Throughout the day, at the BMI Club there was a Fairground Organ playing, thanks to Rob Edwards and a BBQ with Strawberries and Cream.

Many thanks go to Mary McLachlan, hubby Mac and brother for their hard work cooking and serving the huge crowd of people well into the early evening.

Also a big thank you to Keith, Jan, John, Jan and Rachel behind the bar, they certainly deserved a drink for all their hard work.

So we are already starting to plan next year's festivities on the Green and hope that it will be used for lots more Village Functions.

Each month we will have an article on a member of our community. In our first issue the focus is on -

EVELYN RUMSEY

Evelyn is our first featured resident as she edited the Church News almost non-stop since 1967! Now 91 years young, she was born and schooled in Erdington before becoming a shorthand typist for a solicitor, an insurance company and then Birmingham National Fire Service. After moving to Wylde Green, a trip with her sister to Weston-super-Mare in 1939 provided a chance meeting with John, USL resident and future husband - just like in the movies! They married in 1943 and she became a telephonist for Gloucester Fire Service when John joined the Fleet Air Arm at Locking. They moved to Brockworth in 1946, had two children, Jenny and Tony and she joined the Mothers' Union in 1951. In 1956 they moved to Cross House, USL where Christine was born. Sadly, Christine died from breast cancer in 2005.

USL had no street lighting when she moved here. With gaslight downstairs and loos outside, you had to go to bed with a candle. Some things change for the better it seems, although it was far smaller then. Six Acres, St. Leonards Close, Perry Orchard and the M5 didn't exist.

She was an active member of the church, a choir member for over 25 years and on the Parochial Church Council for 40 years in the catering department. Evelyn still organises the Church Flower Rota and is the secretary of Upton Mothers' Union. She has been President and Secretary of the Upton W.I. This group raised money from carol singing for a tea for the Upton elderly in 1961 and this became the 'Get-together Club' where Evelyn was treasurer, then chairman and she has only recently retired from its committee. Evelyn was chosen to visit Highgrove where she and others represented the W.I. to celebrate its 90th Anniversary at a tea hosted by Camilla, Duchess of Cornwall. For years she made Upton cricketers' teas, often on both weekend days!

As if this wasn't enough, Evelyn joined the Upton St. Leonards Players and became treasurer and fondly



remembers the many soirées where she organised suppers. She served as secretary on the Village Hall Committee, joined the Social Committee when the Spring Show was formed and is delighted that it is still running. Other achievements include organising adult and junior village quizzes and the junior one is still popular. For over 30 years Evelyn served on the Flower Show committee as Catering Officer, Secretary and now sorts entry forms as she can 'do that sitting down' - we think she deserves a sit down now!

With five grandchildren and eight great grandchildren to occupy her and hobbies of crochet and knitting, Evelyn reflects that Upton is a 'lovely, friendly village' with many activities on offer. She believes modern families' many commitments make it hard to support events but she's glad the Flower Show remains popular. She was pleased to see so many supporters at the opening of our beautiful new village green in July.

We're pleased to see you looking good Evelyn and that many of the village events that you helped to start, are still going strong.

Nutty Badgers Explorer Scout Unit

Nutty Badgers ESU is Upton's Scout Unit for young people over the age of 14.5 years. We have the second largest group in the Gloucester District but not all our young people come from the village.

Explorer Scouting as a District Unit has 5 Leaders and 35 young people. We support a number of Beaver Colonies, Cub and Scout Packs plus Guide units with our Young Leader program.



Recently the last ever Sun Run took place on Cleeve Hill and we were there in force with 5 Leaders and 21 Explorers taking part in either the 13 or 26 mile run / walk.

Summer Camp will be a first when we experience Narrow Boating. Not the image you would associate with a summer camp! But the Leaders have undergone 2 weekends of training and assessment. Now the tranquil waterways around Stratford and Birmingham will be disturbed by 3 narrow boats full of Leaders and Explorers. We also have our annual

County Explorer weekend in October and the County Kayaking Foundation Course to look forward to.

