

It was great to see Ray Tickner's painting of a cricket game in 1977 on the Rec on the front cover of the August issue. The painting was donated by Mary, his widow, to the Cricket Club, and hangs in the pavilion now. I love doing a "spot the difference" between then and now. ## **Upton Walkers**

We have had the pleasure of walking and seeing lovely countryside on trips to Yorkshire, Cumbria, Wales, East Anglia, the West Country and of course locally, where we have made use of many country pubs! To celebrate our original walk, we still meet for lunch at the Royal William on New Year's Day. In addition we have a BBQ once a year in the summer and an annual lunch in the autumn. Who knows how long we can continue, but it has been very healthy and great fun with good friends.

Rev Clodagh Ingram writes

#### Stewardship

Throughout the Sundays of September, culminating in our Harvest Service on the Perry Orchard Allotments on Sunday 29<sup>th</sup>, we are going to be considering Stewardship.

Stewardship is deeply rooted in the biblical understanding of God as the creator from whom all things come, and how we, as his people are accountable to God for what we do with all that God has entrusted to us.

The word 'stewardship' comes from the ancient Greek word 'oikonomous', which means the manager of the household or household affairs. Stewards in the ancient world managed the household affairs of their master, who entrusted everything to them for safe keeping, particularly when they were absent.

In the story of Joseph, one of the earliest bible stories, an enslaved Joseph becomes the Egyptian Potiphar's steward. Joseph had complete responsibility for his master's belongings. Joseph was totally trusted to make decisions in his master's place; he was trusted with everything including Potiphar's wife. Unfortunately she takes a fancy to Joseph but Joseph acts completely honorably towards her. If you've ever seen 'Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat' you will have seen the outcome. If not you can read the story for yourself in Genesis Chapter 39 (look it up at Biblegateway.com if you don't have a bible).

Stewardship is often equated to how we spend our money but it is about so much more than that. We are, each one of us, made in the image of God, and given responsibility for his world and sharing his love. Stewardship encompasses how we use all of our resources: our time, our abilities, skills and talents, our relationships, the environment, our money and our belongings.

Every Sunday we have a collection during the Service. It is called the Offertory to remind us that we are offering back to God some of what he has given to us. We do so not because we have to but as a loving response to God's love and generosity towards us. The money is received with these words: 'All things come from you Lord, and of your own do we give you for your praise and purposes.' Stewardship begins when we recognise that Jesus is our Saviour and God's plans and purposes are for each one of us

to live life in all its fullness: a life which radiates generosity towards God and other people.

If you would like to find out more why not join us for a Sunday Service. We meet at 10am every week; or come along to the Alpha Course beginning on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> September at 7.30 at Upton St Leonard's Primary School, or give me a ring.

### Churchyard Tales

Yes, we're trying to regenerate the gloomy and somewhat dark garden of remembrance to a place where it will become more inviting for people to come and remember their loved ones. The four holly trees that grew from uninvited saplings have been felled, which is beginning to let some more light into this area. However the large beech tree needs some serious attention. Our tree



surgeon has advised us that it is seriously unbalanced so he will be taking some of the weight off the tree and crown it so as to not only preserve and care for the tree but also to enable some more light to get through to the remembrance garden. 

## This month's feature: The Wesleyan Chapel - Postscript

In the May edition of the U.S.L. Life magazine I presented an article about the Wesleyan Chapel and Sunday school that were situated where Perry Orchard meets the High Street. At the end of the piece I asked if any one in the Parish could remember anything about the Chapel and Sunday school. It was lovely when two Parishioners contacted me.

Here are some of their memories.

#### First, Rachel Hall, formerly Staite.

Rachel was born in Manor Cottage on the  $10^{th}$ , July 1932 . As a child she remembers her Grandmother, Louisa, was a member of the Mothers' Meeting which met at the Chapel. Louisa helped to make the first Mothers' Union banner which now hangs in St Leonards Church.

