Committee as normally catering is geared to 200 people and more than 300 came!







"Hello Vicar"

As a child my parent's friends were known to us as Mr & Mrs and I still find it difficult to address certain people, whom I've known since childhood, by their first

names, despite the fact that I am now older than they were when I first met them. Even close family friends were given the title aunt and uncle. I clearly remember being shocked when my dad invited my sixth form friends to call him Sam. It was radical to speak to a parent by their first name.

How we address other people is significant and as we get to know people more intimately we often address them differently. Children are given pet names, friends names become shortened and certain names stay with us during particular seasons in our lives; our school days or our military service years for example.

In my working life I find myself addressed in all sorts of ways; Rev Clodagh, Rev Ingram, Clodagh and occasionally, Vicar. 'Hello Vicar' is usually the way a stranger addresses me when I am doing something in my formal capacity. It helps people identify me without having to remember my name.

At home and among family and friends my formal titles are seldom mentioned and I'm referred to as mum, Conall or Ffion's mum, Dan's wife, Morfudd's daughter in law or Auntie Clodagh.

Yesterday I was greeted by 'Hello vicar' on two separate occasions by people who have met me before and I was struck by the fact that for the first person, 'Hello Vicar' was a way of keeping me at arm's length and making it clear that our relationship was still on a very formal basis. Yet for the second person the greeting of 'Hello Vicar', was one of affection, the person addressing me taking delight in the fact that I am her Vicar. We have known each other for a number of years and she is very supportive of the work I am doing.

It made me think about how we address God and how some of us never feel able to address God in anything other than a formal way. The formality can be for a number of reasons, it can be our way of keeping God at arm's length or it can be because we have not spent time getting to know him personally and so God remains a stranger.

God does not want us to keep him at arm's length. It's the reason he sent his son Jesus into the world so that we would know how much God loves us and that it is possible to have a relationship with him: a relationship within which we can call him Father. But a bit like my recent experience of being addressed with 'Hello Vicar' addressing God as 'Father' can be done in a number of ways. Father can sound very formal and yet it depends on the context. For those of us who think of God as cold and uncaring the word 'Father' evokes formality and discipline but for those of us who know God loves us and delights in us to call him 'Father' is a title filled with joy and an intimacy.

My hope and expectation is that people who first meet me as 'Vicar' come to know me as Clodagh. God calls us into relationship with him and with one another, it take time and effort to build relationships but our lives are enriched and enabled when we see beyond any perceived formality whether that is in others or in God.

Work begins on Monday September 25th, after the last prearranged wedding and school Harvest services. Inevitably there will be some disruption within the church as the south aisle pews (the ones by the windows) will be out of action: they will be used for storing the organ parts when it is dismantled. Having received such great news I had to go back and practise and finish the hymn despite there being some blank notes and a reluctant "B" with full stops down!!!

We Will Remember Them

Continuing our series on the death toll in WW1, this month is the 100th anniversary of the death of another Villager.

Lewis Henry Lloyd

Lewis Lloyd was a dairyman. He was born in Cheltenham in 1883, and must have taken employment in Upton for a few years before WWI. His marriage with Harriet Turley (from the Forest of Dean) took place in St Leonards Church in 1906, but by 1911 they had moved to a village near Cirencester, and by the time the war started they lived in the Linden area of Gloucester at 15 Balfour Street, with one son and one daughter.


He served in the Bedfordshire Regiment as a Private with number 40951. He had also served in the Norfolk Regiment. He was killed on Friday 21st September 1917, age 35, during the Battle of Passchendaele. He has no known grave and his name is recorded on the Memorial Wall to the missing at Tyne Cot Military cemetery, Belgium.

The Coppice. Building a house in Upton in 1955

When Albert Osborn (Bill) bought the building plot at the corner of Bondend Road and Nuthill it was full of trees, mostly beech saplings, a few pines and a mature oak. It was Springtime and the ground was white with wild garlic in full bloom. From the beginning the family referred to the land as 'The Coppice' and when the house was built they kept the name.

Early in 1955 Bill was told by friends Colin Rumsey and John Herring, (all BMI members) that the owner of The Black and White House, Mr Little was selling two parcels of land in the village. Bill, who cherished the idea of building a home for his wife and family and had been looking for building land for some time, was convinced that this was the best opportunity that had come his way, so he spent all his savings on the purchase.