Two of our Explorers this summer take part in their personal goals to achieve one of Scouting's highest awards, the Explorer Belt. This really is the challenge of a lifetime and is open to Explorer Scouts over 16 and members of the Scout Network.

It is a chance to take part in a 10 day expedition that brings a real understanding of a different country, its people and way of life through travelling through a country and working as a small team with local people on projects whilst at the same time walking over 100 miles! We wish our 2 Explorers a safe expedition as they travel with International Teams in Poland and Japan.

The 23rd International Scout Jamboree takes place in Japan in 2015 and Gloucestershire Scouting only has 30 places. As a Unit we were lucky to have 3 young people accepted along with one of our Leaders. We wish them good luck with their massive fund raising task and training program.

So whilst the unit is very active, we are always limited by funding and we are forever competing with other organisations for opportunities ie bag packing or marshalling at events. The Priest-in-Charge, Rev Christine Birkett writes

Dear Friends

Let's embrace September with a bountiful bundle of positive expectation for the autumn season!

Although it is traditionally a time for harvest, it's also a time for starting new things. It is the start of the academic year and young people go back-to-school after the summer break. Hence it is a time to also start new routines which often revolve around school terms.

So, I offer a very warm welcome to our new village magazine. If you have anything to be included into the Church News section please forward it to me by email by the 8th of the month and I shall look forward to your input and feedback for future editions. I do hope you enjoy reading Upton St Leonards Life incorporating Church News.

Our monthly coffee morning will resume again as will our monthly afternoon Communion Service which is hosted by Mother's Union.

Did you know that it was on the 28th September 1745 that the national anthem was sung for the first time? We may not be singing the national anthem on 28th of September this year but we will be welcoming Bishop Martyn to Upton St Leonards Church to conduct our Confirmation Service at 3pm. Please come along and support our candidates and stay for tea afterwards.

In September we celebrate and commemorate many occasions and many individual Christians who have had significant impact in the church and the world, for instance there is Matthew the Apostle (21 Sept) Michael and All Angels (29 Sept) and many more.

However there is a day in particular which I want to bring to your attention and it is Holy Cross Day (14 Sept).

The cross on which our Lord was crucified has become the universal symbol for Christianity, replacing the fish symbol of the early church, though the latter has been revived in recent times. After the end of the persecution era, early in the fourth century, pilgrims began to travel to Jerusalem to visit and pray at the places associated with the life of Jesus. Helena, the mother of the emperor, was a Christian and, whilst overseeing excavations in the city, is said to have uncovered a cross, which many believed to be the Cross of Christ. A basilica was built on the site of the Holy Sepulchre and dedicated on 14 September 335 AD.

The cross is a symbol of all that Jesus did for the world, and has become the badge of a Christian and we are used to seeing it in two forms. The crucifix, a cross carrying the figure of Christ nailed to it is in remembrance of Jesus giving his life on the cross on that first Good Friday in order to restore our relationship with God. Jesus pleaded forgiveness for the human race and accepted his death in place of ours. The other cross is the empty cross; a symbol of the resurrection in which Jesus defeated death and rose again. After appearing to his followers he was eventually raised up and ascended into heaven to sit at the right hand of God, and to be our advocate. The resurrection is the sign that his plea for forgiveness had been received and accepted, and the Ascension was the point in which heaven was opened for all people and eternal life had begun.

There is no better symbol of hope than the one Jesus provided through the cross (and resurrection). It is right therefore to celebrate the Holy Cross as a symbol of our Christian faith.

For many of us the Crucifixion is the most significant event in the history of the world, and a sign of God's grace and blessing.

The hymn 'Lift High The Cross' by G.W. Kitchin and M.R. Newbolt speaks not only about the death of Christ, but about the love Jesus showed for the human race. The story of the cross is one of love, mercy, and forgiveness and calls for our response. I shall leave you with the chorus: Lift high the Cross, the love of Christ proclaim till all the world adore his sacred name.

