



Important Message from Lianne Hiscock PCSO

Police have issued a warning after fraudsters targeted people across Gloucester in phone call scams where they claimed to be Police Officers. In one incident the fraudster claimed to be a DI Warley working from Bearlands police station. He was described as sounding polite and asked probing questions. When the resident, a 90-year-old woman, questioned his authenticity he



asked, "don't you trust your local police?". She realised this was an attempt at a scam and ended the call.

In another attempted scam the trickster called a woman aged in her 70s and claimed to be a DC Martin Rowley from Bearlands police station. He said her bank card had been used to buy items and that he would transfer her to the fraud investigation team.

In a similar attempt earlier this week the person claiming to be DC Rowley called a woman aged in her 50s and used her name. He told her that her card had been cloned and she needed to go to a bank and withdraw cash. He also said that staff at the bank were under investigation and the woman needed to go to the bank that day as he wanted to arrest them as soon as possible. When she refused to reveal her bank details the man ended the call.

Detective Inspector Matt Phillips from the Serious and Organised Crime Unit said:

The fraudsters were described as having been polite and asking probing questions in a bid to make themselves sound convincing. These are organised crime groups who work together and often target a location at a time, making thousands of phone calls until someone falls victim to it.

They will sometimes know your name when they call, as there are databases online, but please don't let this trick you. They will often be polite and sound professional so they gain your trust - they are manipulative and very convincing.

In some cases the fraudster also gives a collar number and asks you to ring 101 or 999 to check they are who they say they are, but this is just part of the scam as the caller leaves the phone line open and you just end up talking to someone else involved.

"They will also often tell the person they're trying to con not to tell anyone else about the call, including their own family or the bank. They will then arrange for a courier to come and collect the items - either cash, gift cards or other expensive items - at a location such as your home or place of work.

"I would urge people to please tell your elderly or vulnerable relatives and friends about this type of scam - no police officer or other official will ever ask you to withdraw money from your bank, pass over your bank details or hand over cash to someone."

Neither police nor bank officials will ever ask you to withdraw money from your account, purchase anything or hand over your personal details or passwords. If you believe you are being targeted by a scammer hang up the phone and use a different phone line to call Action Fraud or the police, as scammers have a way to stay on the line and will pretend to be the police when you call back. If you don't have access to a different phone line, wait for a period of time and try calling a family member or friend first to make sure the scammer is no longer on the line.

Just because someone knows basic details about you like your name, address or date of birth, it doesn't mean they are genuine bank or police employees. Always question suspicious phone calls and report them to Action Fraud or the police.

If you think you or someone you know has been defrauded, you can report it to Action Fraud online or by calling 0300 123 2040.





BOOK REVIEW

NO HIGHWAY by Nevil Shute (1899 – 1960)

A scientist claims that certain parts of a plane will develop metal fatigue sooner than officially estimated. He is not taken seriously.

There are many themes covered in this book including attitudes to safety, conflicts of interest between management and



professionals, the Cold War and even clairvoyance.



"On Sunday 1st of August we sang in church"

Now if I'd written that statement eighteen months ago then I think your response, dear reader, would have been "so what James, we do that every week!" But after the year we have had this is certainly a statement worth making.

When churches across the UK were re-opened last year after the first lockdown, congregations were unfortunately not allowed to sing. It was thought that singing in church would help the spread of Covid through the build up of aerosols in the air. That restriction was lifted on August 1st at St Leonards and so, after 18 months with barely a sung note in our ancient place of worship, we once again raised our voices in praise. But why do we sing hymns in church, and why have we missed singing them so much?

Hymns are firmly rooted in God's word and, since they are intended to be sung corporately by the fellowship of believers and pull us above earthly matters by reminding us of God's hope for us – that we would be one.

Hymns are intended to reflect the qualities of God, they have poetry that is beautiful, reverent, simple, accurate and pure. The words must be scripturally sound, purely true and without embellishment. Every word must count, and this is true for hymns both ancient and modern.

Many great hymns have been sung literally for centuries, but we do not sing hymns because they are old; we sing them because they are so true that they have survived all the fads of language and musical trends. If modern hymns live, it will be for the same reason.

No wonder then, that when times are confusing or the world is in upheaval, we find ourselves needing songs that are rooted in the deep truths of our faith. The great hymns excite our emotions and excite our minds, our emotional response is therefore much deeper and to have lost that response in our worship has been a great loss. But, hopefully, all that is behind us now and once again we can sing our hearts out in great hymn confirmations of truth. Once again let us rejoice in the songs that transcend these world problems and uncertainties and let us be glad and rejoice in God our saviour and redeemer.

