
Parish Council Report

We have a New Parish Website

Several months ago, the Parish Council agreed to replace the existing parish website which was developed and launched approximately 10 years ago. A key improvement will be the inclusion of the Coopers Edge part of the Parish rather than only focusing on the village of Upton St Leonards.

The home page, shown right, is what you will see when it is finally launched in a couple of weeks time.


The website will be found by using a search engine for Upton St Leonards Parish Council.



The website will provide a number of functions providing such things as -

- A central hub to other websites eg Planning Portal for applications, the Church, Schools, Newsletters etc
- Latest news eg sharing things like road closures as quickly as possible plus key events
- Information on facilities and services within the Parish
- Parish Council Meeting agendas/minutes
- Other Parish Council information eg audit performance/financials

Fix My Street (We Need Your Help!!)



This is a really useful independent website, built by the charity mySociety.

The site was developed to make it easy for problems in the community to be effectively reported to local councils across the UK. The real benefit of course is that many eyes are better than a few so if anyone spots a problem, it can be actioned quickly.

FixMyStreet is primarily for reporting things which are broken, dirty, damaged or dumped and need fixing, cleaning or clearance, eg graffiti, dog fouling, potholes or street lights that don't work. The site also explains what it shouldn't be used for.

There are several ways to access FixMyStreet including online via website **FixMyStreet.com** or downloading a APP (available on IOS and Android).

You enter a postcode or place name, place a pin on the supplied map where the issue exists, describe the problem and send.

Of course, if you do not own a computer or smartphone, you are able to report problems to the Parish Clerk, either in person (at the Parish Office based at Upton Village Hall on Tuesdays/Thursdays 1000-1200) or in writing via Upton Village Hall postbox.

Thank you to everyone concerned, especially Gloucester Brass for their accompaniment.







Football

The 2024-25 season is well under way for the Upton St Leonards teams. This year there are two adult teams, who usually play on Saturday afternoons, and just one youth team, Under 17s. They usually play on Saturday mornings and compete in the Severn Valley Youth League. The adult 1st team plays in the Stroud & District Football League Division 2, and you may recall that they narrowly avoided relegation last year by winning some of their final games. The reserves were relegated and now play in Division 5 North in the Stroud League.

The 2024 season finished last month. The adult teams (1st, 2nd and Wednesday) all had reasonable seasons, no-one got promoted, no one got relegated, and won about half of all adult games. The youth team at Under 15s only played 5 games, winning 2. But many of the Under 15 players joined in the adult games, a very good sign. The Under 13s were brilliant, winning all 9 of their games, and the Under 11s were nearly as good, winning 5 and losing 1. The Under 9s had a great time and won 2 games, lost 5. We ran a very successful "Dynamos" course for boys and girls in school years 3-6. So the youth cricket is

very healthy at Upton St Leonards. However, the club is suffering, like so many organisations, from lack of volunteers to do the work behind the playing teams: team managers / coaches, admin, groundsmen. The 2025 season may be tough, as we face retirements of Chairman, Secretary, two coaches, head groundsman. Would any readers like to help in the background? Contact Andy Russell


Freedom of Upton - we have a new Freeman!!

It was fantastic! The Gloucester group CCS Taiko gave us a most unusual evening. The Japanese style drumming was not only for the ears, but for eyes: movements choreographed with each drummer swaying and using body, arms and sticks,



synchronised to emphasise the performance. I hope the first picture gives an impression of the choreography. Most of the drums here are untuned, Nagado-daiko, and the group also used smaller Shime-daiko drums which can be tuned. The sound can be very loud, but the band moved between strong rythmic passages to

smooth quiet phrases. The second picture is Oliver performing a solo on the big drum, the O-daiko.



When they perform again in the Village (that's when, not if!), come and listen and hear and see for yourself.

PS the performance raised nearly £700 for the "Raise the Roof" fund. Thanks to the band, and the church people who provided a glass of wine in the interval.

Taiko has been a very important and historic part of Japanese culture for many years. Peter Hewitt, the band's founder, explained what we were seeing and hearing and talked about the culture - his words made the evening yet more memorable. Peter's article in last May's issue talks about how this band started and its work with special needs children at Milestone School, who respond amazingly.