Helena Arnold, Diocesan Director of Education, on educating one million children

The Church of England is the largest single provider of schools in the country, with 4,500 Church of England Primary schools, and over 200 Church of England Secondary schools.

As the largest provider of schools nationally, the church is in a unique position to offer a helpful perspective into the national conversation about establishing shared 'British Values' and strong cohesive communities. After all, the 'common good' is not just the aggregate of numerous individual actions, but a shared perspective across diverse communities and an understanding about the conditions that make communities and individuals flourish.

Church schools are dedicated to serving children of Christian faith, other faiths and no faith, ensuring an inclusive education where every child receives an excellent education within a framework of Christian values.

Helping people to understand and critically evaluate the major faith traditions and to draw on their insights in relation to major ethical issues is part of preparing children for effective citizenship. Schools hold a central place in local communities, and face the challenge of balancing the needs of that community with those of a wider context.

Nearly one million children attend Church of England schools; this is more than five times as many people as are estimated to attend Church of England services on Sundays! The responsibility of the church to 'step up to the mark', to ensure schools are well-governed, teachers supported and pupils nurtured, is both a privilege and an honour and is perhaps one of the greatest gifts we can share.

How Church Schools Work

Each diocese has a Diocesan Board of Education (DBE) and Director of Education (DDE). The DBE determines school policy and focuses on standards, Christian distinctiveness, RE and strategic system development.

DBEs are made up of a wide variety of people who have the skills, experience and interests required to run the school system on behalf of the Church. The DBE Measure is the statutory instrument which determines the work and composition of the DBE.

From the Bishop of Tewkesbury, the Rt Revd Martyn Snow

It was announced in August that Bishop Michael has, for personal reasons, stepped back from his ministry as Bishop of Gloucester. This news has caused great sadness across the diocese.

Various news outlets have been carrying a story about a police investigation into certain allegations relating to more than 30 years ago. You will realise that this is very traumatic time for everyone involved and affected by these news reports. Please hold them all in your prayers.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has signed an Instrument of Delegation allowing me to act as diocesan bishop in the absence of Bishop Michael.

You may already be aware, but we have taken the very difficult decision to postpone the visits of Bishops Mary, Sadok and Thomas from our partner dioceses. We will however go ahead with the Partnership Service on Sunday 7 September at 3pm in the Cathedral.

I would like to warmly invite you to the service in the hope that we can gather to mark our own partnership in the gospel and to pray for one another and our link dioceses.

Thank you for your prayers and understanding.

Diocesan Directors of Education and their staff are highly capable educational administrators who have the background required to run and support Church schools. The DDE's team will comprise experts in buildings and finance, governance, admissions, RE and school support.

Parishes are encouraged to work closely with their schools. Often, the incumbent, church wardens and other PCC members are governors of the school. Beyond these formal constitutional links there is huge scope for schools and parishes to work together in the interest of good learning and community development.

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WORLD WAR 1 CENTENARY EXHIBITION

UPTON REMEMBERS

The 100th anniversary of the start of World War One was marked by a truly remarkable exhibition in the Village Hall on August 9-10. The exhibition was the culmination of a year or more of hard work and research by Mike Stratford and a project in the Village school. Villagers and others searched through their own family treasures to find letters, photographs, notes and other memorabilia to add to the display.

The exhibition attracted hundreds of visitors from the village and further afield. Many came just to have a quick look but found themselves staying for a couple of hours, so fascinating was the presentation.

I was particularly struck by reading about the remarkable Millard family of Pincott Farm. Widow Alice Millard raised a family of 10 children, 7 boys. Five of those seven fought in WWI, two died. What a sacrifice to have to endure.

The work done by today's school children was equally fascinating. The youngest ones drew or painted pictures of poppies. Older classes studied letters home and war diaries, and then wrote their own imagined versions. One 'diary' read like a football score: "We got 5 of theirs, they got 2 of ours, then we had tomato stew, disgusting".

WOT NO COCOA!