To get the project started the site needed clearing. Bill negotiated with a forestry worker at Cranham Woods to clear the trees in exchange for the wood; a large beech and a few tall pines were kept. Next, a vehicle was required for transporting materials so Bill bought an 'old banger', repaired the engine, removed the back seats and added a tow-bar to transport a mixer. Building plans were drawn up based on a house in Sneedhams Green. Throughout the whole project Bill's two boys Gerry and Geoff, then aged 15 and 10, worked alongside him every weekend and most evenings, sometimes until nine o'clock; friends and family joined in whenever they could. George Pegler, a friend and a master builder from Cotteswold Road, advised Bill on the construction process.

The main entrance was made in Bondend Road: a handmade tin shed was constructed to house building materials and tools. Diggers were very expensive to hire so the footings were dug by hand. When the bricks arrived from Coleford, each brick had been stacked by hand; it took three men from 8.30am until 4.30pm to unload and re-stack the bricks on-site. Building materials, which were bought on a 'pay-asyou-go' basis, were supplied by John Kent in Gloucester Docks. Both the outside and inside walls were constructed in brick, which meant a lot more work but Bill insisted on the best for the family home. He did every aspect of the work: bricklaying; plumbing; electrics; plastering; all the carpentry including fitting windows and building and tiling the roof. After 18 months, two bedrooms, a bathroom and a kitchen which only had a sink, were completed so the family moved



in. The remainder of the house needed floors, doors, facias, skirtings, plastering and decorating; this took another 18 months because materials were purchased when the family finances could stretch to it.

Bill was thrilled with the result of their efforts and Geoff and Gerry were proud to have worked alongside their 'dad' building the family home. The brothers said that their mother, Victoria Peace, known as 'Dinah,'



never complained, and although their dad was a strict parent, he 'lived for the family.'

The end of this story of 'Building The Coppice' is a tribute to their old workhorse, the converted car. The whole family had become so fond of the car that, when it finally became unrepairable they said, "we didn't have the heart to take it to the scrapyard so we buried her at the bottom of the garden."

Footnote: Bill always wanted 'The Coppice' to be kept in the family: his daughter Wendy lives there now.

Badgers Go to Sonderborg



The village Explorer Scout Group, Nutty Badgers headed over to Denmark this summer to participate at the International Scout Jamboree at Sonderborg. The unit had opted to fly from Bristol Airport via Amsterdam and then onto Hamburg, with a final coach journey to Sonderborg. A long day, finally ending up at a High School where overseas units were being over-nighted prior to the arrival day.

The next day we arrived at the jamboree camp site along with 45,000 other participants. To give you an idea of the scale of this Jamboree, it was massive, the area alone is 2km by 1.5km. It was divided into 4 sub-camps each with their own facilities ie supermarket, cafes, toilets etc. So we had to find our camp area which is the size of half a tennis

court (we were allocated 15sqm per person our area was 240sqm) think needle and haystack...! We met with our host Danish Scout unit and agreed on our pioneering structure that would become our home for the week.

Danish scouting is rather different from English scouting. They carry out a lot of pioneering, making items from wooden poles such as seats, shelters and kitchen areas. They use very little gas, but instead use wood for cooking on open fires. The wood piles were massive, with time schedules for each District to cut wood and bring it back to their camp area.

On Sunday evening we had the opening ceremony. It took 50 minutes to walk from our campsite to the main stage where all 45,000 participants and helpers met. During the following week the unit took part in various activities such as culture and science days; climbing up 25 metres into the tree tops, making pioneer structures to lift a car, meeting scouts from around the world, along with daily chores such as collecting water, wood and food.



The Danish scouts had written a cook book for the week designed to give participants an idea of typical Danish cuisine. As a unit we decided to follow this completely, unfortunately so did everyone else and that's when the cooking ingredients soon started to run out on a daily basis. So in good Scouting tradition improvisation had to take place. Whilst tomatoes and lettuce were bountiful, fruit was in short supply for the entire week. We made batches of Welsh cakes for handing out during social gatherings but had to take the currants out of packets of fruit and nut mix.

Weather for the week was mixed with high winds and massive downpours occurring often, the mud was everywhere and thousands of tonnes of wood chip and bark had to be bought to camp to assist with soaking up the mud. At the end of the week the sun finally came out for the closing ceremony where again we all met up.

Sunday morning we were able to drop camp in the blazing sun, however whilst we waited for the coach to take us to the airport, the heavens opened up and thousands of scouts were soaked to the skin. Finally the coach arrived and we headed south to Hamburg and our return to home.

Speeding Vehicles

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
