on the secretary. In 1998 Peter Macey took over from Barbara Sproston as secretary of the show, and for 22 years Peter was the mainstay of the show, only stepping down last year.

In the 1960's a Spring Show was started which was to be a smaller event housed in the Village Hall. For many years this was organised by Evelyn Rumsey and Mrs Barbara Sproston who were also members of the main show committee.

Upton's Flower Show is a popular community event that has been held for at least the last 130 years. Long may it continue.

The 2021 season has finished, and the club has had mixed fortunes. The weather didn't help with most of May washed out and quite a few other rain cancellations. Top of the honours board must be the 2nd XI which finished first in its Division, winning 10 games, losing 2

(and 6 games were cancelled or abandoned). The First team won a few games in the first half of the season, but often was not competitive in its Division and only narrowly avoided relegation (Won 4, lost 9, cancelled 5). The Wednesday team was disappointing, conceding half their games for lack of players. We managed to play 4 Sunday friendlies, and that side of the club is slowly growing.

We had lots of very enthusiastic players in the youth section, putting

out teams at ages Under 9, Under 11, Under 13 and Under 15, and many of the older youth players featured in the adult games. Each junior team won a few games. It was great to see the ground buzzing on Thursday practice nights with so many youngsters and a really good number of adult coaches. Girls cricket is growing fast, and we had 5 girls playing and practising regularly.

<u>If</u> we can find a venue, youth training will carry on indoors through the winter, but the school sports halls we use for this are still unavailable (at the time of writing) as an after effect of the pandemic.

Stats are always important to cricketers! Our best batsman was once again someone known to most readers - Rahul Odedra, from the Village Shop. Rahul was also second in the bowling stats.

The old green roller became unusable as its gearbox seized up. We were very fortunate to find a replacement at a remarkably low cost. Almost on a whim, we put the old one up for sale on Ebay, expecting nothing. It sold for nearly 3 times the cost of its replacement, and 33% more than it cost us 10 years ago. Remarkable!

### Ruby Elkins plays a match at Lords

Ruby is one of our cricketing girls (she is also a granddaughter of the late Janet and Tony Morris of the Village). We thought she was a talented cricketer and nominated her for trials for the County. Gloucestershire has a particularly strong squad of girls at the moment in its county age group teams, and Ruby didn't make the cut. *However*, her talent *was* noted and she was selected to play for the Cotswolds area in an MCC sponsored competition aimed at increasing access to cricket for girls. From the Gloucestershire Cricket Board newsletter I quote:

"Gloucestershire Cricket Board are extremely proud of a group of girls from our wonderful county. **They have reached the MCC Foundation Finals, which will be played at Lords on Monday 20th September.** When this group of girls came together (aged between 11-15) on a winter's day in early 2021 for trials, not in their wildest dreams could they have ever imagined they would be playing the final at 'the home of cricket', Lords, in September. The Cotswolds Girls Hub navigated their way through four rounds, having the great fortune to play the quarter and semi-finals at Winchester & Harrow School respectively."

Printing schedules mean we can't quite finish this wonderful story. We hope to do so in the next issue.
