UPTON ST LEONARDS VILLAGE CHURCH NEEDS OUR HELP -

We are all well aware our church is in dire need of a new roof; it is leaking badly and the wet weather isn't helping. The cost of urgent repair is at least £350K if not more.

We may think that a problem regarding the church isn't our concern as there are a lot of us in the village who don't consider themselves "church goers" but the majority of us have used and will expect to use the church in the future.

Our church is used for a multitude of different things – the main one of course, is enabling regular church goers to enjoy their faith along with other like-minded people but as a community, we also expect to use it for happy events such as christenings and weddings and sad events such as funerals, burials and laying of ashes.

If our church were to close, which is a possibility if the money cannot be found for repairs, where in our village would we christen our children, see them get married, renew our wedding vows or say good bye to our loved relatives or friends and maybe have them buried in the graveyard or lay their ashes or place flowers in remembrance?

The church bells would no longer sound throughout the village to commemorate special events like the late Queen's Jubilees and the King's coronation and the Church Tower wouldn't be available to light up for personal anniversaries, in remembrance of our own people loved and lost but always in our hearts.


The church alone cannot meet the repair costs. Match funding and other external funding is being sought but we need to demonstrate our determination by raising a large amount in the first instance.

Fundraising for £350K plus is a daunting task and we need help. Is here anyone out there with experience of fund raising who is willing to give of their time and knowledge? What a growing season we have had – full of challenges. A late Spring meant a late start for us, but we managed sowing and planting during April and May. Then came HOT, DRY June! "Oh no we thought, not another year of constant watering". Never mind – we just got on with watering seedlings and plants and gathered a good crop of rhubarb. Then July hit us with what seemed like non-stop rain! OK – so no need to water, but didn't the weeds enjoy themselves?! Do we weed or do we harvest our crops? Soft fruit grew well and the blackbirds enjoyed themselves, but left us some. We lifted early potatoes and had a reasonably good crop. Salad and roots are doing well, so are the slugs and snails!

Several plot holders are growing flowers and they are blooming beautifully. August has brought us mixed weather, but we're hoping the warmer temperatures will spur the squashes, pumpkins, beans and tomatoes into action. We're keeping an eye out for the dreaded blight, especially as it thrives in warm, wet weather.

Now September is here we are busy getting ready for the Village Show with lots of fantastic produce to exhibit.



Book Review

A beginner's guide to garden composting

It has been estimated that households produce about half a tonne of vegetable waste each year and whilst most of us use kerbside waste recycling facilities, this waste can be very usefully employed at home (or allotment) to generate compost for the garden, veg plot or flower containers. If you have lawns and shrubs these too can generate waste to be beneficially used to enrich our gardens. Composting at home isn't difficult and it doesn't generate environmentally harmful byproducts either.

There are available any number of pieces of kit to enhance natural composting but it doesn't need to be costly or technically challenging either. For millennia gardeners have been simply mixing various compostable wastes in a heap and leaving nature to get on with the degradation process. It can be beneficial to give these processes a bit of a helping hand such as keeping a heap warm in winter or dry during very wet weather, but generally once naturally occurring worms and micro-organisms have entered the waste off it will go.

Building a simple box from waste pallets can make a heap more manageable and possibly more aesthetic, whilst plastic purpose manufactured products often appear on free websites. There does however need to be a bit of thought about what products can and will compost and how much to add at any one time. Most modern papers have biodegradable inks which will compost, although "scrunching" helps by providing greater surface area to biological processes, cardboard if torn apart, vacuum cleaner contents and pet hair will all compost. Composting



is mainly about balanced mixing of wet waste materials eg. veg waste and lawn clippings (technically referred to as green) and dry waste such as paper, card and animal hair (referred to as brown) to achieve a good mix. Too much green and the compost will potentially become too wet and may begin to smell, too much brown and the composting process can slow or even stop.

Most successful composting knowledge is gained by 'trial and error' although the internet contains vast amounts of both general advice through to highly scientific research which can be useful if things go wrong. My compost helps improve the yield in all our vegetable beds with very little input from me other than to keep it topped up with raw material. Happy composting.
