I had to contain my excitement for a whole month as I'd saved it to give to my Grandma on her 85th birthday when we were all together as a family. The ring had been underneath the lawn for over eight years. The grass has been mown every two weeks since then and I can't quite believe that it was so safely hidden and still quite shiny.

I'm so grateful to Andrew, Tim and Keith for their help in reuniting my Grandma with this ring. I would highly recommend them to anyone looking for treasure whether it's sentimental or historical. They gave up their free time to help look


There are two categories - adults and children.

If you enjoy history though, you need come no further than Upton St Leonards Village Hall where the village history group meets on the third Thursday of every other month at 7.45.

Our first meeting of the season kicks off on 19th September with a talk on Gloucestershire battles by Timothy Brain. For the rest of the year, we also have talks lined up on both Katherine of Aragon and Katherine Parr, (a third of Henry VIII's wives then!) and two talks by our own members, Andy Russell, on village charities and Edward Wyatt on his father Dennis Wyatt, as well as a Gloucestershire quiz in the summer.

At our July meeting 2024, Edward Wyatt gave us an illuminating talk on the life of Margaret Marden.

Many of us visiting St Leonard's church will have seen the memorial plaque, on the wall inside the church to the left of the doorway, and perhaps wondered who Margaret Marden was. And also why the family of Revd. R.J. Cooper had erected that plaque to someone described as 'Ladies Maid and Friend'?

Edward has done a lot of research into this project, finding out out about Margaret Marden, who was born in Upton in 1802 and died in the household of the Cooper family in 1891, having held various roles within that same family for over 60 years.

September is History Month, with Gloucester's very Sadly, because of his family commitments, Edward is stepping down from the committee of the History Group - he will be sorely missed, but we are looking forward to his talk on January 16th 2025. Edward was one of the founder members of the history group in September 1999, and we would like to give him a huge thank you for his sterling work, both on the committee for many years, and for producing the Annual Review over the last ten years, as well as giving at least one of our talks every year.



BOOK REVIEW


After Julius by Elizabeth Jane Howard

Elizabeth Jane Howard was an English novelist (1923 – 2014).

She wrote 12 novels including the best-selling Cazalet Chronicle. After Julius was published in 1965 and it is a subtle novel, readable and humane. It is twenty years since Julius died but his final heroic action still affects the lives of the characters in this novel.

Julius was killed while assisting in the Dunkirk evacuation during World War 2. His family gather for a weekend and take turns to narrate the story. Elizabeth Jane Howard is skilled at descriptions and uses them to help the reader understand the characters. One of the characters – Dan – is said to be based on Laurie Lee.

The Diocesan President, Doreen McLellan joined us and presented the Branch with a RISEUP campaign Bronze certificate. Entente Cordiale?

A view of the relationship between France and England



We have recently had our General Election and so have the French. The new government in this country will still have to tackle the problem of small boats arriving from France. Watching the English Channel for boats from France is not new. During World War II in 1940, boats large and small sailed to the French coast and rescued a large proportion of the British Army from Dunkirk. Over 338,000 British and French troops were safely evacuated by sea after Germany invaded France. During the war several governments came to England after their homelands were invaded by Germany. Among them were Norway, Holland, Greece, Poland and the Free French.

Charles de Gaulle arrived here after the Vichy government in France agreed an armistice (cease fire) with the Germans in 1940. He became leader of the Free French Army and chaired the provisional Government of the French



Republic but relations with the British Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, were always cool. De Gaulle never forgave Churchill for withdrawing British troops from France. He also complained that the office he had been given in London was too small. De Gaulle set up home with his family and moved to avoid bombing from London to Shropshire, Hertfordshire and finally Hampstead. Churchill gave de Gaulle airtime on the BBC to transmit messages to France and even offered to fund the Free French Forces. After the D Day invasion of Normandy by allied troops in June 1944 de Gaulle returned to France and made Bayeux the administrative capital of Free France. Free French forces were the first to enter liberated Paris on 25 August 1944.

De Gaulle was provisional President of France from 1944 until 1946. In 1958 he was called back from retirement to form the Fifth Republic following approval by a referendum. He was then elected President and remained in post until his resignation in 1969. He reluctantly attended Churchill's funeral in 1965 and never thanked Britain for giving him safe exile during the war.



At one time in history large parts of France were governed by a King of England. France and England (later Britain) fought 41 wars against each other between 1109 and 1815. That is a war every 17.3 years. France won 24 times, England won 11 times and six wars were unresolved. King Richard I spent only 6 months of his 10 year reign in this country and spoke French like all

the Norman Kings. Relationships between France and this country have not always been friendly. Will things change noticeably with the new governments in both countries, I wonder?





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