Rachel remembers that meetings at the Chapel always started with a hymn and a prayer and that often there was a speaker. She also remembers that a doctor from Painswick held a surgery once a week in the Chapel room. Later this moved next door to Laurel Cottage, in the High Street.

Rachel attended the Chapel Sunday school and youth club where she played table tennis and took part in drama productions (Girls only). She fondly remembers annual Chapel teas celebrating the Chapel's opening. Rachel married her husband Trevor in 1954 in St Leonards Church.

Below is a copy of one of Rachel's photographs, showing the opening of the Chapel in 1913.

Rachel's Mother and Grandmother are in the gathering. Everyone looking splendid, I guess you would say,"All in their Sunday best". Rachel's Mother was married at the Chapel in 1928.

Best apples to be had.


Its all gone now and that's a shame,

# September's Art Page - with a Train Theme

#### ADELSTROP by Edward Thomas (1878 – 1917)

Yes, I remember Adelstrop
The name, because one afternoon
Of heat, the express-train drew up there
Unwontedly, it was late June

The steam hissed. Someone cleared his throat. No one left and no one came
On the bare platform. What I saw
Was Adelstrop – only the name

And willows, willow-herb, and grass, And meadowsweet, and haycocks dry, No whit less still and lonely fair Than the high cloudlets in the sky.

And for that minute a blackbird sang Close by, and round him, mistier, Farther and farther, all the birds Of Oxfordshire and Gloucestershire.

Thomas wrote this poem following a railway journey during which his train stopped briefly at the now-closed station in the Gloucestershire village of Adelstrop.

Although not strictly a war poem, it has become popular in anthologies because of its reference to a peaceful time and place, only a short time before the outbreak of the First World War.

Thomas enlisted in 1915 and was killed in 1917. This poem was published three weeks after his death.

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Murder on the Orient Express by Agatha Christie, published in 1934, is a novel featuring the Belgian detective Hercule Poirot. The Orient Express train is stopped by heavy snowfall en route from Istanbul to London.

Poirot is one of the passengers and on the second night of the journey when the train is at a standstill due to a snowdrift, an elderly American is found murdered in his compartment. Poirot is asked to investigate and the novel moves at a brisk pace, with many improbabilities which Christie succeeds in making convincing.

(The book was made into a film in 1974 starring Albert Finney as Poirot and including many famous actors – Sean Connery, Lauren Bacall, John Gielgud, Vanessa Redgrave and Ingrid Bergman. A second film was released in 2017, directed by Kenneth Branagh and featuring Johnny Depp, Judi Dench, Derek Jacobi and Olivia Coleman.

NOT ADELSTROP by Dannie Abse (1949 - 2009)

Not Adelstrop, no – besides the name hardly matters. Nor did I languish in June heat, Simply, I stood, too early, on the empty platform, and the wrong train came in slowly, surprised, stopped. Directly facing me, from a window, a very, very pretty girl leaned out.

When I, all instinct, stared at her, she, all instinct, inclined her head away as if she'd divined the much married life in me, or as if she might spot, up platform, some unlikely familiar.

For my part, under the clock, I continued my scrutiny with unmitigated pleasure.

And she knew it, she certainly knew it, and would not glance at me in the silence of not Adelstrop.


Only when the train heaved noisily, only when it jolted, when it slid away, only then, daring and secure, she smiled back at my smile, and I, daring and secure, waved back at her waving. And so it was, all the way down the hurrying platform as the train gathered atrocious speed towards Oxfordshire or Gloucestershire.

And finally - a film set on a train - The Lady Vanishes (1938) directed by Alfred Hitchcock, based on a story written by Ethel Lina White from Abergavenny. The film features Margaret

Lockwood, Michael Redgrave and May Whitty. Yet again, a group of travellers is delayed by an avalanche on a train heading for England. One passenger disappears. Romance blossoms as two travellers begin to investigate the mystery. This film is an absolute classic and we recommend it to you.