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Feature Article - Street Vetting

Street Vetting started in London in late 2016, the joint idea by two vets who saw the need to provide veterinary care for the Homeless (https://www.streetvet.co.uk/). Since then many cities across the UK have local groups of vets and registered veterinary nurses that provide care, free of charge, to the Homeless. Each Team gives its time freely and



most of the care is provided by each city's StreetVet Team out on the streets. Please do read the homepage because it gives a fuller insight into the whys and wheres of this amazing Charity.

SV Gloucester was set up in March 2019 which is when I started helping out. Initially we met on a Friday morning at the George Whitfield centre and then on alternate Saturday evenings we walked around the city centre, introducing ourselves to possible clients. Word soon got around about our work and liaison with community policing and the wonderful people at the George Whitfield, namely Gloucester City mission, helped cement our credentials.

Unfortunately, COVID scuppered our use of the GWC, and The Mission stopped their outreach on Saturday evenings supporting people. Undaunted, and with the superb support of our Team lead, Tim Sandys, we now have a weekly outreach for one hour at Gloucester Park bandstand and a second hour near Kingsholm Stadium where several hostels are located. Each outreach takes two backpacks full of diagnostic equipment and simple drugs, toys, treats, leads and coats. Companies provide food free of charge and will even deliver this directly to the client. Drug companies also provide a range of treatments free of charge, and members of the public buy pet-related stuff from each city's Amazon wish list. Tim has all the kit, spare food and takes deliveries at his home so half of his garage is now taken over by SV paraphernalia!

Our work on the streets is backed up by two local Gloucester vet Practices, Wood Vet Group and SPA Vets, providing surgical and hospital support at reduced rates when needed. This is largely for routine neutering and urgent events like dog bites but most care is provided by the StreetVet Team. Noah's Ark Pet Taxi will ferry dogs to one of the clinics and Teckels will often board a dog too for a few days if needed. We are fortunate to have such a collaborative approach by several interested parties and WhatsApp is invaluable when communicating with the Team.

Tonight I was messaged and agreed to attend a mercy mission where one of our clients was evicted but his dog was in his hostel room. I got his dog to him plus a few bits and pieces but tonight both are out on the streets with thunderstorms forecast.

One of the major successes of SV Gloucester is the acceptance by some hostels that SV dogs are well cared for, vaccinated, have regular flea and worm treatment and thus will allow dogs to stay with their owners. We provide cages where needed too. As already said, if the owner can't stay with their dog, they stay on the street.

The Homeless will often miss hospital visits or admission because no-one will look after their pets. Owners will go without themselves to feed their animals. It is the bond between owner and pet that keeps them both alive and generally off drugs and out of prison. They are given hope in what seems a hopeless world.

Consider John, not his real name, well spoken, tidy but homeless. He was in a relationship that went sour, his partner ran up debts, left him, the mortgage went into arrears, the house was re-possessed and he was on the streets of Gloucester. He lost his job and he was a lost soul. He got a dog, got a room in a hostel, got a job and slowly turned his life around. His dog has been a major part of his survival and his move back into mainstream society.

This is why I'm happy to give some of my time to others in need. Being part of the Gloucester Street Vet team has reminded me that anything can happen to us and it's the support of others that can make all the difference. Here's the webpage again and Gloucester's page too.

Do You Have Any Relatives in Australia?

Many people have family or relatives and friends who have emigrated to Australia.

This is a story about people from Upton who years ago went to Australia not of their own free will.

The transportation of so called criminals was employed from the end of the 17th Century as a means of supplying labour for the plantations of the West Indies and the Southern American colonies. After the American revolution transportations switched to colonise Australia from 1788 to 1869.

Deportation was usually for a petty crime, such as theft of property. More serious crimes were punished by death. Transportation was seen as a way of reducing the prison population in this country. Some prisoners were housed in prison ships anchored in the Thames or other rivers. Conditions on these ships were appalling.

It was recorded that three men from Upton were transported to Australia. By the end of transportation 160,000 people had been sent to Australia. One in seven of these were women, almost all for petty theft.

In August 1818 William Chadwick age 19 of Upton, a labourer, was sentenced to life and to be transported. He sailed on 20th November 1818 to Van Diemans Land (Tasmania) on board a ship called Hibernia.