One of the stories researched by today's school children was a report that at one time in WWI there was a severe shortage of sugar brought about by the sinking of cargo vessels, so if children wanted their daily drink of cocoa at the Upton village school they had to bring their own sugar, if they had any. School often had to end early in winter because of a shortage of coal to heat the school rooms.

Much of the material and research is to be kept in the school for future studies.

UPTON SAINT LEONARDS FLOWER SHOW

The flower show originated in the late 19th century at Bowden Hall when in the ownership of the Birchalls. It became the highlight of the year for the village when villagers were invited to Bowden Hall grounds. It was held at Bowden hall until 1925 when the estate was sold.

It then moved to fields opposite the Village Hall where Saint Leonard's Close now stands. An idea of its importance can be gauged from the fact that the flower show committee in 1925 consisted of 32 people. The committee included the vicar, church wardens and members of the parish council. Included in the show were adult classes for fancy dress competitions. At one show there was a stagecoach which was held up by a highwayman.

The show was then held on fields adjoining Commelines Mill. The show consisted of horse jumping and showing classes, tug of war competitions, and the usual flower and vegetable exhibits.

The show has also been held on fields near the Stanley. One year the marquee blew down during the night, the show was thus delayed.

The show then moved to the Village Hall and grounds where it has been held until the present day.

USL Neighbourhood Watch

We are lucky compared to other areas around Gloucester that crime is low in our village. There are many reasons for this and having a number of Neighbourhood Watch schemes does give us an extra layer of protection when considering the psychology of offender behaviours. We currently have 10 schemes covering a large part of the older village.

With crime so low some of you may wonder whether you are in a Neighbourhood Watch scheme because you may not have had a crime related message for a long time. If you haven't received a Neighbourhood Watch newsletter called "Cascade" in the last 3 months then you are not in a scheme or it may have lapsed.

Receiving the occasional message to review your security and think about reporting any suspicious behaviour by strangers can help make our community a safer place in which to live.

It is simple to set up a scheme. We do need a contact who we can pass the occasional crime related messages to and who can distribute the newsletters 3 times a year. I produce the introduction letters and initial information for all the members at the start of the scheme and there is no need for any meetings or other organisation.

You will then be registered with the Police and have the support of my office for any crime related information. We can also help resolve "quality of life" issues (not classed as crimes) which may require Council or other Agency interventions.

Keeping yourselves, your families and possessions safe is not rocket science. Clearly there is no way to guarantee that you won't be a victim of crime but being in Neighbourhood Watch is one preventative measure that could make a difference. TUG-O-WAR

Back in the 1960's and 70's Upton had a tug-o-war club that competed at national level and was of high renown, led by the likes of Mike Long and Mike Barnfield. There is a trophy cabinet in the BMI stuffed full of all sorts of awards.

Well, there is a new outfit using the Rec, indeed using the hoist installed by the old village team.

On Thursday evenings you will see a squad of young men and women practising hard. They are the Gloucestershire Army Cadet Force Tug-o-War squad. And just like the village team before, they have a national reputation. We can't claim that this is a village team, but we can enjoy some vicarious pleasure that the squad training here is so good.

At the National championships, held in Lincoln in June, the squad won silver in Junior Men 530 Kg class and silver in Junior Men 560 Kg class. The girls did even better, winning gold in Junior Women 480 Kg Class and gold in Junior Women 520 Kg Class. The girls squad will be going on to represent England in an international event.

PETANQUE (or French Boules as some people know it)

The Pétanque club has been going for over 15 years, using the pistes at the recreation ground.

Joyce Smith lived in Upton almost her whole life. She was a daughter of local builder Ben Moore. For many years Joyce and her husband Keith organised an annual dance in the Village Hall, with disco and fish & chip supper. Joyce loved acting, particularly in comedy parts, and was regularly on stage with the St Leonards Players. Much more recently, Joyce and Keith were founder members of the village Petanque Club.

This month marks 100 years since World War 1 began. World War 1 was called` The Great War' because the war was so massive that people thought it would never happen again.



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