In October 1819 Jonathan Taylor, age 49 of Upton, was sentenced to seven years and sailed on 23rd March 1820 to New South Wales on board a ship called Neptune I.

In January 1841 Thomas Poole a labourer age 36 of Upton, was sentenced to seven years and sailed on 30th August 1841 to Van Diemans Land on a ship called Barossa.

These three men were sentenced at Gloucester Quarter Sessions. I have yet to find out what their crimes were.

If they survived the voyage to Australia and after serving their time, most convicts stayed in Australia and joined the free settlers, some rising to prominent positions in Australian Society.

Today, many Australians consider it to be a cause for celebration to discover a convict in one's lineage.

Parliamentary Boundary Review

The Boundary Commission for England (BCE) launched a consultation on proposals for new Parliamentary constituencies on the 8th June 2021 and ended on the 2nd August 2021. Results of this initial consultation will be published by the BCE in early 2022. At the same time a number of public hearings will be held across the country providing a chance to voice views.



Any changes from this will be published later in 2022 and final recommendations will be presented to Parliament by 1st July 2023. For more details please go to BCEReviews.org.uk

For information, the initial response from your Parish Council is shown below.

Upton St Leonards Parish Council is totally opposed to the Parliamentary Boundary changes proposed by the Boundary Commission for the following reasons:

Although Upton St Leonard's Parish and Stroud District Council are geographically very much a part of The Cotswold Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, parishioners have a long standing administrative relationship with the Stroud Constituency, which they would not wish to lose. Upton considers itself to be a 'Stroud' village with easy access (6 miles) to the centres of administration for District and Parliamentary Constituency matters.

Upton has a history of strong support for the current administrative arrangements and Commissioners should appreciate that in 1989 – the Parish fought successfully to avoid incorporation within the Gloucester City administrative boundary.

The parishioners and the Council have a strong bond with the Stroud Member of Parliament and indeed she attends Parish Council Meetings.

The Boundary Commission appear to be undertaking this process purely to satisfy numbers and do not appear to be reflecting 'community' interests and their related boundaries. The Parish believes this is a vital consideration at all levels of administration from Parish through to Parliamentary Constituency level.

These proposals also change the face of politics to the extent that it would appear from the demographics of the Stroud Constituency that will remain, it would most likely be a labour seat for the foreseeable future, even though one would have thought that the Commission should not be seeking to achieve that sort of outcome for what is a very balanced marginal seat that does frequently change hands thus evidencing a very wide spectrum of beliefs and aspirations

Update on Potholes

Many residents are concerned about the state of the roads in places in Upton. There are without doubt too many potholes and this leads to possible dangerous situations to cyclists and to possible damage to vehicles. Highways do have a protocol that states that a pothole has to be a certain depth before it will be put on the list for repair.

This can sometimes be very frustrating when they repair two close together but appear to have ignored another close by, simply because it didn't meet the protocol. Highways do have of course limited resources and they too have been affected by the Covid Pandemic in that staffing levels have often not been up to their normal levels.

I have personally raised the case of the state of Six Acres and I am hoping that this will be attended to very shortly. Many have been concerned regarding Nuthill. I can confirm that the main area of the road that is of concern about halfway up will be resurfaced in October, at last.

In the meantime please do not hesitate to report bad potholes yourselves (see example shown). I know it is easy to ask a Councillor to do it but the more that individual taxpayers report problems the more likely it is to get it resolved quickly.

Road Closures

Gloucestershire County Council intend to make an order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (as amended) to temporarily close and restrict part of the roads as detailed below.

Nut Hill, Upton-St Leonards Its junction with Bondend Road. Its junction with A46 Painswick Road, 2050 metres.

Bondend Road, Upton St Leonards and Its junction with Nut Hill. Its junction with Upton Lane, 658 metres.

Bondend Road, Upton St Leonards and its junction with Nut Hill. Its junction with The Stanley, Upton St. Leonards, 281 metres.

There will be no parking or waiting permitted throughout the duration of the works. The reason for the closures and restrictions is to carry out carriageway resurfacing.

The roads are expected to be closed and restricted on a rolling programme commencing 7th September 2021, where the presence of approved signage will indicate whether the closures and restrictions are in force. Further advance warnings of dates/times will be displayed on site prior to the closures and restrictions taking effect. It is anticipated all works will be completed by 31st December 2021.
